SS Representative Lists County Visits

The schedule of service by the Social Security administration thru June 30 was announced this week by the Amarillo SS office.

Spring weather was on again, off again in McLean the past week. But Wednesday it appeared winter had arrived back on the scene.

Sleet and rain pelted down on the city Wednesday morning, and mist continued into the afternoon.

Weathermen forecast continued light rain and snow for the Panhandle today.

Temperatures took a nosedive here Tuesday afternoon, as a cold front moved across the area.

The mercury dropped to 30 degrees at 3:30 p. m. Tuesday and stayed right on that mark before beginning a slow rise at 5:30 a. m. Wednesday, according to official weather records maintained by Pete Fulbright.

A shower last Saturday left 21 inch of moisture, increasing the total for 1961 to 3.39 inches.

Fulbright's records showed 4.50 inches to this same date a year ago.

A wide range of temperatures is noted in the week's thermometer readings. Top reading was 69, which occurred last Friday and again on Sunday.

SCD NEWS IS OFF PRESS

The first issue of The Gray County SCD News is being mailed this week to almost 700 farmers, ranchers, landowners and business people in Gray County and the Panhandle.

Printed by The McLean News, the four-page, four-column news paper is the official publication of the Gray County Soil Conservation District.

Curtis Schaffer, SCD board of supervisors chairman, said the expense of the first issue will be paid from the district trust fund.

"Future issues will be sponsored by advertising from local business," he added. "Advertising will be limited to just enough to cover the cost of publication."

Advertising invited "Advertising will be accepted on a first-come, first-served basis. If a businessman, farmer or rancher is interested, contact one of your local supervisors."

Schaffer said the main purpose of the publication, which is scheduled for distribution every three months, is "to acquaint you with the activities of your soil conservation district."

"With each future issue," he continued, "we hope you will develop a greater appreciation for your soil conservation district and the soil and water conservation movement."

The McLean News was selected to print The Gray County SCD News after submitting the lowest of three bids on the publication.

New Auto Supply Firm Opening Here

Formal opening of G and W Auto Supply, 118 Main Street, will be held Saturday, according to the owners, Leo Gibson and Glen Wade.

Coffee and doughnuts will be served, starting at 8 a. m., and the public has been invited to attend.

The new McLean firm will handle "all kinds of auto parts," Gibson and Wade said.

A large supply of parts has already arrived and more shipments are being received daily.

Special Water Rates Are Effective Now

Many residents are taking advantage of the special summer water rates for yards and gardens in McLean, it was reported this week.

The rates are effective now thru Sept. 19 for persons wishing to sign up at city hall. The rates are \$4.50 for 30,000 gallons and \$6 for 50,000 gallons.

It was erroneously reported last week that \$6 would buy 60,000 gallons under the special rates. Residents who desire the reduced prices must sign up for a minimum of three months.

CONTRACT LET ON ROAD JOB

A \$155,806 contract has been awarded for 5.9 miles of construction on Ranch to Market Road 1321 in Gray County, the Texas Highway Commission announced this week.

Gilvin-Terrill, Inc., submitted the low bid on the project.

Included in the work will be grading, structures, base and surfacing beginning five miles east of Lefors. The project is expected to take 120 working days, according to Charles W. Smith, district highway engineer from Amarillo.

Gordan K. Reading, resident engineer at Pampa, will be in active charge of the project while it is under construction.

2 Others Okayed

The Highway Commission also announced approval of two other improvement projects in Gray County, costing an estimated \$9,200 and financed in the 1961 farm to market road improvement program.

Seal coat is to be placed on Ranch to Market Road 1321 from a point 2.6 miles north of SH 273 to the northwest 3.1 miles. Estimated cost of this work is \$4,100.

Seal coat also will be placed on Farm to Market Road 2473 from SH 273 to the Wheeler County line, a distance of 4.3 miles, at a cost of some \$5,100.

City, School and Senate Elections Are Coming Up

VOTING SLATED HERE SATURDAY AND TUESDAY

Politics was drawing much of McLean's attention this week, as voters prepared to go to the polls twice during the next few days.

