Football Banquet Is Set Tuesday Night

WEST TEXAS COACH WILL BE SPEAKER

The 1960 McLean Tigers will be honored Tuesday night at the annual football banquet sponsored by the Lions Club in the American Legion building.

Football players and Lions Club members will begin selling tickets, at \$1.50 per plate, Friday.

Speaker for the event, scheduled for 7 p. m., will be Joe Kerbel, head football coach at West Texas State College in Canyon. Jack Riley, McLean Grade School principal, is to be master of ceremonies.

OU Graduate
The banquet is held each year under the sponsorship of the Lions Club of the city.

Kerbel, a 1947 graduate of the University of Oklahoma, assumed the head coach's duties at West Texas State this year after being assistant coach in charge of offense at Texas Tech, Lubbock, the previous two seasons.

Before going to Tech in 1958, Kerbel was known as a builder of outstanding high school teams in Oklahoma and Texas, compiling an overall record of 76 wins, 15 defeats and two ties.

His first head coaching job was in Cleveland, Okla. In two seasons there, beginning in 1950, his teams won 20 and lost three, while capturing the district title both years and going to the state semi-finals one time.

Coached in Amarillo
From Cleveland, he went to Breckenridge High School in 1952. His teams at Breckenridge won the Texas state championship twice in his three years there.

Kerbel, who is 38, then went to Amarillo High School, where he coached the Sandies to two district titles.

The Buffalo coach played high school football at Seminole, Okla. He served in the Marines during World War II and holds the rank of captain in the inactive Marine Corps Reserve.

\$418.20 Contributed To MD Fund Drive

Contributions to the Muscular Dystrophy Fund drive in McLean climbed to \$418.20 this week, setting a record.

Fire Chief Boyd Meador and other members of the fire department who conducted the campaign expressed their appreciation for the generous contributions.

The effort this year topped the \$401 collected in 1959. Volunteer firemen annually stage the drive in McLean.

Rev. Beltz New Baptist Minister

Rev. Dan Beltz, Oklahoma City, has accepted a call to become pastor of the McLean First Baptist Church.

A minister since early in the 1930s, he will preach his first sermon as pastor of the local church on Dec. 18.

Rev. Beltz succeeds Rev. Jesse Leonard as pastor here. Rev. Leonard resigned in November to move to Bonham.

A native of Oklahoma, Rev. Beltz has served the Wilmont Place Baptist Church in Oklahoma City since 1954.

Other pastorates have included the First Baptist Church in Thomas, Okla., from 1939 to 1942; First Baptist Church in Lefors, 1942 to 1952; and First Baptist Church in Erick, Okla., 1952-1954. He was graduated in 1928 from Cherokee, Okla., High School and (See BELTZ, Page 4)

Doyal Billingsley pitched in six field goals for a total of 12 to help the Tigers' cause. Donnie Woods had nine; Jim Watson six; Darreth Welch two.

Mrs. Hardin was born Nov. 12, 1891, in Oklahoma and moved to McLean from Union City, Okla. The former Mattie Pearl Milton, she was married to T. H. Hardin on Nov. 19, 1922, in McLean.

She is survived by her husband; one daughter, Mrs. Jack Lisman, McLean; a step-daughter, Mrs. Claude Williams, Dallas, and two grandchildren.

Cubs' Record Is Impressive—3 District Crowns

The McLean Junior High Cubs have built up a reputation in football competition. Early in November, they wrapped up their third straight undefeated and untied season by downing previously unbeaten Wheeler 22-6.

That gave the Cubs of Coach R. L. Cline their 19th consecutive victory, and they are looking forward to extending that string next fall.

En route to rolling up their amazing record, the locals have captured three district championships, too.

In the past season, the Cubs opened their schedule with a 36-0 victory over Lefors, and two weeks later—after Shamrock had cancelled its contest with McLean—they dumped Clarendon 38-8.

Ice Title Away
Memphis was downed next 20-8, and the Cubs beat Canadian 14-6. They then clinched the third district crown with a 22-6 win over Lefors.

After a week of leisure, the future Tigers returned to action to defeat Wheeler 22-6 and wind up the season.

During the 1958 season the Cubs defeated Clarendon 26-0, Wheeler 42-0 and 35-12, Clarendon 38-0, Memphis 42-0, Canadian 34-30, Shamrock 30-6 and Wheeler 36-12.

This team was under the direction of Bill Adams, who currently is serving as assistant coach at Friona.

