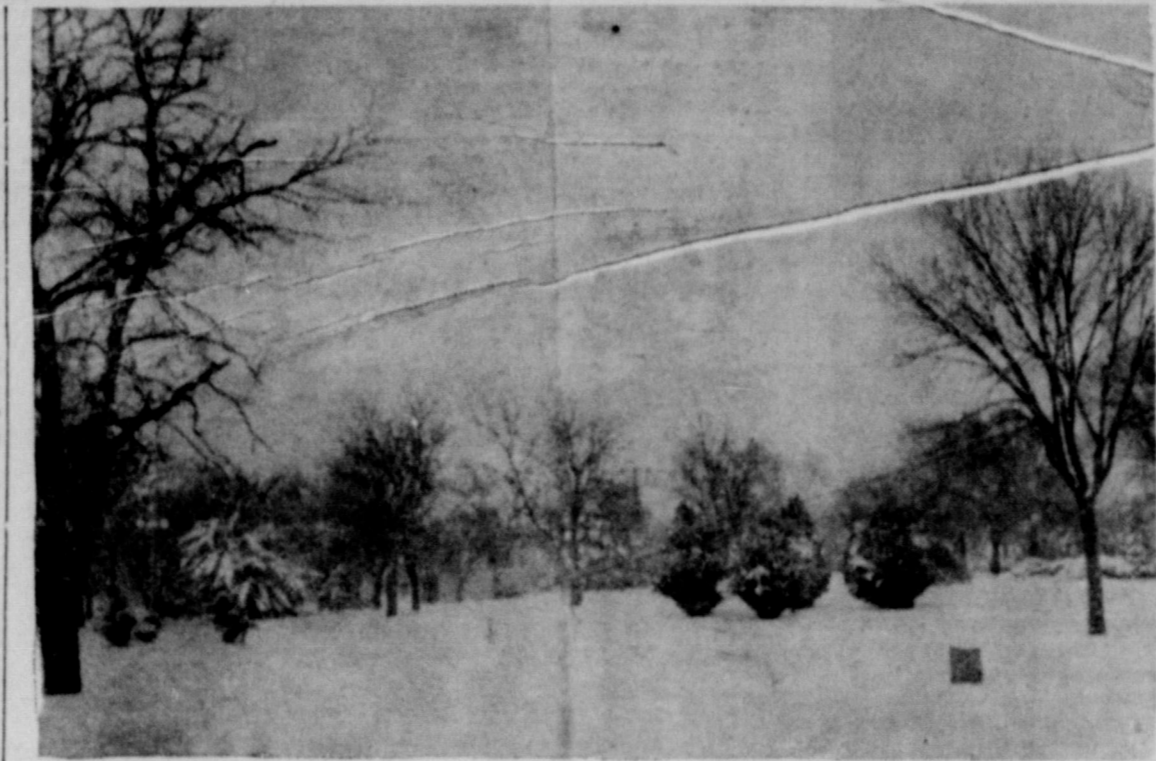
## Directors Named For Local Retail Merchants Group

## Joe Miller Takes Part In Air Weapons Meet

Yuma, Ariz.—A participant in the Navy's fourth annual air weapons meet, "Operation Top Gun," while serving with Attack Squadron 56, home-based at Miramar, Calif., was Joe W. Miller, aviation electronics technician third class, USN, son of Mr. and Mrs. D. L. Miller of McLean.

Before entering the Navy in September, 1957, he attended West Texas State College.

His squadron, flying the A4D "Skyhawk," placed first in jet light attack events during the meet held Nov. 30 through Dec. 4 at the Marine Corps Auxiliary Air Station at Yuma, Ariz.

The competitive aerial weapons training exercise featured Navy and Marine teams from Atlantic and Pacific Fleet squadrons, selected in similar competitions within the fleets.

More than 130 planes belonging to front line operational units flew in the competition which is conducted to evaluate aviation weapons systems, supporting equipments, and training and operating techniques on a navy-wide basis under the most competitive conditions.

