McLean - Lefors Game Here Friday Ends 2-A Season

running and usually effective blocking and tackling helped the McLean Tigers upset the Lefors Wildcats' appecart last Friday setting the stage for Friday's season-closer with the Lefors Pirates here.

The traditional Tiger-Pirate battle will unfold at Duncan Field starting at 7:30 p.m.

Lefors Coach Dunny Goode will bring a powerful band of Bucs to McLean. The Pirates already have lined up a position in the bi-district playoffs, but a defeat Friday would seem to share the 2-A championship with the Clarendon

Bronchos, provided the latter get by Memphis.

Lefors hammered the Memphis Cyclone 57-14 last week.

Thus, the scene here Friday night will be much the same as it was two years ago in Lefors, when the Pirates had the title won.

In 1960, however, the Tigers rose to the task and handed the Bucs a 13-6 defeat.

McLean Coach Derral Davis said Wednesday that he was more than pleased with the improvement shown by the Tigers in recent weeks.

"I guarantee you," he added, "if Lefors beats them, the boys

will go down fighting."

He praised their "effort and desire in practice and in games," and said the Tigers have proved to him what can be accomplished "through a little hard work and effort."

Debbie Crockett, who had turned in an outstanding performance the week before, did it again Friday as McLean ripped the Canadian Wildcats 21-7.

But Crockett wasn't alone in the star's role. He shared it with almost the entire team.

Bob Patton and John Evans were both tough to get around either on offense or defense, and Eddy Windom's blocking was a

key to the Tiger victory—despite the fact that the youth has a broken hand.

Coach Davis also cited Mike Johnson's fine line play and Don Woods' signal calling throughout the evening.

Patton, who started the season in the backfield but was moved to the line a few weeks ago, got in on the scoring act, with one touchdown on an intercepted pass and one conversion.

An even match appeared certain in the early stages of the game with punt exchanges common.

Canadian finally got on the scoreboard—after time had run out in the first half.

The Wildcats intercepted a wayward McLean pass as the half ended, but a penalty against the Tigers on the play gave Canadian another opportunity.

And the hosts took advantage of it, with End Wyman Prater snagging a pass for the touchdown. The kick for extra point also was good.

McLean struck quickly after the rest.

Following the kickoff opening the second half, the Tigers were in possession on their own 30. On the first play from scrimmage, Crockett broke through a hole in the Wildcats' defense and finally was hauled down from behind on

Canadian's 13.

Crockett bulled his way to the seven and Evans got to the five. Then Crockett picked up a first down on the Canadian one and crashed across for the score on the next play.

Patton's attempted conversion was wide, and the Wildcats had a narrow 7-6 lead with 10:01 of the third quarter to go.

McLean's next scoring drive started on the Tiger 23 after the locals recovered a Canadian fumble. Evans took a pass to the McLean 43, but a penalty moved the ball back to the 38. Crockett went to the 46, then to the Canadian 49 and to the 49.

Evans carried to the 31, and then picked up a first down on the Wildcat 26. Crockett got another first on the 10, ripped to the six and crossed the middle to the end zone on the next play.

To cap the effort, Crockett ran across the two-point conversion, sending McLean in front 14-7. Only 6:16 remained in the game.

Canadian began heaving desperation passes as the time ticked away. With 54 seconds left, Patton intercepted a Wildcat pass on about the Canadian 15 and outran the defenders to score.

Patton kicked the extra point to give McLean its second District 2-A victory.

Will Show Off Remodeling Open House to Be Held at City Hall

City commissioners Tuesday night accepted the remodeling job on the city hall, and announced that an open house will be held as soon as arrangements are completed.

Total cost of the project is \$13,307.63, and the commission approved final payment to Kenneth Hambright of McLean, contractor on the remodeling.

The original contract price was \$10,821.43, but this figure was increased when the governing board decided to install refrigerated air-conditioning, a better grade of paneling and other extra features.

Insurance on the building was increased from \$8,000 to \$20,000.

Mrs. John C. Haynes, wife of the mayor, was appointed chairman of the open house committee, with the wives of all aldermen—Mrs. Joe Burroughs, Mrs. Creed Lamb Jr., Mrs. Boyd Meador and Mrs. Jack Shelton—and city office employees Mrs. Back Lee and Mrs. Vernon King also to serve on the committee.

Date to Be Announced

An afternoon open house—with the date to be chosen later—is planned, and refreshments will be served.

The commission also approved payment to the Barker Drilling Co. for cleaning out the city-owned Beagle gas well.

