after Nov. 1.

Farmers may sign only one of their farms up for the 1963 program and not participate on their other farms, if they wish.

Regulations prohibit a wheat payment on any farm if the producer exceeded his wheat allotment on any other of his farms. Dec. 14 is the deadline for signing up for the program.

Miss Mason suggested that farmers drop by her office and let personnel there compute the payment on their acreage at 20 per cent and at 50 per cent, before a decision is reached.

She said the program is "entirely voluntary and you will still receive price support at the national level of \$1.82 per bushel if you do not sign up at all."

# WALTER ROGERS REPORTS

## IN TRIBUTE

Shortly after this newsletter is being written—on Sunday, Nov. 11, to be exact—we will celebrate Veterans Day. Therefore, this seems to me an appropriate time to consider just what our armed forces mean to us.

Nov. 11, 1918, was the original Armistice Day. That day was the end of World War I, and it was made a national holiday shortly thereafter, as a tribute to all those who had died in the "war to end all wars." Since then, we have engaged in World War II, the Korean "police action," several small conflicts in widely scattered parts of the world and the continuing Cold War.

The cost of these struggles in men and money has been tremendous, and all of us mourn the gallant men and women who gave their lives that we might live. But, the result is something we must never forget: We are free, and we will remain free.

The current trouble over Cuba makes this all the more pertinent. One American pilot died in this encounter a few days ago; other lives may be lost before it is all over. But, all indications are that in this case we have convinced the Communist aggressors that we will fight if we must; and this determination on our part, firmly and unequivocally conveyed to the rulers of the Kremlin who pull the strings in the Cuban puppet state, has apparently won the day for us.

Based on the information available as I write, the offensive missile bases in Cuba are being dismantled and the weapons of mass destruction which they supported are being crated for return to the Soviet Union. I am sure we all rejoice together that this threat is being removed and that our national strength and unity have again guaranteed our position as the greatest nation on earth.

The lives that have been lost in recent wars were terribly precious—there is nothing more an individual can sacrifice for his country and loved ones. We who enjoy the fruits of their sacrifice owe them a debt that can never be repaid; a debt we can only commemorate by remembering them and doing everything in our power to maintain the nation which they saved for us.

And, there are two major facets to this job. First, as individuals, we must remain constantly aware of what our country means to each and every one of us; we must remember that the maintenance of our nation is infinitely more important than the personal concerns and problems which face us in our daily life. And, collectively, we must do all that is necessary to maintain the strength which permits us to carry on our way of life.

This latter duty is an expensive proposition, in terms of dollars. As I mentioned several months ago, the appropriations for the Department of Defense for the current fiscal year amounted to \$47,839,491,000—about 60 cents out of every tax dollar collected. This is a staggering sum of money, but the job to be done with it is also huge. And, I am sure none of us would begrudge a single penny, as long as it is spent carefully and accomplishes the purpose for which it is appropriated.

Twenty-six friends met at the home of Mrs. Dora Sanders Thursday night. Hymns were sung and salad, cookies and punch were enjoyed. The next meeting of the group will be at the home of Mrs. Ora Grimsley.

Out of this total, the amount of \$12,901,890,000 is designated for "military personnel." This is the money which pays the guardians of our sovereignty, to whom we all owe a debt of thanks. Although the members of our armed forces are imperfect individuals, as are we all, they are primarily dedicated individuals whose very existence is our shield against any totalitarian system which would take over the world.

They are men and women of courage and determination, most of whom could lead easier, better-paid, more relaxed lives as civilians. One of the happiest jobs of a congressman is the appointment of young men from their areas to the various service academies, and I take a tremendous amount of pride in the fine cadets and officers who represent the Panhandle in the academies and the Army, Navy, Air Force and Marines and the many young men from the area who serve in the ranks in all of the services.

I am sure you all join me in thanks and best wishes to the representatives of our area, and the rest of the nation, who have the front-line responsibility for permitting us to continue to live as a free and happy people.