A highlight of the meet was a missile demonstration at the Mugy, Calif., Pacific Missile Range on Dec. 2, featuring the first public firing of the Sparrow III, supersonic air-to-air missile, from all weather jets using only the craft's radar to sight and destroy the target drone.

## Tax Letters Mailed To Truck Owners

Four thousand letters are being mailed to North Texas truck owners, according to Wiley E. Davis, administrative officer of the Pampa office of Internal Revenue.

A comparison of state registration records and the Internal Revenue Service records revealed that most of these taxpayers are delinquent in filing and paying the federal highway use tax. ### SUPPER PARTY MEAT PIES . . . tender . . . hot . . . appetizing



It's fun to serve these pies. They're such a gay surprise for guests . . . look like fruit pies but are really meat pies.

There the pies stand, waiting to be cut into big, smoking hot wedges. The chopped meat filling, brown and crumbly, is pungent with onions and herbs. And tangy canned apple sauce is mixed through for a dash of the unusual. The apple sauce also helps keep the meat deliciously moist.

One whiff of that savory filling, one look, and guests fall to with frank gusto. Especially the men! You know with what enjoyment they greet simple, hearty, uncomplicated dishes.

Bake two, bake four . . . people will pass back for more, that's sure. Once baked, they are easily kept hot in the oven (turned to very low), to be brought out as needed. And, if by chance there is pie left, next day reheat it . . . it's still good eating.

2 large onions, thinly sliced	2 teaspoons poultry seasoning
1/4 cup butter	1/4 teaspoon thyme
2 lbs. ground chuck	1 1/2 teaspoons salt
2 eggs	1/2 cup ketchup
1 cup dry bread crumbs	1 4-oz. jar pimiento, diced
2 cups canned apple sauce	Rich pastry

Saute onions in butter until soft. Slightly heat ground beef in another skillet, mashing lightly with fork, to separate beef into small pieces. Drain off excess fat. Beat eggs; add bread crumbs, apple sauce, poultry seasoning, thyme, salt, ketchup and pimiento. Add onions and meat; mix well. Line 2 9" pie plates with pastry; place 1/2 hamburger mixture into each pie plate. Cover tops with pastry; seal edges together. Trim off excess pastry; make fancy edge. Make slits in tops to allow steam to escape. Bake in hot oven, 400 degrees, 35-40 minutes, or until delicate brown. Serve hot.

At a meeting of professional journalistic fraternity recently the discussion again came up concerning small weekly papers carrying advertising from larger cities in the nearby area.

All publishers attending granted that they accepted this advertising, and one in particular made the remark that he apologized regularly, but of necessity, ran all the advertising he possibly could. We also run all the advertising possible, but offer no apology for doing so.

Advertising to the newspaper is life blood. It is stock in trade, and the constant aim of our publication is to produce a paper of such interest and merit so as to furnish the advertiser with the best possible coverage of his message to the public. This is no more or less than the tailor who continually strives to offer the best suit of clothes, or the service station whose aim is always the most prompt and courteous service.

The McLean News is interested in and strives to stimulate local trade. We have publicized new businesses and remodeled firms because we are proud this is taking place. McLean is a prospering, growing community, and we look forward to the time when all consumer trade will take place in our boundaries. We are a "trade at home" newspaper, and will contribute all in our power to carry this out.

If competition were not an integral part of a healthy economy, we would not have the community we have today. When competition is pressured out of our system, then we no longer have opportunities afforded by private enterprise.

Our columns are open to all advertising that is above fraudulent practices, with the exception of ads for alcoholic beverages, which we do not accept.

When the furniture dealer refuses to sell a dinette because the buyer is from Pampa, or when the cafe will not serve food to a man because he is from Shamrock, then we will reconsider the above views. Advertising is our stock in trade and we will sell it to all persons who consider it a fair and mutually agreeable proposition.