It was reported that cleaning the well had increased the gas output considerably, providing additional gas for the city system before the heavy consumption period arrives.

McLean was plagued by a shortage of gas last winter, and the improvement of the Beagle well should help solve the city's gas problem. (See CITY, Page 2)

Second Sabin Clinic Scheduled on Sunday

TYPE 2 ORAL VACCINE WILL BE OFFERED

Type 2 of the Sabin oral polio vaccine will be given Sunday afternoon at the second clinic in McLean.

Again, the Lions Club, which is sponsoring the anti-polio campaign here, has invited all persons six weeks of age and over to receive the Sabin vaccine.

The clinic will be held in the grade school cafeteria from 12 noon to 6 p.m. Sunday.

As at the first clinic, there will be no charge for the vaccine, but persons who desire may make contributions to help offset the expense.

A total of 1,195 persons were given the vaccine at the Type 1 clinic here on Oct. 7.

On Sugar Cubes

The oral vaccine is administered on a cube of sugar to everyone except diabetics and infants. Diabetics will receive the vaccine in distilled water and the vaccine will be dropped directly into the infants' mouths.

Persons who are acutely ill with fever should not take the vaccine. Nor should persons take the vaccine if they have had a tonsillectomy or adenoidectomy within two weeks of the clinic date.

These operations should not be performed within two weeks after a person receives the vaccine.

Residents of this area are urged to take the Sabin vaccine, even though they might already have been inoculated with the Salk polio vaccine.

Similar polio clinics are being planned Sunday afternoon in Lefors and Pampa for persons living in those areas.

as possible. Those mailed after Dec. 1 should be sent air mail.

Pack Well

3. The use of an adequate container and packing material will help insure safe delivery of Christmas gift parcels.

Reeves announced that a special four cent Christmas stamp has been issued for use during the period from Nov. 2 to Dec. 31 only. The McLean Post Office has a supply of these stamps.

Greeting cards mailed in sealed envelopes with writing enclosed must bear a four cent stamp. Return addresses should be placed on these so they can be returned if necessary.

Cards left unsealed and signed or with the words "Merry Christmas" added to the signature may be sent for three cents, as well as those intended for delivery through a Post Office box in McLean. The latter may be sealed or unsealed.

Not for Routes

This does not include cards for delivery on a route out of the McLean Post Office.

Christmas greeting cards for distant states should be mailed by Dec. 10 and those for nearby states by Dec. 15.

"Every Christmas at this office has been marked by splendid cooperation by the patrons of this Post Office," Reeves said. "This cooperation is appreciated, as it helps us to help each of you in the job of moving the Christmas mail."

"Please notify us when there are problems such as late deliveries, wrong deliveries, losses of any sort when they occur in the mail, whether or not the article is insured or registered."

"These complaints enable the Post Office Department to pinpoint the areas that are at fault. We are looking forward to the largest Christmas mailing on record, and thank again for the fine cooperation we have experienced in the past."

First Freeze Comes To McLean Nov. 8

McLean recorded its first freeze of the fall season last Thursday morning, with the official thermometer showing 31 degrees.

This was five days later than the arrival of freezing weather a year ago—and eight degrees warmer.

An even 32 degrees was recorded by the city-maintained U.S. Weather Bureau thermometer again last Friday.

While no rain had fallen by early this morning, the skies were overcast and weather reports indicated a possibility of showers.

Total moisture for the year still stands at 18.16 inches, compared to 23.45 on this date in 1961.

HOW TO SCORE A 160,000 MILE BULLSEYE — Astronaut Walter M. Schirra Jr. left nothing to chance on his history-making space flight. He was watching as his SIGMA 7 space capsule, the candy-striped retro-rocket package strapped to the heat shield, was hoisted (1) to the top of the gantry at Cape Canaveral. He checked progress as technicians gingerly lowered (2) the capsule into position atop the Atlas booster, closely observing his all-important "brakes." Enclosed in the candy-striped dome, the "brakes" consist of three small bucket-size solid fuel Thiokol retro-rocket engines each 12 inches in diameter and 15.5 inches long. Their performance brought to a successful climax Schirra's six-orbit flight which had started at 8:15 AM(EDT) Oct. 3 with a spectacular blastoff (3) from the launch site. At 5:07 PM(EDT) the retros fired in perfect sequence, burning for about 11 seconds. Together they generated sufficient reverse thrust to slow the capsule velocity by about 500 feet per second, thus easing SIGMA 7 out of its orbital path. Owing to the performance of the pilot, capsule, "brakes" and the large supporting team, Walter Schirra splashed safely into the Pacific 21 minutes later, having scored an almost-perfect bulls-eye after a flight covering 160,000 miles. Schirra climbed (4) out of his capsule at 6:15 PM(EDT) aboard the carrier Keearsarge to the cheers of the Navy crew.

