PLANS COMPLETE FOR PHONE CO. OPEN HOUSE, OCT. 23-24

The telephone company will hold open house at the new telephone building on October 23 and 24. Joe McDonald, telephone manager, has announced. The hours of the open house will be from 1 p. m. till 5 p. m. on Friday and from 1 p. m. until 9 p. m. on Saturday. "We're closing down early Friday so everyone will have a chance to get to the football game," the manager said, "and we are staying open most of the day Saturday so we can get a chance to see as many of our McLean people as possible."

McDonald said that two special exhibits have been booked for the event. The first will be a Bell Solar Battery, which transforms sunlight into electrical energy. "This is one of the marvels of the scientific age," McDonald said. "Ten years ago if anyone said some day we would be turning sunlight into electricity we would have laughed at him—but this solar battery shows that it can be done." McDonald also said the battery is similar to one now being used to provide electrical energy for a radio in the United States satellite placed in orbit a short time ago. Besides the solar battery, the manager said, a "voice mirror" will also be brought to McLean. "With this device," he said, "you can hear your own voice just as it sounds on the telephone. It's really a lot of fun, and most people are surprised to find out they sound pretty good."

In addition to the exhibits the telephone company has planned a special tour of the building with people on hand to explain how each piece of the complicated machinery is used to provide McLean with telephone service. "One of the things that is amazing to most people," McDonald said, "is that we can show them the exact pair of wires that leads from the equipment to their own telephone. If a visitor can tell us his telephone number we can show him right where his telephone is connected to the equipment."

McDonald said special invitations have been prepared and will be sent to each telephone subscriber a few days before the open house.

Tigers Tackled By Rockets, 20-0

McLean's Tigers scored a fast first-quarter touchdown which was nullified by a penalty, and then failed to penetrate again for the remainder of the game as they fell to the AA Wellington Skyrockets, 20-0.

Playing on the Skyrockets' home ground, David Crockett launched the action early in the first period when he took a Wellington punt and galloped 70 yards to the end zone. The play was called back, and for the rest of the contest, the Tigers never were able to duplicate the scoring feat.

The non-district battle brought the Tiger record to three victories against two losses for the year. In district 2-A the Tigers hold a 1-0 mark.

Jumping to action in the second quarter, the Skyrockets scored after a 42-yard sustained drive, and with two minutes remaining in the half chalked the second TD. Both conversion attempts failed, and at intermission the Tigers trailed by 12-0.

In the third quarter it was a standoff, but in the final stanza, the Wellington squad managed a third TD for the night, adding the conversion to put the final tally at 20-0.

The Tigers worked at a disadvantage with the Skyrockets in the injuries of David Crockett in the backfield and Carey Don Smith in the line. Crockett had an injured ankle and Smith was hurt during the game.

Coach Clifford Bradshaw's Tigers will go into their second district 2-A tussle of the season tomorrow night as they travel to Panhandle to meet the Panthers, who now stand 20-0 in conference competition.

★ ★ TO PLAY 2-A TILT WITH PANHANDLE

Tomorrow night McLean's Tigers will take a 1-0 district record into their second conference tilt of the season as they go against the Panhandle Panthers there in a game set to begin at 7:30.

The Panthers of Coach Clint Williams are looking for their first victory of the season, having lost their first five encounters in a tough pre-district slate.

In 2-A the Panhandle squad lost to Clarendon 22-20 and to Canadian 20-8. In pre-district games they fell to Gruber 32-6, Childress 26-8, Stinnett 40-8, and Sunray 30-0.

McLean will be going for its second district victory, having defeated Canadian 8-0. McLean now has a season record of 3-2.

Presently the Tigers have scored 76 points offensively while holding their opponents to 62 points. Panhandle has scored 50 points while allowing opponents to score 170 points. This, however, is considering the fact that Panhandle has played three of the top-rated Class A teams in area.

In weight the Tigers will average 160 pounds per man in the line against 164 per man for Panhandle. In the backfield the Tigers average 150 compared to 153 for Panhandle.

Following tomorrow night's game, the Tigers will again tilt on the home field against Mertel Phillips.

IT COULD HAPPEN HERE!

A court decision in Rome, Italy, giving landowners the right to lay off farmhands at will, has brought communist-backed demonstrations, says the Associated Press.

