### CLUBHOUSE TO BE BUILT AT GOLF COURSE

All Association Officers Elected To New Terms

Plans to construct a clubhouse at the McLean golf course were approved Monday night, and a building committee was appointed to begin making preparations.

Members of the McLean Lions Golf Association voted during a meeting Monday to find a temporary building to move to the course until a new structure can be erected.

The group also voted to change the name of the association to McLean Country Club.

#### To Sell Refreshments

Women members of the club announced that they will sell sandwiches, hot dogs, fried pies, doughnuts, coffee and lemonade on May 31 and June 2—during the Rodeo and Horse Show—to raise money for the clubhouse fund.

The women will sell refreshments at City Park from 5 to 7 p. m. on May 31 and all day at the rodeo arena on June 2 during the Horse Show.

Appointed chairman of the building committee was Ray Chastain of Lefors. Other members are Joe Burroughs, Earl Stubbfield and Hershel McCarty.

Pete Rice was employed to operate the concession and equipment stand at the clubhouse.

#### Back Remains President

R. D. (Sonny) Back was re-elected president of the club and all other officers were named to new full-year terms.

Others are Don Blair, Joe Burroughs and Sammy Haynes, vice presidents; John C. Haynes, membership chairman; T. Elmo Whaley, secretary, and Pete Rice, greens chairman.

Elected directors were Chastain, Don Alexander, Tom Greenwood, Mrs. Sammy Haynes, McCarty, Mrs. Jack Riley, Harvey Taylor and E. J. Windom Jr.

The organization also decided to put oil and sand on the greens, and high school boys were asked to help with the project.

### 3 Persons Killed In County During April

Three persons were killed, two injured and property damage amounted to \$1,930 in seven accidents investigated by the Highway Patrol in Gray County during April.

This was the report released this week by Sgt. E. G. Albers, patrol supervisor for this area.

Sgt. Albers said the April record brought the total number of persons killed in the county during 1961 to four. Thirty-two have been injured and property damage is estimated at \$18,594.

### Rites Held Here For Felton Webb

Funeral services for Felton Kirk Webb, well-known area rancher, were held Sunday in the McLean Methodist Church.

Rev. Jack Riley of Pampa, former pastor of the McLean Church, officiated at the services, and was assisted by Rev. J. B. Stewart, pastor.

Interment was in Hillcrest Cemetery under the direction of Lamb Funeral Home. Masonic rites were conducted at graveside.

Mr. Webb died at 8:45 a. m. last Friday in Highland General Hospital, Pampa. He was 38 and

had been hospitalized 2½ weeks. Born on Dec. 11, 1922 in Wheeler County northeast of McLean, Mr. Webb lived on his ranch 12 miles north of McLean.

He was a member of the McLean board of education, the Gray County Soil Conservation District board of supervisors, McLean 66 Rodeo Association board and of the McLean Masonic Lodge No. 889.

A veteran of World War II, he served in the Marine Corps.

He was married to Miss Thelma Burns on Oct. 19, 1945, in Boston, Mass.

Survivors include his wife; two sons, Billy and Kirk of the home; his mother, Mrs. Mary Webb, Canadian; a sister, Mrs. Betty Jean Eoff, Rogers, Ark.; grandmother, Mrs. Lallie Webb, Mobeetie.

### HAIL LOSS IS REPORTED HIGH

Storm clouds which brought heavy hail damage to portions of the Panhandle and produced at least one tornado in Gray County barely touched the McLean area Tuesday afternoon.

Light hail fell in the city as the clouds moved across the area, but it wasn't enough moisture to measure.

Panhandle and Wheeler areas were hit with the brunt of the hailstorm, with crops heavily damaged.

Fruit trees around Wheeler, which had survived late freezing weather, were reported stripped of leaves. Wheat and other crops were badly battered, as were some buildings.

At Panhandle, there were few unbroken windows remaining on the north side of buildings.

#### Tornado Sighted

A tornado was sighted southeast of Pampa in the Lefors area and heading northeast, but it apparently lifted back into the clouds and stayed there.

Dry farm and ranch lands in this area are in need of moisture. The last rain received here was only 46 inch on May 4, after a dry, dry April.

Moisture total for the year now stands at 4.82 inches, and is falling far behind 1960. At the same time a year ago the city had received 6.47 inches.

### City Celebration Spotlighted Over Golden Spread

Cotton John Smith, well-known public relations director of Amarillo KGNC radio and television, kicked off publicity across the Golden Spread here Tuesday for McLean's 66 Roundup, Rodeo and Horse Show celebration.

