THE "WHY" OF PERCENTAGE DEPLETION

One of the most controversial issues connected with the oil industry—and probably the most misunderstood -is that of percentage depletion-which allows oil producers to deduct 271/2% of their gross income for tax purposes. Congress after Congress has approved percentage depletion. It is essential to keeping our oil supply geared to this country's enormous demand.

Oil production differs from other industrial operations in two important ways. It is risky far beyond normal, and, secondly, it involves the constant selling of a capital asset—every barrel taken out of a well reduces its value by that much. A manufacturer, by contrast, doesn't sell his assets, which consist of plant and machinery, in the normal course of business. He sells only the products he makes.

Factories, of course, depreciate in value. The income tax law allows for that through their depreciation provisions. If say, the manufacturer has capital assets worth \$100,000, and is permitted an annual depreciation of \$10,000, at the end of 10 years he'll have his \$100,000 capital again, untaxed. Because of inflation, depreciation allowances are generally inadequate these days, but that is the theory behind the provision. But this system just won't work with oil production, for two

In oil, the market value of the capital assets has no real relationship to the cost of creating those assets. TO FULFILL A PROMISE

The executive director of Congress' Joint Committee on Atomic energy recently asked interested parties to comment on the "Proposed Expanded Civilian Nuclear Power Program." One was the Edison Electric Institute Committee on Atomic Power.

Elmer L. Lindseth, the committee's chairman, replied in detail. At the end of his long letter he offered this summary: " . . . It seems to us to be particularly important that at each stage of the development of the new field, prime consideration be given to the maintenance of our nomal business system. Whatever we have in the way of productive capacity in this country can be credited to that system, and as we enter this new field of energy, every effort should be made to protect and strengthen it.

Going on, Mr. Lindseth urged that the nuclear program ". . . should be designed to create an environment in which the inventive and productive capacity of industry can most effectively be utilized to achieve the national and international objectives at the earliest practicable date. Detailed government controls and government ownership of nuclear power plants will not serve to create this envronment and will be detrimental to the achievement of the program objectives. Marimum participation by industry on the other hand will achieve optimum progress at least cost to the tax-







A STARTLING FACT

By David V. Fultz, Minister McLean Church of Christ

On my desk is a tract that has very few words in it, but these teach a wonderful lesson that all of us should take to heart. The front page has on it only the words "A Startling Fact" and on the inside are two pictures; one shows a child going to church and the other shows a child before a judge in court. Between these two pictures are the words, "A child brought up in Bible School is seldom brought up in court."

These words ought to cause us to ponder seriously, where the emphasis should be placed in helping to overcome, not only the juvenile problems of our society, but the problems of crime at every age. Juvenile delinquency and crime have been growing for a number of years in our country, and it is evident that laws and law enforcement are not the only answer to the problem. Christ taught us this when He taught the principle of the control of the thoughts before the act was committed. "For out of the heart come forth evil thoughts, murders, adulteries, thefts, false witness, railings, these are the things that defile the man; but to eat with unwashen hands defileth not the man." Matt. 15:19-20. Not only do we learn the principle of control of thoughts concerning things evil and bad when we attend Bible study and church, we also learn the many

good things of God to fill our minds and occupy our time. Judge Sam Davis Tatum said two years ago in a lecture at Abilene Christian College, "From parents, most of all, the children get their estimation of values, their ideals, and their conceptions of life. Since I became Judge of Juvenile Court of Davidson County on June 1, 1939, I have tried approximately 14,500 youngsters under the age of 17 for violating the law in that jurisdiction. Of that great host of children, in only two instances, did the father and mother go to Sunday School and church regularly with their children. The fathers and the mothers of Nashville and Davidson County that go to Sunday School and church regularly with their children, never had children in the Juvenile Court for violating the law with the exception of these two cases." This is something for us to consider seriously. Regular attendance did make a difference, however, as he goes on to bring out those who only attended occasionally did not have this record. There were 93 cases in the 14,500 who were brought to court, where the children attended regularly, but their parents did not. Think what it means to your child when you attend with him, as well as the good you, as a parent, will get from it.

A lady once asked an eminent psychologist when she should start training her child. He asked her how old the child was, and she replied, nearly five. He replied, "Lady, you have waited at least five years too long already!" Bring those babies, in mother's arms, to Bible study and church, and never quit attending until you are too feeble to walk from the car to the building. Remember the child brought up in attendance doesn't go wrong, and right now is the time to start attending if you are not already.





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

Cities vs. City Employees-Texas League of Municipalities recently voted to ask the Legislature to step out of the field of are the operators of summer regulating city employees' salaries, hours and benefits. It's a purely local concern, said the league. State Association of Firefighters and Policy Officers Association took a dim view of the proposal. Executives of the two groups met in Austin, promised a fight against "legislation which would erase all the progress of the past 20 years."

Farm Irrigation-Texas Farm | (against). Bureau delegates voted to ask Credit Rates Upheld the Legislature to make it a little easier for them to get a permit to use small ponds on their property for irrigation. At present, farmers may dam up to 200 acre feet and use it for household and domestic purposes. To use it for irrigation, they must get a sepcial permit, reportedly difficult and expensive. Irrigation from farm pends brought a hot contest between city and rural forces during the water legislation debates in the first special session, in the fall of 1957. Traffic Safety Laws-Texas

Safety Association, plus other groups, is pushing for legislation aimed at reducing road fatalities. Points in the program: (1) allowing for the results of "drunkmeter" (chemical tests for alcohol) tests to be introduced in court as evidence in drivingwhile-intoxicated cases, (2) stronger traffife law enforcement, (3) provision for enough highway patrolmen to do the job, (4) changing speed laws to meet the standards of new roads, (5) improved traffic courts, (6) a uniform license law, and (7) universal driver education.

Medical Payments-People approved a constitutional amendment to allow for medical aid payments ot persons who receive state welfare checks. Such scale in Texas would cost an estimated \$8,000,00 a year.
