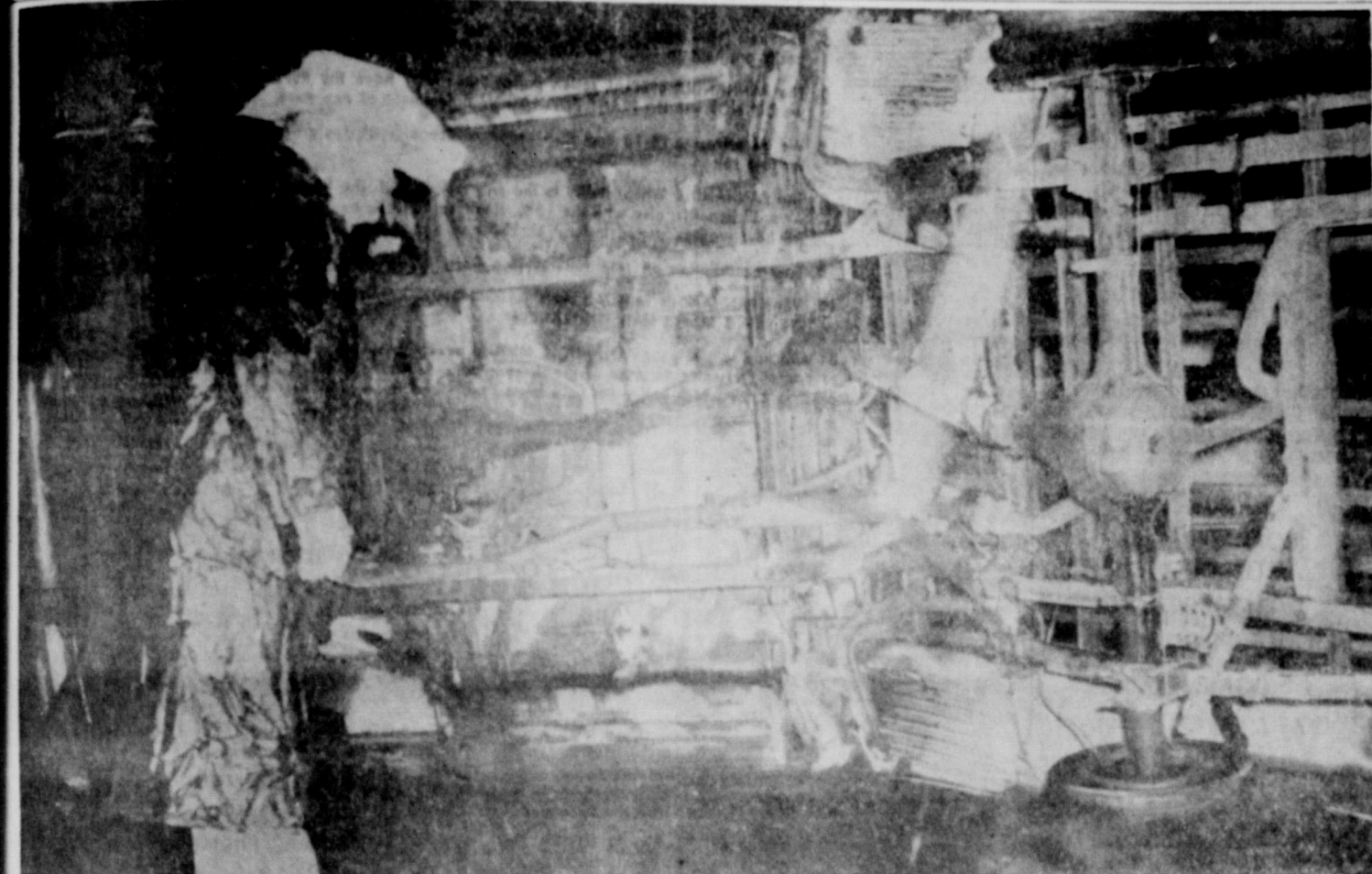

## Rodeo Celebration Opens Wednesday

### TORNADO IS SIGHTED HERE

Thunderstorms that produced at least one tornado roared over McLean last Sunday afternoon, leaving 66 inch of moisture—in rain and hail.

Pete Fulbright, local weather observer, said Wednesday that the brief downpour brought to 4.09 inches the amount of moisture received here since the first of the year.

The total for May stands at .91 inch. At this time a year ago the city had received 4.89 inches.

Rains in May include, in addition to Sunday's storm, .18 inch on May 16 and .05 inch on May 18.