Smith, guest speaker at the Lions Club luncheon, tape-recorded three interviews for presentation over radio and announced that "full coverage" will be given the event.

Pictures were made following the luncheon of several wagons, horseback riders and western dressed local residents for publication in the Amarillo papers and showing on television.

A TV cameraman will join the trailriders when they depart next Thursday morning for Amarillo, and KGNC crews are to be on hand to greet the local group when the trip ends there the following Saturday.

The trail ride is being made to point additional attention to the four days of festivities opening in McLean on May 31.

Faris Hess is trail ride boss, and a host of local and area residents are expected to join the procession traveling U. S. 66 westward to Amarillo.

Persons unable to make the ride are being invited to join the caravan in Amarillo Saturday, May 27, for the parade and television appearance there.

The old fiddlers contest, a popular event each year, will be held on Main Street at 3 p. m. Saturday, June 3. Prizes of \$15 for first place, \$10 for second and \$5 for third will be awarded.

Smith called the celebration a "good tonic" for the community and praised McLean residents for their interest in continuing to boost their town.

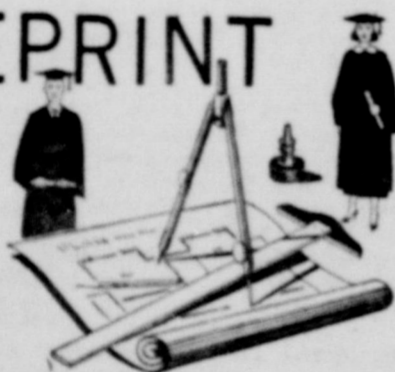

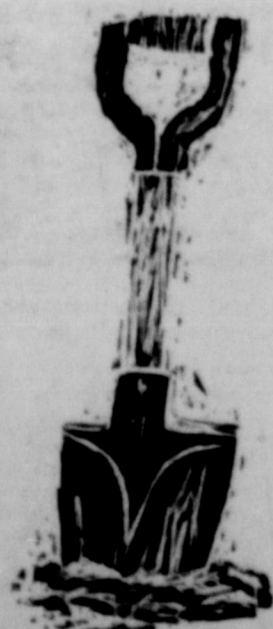

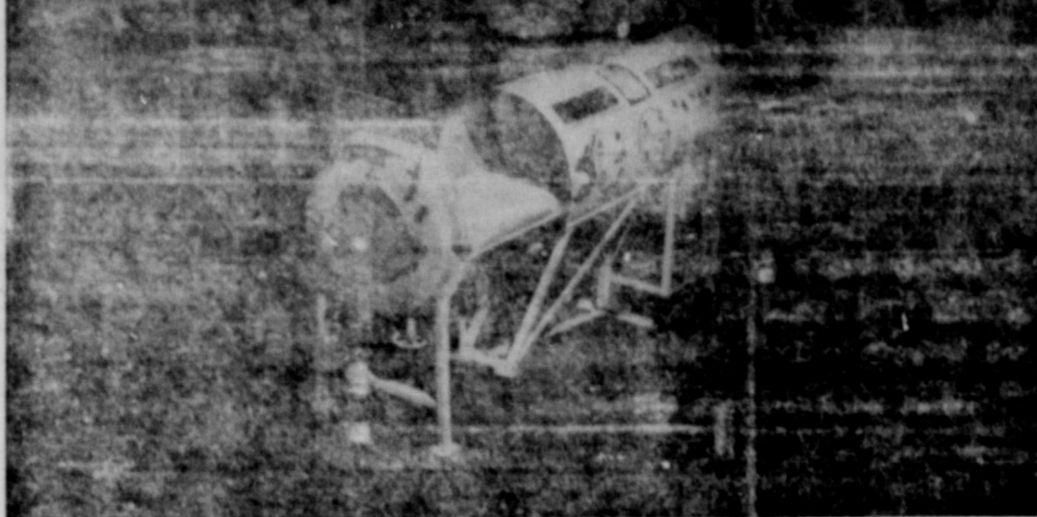

# WANTED: More Vacancies



This iron lung is now empty—for a change. How long it and thousands of others remain empty depends upon how soon the entire nation is fully vaccinated against polio.