Coach Cline stepped into the picture for the 1959 season, and under his guidance the Cubs beat Lefors 32-0 and 14-12, Clarendon 38-0, Memphis 42-0, Canadian 34-30, Shamrock 30-6 and Wheeler 36-12.

In the past three years the Cubs have scored 561 points to 120 for their opponents.

Kellerville Man Is Seriously Injured

Lloyd L. McPherson of Kellerville suffered a broken back and other serious injuries last Saturday afternoon when a jack gave way, and a heavily loaded trailer fell on him.

McPherson was working on the J. B. Brown farm nine miles northeast of McLean attempting to make repairs to the trailer when the mishap occurred.

The jack holding the trailer gave way, and McPherson was pinned underneath. The trailer carried a large butane tank.

McPherson was first taken by a Richerson-Lamb Funeral Home ambulance from McLean to the hospital in Shamrock. Saturday night he was rushed to St. Anthony's Hospital in Amarillo, where his condition was not known Wednesday afternoon.

Beck Stricken

Earnest Beck returned to his home in McLean Tuesday night after receiving treatment in a Pampa hospital for an apparent light heart attack.

Beck underwent tests in Highland General Hospital following the seizure. The examinations showed no serious damage to his heart.

Early Work Seen On Creek Project

The nation's "Mr. Conservation" has predicted that federal funds will be made available soon for development of the McClellan Creek watershed upstream flood prevention program.

L. L. (Red) Miles, Cheyenne, Okla., banker who was chosen "Mr. Conservation" by the National Association of Soil and Water Conservation Districts in 1959, made the prediction during a visit to Pampa last Friday.

Miles, who spoke to the Pampa Kiwanis Club on the importance of watershed programs, told The

McLean News that the federal government is recognizing the need for additional conservation work and "they know additional money must be made available."

The McClellan Creek project early this month received tentative approval from a group of engineers and economists representing the State Soil Conservation Board and area Soil Conservation Service.

As many as 14 water-retarding structures are planned on the watershed in Gray and Carson Counties. Total cost of the structure (See CREK, Page 4)

Lions District Governor Due In City Tuesday

Ralph R. Thomas, Lions district governor from Pampa, will be in McLean next Tuesday for an official visit with the local Lions Club.

Thomas will be a guest of the McLean Lions at their regular noon luncheon in the First Methodist Church basement. He will speak on the subject "Lionism."

Following the luncheon, Thomas is to meet briefly with the club directors.

Lions District 2-TI, headed by Thomas, includes 63 clubs and comprises the entire 18th Congressional District. There currently are 361 district governors who supervise the activities of more than 15,000 Lions Clubs.

Retired Farm Agent
Thomas retired as Gray County farm agent on Aug. 1. He had served in that capacity since May 1, 1930, with the exception of six years on military leave during World War II and the Korean conflict.

He is a key member of the Pampa Lions Club and holds a 29-year perfect attendance record.

Thomas has received his second extension award and is a life member of the Texas League for Crippled Children. He is past president of the Pampa Lions Club.

During the Korean conflict, Thomas was awarded a Bronze Star medal for "meritorious service in connection with military operations against the enemy." He retired from the Air Reserve as a lieutenant colonel last year.

