

They Make Christmas Tree Needles Stay Put

Any homemaker who has ever contended with those thousands of little needles that fall from Christmas tree to carpet during the holidays will welcome the idea of having a real tree whose needles stay put.

Up in Santa Claus country, Ede and Roy Halvorson, of Duluth, Minn, make a regular practice of shipping out hundreds of just such trees each year.

Those are small spruce trees, designed for apartment and small home use, and each has protective coating which makes the trees last for several months even in a warm room.

This husband-and-wife busi-ness team ship their trees in the traditional green and in pink, blue, white and silver, too.

They got into the business by" way of growing the trees as a sort of weekend, hobby. At first, they found the business wasn't a going concern because the trees oked like plucked chickens before they could even ship them

It was then that they developed their own fluid coating to keep the trees from drying out. "We think the three-foot trees solve a lot of problems for a great many people," Ede Halvor-



That was said in a recent speech by Secretary of the Interior Seaton before a state reclamation association. 

The American "Bill of Rights consisting of the first ten amendments to our federal constitution all adopted at one time in 1791, specifies in some detail a number of basic civil rights of the individual citizen. Unaltered by subsequent amendments and jealously guarded by our courts. these privileges must still be respected by our governing bodies | today.