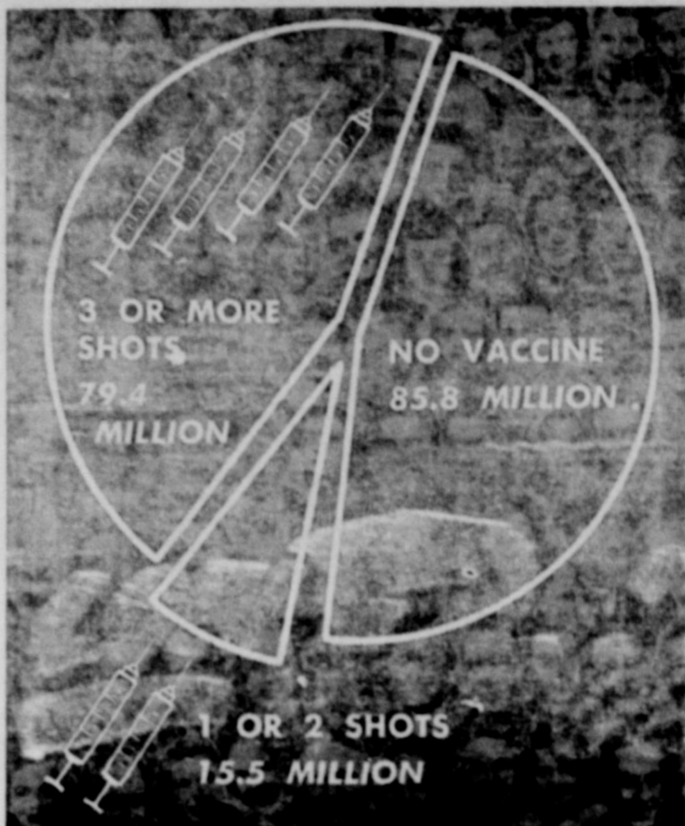
Almost half the U. S. population is unguarded against crippling polio.

Basil O'Connor, president of The National Foundation, has described the vulnerability of some 85 million Americans to paralytic polio as "a national disgrace."

There is no scarcity of the Salk vaccine, he pointed out, and two inoculations now, within a month's time, would provide at least some measure of protection against polio outbreaks and epidemics in the summer.

In thousands of cities, villages and hamlets across the nation, Salk polio vaccination is available at little cost, and in some communities the prescribed series of at least three shots is free. A fourth "booster" shot is now recommended. "The individual's common sense and will to survive should dictate immediate vaccination," Mr. O'Connor said. "If he or she has a family, all the more urgent ground for polio protection."

The National Foundation has been joined in its nationwide appeal to the unvaccinated by the American Medical Association and the U.S. Public Health Service.

**Weather Factor Is Important for Game**

AUSTIN—(Special)—The coming season's game crop will be fairly well established during the next few weeks, subject to weather conditions, according to H. D. Dodgen, executive secretary of the Game and Fish Commission.

Reports received in his office indicate that drought conditions have prevailed for several weeks over some of the best game areas in the state. Up to now, large game hasn't suffered too much from the lack of food. However, rain is badly needed over a great deal of the range.

Field personnel have reported to the Austin office that there has been comparatively little pairing off of mourning doves, and that there is still a large concentration of doves in South Texas.

Quail are beginning to pair off and if nests are not destroyed by early summer flash flood, there is a possibility of a good quail crop again this fall.

Practically all the waterfowl on the coast have migrated northward to the summer nesting areas.