Balloting is scheduled Saturday in the annual board of education, while the second trip to the voting place will come Tuesday, when McLeanites choose two aldermen and mayor and help with the selection of a new U. S. Senator from Texas.

Voting on both days will begin at 8 a. m. and end at 7 p. m. in city hall.

A quiet campaign appeared to be the rule in the school board and city commission races.

P-TA Supporting Educational Needs

Members of the McLean Parent-Teacher Association this week are contacting friends and neighbors in a program of public information concerning educational needs for the community's children and youth.

Mrs. Guy Beasley, P-TA president, said the project—known as "Education Alert"—is a voluntary public service undertaken by the Texas Congress of Parents and Teachers to awaken citizens to the need of support for quality education.

Information about basic educational needs will be furnished, and people are to be given an opportunity to let members of the Legislature know whether they are in favor of quality education, and whether they are willing to pay their fair share of the cost.

Individuals have been encouraged to "freely express preferences for or against any particular tax or bill or any legislative program."

The cost per Texan to make the needed improvement next year has been estimated at \$1.50.

Much of this would go for raising teachers' salaries.

Hunt and his wife have four children—three of them attending school.

He received his bachelor of arts degree from West Texas State College in Canyon and has master's degree from Texas Tech, Lubbock.

Hunt has coached in Oltan, New Deal, Idalou, Sundown and Meadow.

He is a veteran of World War II and was a first lieutenant in the Army.

Ground Water Level Of County Is Checked

Gray County was included in a just-completed comprehensive survey to determine ground water-level measurements in the southern high plains.

The Board of Water Engineers this week announced the publication of a special bulletin, No. 6101, reporting the results of the survey.

The bulletin, "Water Levels in Observation Wells in the Southern High Plains Texas, 1960 and 1961," lists the ground-water-level measurements in observation wells in 25 southern high plains counties, including the most extensive irrigated farming development in the state.

The bulletin may be obtained

without cost at the board's office, P. O. Box 2311, Capitol Station, Austin.

Systematic measurement of water levels in observation wells is useful as an index in maintaining a current inventory of available water supplies and in making quantitative predictions of the future availability of those supplies.

Collection data for the report began last Sept. 1.

Changes in water levels from 1960 to 1961 also are shown.

Board of Water Engineers personnel were assisted by the U. S. Geological Survey and the High Plains Underground Water Conserv-

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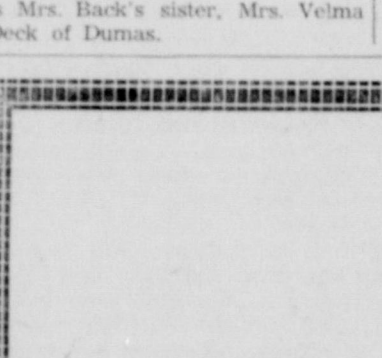

CONGRATULATIONS

Congratulations to The Lefors Progress and the new publisher, Jack Shelton.

I admire Jack and his wife, Margaret, for their ambition. I mentioned earlier that Jack was also printing another publication for the Gray County Soil Conservation District.

So you can see you have a very busy editor in McLean. Many times editors of local weekly newspapers are expected to attend all local functions and report on the activities of these meetings.

One thing I did pick up in a journalism course at Texas A and M was the fact that a local editor always welcomes any news that is turned in, preferably in writing.

He can choose pretty well between two things, however. He can gather the news and let someone else print it or he can print it and let someone else gather it.

Most local editors find it very profitable when they farm out their printing work.

GREEN BUGS

Last weekend we were swamped with calls about green bugs.

In 1959 three tests were run by the Amarillo Experiment Station on green bugs. Results of these tests show that it increased yield by about nine bushels per acre.

Very recently spraying was done on the Sailor farm just south of the courthouse annex in Pampa. The result looked very good at the time of this writing.

Cost is about \$2.25 per acre.

BRUSH CONTROL

Flip Breedlove, Donley County agent, tells me they sprayed sev-

eral thousand acres of brushland in Donley County in 1960 and they hope to increase the acreage in 1961 to 14,000.