## OLD FACES

A new Congress is in session—but, so to speak, many an old legislative face will appear on the Congressional stage.

One will be another effort to extend the federal minimum wage law to certain enterprises which have been exempt every since it came into being back in the 30's—notably, retail trade.

A retail executive has written a forceful and moderate letter about this problem to a number of Senators. He says: "Specifically, in the retail industry certain unique problems obtain. It was out of these problems and the proper Congressional concern for the industry and its importance to the nation's economy that the exemptions were written into the law. This industry employs an unusually wide range of untrained personnel for whom they carry the burden of education and training in business practices. They employ substantial numbers of seasonal personnel for whom they assume the overhead of training. They must engage personnel to work such hours and at such wages as necessity and custom in each city or market dictates to carry on an economically sound operation."

He also makes another point of major importance: "... contrary to other production industries of products of national distribution, the retail industry has the character of an essentially local, neighborhood or community business. Even within our national retail chain operations, each unit must be responsive to the immediate locality it serves, participating in all of the local economic variations as to labor supply, wage and work standards and the sociological as well as economic makeup of the area."

From a purely practical standpoint, the imposition of arbitrary minimum wage, higher than the productivity and value of untrained workers warrants, would force retailers to pare marginal employment to the limit. And thus, ironically, the law would seriously damage the work groups it is designed to help.

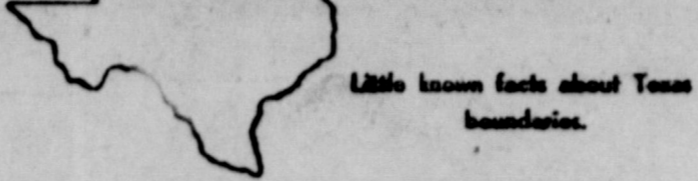

## 'Battle Border'



Little known facts about Texas boundaries.

(Editor's Note: This is the 4th in a series of articles outlining the numerous boundary conflicts dating back to 1716, pointing up little known facts which shaped the Texas of today.)

The Republic of Texas wanted annexation in 1837 but was rejected by Congress.

Sam Houston withdrew the offer and dreamed of a new republic stretching westward from Texas to the Pacific including the northern tier of Mexican states, plus present day New Mexico, Arizona and California.

Attorney General Will Wilson, a great admirer of Houston, pointed out how skillfully Houston incited the jealousy of the United States.

"Sam Houston stoked the fire of jealousy by ignor-

ing the United States and dickered with France and England, both known to want Texas independent.

"Houston's vision of a large competitive nation between the U. S. and Mexico caused Washington to run a fever.

Annexation followed, resulting in the 1848 war with Mexico in which the western one-third of the present United States was acquired. During this war, Gen. Stephen W. Kearney led U. S. troops overland from Dodge City, Kans., to capture Santa Fe and remain in possession.

Senator Benton in Congress immediately put the Santa Fe territory into a boiling caldron of debate over slavery by demanding that possession of Santa Fe not be delivered to Texas because Texas was a slave state.

A full dress rehearsal of the coming tragedy of civil war began.

Texas sent Spruce M. Baird as county judge to take possession of Santa Fe, but Colonel John M. Washington kicked him out. Texas also sent Robert S. Neighbors as county judge of El Paso.

Since there were no federal troops in El Paso, Judge Neighbors successfully established a beachhead and took possession for Texas.

Governor Bell of Texas called a special session of the legislature to organize 3,000 mounted volunteers to capture Santa Fe from the federal troops. The legislature gave Bell an out by providing that the troops be used only if the United States refused to buy the disputed territory.

This brought on another bitter division and debate in our national congress, compromised by fixing the present boundary between Texas and New Mexico and paying Texas ten million dollars for surrendered territory. Texas kept El Paso because she had possession, but Texas lost most of what is now New Mexico.

Historian Will Wilson says Texas got short changed again. "Texas had money in the treasury but her northern and western boundary had been pushed down more than 100,000 square miles."

