# Wagon Train Heads West Next Thursday Morning

## MEETING IS SATURDAY TO FINISH PLANS

The much publicized wagon train to Amarillo, first event in McLean's annual 66 Roundup Rodeo and Horse Show celebration, will head west at 5 a. m. next Thursday, with numerous persons expected to make the trip.

Bossed by Faris Hess, the large delegation of western-clad McLeanites will travel along Highway 66 on the three-day outing to Amarillo.

All persons planning to go along on the trip are urged to attend the rodeo planning meeting at 7:30 p. m. Saturday at city hall.

Final instructions will be given at that time. Area residents have been invited to join the wagon train to Amarillo, and many have indicated they plan to accept.

Several wagons are expected to be in the procession west, adding to the interest.

**Third Annual Trip**  
This will mark the third year the trip has been made to Amarillo to publicize the 66 Roundup Rodeo and Horse Show festivities. Each year the number of persons riding horseback and in wagons has grown.

The travelers will spend Thursday night at the old Lark School west of Groom, then stop Friday night at the edge of Amarillo.

Saturday they are scheduled to parade through Amarillo and go directly to the studios of KGNC-TV for an appearance on television.

Cotton John Smith, KGNC farm director, will interview the wagon train participants during his Saturday program.

The annual rodeo will open here on Memorial Day, May 30, and continue through June 2. The Horse Show, which has been gaining in popularity each year, is scheduled for the final day of the celebration.

## BOARD HIRES NEW TEACHER

Mrs. Don Viegel of Floydada was employed Monday night by the McLean board of education as high school home economics teacher for the 1962-63 term.

The board approved employing Mrs. Viegel, a West Texas State College graduate, on the recommendation of Supt. Lee Welch.

Welch said he had interviewed several prospective teachers and believed Mrs. Viegel was best qualified.

She will replace Mrs. Lois Page, who is moving to Floydada later this summer.

School trustees also accepted with regret the resignation of Mr. and Mrs. Dick Whatley as high school teachers. The Whatleys are completing their first year in the local school system.

They have accepted teaching positions in the Hammon, Okla., public schools for 1962-63.

During their regular monthly meeting, the board also approved the purchase of shelving for the high school library from Great Plains School and Church Supply, Amarillo.

Welch reported the purchase of two 16-mm projectors—one for the grade school and the other for use of the football coaching staff.

Authorization to buy the projectors had been given earlier by the board.

**COTTON PLANTING**

Most of the McLean farmers have either finished planting cotton or will be finishing soon. Mr. B. F. Holland, gin manager, tells me he has sold over 29,000 pounds of delinted and treated cotton seed.

Mostly Lankart 611 and Western have been sold. This should plant around 2,500 acres of cotton. We have around 4-100 acres of cotton allotment in the county.

Some farmers, no doubt, have their own seed and others have purchased elsewhere. This would mean the bulk of our cotton crop has been planted.

Although most people are yelling for a rain, I'm sure the cotton farmers had just as soon have a few days of cloudy weather without rain or wind.

B. J. Shaw, who farms north east of Alameda and an irrigated farm east of Pampa, purchased 1,600 pounds of Lankart 611. Shaw has a cotton allotment on both places.

Roy Billingsley is reported to have cotton up. C. W. Osborne, who gins at the McLean Gin and farms about 200 acres of irrigated cotton near Pampa, has cotton up.

If we can avoid the big rains

and have favorable summer weather on our cotton, we can expect this one rather minor crop to bring in about 615,000 in agricultural income to Gray County.

**NEW TYPE MILO**

Hybrid milo was developed in about 1956 by the Chillicothe Experiment Station, and has since raised yields of milo from one-fourth to one-third. Farmers readily accepted hybrid milo, since hybrid corn and the general acceptance of any new scientific developments paved the way.

Within two years after seed became available over 90 per cent of the milo planted was a hybrid. Although hybrids have broken the yield barrier, there are certain undesirable characteristics about them — mainly their tendency to fall down near harvest time.

No sooner did the experiment station get hybrid milo developed than the need arose to improve the standability of the hundreds of different hybrids developed.

Now again the experiment station has answered the call. They are about to release a new hybrid that is a dwarf. The yield under both dryland and irrigation has exceeded that of the most popular hybrid varieties.

For demonstration purposes I have small quantities of two of these new dwarf hybrids. They go by numbers. One is A-3197 X 547.

I would be glad to furnish seed for four short rows of milo on any one's place in the McLean vicinity. Let me hear from you. We can plant it at the same time you plant your regular milo crop.

We will not attempt to compare yields. Just use it for observation. Let's have a few good demonstration plantings in the McLean vicinity.

**GOPHERS**

A representative of the Fish and Wildlife Service was by the office last week, and we were talking about getting rid of a few last remaining prairie dog towns. If you have a prairie dog town, we would like to know about it.

Also Mr. V. R. Smith, representative of the Fish and Wildlife Service, said the service was getting some machines that can be pulled with a three-point tractor to be used for demonstration on the eradication of gophers.

They build little trenches and distribute poison grain to eradicate these pests of alfalfa fields and other crops. He said they were most effective. Anyone interested in a demonstration, let me know.

Incidentally, Tom Sparks, with the service, is to be here June 4 to do follow up work on the prairie dog work.

**HESS & WRIGHT SALE**

Although I don't have Faris' permission to make any appraisal of his sale, I did pick up a few notes while helping Flip Breedlove with the barbecue.

The auctioneer dropped the gavel on one bull at \$4,250. A cow and calf brought \$3,900. The first 72 lots averaged \$824. The entire sale averaged \$488 per lot on 480 lots.

My seventh grade math gives me in round figures a total sale of \$234,240, or slightly over a quarter-million dollars. I am assuming that all 480 lots sold.

Faris seemed to be well pleased with the results.

This week Faris is to be on the program at Fort Worth on a Hereford Improvement Congress. This isn't the correct name for it, but is close.

Clyde Magee and Evan Sitter were to accompany Faris to this nationwide program.

**WEIGHT FOR AGE**

George Saunders, Angus breeder, had some outstanding gains in a recent feeding test on 11 bulls he had on feed. No. 203 bull that graded choice-plus made an average daily gain of 3.3 pounds in the 140-day feeding period.

He had several others that did did close to this figure.

A letter written by Jim Vineyard, son of Mr. and Mrs. P. M. Gibson of McLean, on the racial problem in Indianapolis, Ind., has been published in a newspaper there.

Vineyard wrote the letter to the editor of the Indianapolis Star in defense of a Negro family which had recently moved into a neighborhood formerly occupied by whites only.

Vineyard wrote that "I take pride in the fact that I can live across the street from a colored family, for after all, our Constitution says that I am equal to them."

He declared that "if any action is taken, whatever it may be to get this colored family to leave our neighborhood, I will do my utmost to have it publicized so that the populace may know what type of people call themselves Americans, and who these people are."
