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CAPITAL GAINS AND LOSSES

Gain from the sale of a capital asset is given preferential tax treatment on your income tax return. In general, this capital asset treatment applies to any property held by a taxpayer except property which the taxpayer is engaged in the business of selling.

Normally, when you sell a capital asset you either sell it at a gain or you sustain a loss, both computations being based upon the difference between the cost you paid for the item being sold and the selling price.

Generally, capital assets sold by you at a loss, which are in the nature of personal, non-business property used by you for your own benefit do not result in a loss deduction. On the other hand, all items sold by you at a gain do result in gross income to the extent of the gain. An exception to this rule regarding gain is in the case of a personal residence. This will be the subject of a later article in this series.

The profit on the sale of a capital asset is includable in gross income in its entirety. Where, however, you have held the asset for more than six months, you are entitled to a deduction of 50 per cent of the gain. Gain from the sale of a capital asset held more than six months is known as long-term capital gain.

A popular misconception is that long-term capital gains are taxable at a flat 25 per cent rate. Actually, this is the maximum rate. Along the 50 per cent deduction mentioned above, the balance of the long term capital gain is added to other income and the tax applied to the total. Unless this total, after other deductions and exemptions, exceeds \$36,000 in the case of a married taxpayer filing a joint return, the rate is less than 25 per cent.

Losses from the sale of capital assets, except again those held for your personal benefit such as a residence or a car, are deductible in the year you sell the capital asset, but only to the extent of your capital gains. However, if your losses exceed capital gains, you are allowed to deduct an additional \$1,000 against other income. Any balance of the loss remaining will be carried over to the five succeeding years, and deducted, subject to the same rules.

Property used in your business, but not held for sale to customers, receives a hybrid treatment upon sale. If a profit is made on the sale, it is treated as capital gain. However, if a loss results, the loss is deductible in full in the year of sale to the extent of any income received. Items in this category include: rental property, store buildings and fixtures and farm machinery.

Brush Control Is Most Important

There were several thousand acres of brush sprayed in the Gray County Soil Conservation District during 1961. Some of the cooperators who have done brush control work this year through the Great Plains and ASC programs were Billie Davis, H. H. Hudgins, Drew Word, Paul M. Bruce, John B. Rice, Emory Crockett, J. D. and Ray Fish, Guy Beasley and William E. Gething.

Many brush control experiments in the past have shown that three-fourths of the sand sagebrush on infested rangeland can be killed by one proper application of 2,4-D. Also forage and beef production can be increased 50% to 75% if deferred grazing is practiced for at least one summer growing season after the sage is controlled. Chemical control is cheaper, faster, and usually more effective than mechanical control.

Chemical control of sand sagebrush is effective only when the plants are in full growth and after they have reached full leaf. Adequate rainfall and good growing conditions are essential. Spraying shortly after a heavy rain is advisable.

Without control of sagebrush or any other undesirable species, only slight improvement in forage yield can be expected on many ranges even after good grazing management has been practiced, for 15 to 20 years. Where there is no seed source available it may even take longer. Seldom is overseeding justified without re-

moving the sagebrush first, because the grass seedlings cannot compete with the sagebrush for soil moisture.

Some good rules to follow in the control of sagebrush are: where there are dense stands preventing good grasses to grow control measures should be used, where good grazing management will be provided following control, and where seeding will be done promptly, if needed.

One of the most important rules is good management after the sagebrush has been controlled. The main purpose of management is to encourage the maximum production of good grasses. Otherwise, repeated control measures must be taken at added expense.

There are many farmers and ranchers already applying control measures through the Great Plains Conservation program. If anyone is interested in controlling sagebrush or any other undesirable species on their rangeland and would like assistance in any way they should contact their local Conservation Service, Soil Conservation Service technicians will be glad to give any assistance they can and explain how one may get federal cost-share if they so desire.

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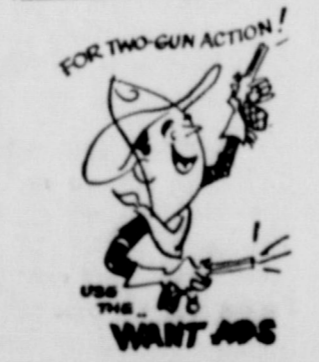
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THE QUACKER BARREL

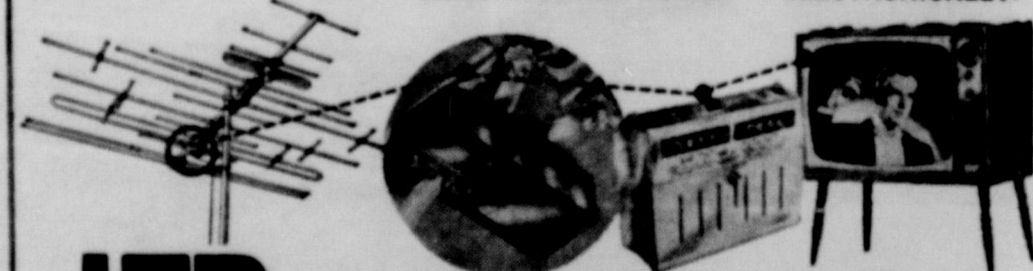

NEWS from YOUR COUNTY AGRICULTURAL AGENT TEXAS A & M COLLEGE EXTENSION SERVICE

By FOSTER WHALEY 4-H DEMONSTRATION

Cecil Regier, assistant county agent, has a 4-H team demonstration on farm management. This team illustrates through some very colorful charts and graphs a big income-tax saving by using capital gain provision as provided for breeding stock.

They illustrate the advantage of a fast cull and herd improvement program over the usual pattern of culling cows for a longer period of time.

This coming Friday night, April 27, starting promptly at 7:30 p. m. in the agricultural building in Pampa, this team will give this 10-minute program. It will precede a general farm meeting that will follow.

I believe every cowman would profit greatly by attending this meeting.

The Raymond Maddox stock farm is used as an example in this demonstration. Gene Maddox, the son, is one member of the team.

By changing to the fast cull rate, it is shown where Raymond could improve his income by approximately \$2,000.

The extra \$2,000 is picked up mainly through the capital gains provision as provided on beef-breeding herds. I am told Raymond is taking the 4-H boy seriously and is changing his operation to fit the demonstration.

During our income tax school last fall, an Internal Revenue agent saw these boys put on their demonstration, and he was highly complimentary of it.

GRANDDAUGHTERS

At the present, 15 million sterile flies are being released each week now in deep south Texas. This will soon be stepped up to 20 million.

Upon completion of a plant at Mission, Texas, on July 1 the capacity can be upped to 75 million sterile flies a week.

So far everything is going as scheduled. There is an inspection line that runs from Houston to San Antonio along Highway 70 to Del Rio. This transport line was set up in order that no infested animal would be taken out of the area south of this line to spread screw-worms to the north.

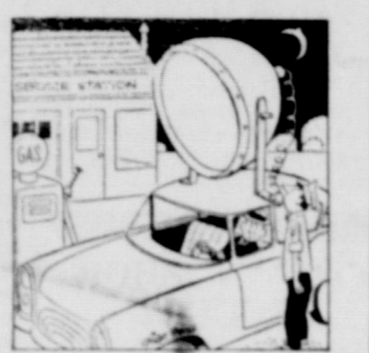