Several McLean residents sighted a long, ropelike tornado extending from the storm cloud late Sunday afternoon. The twister, too high to touch the ground, appeared to be moving to the southwest before rain and hail began to fall here and obscured the vision.

Late during the same afternoon, Shamrock reported some damage from a tornado there.

The storm alert siren was sounded in McLean during the late afternoon, as the menacing clouds moved toward the city from the southwest.

### 2 Are Killed In Fiery Auto Crash

A California couple met a fiery death near Alanreed Sunday afternoon, when their pickup truck overturned and was struck by a Greyhound bus.

Mr. and Mrs. Oliver Perry Hazzard, 546 Higura Street, San Luis Obispo, Calif., were unable to escape from the cab of their truck after it caught fire.

They were burned beyond recognition.

Highway Patrolman E. C. Parker, who investigated the mishap, said the Greyhound bus driver had taken evasive action to avoid hitting the overturned pickup, but to no avail.

Glen Edward Potter of Oklahoma City, driver of the bus, told Parker that he jumped from the west-bound vehicle with a fire extinguisher following the crash, but was unable to put out the fire.

**Bus Passengers Unhurt**

No one on the bus was injured, but the vehicle received a broken windshield.

Parker said rain in the afternoon had left Highway 66 slick in spots. When the pickup, which also was headed west, hit one of the wet places on the highway and was caught by a strong cross current, Hazzard lost control of the truck.

The truck was made top-heavy by a camper on the back.

The vehicle started sliding sideways, then over turned on its left side and skidded some distance.

Potter was unable to prevent a collision of the bus with the overturned truck. The pickup immediately burst into flames, trapping Mr. and Mrs. Hazzard inside.

McLean volunteer firemen were called to the scene but were unable to do little more than spray water on the truck while the fire burned itself out.

Bodies of the two victims were sent by train to California Wednesday morning for services and interment.

Mr. Hazzard was born on Sept. 11, 1908.

Rev. and Mrs. Beltz are to return to McLean in time for local worship services on June 10.

### Livestock Survey Cards Distributed

Postmaster Bill Reeves this week reminded rural patrons of the McLean Post Office to be on the look-out for the June Livestock Survey cards.

J. M. Hathaway, McLean rural carrier, was scheduled to distribute the survey cards in a sample of boxes along his routes this week.

Reeves pointed out that the United States Department of Agriculture bases livestock and poultry estimates on replies to the survey.

"It's important," Reeves explained, "for everyone who gets a card to fill it out and return it to the carrier. This way, USDA statisticians are able to estimate the state's milk production, calf and pig crops, lamb and wool crops and the number of hens and pullets."

Reeves said that information from the survey will guide livestock and poultry producers in making important business decisions.

### Lion Officers To Be Installed At June 5 Program

Joe Tooley of Pampa will install new officers of the McLean Lions Club at a Ladies Night program on June 5 in the Methodist Church basement.

Tooley is a long-time member of the Pampa Lions Club and has been active in Lions work both there and across the district and state.

Local club President Jimmie Don Morris announced at Tuesday's board of directors breakfast that Tooley had accepted an invitation to install the new officers.

Also during the breakfast, the directors approved the purchase of balls and other needed equipment for the new Inter-City League baseball team which has been organized here.

The league will begin its season next week, with teams from McLean, Wheeler, Lefors, Samnorwood, Mobeetie and Shamrock participating.

### Funeral Services Held For Oscar B. Tugwell

Funeral services for Oscar Burton Tugwell, 80-year-old former resident of McLean, were held in the First Methodist Church here Tuesday.

Rev. Jack Riley of Pampa, former pastor of the local church, officiated, and interment was in Hillcrest Cemetery under the direction of Lamb Funeral Home.

Mr. Tugwell, who lived at 1707 Pontiac in Roswell, N. M., died Sunday morning in St. Mary's Hospital there. He had made his home in Roswell since moving there from McLean in 1956.

He came to McLean in 1945 from Pampa.

Born in Independence County, Ark., Mr. Tugwell had been ill for about three years.

He is survived by two sons, Fred of Fort Worth and R. A. of Ellensburg, Wash.; three daughters, Mrs. R. D. Patterson of Idaho and Mrs. J. M. Rice of San Diego, Calif.; 11 grandchildren and nine great grandchildren.

Lefors also will be represented in the graduating class.

Candidates for bachelor of science degrees from Lefors are: Martha Jane Bredfield, elementary education; Jimmy Clinton Roberts, mathematics; Howard Leroy Bredfield and Arthur R. Roberts, electrical engineering.