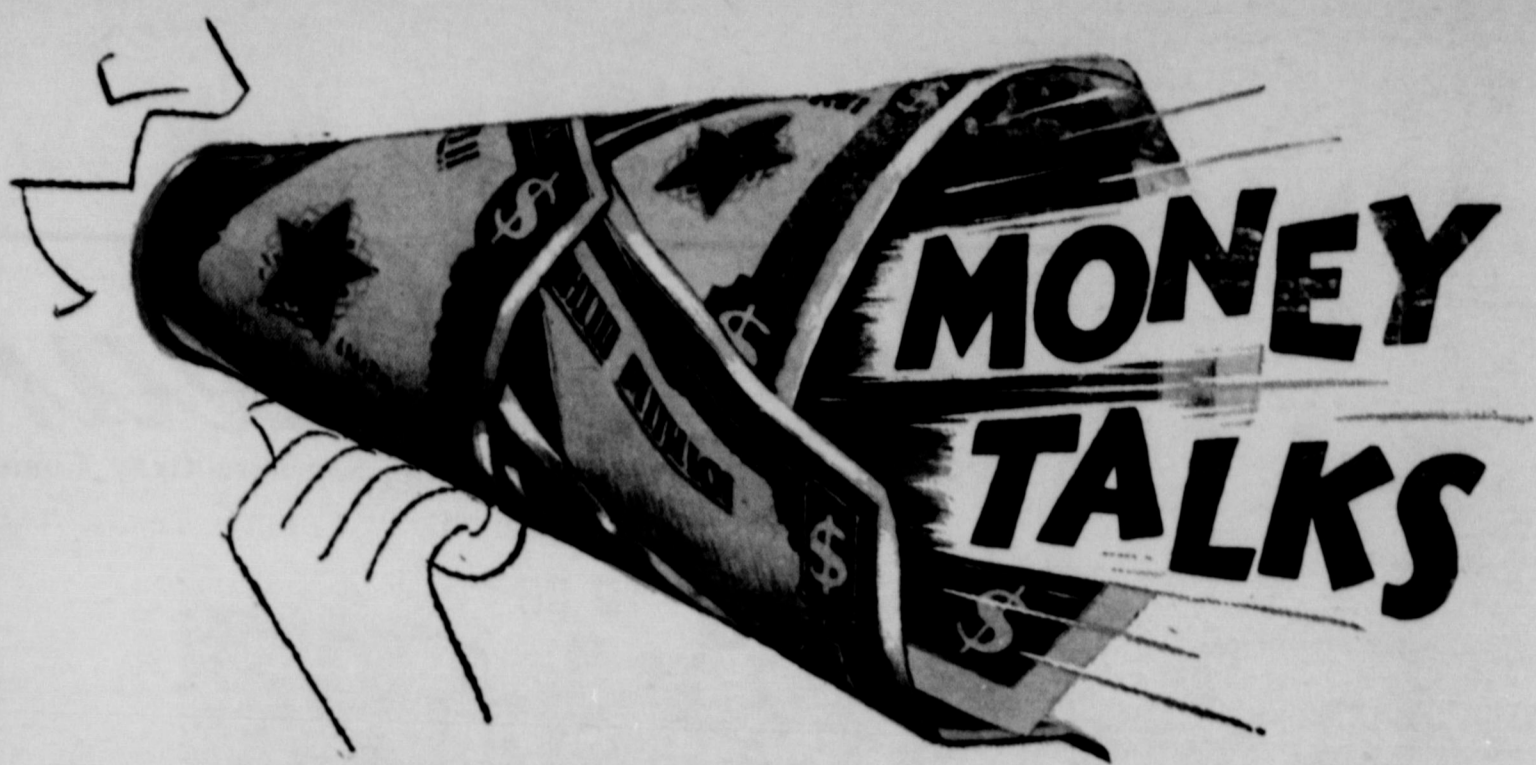
She carried a white satin-covered Bible topped with a white orchid and lilies-of-the-valley.

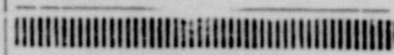

tures has been estimated at \$1 million.

Males' hometown of Cheyenne is located near the Sandstone Creek upstream flood prevention project, the first program of its kind in the world.

Twenty-four earthen structures similar to those planned on the McClellan watershed were completed in the Cheyenne area in 1953. Since that time there have been no damaging floods in the western Oklahoma area, where prior to the program farms had been hard hit by floodwaters on many occasions.

Oklahoma has led the nation in upstream flood control work, mainly, Males said, due to the fact that the state Legislature voted funds to pay for watershed project planning parties.

If state funds are not provided, money must be raised locally or planned projects are required to wait in line several years for federal action.

In his color-slide illustrated talk at the Pampa Kiwanis luncheon, Males showed the results of heavy flooding in the Washita River in western Oklahoma before the watershed programs were started upstream.

Seventeen persons lost their lives in the area in a 1934 flood.

The "second biggest loss," he said, "was to the soil."

Properly treated land upstream will "trap and break up the raindrops as they fall," forcing the water to soak into the soil. This, in turn, will provide moisture for growing crops and raise the water table.

Discussing one picture of water flowing from an improperly treated field of red clay, Males declared that the water "looks like blood; it is blood—it's the blood of the soil because we're murdering it."

He continued: "When you read about a flood causing \$1 million damage in towns, you can multiply this figure by three and have about the loss suffered by farms along the flooding river."

As proof that upstream flood prevention programs raise the water table, Males showed pictures of Sandstone Creek before and after dams were constructed and land was planted in that area.

Sandstone had flowed only some

90 days out of the year before the structures were built. Since the project was completed, it has flowed more than 600 consecutive days. This is because springs which once fed the creek have begun to flow again after being dry for 30 years.

