## General Election Is Set Next Tuesday Campaigns Are Drawing to End

A large ballot—comparable in size to a page of The McLean News—will be presented to voters next Tuesday in the general election. Balloting will begin at 8 a.m. and end at 7 p.m. in the McLean city hall. A total of 541 poll tax-paying voters reside in commissioner Precinct 4—482 of them in McLean and 59 Alanreed—and a large turnout could occur, depending on how well the Democrat and Republican candidates have put their messages across.

### Matagorda Island Lease Subject Of State-Filed Suit

State Rep. Grainger McIlhany of Wheeler, chairman of the House Special Committee to Safeguard State Lands, announced Wednesday the federal government has indicated an interest in working out a lease agreement for Texas-owned lands of Matagorda Island. The lease, which could benefit the Texas public schools, is to be based on the fair value of the lands—amounting to approximately 15,000 acres. Investigations and hearings of the McIlhany committee held the past several months have revealed that since the days of World War II state lands on Matagorda have been condemned each year by the federal government for less than six cents per acre per year. At the same time, however, McIlhany said that private landowners have been receiving around \$1 per acre for their lands on the island, which is used by the Air Force as a training area.

### AMENDMENTS IN BRIEF

A number of McLean residents have during the past few days asked for additional information on the 14 proposed constitutional amendments to be voted on in next Tuesday's election. Because of these requests, The McLean News is publishing a brief digest of each of the proposed amendments: NUMBER ONE (HJR 25)—Provides Workmen's Compensation Insurance for the employees of all political subdivisions. NUMBER TWO (SJR 9)—Raises the limit on use of state funds to assist needy aged, needy blind and needy children from \$47,000,000 to \$52,000,000. NUMBER THREE (SJR 22)—Permits creation of hospital districts in Ochiltree, Castro, Hansford and Hopkins Counties. NUMBER FOUR (HJR 46)—Provides for a state program of acquiring conservation storage facilities in reservoirs. NUMBER FIVE (HJR 51)—Creates hospital districts and limits their power. NUMBER SIX (HJR 36)—Authorizes retirement, disability and death benefits for elected and appointive officers and employees of counties and political subdivisions who have served in such capacity for 12 years or more. NUMBER SEVEN (SJR 13)—Insures continuity of state and local governmental operations in periods of emergency, resulting from disasters caused by enemy attack. (See AMENDMENTS, Page 7)

**Block Further Condemnation**  
Upon the recommendation of the House Land Committee and Land Commissioner Jerry Sadler, the attorney general has filed suit to block further condemnation of these state lands. McIlhany pointed out that he feels the state is entitled to the same lease payment as other landowners on Matagorda Island. The Wheeler lawmaker indicated that his committee will meet with state and federal officials in Austin on Nov. 8 to work out details of the lease. He said that the increased income of a fair lease over the six cents condemnation procedure will benefit the public school fund and help all of the school children of Texas.

### Funeral Held For Mrs. Lillie Aldous

Funeral services for Mrs. Lillie Aldous, sister of Miss Ruby Cook of McLean, were held Monday in the Shamrock Episcopal Church. Mrs. Aldous died Saturday night in Shamrock General Hospital. She was 81. Owner of the Aldous Ranch south of Shamrock, Mrs. Aldous was the daughter of the late Mr. and Mrs. C. C. Cook of McLean. She was also a sister of Mrs. Mae M. Watson of Fresno, Calif., formerly of McLean. Mrs. Watson is seriously ill in Fresno. She was a member of the Episcopal Church, having served as secretary for several years. Attending the services from McLean, in addition to Miss Cook, were Mrs. Byrd Guill, Willie Boyett, Melvin McCabe, Wilson Boyd, S. A. Cousins, Bob Black, Claude Powell and M. M. Burroughs, Mr. and Mrs. Pete Rice and Mr. and Mrs. Jim Dougherty.

Windom Jr., association president, said that it is important that all directors attend.

### Turkey Day Holidays Begin on Nov. 21

A two-day vacation is ahead for McLean High School and Grade School students and teachers. Classes will be dismissed for the Thanksgiving holidays on Wednesday afternoon, Nov. 21, and not be resumed until the following Monday, Nov. 26.

### MERCURY DIPS EVER LOWER

The weather seems to be looking with favor more now on the completion of the McLean area's cotton harvest. Still, farmers are hoping Jack Frost will soon make his appearance, so that leaves on the cotton stalks will die and the bolls will pop open for machine harvesting. If the first big freeze comes as early this year as it did in 1961, they haven't long to wait. On Nov. 3 last year, the temperature plunged to 23 degrees for the first freeze. Thermometers continue to dip closer to the freezing mark here, recording a low of 35 degrees during the past week. The low came last Thursday. The high for the week was 74 degrees, which occurred on Saturday. No rain has fallen in the past seven days, leaving the total for the year at 18.16 inches. This compares with 22.81 on this date in 1961.

### Bond Sales Reach 50 Per Cent of Goal

Sale of United States savings bonds in Gray County totaled \$39,483 during September, according to George B. Cree Jr. of Pampa, bond committee chairman.

This amount pushed to barely 50.2 per cent of the 1962 goal the total of bonds sold so far this year.

Cumulative sales for the year are \$396,765, compared to the goal of \$710,000.