"The United States bought that real estate for 15 cents an acre!"

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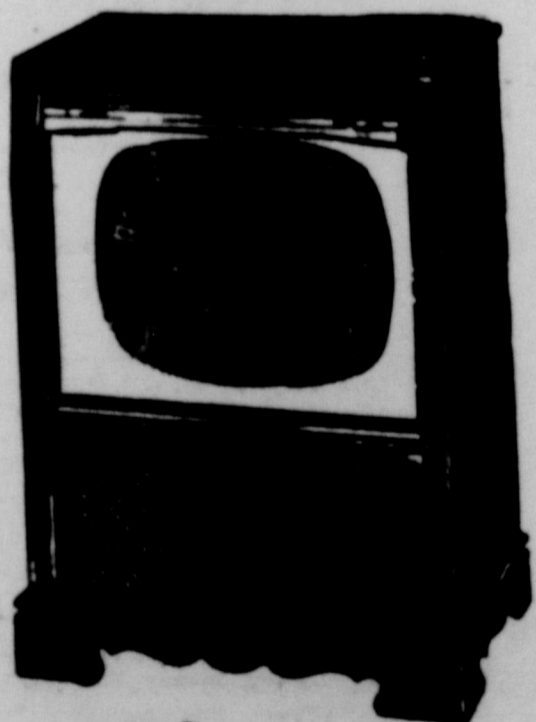

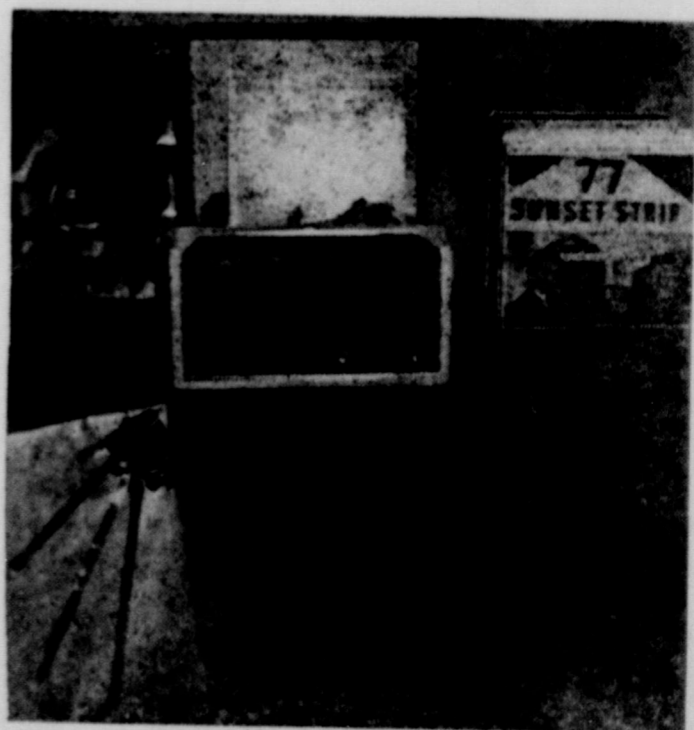

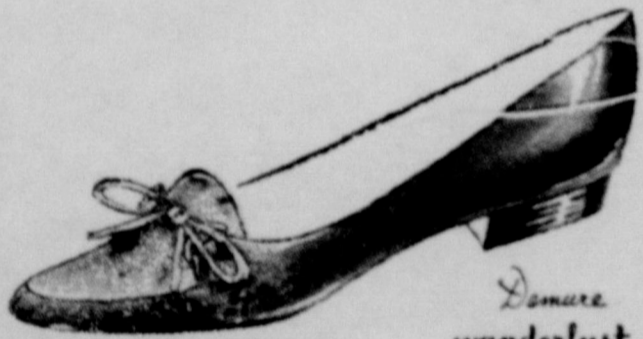