A law passed shortly after World War II required farmers to employ a certain number of workers even when there was no work. The court has just declared this law unconstitutional, and sitdown strikes and demonstrations have been the result.

So what? We have no law requiring farmers to hire a given number of workers according to the size of their farms.

But it could happen here. There's plenty of feather-bedding just across the fence line in many industries, under court-approved contracts that require the hiring of unneeded workers when labor-saving practices are adopted.

Efforts already are underway to repeal the agricultural exemption under the federal wage-hour law, thus giving government the power to fix farm wages. In some sections farm workers and some producers are being pressed into labor unions, through coercion or promises of a better economic break.

Is it not possible that these trends, carried to their logical ends, could lead to federally-protected feather-bedding on the farm? We think the answer is obvious.—The Alabama Farm Bureau News

SOME DIVIDENDS!

E. F. Hutton, writing in the Houston Chronicle, has something illuminating to say about the economics of medical care.

"We gripe about the rising costs of hospital care and doctor's bills," he says. "Because they hit us when we are down, they seem worse than other rising costs of living."

"But there is an unnoticed silver lining. We live longer, stay well longer and get really sick less often than in days of yore. More sick people get well, and get well quicker than in the 'good old days.'

"Modern medicine, surgery and drugs have added seven years to the average life span since 1940. They

have reduced the average length of hospitalization by more than 16 days in the past 20 years, and made rapid cures possible in thousands of cases without going to a hospital. Some dividends!"

There seems to be a more or less widespread feeling that medical care costs have out-run general price increases. That view has been supported by statistical comparisons using base periods which result in a misleading conclusion. A fair comparison presents a very different picture. For instance, in the 20-year 1938-58 period the consumer price index rose 104.8%. Medical care costs rose 99.2%. And physicians' fees rose 89.9%—substantially less than the general index.

Statistics aside, how much are seven more years of life worth? How much is health worth? How much is speedy and complete recovery from illness worth? Such questions are impossible to answer in terms of money. But, whatever one's personal feeling, the medical care dollar buys an enormous return.

When you buy a 26-cent package of corn flakes, you're getting about three cents worth of corn. In a 20-cent loaf of bread, you're getting 2½ cents worth of wheat.

You cannot strengthen the weak by weakening the strong.



Dear Sir:

Last week I received a telephone call from a young West Berliner, Dagulf Mueller who had just returned from America. He had been given my address by Rev. Jack Riley and wanted to meet me.

Dag, as he wants me to call him, worked in New Haven, Conn., for eight weeks and then, along with other students from foreign nations, chose a tour to the western states. This tour took him to the McLean community.

With this letter I wish to express my thanks for the outstanding manner in which the citizens received these students, gave them lodgings for the night, etc.; but, most of all, for the warmth and cordiality these students received in our community. This put an everlasting memory of our town in the souls of each, that will live forever.

With this memory most prominent in his mind, Dag returned to Berlin, where I have the privilege of being stationed, and with

his words, "Will try to show me some of the brotherly love that was extended to him by all in McLean."

I will try to give some events that stand out in his memory about our community.

He told of his visit to the Haynes ranch, where he had the honor of sitting on the horse, "Old Red"; about putting on cowboy boots and belt in Mertel's store and how he visualized himself as a Texan; of Teen Town, one of the warmest, most friendly dances he has ever attended and especially of jitterbugging with a girl named Nancy, whom I think is Nancy Meacham; of the friendly discussion he had with Jimmie Don and Mrs. Morris. But I think the thing that stands out foremost in his mind is how, at the Groom-McLean football game, everyone was shouting "Come on, Tigers, beat those Groom Tigers." He states that the football game provided more fun and entertainment than any event while he was in America.

I could go on all day about the things he remembers most about McLean. It makes my chest swell with pride to be from a com-

munity where people are people such as in McLean.

Dag is a leading figure in the Film Club of Frei University of West Berlin. He has shown me things already about the "Island of Freedom" that normally I would not have enjoyed.

Every day in Berlin 110 miles behind the Iron Curtain, I see the influences of the communist doctrine, and then I can really realize what it is to be from America. It takes small places, as McLean, to unite and become a nation, so I know that with a core or inner being such as McLean, America is tops.

Thanks again for all this I have mentioned and what I failed to mention, for providing me with this friend here.