### WAGON TRAIN LEAVES HERE EARLY TODAY

A long procession of horseback riders and wagons pulled out of McLean at 5 a. m. today to kickoff the city's 53rd annual 66 Roundup Rodeo and Horse Show celebration.

The wagon train, bossed by Faris Hess, is scheduled to arrive in Amarillo Saturday morning to end the three-day trip.

A host of the Southwest's top amateur rodeo performers are expected here for the opening of the rodeo on Memorial Day next Wednesday at the Felton Webb arena north of the city.

The four-day rodeo and related festivities will continue at 8 p. m. through the following Saturday.

### Saddle to Winner

The two ground rodeo will bring each event winner a \$225 trophy saddle.

The purse for the winners will be \$2,400-\$400 for each event.

Events are to include saddle bronc riding, bareback bronc riding, bull riding, calf roping, heading and cutting and bulldozing.

In addition a girls barrel race, with a \$150 jackpot, also is scheduled for the first time.

A highlight of the activities will be the Horse Show and open riding horse contest at 9 a. m. Saturday, June 2.

Mrs. Ruby Baskin, who, with her husband, Neville, is in charge of the horse show arrangements, said many quarter horses are expected to enter.

The annual calf scramble for McLean 4-H and FFA boys has been set for the final rodeo performance on June 2.

Mrs. Fern Boyd announced this week that the registration of pioneers for the celebration will start at 1 p. m. next Wednesday at Lovett Memorial Library.

### Free Pass

Persons who have been in the community 50 years or more will receive one free pass to the rodeo.

The Old Fiddlers Contest will be at 2 p. m. on Wednesday, with the parade later in the afternoon at 4.

Rodeo headquarters is to be Ellison Chevrolet Co. Stock contractor is Rajten Brothers Rodeo Co. of Happy, and the rodeo announcer will be Speck Lunceford of Dallas. The rodeo clown will be Richard Walters of Amarillo.

John C. Haynes is serving as president of the rodeo association, which is composed of the McLean Lions Club and Roping Club. Bob Sherman is rodeo chairman.

Haynes announced this week that the final rodeo planning meeting will be held at 7:30 p. m. next Monday, and every person who can help with the event in any way is asked to attend.

### Memorial Day Rites Set at Cemetery

Memorial Day arrives next Wednesday, and McLean will observe the event with a holiday for most businesses and a special program at Hillcrest Cemetery.

Rev. L. R. Green, pastor of the Assembly of God Church, will be speaker for the memorial service starting at 10 a. m.

The program is held each year at the cemetery on Memorial Day.

### Another Phase Of Hedley Road Okayed

The Texas Highway Commission has approved the construction of 7.4 more miles of the new road between McLean and Hedley, it was learned here this week.

Work on the first 8.6 miles of the road is expected to get under way soon, since the contract for the project was awarded several weeks ago.

When construction on the second phase of the project will begin wasn't revealed.

The Highway Commission gave approval to the full 26 miles of road from McLean to Hedley last year, but the project is scheduled in stages.

### Highway Week Is Proclaimed Here

Mayor John C. Haynes has issued a proclamation designating May 29-30 as "Highway Week" in McLean, asking citizens to "support a sustained program of highway improvement and modernization to keep Texas growing."

President John F. Kennedy earlier proclaimed the same period as "National Highway Week" and "Texas Highway Week" was designated by Gov. Price Daniel.

The proclamation commends the Texas Highway Department "for its achievements in building today's fine highway system in the face of mounting traffic problems."

### Residents Urged to Attend Watershed Meet Slated Saturday

An important meeting in the planning of the McClellan Creek watershed upstream flood control project is scheduled here Saturday.

All business people and other residents are being urged to show interest in the project by attending the meeting at 2 p. m. in the high school auditorium.

Initial plans have been made and preliminary approval given for the construction of several flood control dams on the McClellan Creek watershed.

At Saturday's meeting here, representatives of the Texas Soil Conservation Board will be on hand to hear local opinions on the need for the project.

### GRADUATION ENDS SCHOOL

"World prizes come to those who forget self," McLean High School's graduating seniors were told Tuesday night.

Dr. Al Harris, president of Southwestern State College in Weatherford, Okla., told the students they should "make wise use of time. . . There is no time given to us to throw away."

He said that "everyday presents a new opportunity to see what you will do. . . Everyday is examination day."

Dr. Harris declared that "Americans cannot be discouraged from doing things they dream about," and he told his listeners he could not "minimize the importance of education."

Phyllis Flowers, the class valedictorian, and Margie Raiback, salutatorian received scholarships from church related colleges, and Miss Flowers also was presented a one-year tuition scholarship from any state-supported college.