They report excellent results. It is hoped we will have at least 10,000 acres of rangeland sprayed in Gray County.

INSECT CONTROL

I mentioned earlier The Lefors Progress, the newspaper being started for Lefors.

Mrs. Charles Roberts of Lefors called me last week and asked that I contribute an article for their first issue on insects. I feel very complimented that I have been asked to do this, and I will have a general article on household insects, vegetable and insects affecting shrubs.

NEW RADIO PROGRAM

I have always had a hard time saying NO to someone, and it looks as though I said yes once more too often.

Officials of KPDM, Pampa, have prevailed on me to have a daily radio program at 6:45 each morning. I don't know too many of the details as yet.

As I understand it, I am to have a seven to nine-minute roundup of farm news daily. One thing that will help, however, is the fact they agreed to put a mike on my office desk.

Needless to say, most of these programs will be done by recording.

Here is hoping I'll pick up many McLean listeners. My plan is to have news of county-wide interest. Much of it will come from the McLean area.

'The Valiant' Local Play Contest Entry

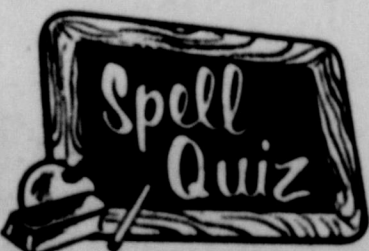
"The Valiant," a play was presented by students from Lefors High School, under the direction of Bill McGowan, at the one-act play contests held at Canadian Thursday night, March 23.

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WALTER ROGERS REPORTS

EDUCATIONAL TELEVISION

A subcommittee of the Committee on Interstate and Foreign Commerce has held some recent hearings on educational television. These are a continuation of the hearings that have been held on this subject for the past several years.

At the recent hearings, outstanding educators (including Dr. Logan Wilson, chancellor of the University of Texas) from all over the nation appeared and gave testimony in support of early action by the federal government to make possible the use of television channels set aside for public or educational purposes.

The Federal Communications Commission has available for all purposes 2,209 television channels (674 VHF and 1,535 UHF). These are all of the channels. Out of this number 267 channels have been set aside for educational television purposes (88VHF and 179 UHF).

At this date, approximately 58 of these channels have been utilized. The channels have been retained for public purposes primarily because the channels are public property. The channels which have been assigned to private corporations and individuals are also public property and concern the use of the spectrum. The broadcasters or broadcasting stations have a license to use these channels.

The reason that so few of the educational channels have been utilized is due primarily to the lack of funds. Most of the states have been hesitant to create an authority and provide funds for the use of these educational channels. Many institutions of higher learning have been anxious to obtain licenses to operate on these channels.

However, the lack of funds available to these educational institutions has been the major stumbling block. Some of the states have instituted programs to take advantage of these facilities. The state of Alabama is using educational television in a substantial majority of its public schools, and takes the position that it has been highly successful and will prove more so. The bills before the House of Representatives provide for federal grants of approximately \$1 million to each state for the purpose of purchasing facilities and equipment necessary to start operation of these stations. As you can probably suspect, there are many problems involved.

One of the issues is whether or not a grant of this kind would be federal aid to education. The next question is whether or not the license to operate the channel should be granted to a state, authority, to the public school system of the state, to several of the institutions of higher learning, to an organization made up of educational institutions or be set up as an arm of the federal government operating on a regional basis.

The thought is that if the channel should be granted to a private or a single educational institution, any federal grants would certainly constitute federal aid to education. It is generally conceded that the use of these channels should not be confined to teaching school alone. If the channel is to be utilized, a proper allocation of time could result in beneficial information for all persons of all ages.

In any event, there will be much pro and con on this subject during this term of Congress. Certainly it is a subject that should be exhaustively studied. The wonders of television and its many possibilities provide a great challenge to man. Properly used, this discovery and medium could and should make a great contribution to the enlightenment of man, to the advancement of civilization and to the realization of universal peace.