Males said the federal government must continue to furnish financial assistance so that more conservation programs can be developed.

"Preservation of our soil and water resources is just as much a part of our defense as rockets, satellites and the atomic bomb," he stated.

He lashed out at the nation's big metropolitan newspapers and magazines for their attacks on farmers.

"They make it appear that farmers should hang their heads Males added while explaining that the United States' farm surplus actually isn't as large and costly as foes of the subsidy programs would have Americans believe.

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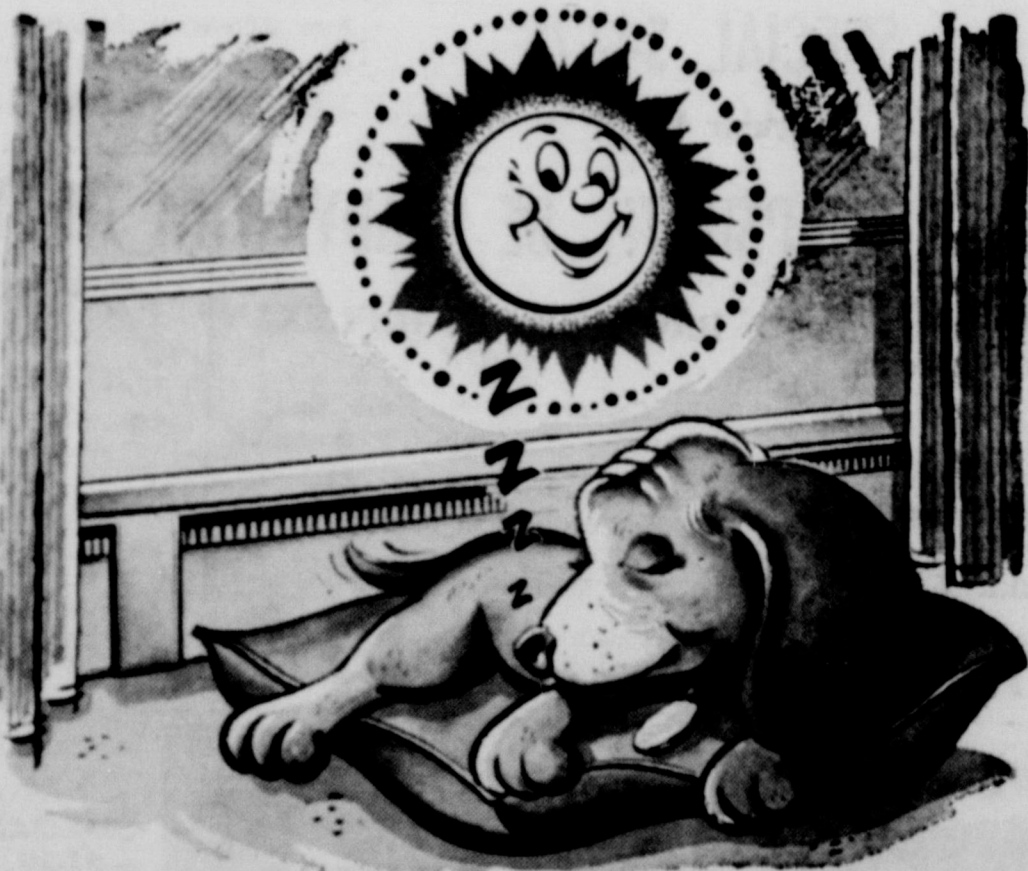

The meet, which was held at Darrowzett on Nov. 19, proved a very successful venture for the McLean chapter of Future Farmers of America.

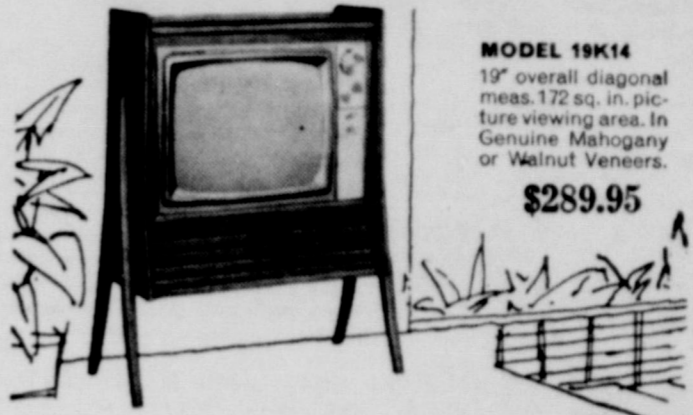