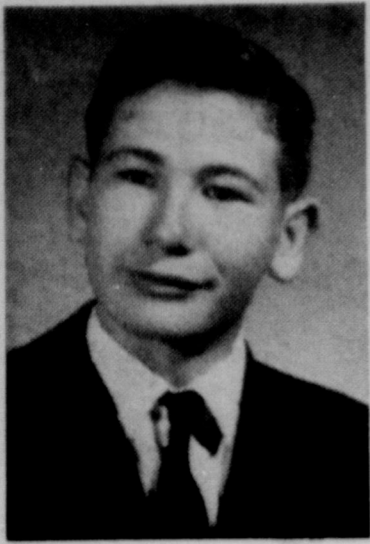

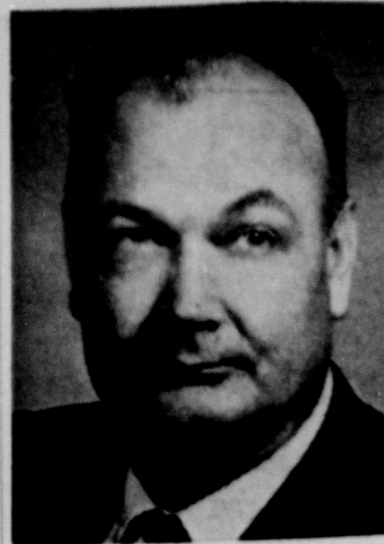

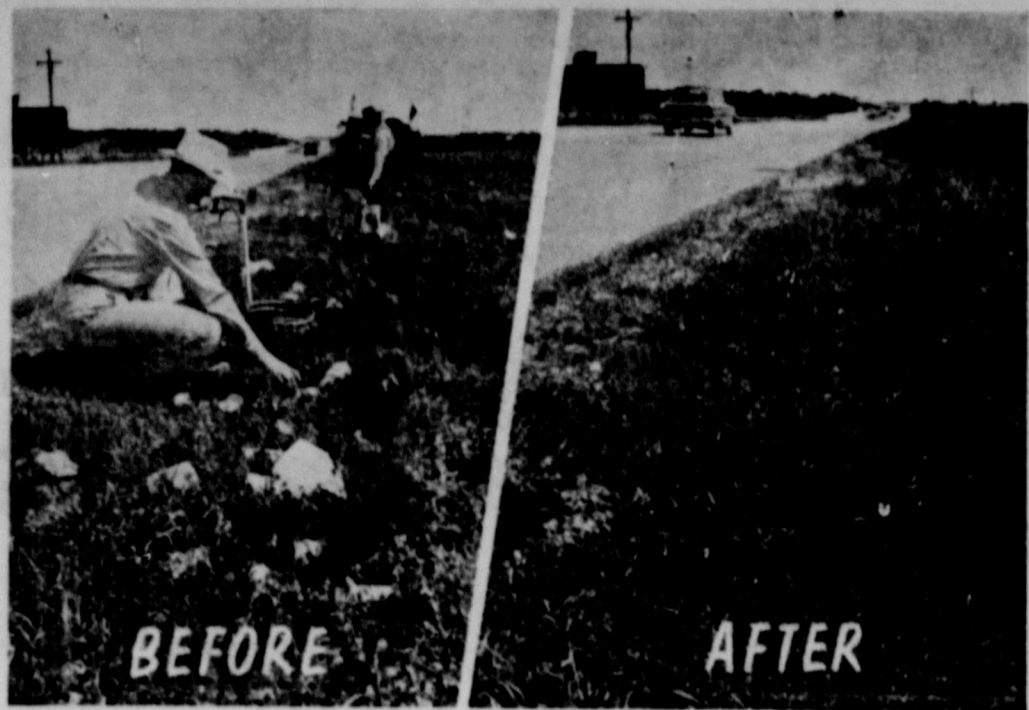

## LACK OF AMMUNITION ENDS FIRST NAVY FIGHT

Henry Eagle, captain of the navy steamer U. S. S. Star, scanned the shoreline as he moved his ship around Sewell's Point 100 years ago this week. Suddenly he spotted what he had been looking for and swung his vessel around.

It was the evening of Saturday, May 18, near Norfolk, Va., and the Eagle had seen a group of Confederates erecting a barricade. It was the beginning of the Civil War's first naval battle.

Minor as it was, it attracted wide attention that week—alongside other important news: North Carolina's secession and Kentucky's proclamation of neutrality.

Eagle's shots caught the Confederates without a usable weapon. So the Star—and a federal tug which joined in the bombardment—fired unopposed.

That night, under cover of darkness, Confederates began moving in their own guns.

Eagle waited next morning to see if there was any movement ashore before renewing his fire, and it was afternoon when his next shot sounded. To his surprise, the shot was answered and one of the first Confederate shells clipped a line from his vessel's gaff.

**Shots Are Exchanged**

For more than an hour the battery and ship exchanged shots. Shells slammed into the sand and embrasures of the Confederate barricade and one struck a cannon (two Georgia soldiers became minor heroes when they ran into the line of fire and scraped sand from the barricade's portholes).

Five Confederate shells crashed into the Star's hull and upper works, but they caused little damage. Two Union men were slightly wounded.

Then it ended. Almost at the same time the Confederates found themselves down to their last two rounds of ammunition; the Yankees down to their last five. The Star swung around and headed out to sea.

### TERMITES

Recently I have had a number of calls on what to do about termites under houses.

They are a big problem sometimes, especially when they get under houses with low clearance. We have an excellent publication on this subject which we would be glad to pass along to you on request.

### RATTLESNAKE REPELLENT

My wife, Lois, asked me to pass this on to you. She has a horror about finding a rattlesnake in our yard sometime.

A professor at the University of Georgia developed a chemical in a granular form that can be placed at strategic locations to repel snakes.

If they stay exposed too long the chemical will kill the snakes. I have the address in my files of a commercial company that produces the chemical if anyone is interested.