Statewide, bond sales for the first nine months of 1962 reached \$111,734,186, representing 67.7 per cent of Texas' goal of \$165.1 million.

### QUEENS WILL FACE SOVIETS

Laura Switzer, McLean All-American basketball player, will be in the lineup for the Wayland Baptist College Hutcherson Flying Queens in the international cage spectacular on Nov. 21 in Lubbock's Municipal Coliseum.

Squaring off will be two teams from the United States and two teams from Russia, with the opener between the Queens and Soviet National Women's team scheduled for 7 p.m.

In the second contest the Soviet National Men's Team battles an all-star male squad formed around the regulars of Phillips 66 Oilers of Bartlesville, Okla.

Miss Switzer, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Forrest Switzer of McLean, has seen action against the Russian team before—when she and other All-American players toured the Soviet Union last year.

Miss Switzer is a senior at Wayland and is in her third year as a member of the Flying Queens, famed women's basketball squad.

Led by seven-foot, three-inch, 320-pound Jannis Krymisch, the Russian men are expected to field their finest team ever in international competition.

Standouts on the women's team will be Nina Poxmanskaja, the team captain, and 6-6 Revela Salimova.

Eight games are scheduled for the visiting Russians, who are due to arrive in New York next Tuesday. In addition to the games in Lubbock, the teams will play in New York, Washington, Nashville, Tenn., Sioux Falls, S. D., Mt. Pleasant, Ia., and Denver, Colo.

Tickets for the Lubbock games will be \$1.50 to \$2.50, and are on sale in Lubbock and surrounding area. Wayland College has a block of tickets for sale, and they may be purchased by writing the college business office at Plainview.

### COMPACT

From the dawn of Western thought, men like Socrates have wondered what claims the laws have on us—aside from pure force.

Some thought men had contracted to set up and obey the laws to keep the peace: "You don't hurt me and I won't hurt you." But until 1620 at least, nobody had ever seen men enter such a social contract.

True, Socrates in return for the good Athens had done for him, said that he had entered an implied, unwritten contract to obey her laws, even the unjust judgment against him to take the hemlock and die.

Still, not until the Mayflower band 20 centuries later, sailed over to settle in the new world did we get a social contract actually signed and sealed.

It comes down to us in 198 vital words, the granddaddy of all written constitutions, as well as a document in the history of liberty under the law. Its gist:

"We . . . do by these presents solemnly and mutually in the presence of God and one another, covenant and combine ourselves together into a civil body politic, for our better ordering and preservation . . . and by virtue hereof to enact, constitute, and frame such just and equal laws, ordinances, acts, constitutions, and offices from time to time as shall be thought most meet and convenient for the general good of the colony, unto which we promise all due submission and obedience.

In witness whereof we have subscribed our names at Cape Cod on the 11 of November . . ."

Much too plain in the next 168 years. But in 1788 the states wrote and ratified the world's finest and now oldest and most successful constitution. Why do men obey the laws? It says:

"We, the people of the United States, in order to form a more perfect Union, establish justice, insure domestic tranquility, provide for the common defense, promote the general welfare, and secure the Blessings of Liberty to ourselves and our Posterity, do ordain

and establish this Constitution of the United States of America."

### Letter to the Editor

(The following letter, written by Margaret Randel of Panhandle, formerly of McLean, is reprinted from the Friday, Oct. 17 issue of the Amarillo Globe-Journal.)

Mr. Turnstile, where I have been studying this past year, is of course, a major topic of interest, and I have been fortunate enough to have been able to see in on many of the sessions of Congress.

I have been interested to note when I mentioned the congressional district I was from, these Republicans and Democrats had nothing but the high praise for our congressman, Mr. Rogers of Pampa. The reason for the regard which these people have for Congressman Rogers are not hard to see.

Whenever a person's political views here, I have discovered, always admires a congressman who possesses three qualities: ability, integrity and loyalty. Mr. Rogers' ability has been demonstrated in the terms he has served in the House of Representatives for 181, holding positions on committees on Veterans Affairs, Interstate and Foreign Commerce and Communications and Power, among others. In these committees, he has worked to obtain the Canadian River Dam, private ownership of the U.S. communications satellite, and dealt with a host of other important vital issues.

Mr. Rogers' integrity has been proved through his entire term of office—something, unfortunately, which some people in Texas cannot say about their representatives.

And, far from least, Walter Rogers has represented his constituents here—in supporting measures which they need, in being interested in their views and ideas in short, he has consistently represented the best interests of the 8th Congressional District.

The positions which Mr. Rogers holds are important ones; a congressman, in order to fill such posts, must obtain seniority—and without this seniority, it is difficult, if not impossible, for him to be able to make his voice heard in the needs and desires of his district.

Many things, of course, are important in voting for a Congressman. Campaign speeches and promises are one thing; more important is the day after the election—how well will our representative represent us—and the others of our district? Will he speak up for a vocal minority—or will he strive to know and follow the thinking of the majority?

I have been afforded a rare opportunity this year to observe my congressman in action, to see what kind of representative he really is. I know that many other people in the 18th Congressional District have also had similar opportunities. But I have been so favorably impressed with the job that Mr. Rogers is doing for us here in Washington that I wished to tell

my friends at home about him, and I hope that they and all the voters in the district will carefully consider Mr. Rogers' record on Nov. 6.
