This result, says The Wall Street Journal, "is a tribute to the financial resources and organizational skill of unions. It is also a tribute to the union leaders' ability to turn the English language upside down and inside out.

The Journal amplifies that view in these accurate words: "The unions, and their large echoes among some of the politicians, ware able to convey the impression that right to work meant union-busting, which is demonstrably untrue. . . . The only thing right to work can possibly bust is some of the dictatorial power of corrupt union leaders over their members, and that -unless one believes in dictatorship as a way of life ---- is to make unions stronger not weaker.

At any rate, right to work is now the law of the land in 19 states, which is an impressive fact in itself. It will be debated and voted upon in others in cominal elections. And those who favor it can certainly learn a lesson from the effective work done by the unions in handling this and other controversial legislative issues. The unions have been doing a superor job in getting their ideas over; other groups have been doing generally poor jobs. That imbalance must be corrected if we are to have representative government in more than name only.

#### VOICE OF THE VOTERS

The fact that numbers of Senators and Representatives favor public electric power development is cited as compelling evidence that their constituents share the same view. But, it is clear, some more analysis is needed.

For example, take the state of Oregon. The members of its Congressional delegation, with a single exception, all strongly favor public power and have made it a EFFICIENT --- DEPENDABLE campaign issue. And last November 4th, the Oregon ballot carried three measures involving public power.

One would have authorized the state to build plants to produce power from water, steam or nuclear energy. A second would have raised funds whereby an Oregon town could buy out the facilities of a business-managed utility company which now serves it. The third would have authorized Oregon's only large city, Portland, to generate power from its municipally-owned water system.

What happened? All three of the proposals were defeated—and by heavy NO votes.

That poses another question: If this is the way Oregon voters feel about public power, why did they vote public-



One of the important reasons for social security insurance benefits is the protection of children, and the 1958 changes in the social security law make it possible to pay benefits to more children and more widows. In the case of children, this results from the removal of the adoption provision in the old law; in case of widows, the removal of the adoption provision will also permit the payment of mother's benefits in most cases It is no longer necessary that a child, other than the worker's own child, be an adopted child in order to qualify for survivor's benefits. The requirement now is that the child be "adoptable" and be adopted by the surviving spouse within two years after the worker's death. If the child was living in the worker's home as a member of the family, and was not supported by anyone other than the worker and his spouse, he is now regarded, for social security purposes, the same as the worker's own child if he is adopted within two years after the worker's death.