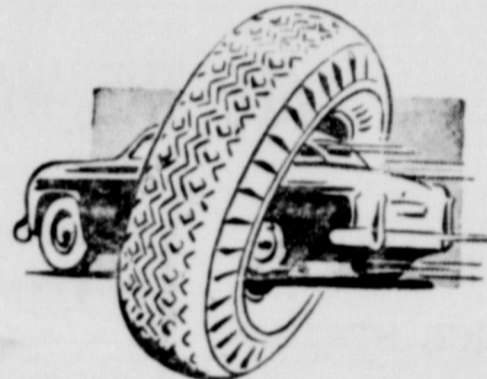

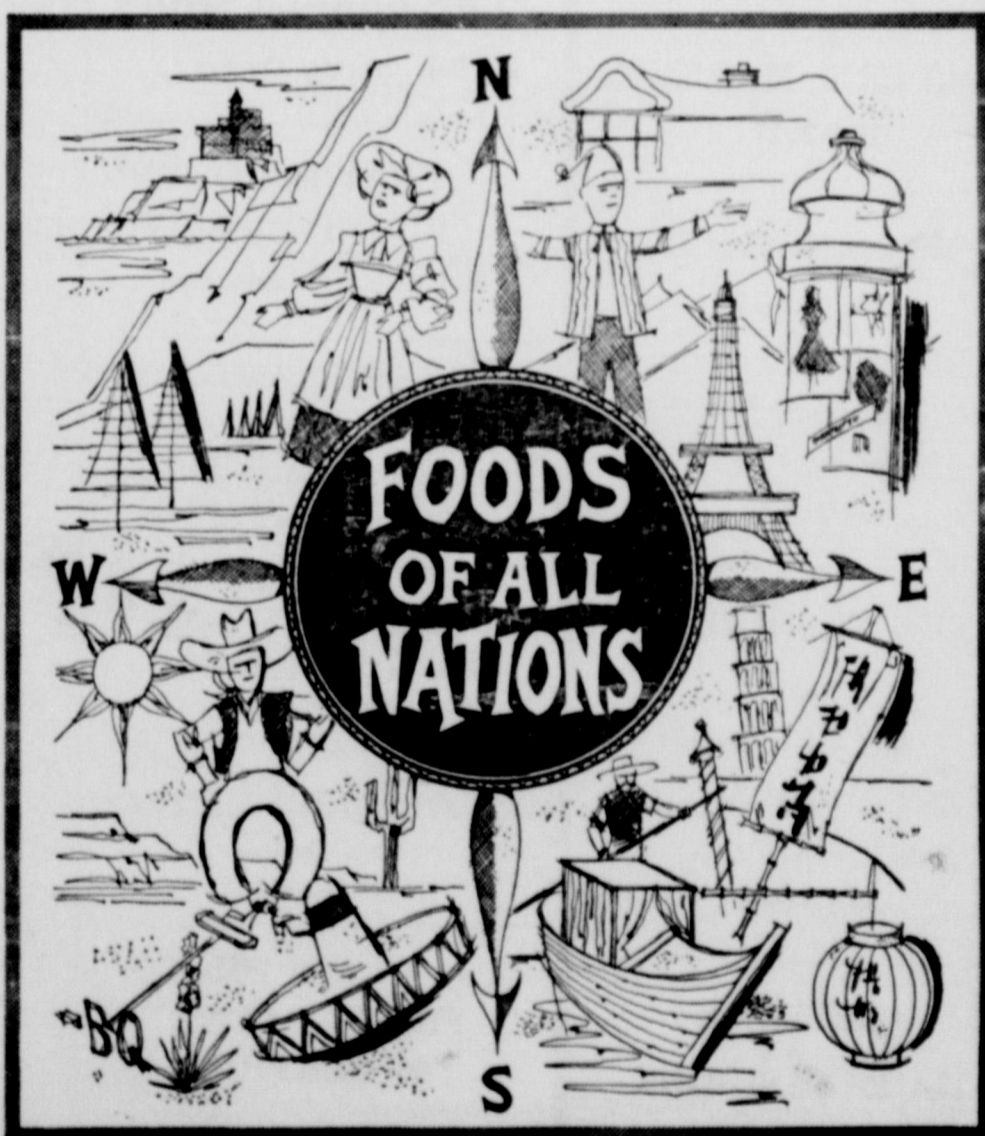

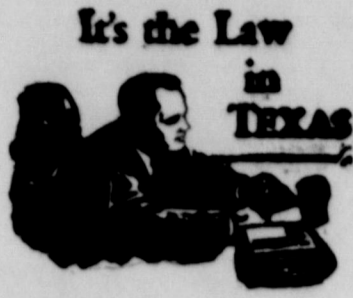

## PARKING LOT THEFT

Mort Meanswell owned a parking lot. It was enclosed by an eight foot fence and had one entrance and one exit. Mort kept at least one attendant on duty at all times to park and watch after his customers' cars. Patrons were requested to leave their keys in the car to enable the attendants to park the cars as well as move them when necessary.

Hotrod Harry parked his car in Mort's lot and was given a claim check. He promptly put it in his pocket without paying any attention to it. Upon the back of the claim check was written "The per-

son accepting this ticket assumes all risk of accident, and expressly agrees that the management shall not be liable, under any circumstances, for any injury to person, or loss or damage."

A couple of hours later Harry returned. His car had been stolen. Mort Meanswell said that he was sorry, but pointed to the statement on the back of the claim check. Mort refused to pay for the stolen car. Harry sued him.

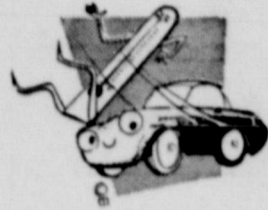
Must Mort pay for the stolen car?

Mort probably would have to pay. Most courts have held that a statement on the back of a parking claim check is only effective if called to the car owner's attention. Mort had not done this. Also, Harry had a right to believe from the fact that Mort maintained an enclosed space for parking, with attendants on duty, that he was paying the parking fee in consideration of care and watchfulness to prevent injury or loss.

Parking lot operators may at-

tempt to escape responsibility by a notice of limitation of liability posted on the lot or printed on the claim check given the owner of the car. But with few exceptions the courts have not upheld such limitations where the loss or injury was due to the negligence of the operator of the lot, and where the stipulations were not specifically called to the attention of the car owner.