Both of the top two students also received trophies from McLean High School.

Miss Flowers, in addition, was the recipient of the American Legion and leadership awards for girls, with Jim Watson being presented the same awards for boys.

The leadership award winners were selected by MHS teachers.

Miss Flowers and Miss Raiback said the traditional valedictory and salutatory, respectively, at the commencement program. Principal Bob Green presented the class members to Sammy Hynes, board of education president, for diplomas.

### Seniors Sing

For the musical part of the program, the senior class sang "Moon River." Mrs. H. F. Fabian played the pre-choral and recessional; Rev. J. L. Carter, pastor of the Pentecostal Holiness Church, said the invocation, and Mrs. Wanda Waldrop sang "The Lord's Prayer" as the benediction.

Following the exercises, the class went to the American Legion building for an all-night party to celebrate the graduation.

The baccalaureate service was held Sunday night with Rev. J. B. Stewart, Methodist Church pastor, delivering the sermon.

Graduation exercises for the grade school were held Monday night, and Don Willingham, minister of the Church of Christ, was the speaker.

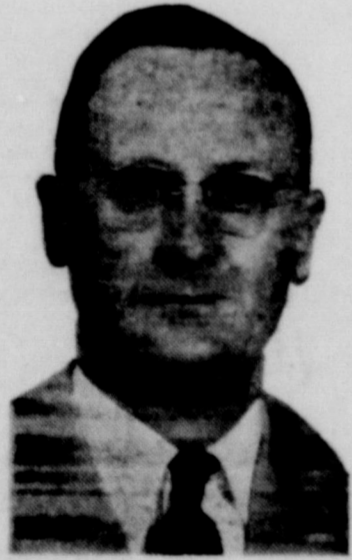

**COTTON INSECTS**

Last year for the first time we had some cotton boll weevil trouble. There is some disagreement on how much trouble we had.

My personal opinion is that we didn't have enough weevil trouble to warrant spraying. The unusually cold winter should have helped some in preventing serious outbreaks this year.

It is something we should keep an eye on.

I now have for free distribution copies of the Extension Service "1962 Guide for Controlling Cotton Insects in High Plains."

**WHEAT PROSPECTS**

For the most part, the wheat crop on the High Plains will be very disappointing to most farmers.

Last fall we started off with an other abundant supply of under ground moisture. Wheat pasture was above average. A good rain in February set the stage for an other bumper crop.

But several factors have changed since then: 1. Extremely dry weather. Some folks have had less than an inch in the form of worthless quarter-inch showers.

2. Two plant diseases associated with dry weather have also hampered yields. Planting at too early a date encourages these two diseases.

3. Pasturing too late and heavy have also reduced prospects. Some farmers have turned back in on their wheat and will graze it out.

This year's average or below average crop will break a chain of bumper crops that started in 1958. Our hope is that four years won't be followed by four bad ones.

The bright spot in it all is the fact that many farmers have already harvested a good wheat crop in the form of good profits on grazing cattle. Profits have ranged from \$20 per head to as much as \$55 per head for winter gains.

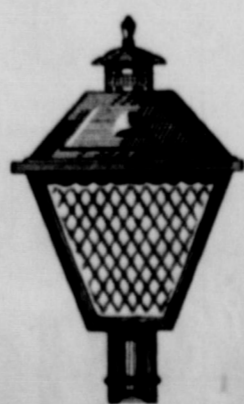

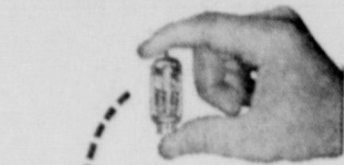

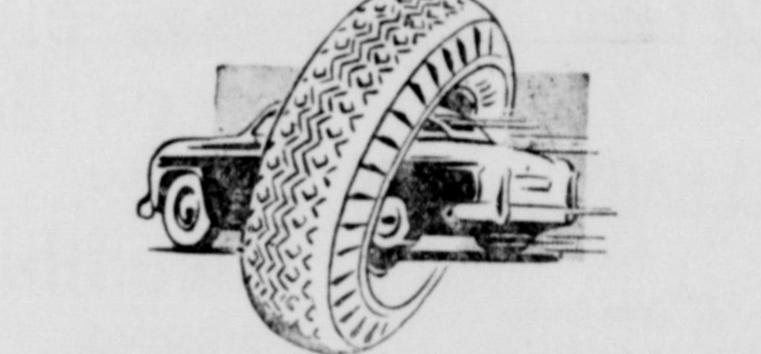
