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# AN OPEN LETTER All American Taxpayers

Savings and loan associations in many parts of the country are attempting to thwart legislation that would partially close the glaring tax loophole that permits these prosperous, rapidly growing institutions to pay virtually no Federal income tax. Their misleading statements, made to the public through newspaper advertisements and letters, are be-clouding an issue of vital significance to every American taxpayer.

Many of these statements give the misleading impression that the legislation now being considered by the Congress to increase the taxes paid by the savings and loan associations is sponsored by commercial banks.

WHAT ARE THE FACTS?

FIRST, that this particular legislation was introduced at the request of and has the full support of the President of the United States and the Secretary of the Treasury.

SECOND, that a bill (H. R. 10650) which would increase savings and loan taxes has been carefully prepared by the Ways and Means Committee of the House of Representatives and the House itself duly passed the legislation by a majority vote.

THIRD, that the savings and loan tax provision of H. R. 10650 enjoys broad support from diverse and important segments of the American people; it is supported by major national groups representing both business and labor.

FOURTH, that the Secretary of the Treasury has stated that H. R 10650 does NOT go far enough in taxing savings and loan associations. The Administration believes—and we think all fair-minded people will agree—that exemption of 60 per cent of the net income of the savings and loan associations from taxation (as provided in H. R. 10650) is unfair to all other taxpayers, and that the percentage of income taxed should be increased substantially.

When you receive a letter from a savings and loan association or when you read a newspaper advertisement in which the associations claim that they should not be subject to the same tax as their competitors ask yourself: How much tax do you pay? It's more than 1 per cent of your net income, isn't it? Yet in 1960 savings and loan associations paid less than 1 per cent of their net income for Federal income taxes. You as an individual paid far more than that. When tax-favored savings and loan associations pay less than their fair share, you and other taxpayers are forced to carry a greater share of the tax load.

## ARE YOU WILLING TO CONTINUE TO PAY SOMEONE ELSE'S TAXES?

Don't you agree with the President of the United States that it is about time savings and loan associations should start to bear their full share of the national tax burden?

We would like to see your taxes and our taxes reduced but we see no chance that this can be done. Banks pay from 30% to 32% of their net earnings in income taxes. You pay from 20% upwhy not tax everybody on an equal basis?

That made no difference to these lobbyists. They came right on into this district on their own to tell you how to vote in a local election. The most effective way of telling these lobbyists to stay out of a local election is to vote for Loster A. Jones on May 5.

The present representative of this district takes much credit for road system. Let's look at the condition of our road system as late as January 3, 1962. The governor addressed a joint session of the House and Senate on that date and his address is entered in the official House Journal. A few of the remarks contained in this address are: "On the farm to market road question, I vetoed the secondyear Colson-Briscoe program in the sum of \$15 million because there was no provision made by statute for maintenance of farmto-market roads." "A PRO-POSAL WHICH I SUBMIT IN BILL FORM by which the Colson-Briscoe program of \$15 million per year for construction would be restored and continued, and that maintenance funds wou'd be provided FREEING THE PRIMARY HIGH-WAY SYSTEM of a present maintenance load of \$18 million peryear." I maintain that the legislature had this system so fouled up, the governor of this state had to write a bill to provide adequate financing of the farm-to-market

road system. If robbing Peter to pay Paulusing primary road funds to support the farm-to-market road system-denotes "a proven leader in drives for improved road systems," personally need a little more explanation of how that works. I cannot call this confusion an example of fiscal responsibility. As your representative, my solution to expanding our farm-to-market road system would be direct. We should provide adequate funds to continue progress of the farm-to-market road system without interfering with our primary and interstate highway system.

My next newspaper column will not introduce any new issues. I believe in fair play in all things. Introducing of new issues or charges at this late date would not give my opponents adequate time to inform the people of this district as to their stand. I have rsod official documentation in my campaign and I will place my future in your hands on the merits of each issue I have discussed dur-

ing the past eigh' weeks. A detailed talk on this subject will be rante on radio Friday of this week.