THE PRESIDENT'S FARM PROGRAM

Most of you realize the difficulties and the trials and tribulations that have been experienced in trying to work out a farm program which would be in balance with the other segments of the economy. The President's message to the Congress on this subject touched on just about every phase of the agricultural picture.

Each of these phases will receive a separate study and evaluation. Subsequent messages will no doubt provide much more information as to the administration's thinking on these subjects.

However, one particular suggestion of the President should receive a complete re-evaluation. I have reference to the following paragraphs contained in his message: "Programs formulated in accordance with the enabling legislation here proposed and involving con-

trols over production and marketing should not go into effect until approved by a majority of two-thirds of the producers voting under regularly authorized voting procedures and there should be legislation to this end. Such voting will be after full opportunity for debate and discussion and will insure that the producers of no commodity will be asked to accept programs to which they have not given strong affirmative approval.

"All comprehensive programs prepared under existing and requested authority will be duly submitted to the Congress of the United States not less than 60 days before taking effect. If within the 60-day period the program is rejected by either House of the Congress, the program will not go into effect. Thus no agricultural program will be adopted if it is regarded adversely by a majority of either House of the Congress."

I cannot support this procedure. It is, in effect, reversing the legislative process. Under our Constitution, legislation is supposed to be prepared and passed by the Congress. It is then submitted to the executive branch of the government, which is headed by the President.

The veto power is vested in the President. If he approves of legislation, he signs it. If he disapproves of it, he vetoes it. In such last event, in order for such a measure to become a law, a two-thirds majority vote of both houses of the Congress is required.

If we should follow the suggestion of the President as above quoted it would be, in effect, permitting the executive branch to write a law and submit to the Congress for veto. Inaction by the Congress and failure to veto the proposal would constitute approval by acquiescence.

Although this method has been used a number of times in the last several years, it has never had my full approval. It is reversing the lawmaking process as laid down in the Constitution. It has been used in the Eisenhower and previous administrations for departmental reorganization and other purposes.

This, however, does not, in my opinion, constitute a sufficient precedent to employ the method further. It might work all right in the particular agricultural situation involved, but we must remember that its use could be extended to other segments of the economy. Such practice could develop to the point that our entire lawmaking process could be completely reversed.

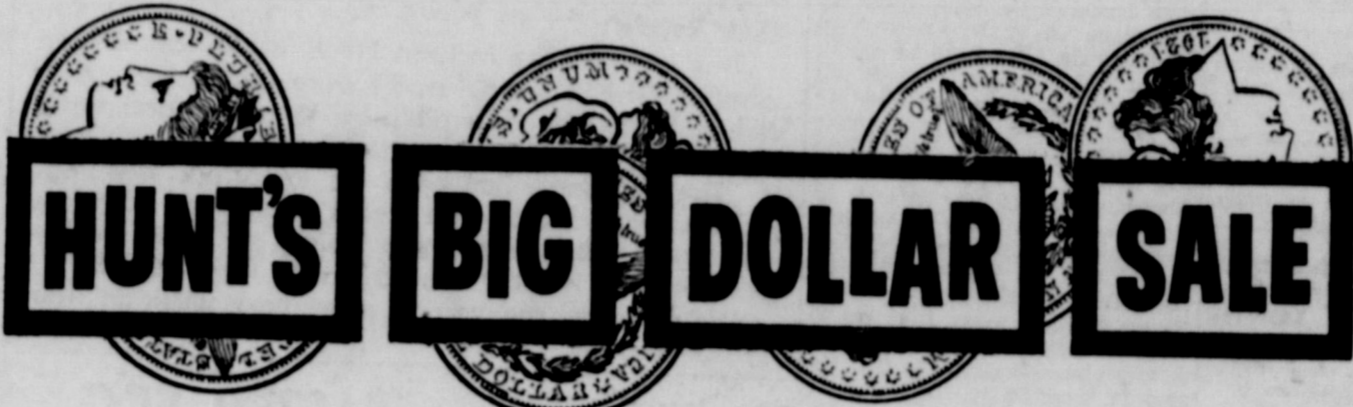