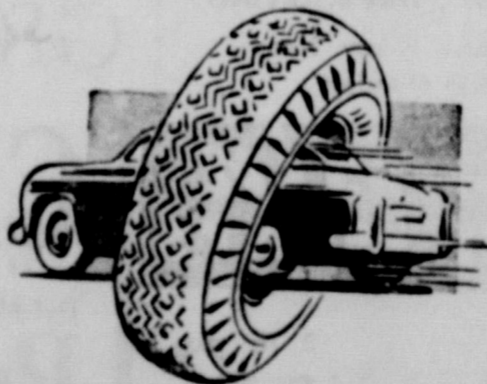

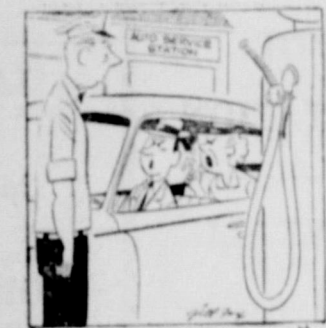

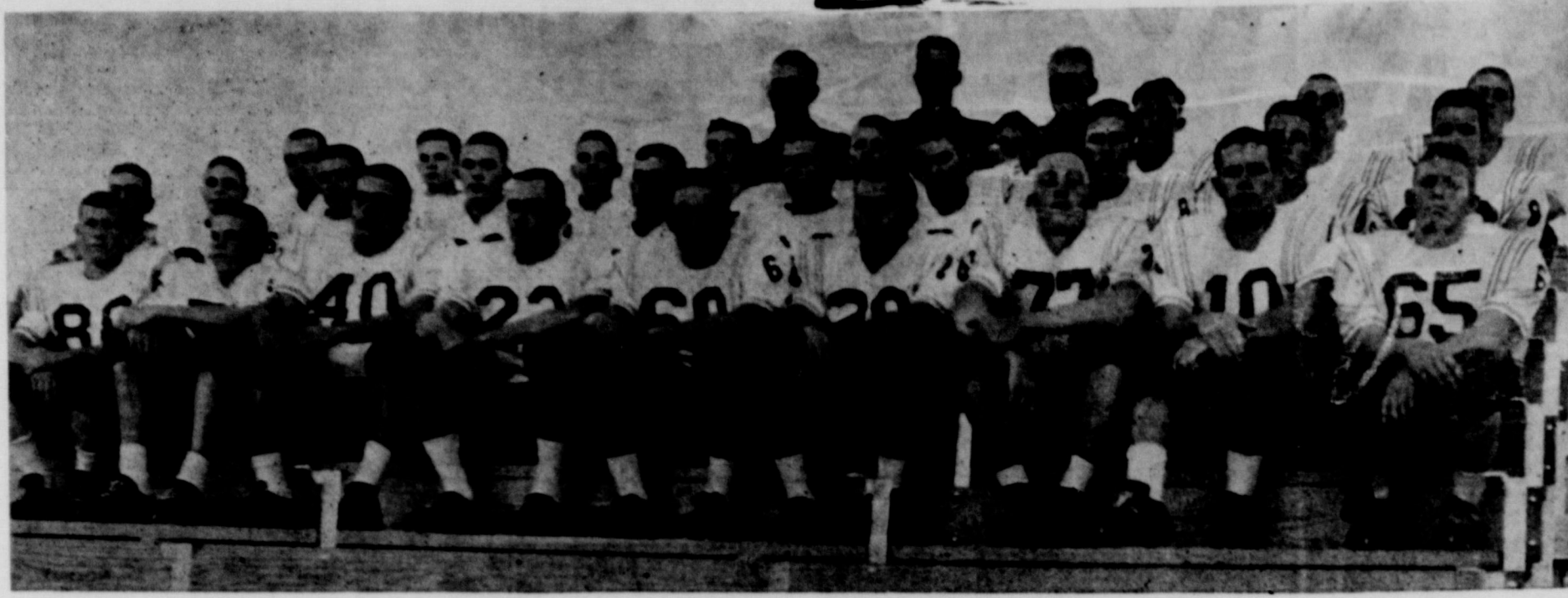

Deer Hides Usable At Hospitals, Texas Special Schools

AUSTIN—(Special)—Deer hunters were reminded today an audience of 26,000 persons in state operated hospitals and schools for mentally retarded wish them luck with their buck.

Nor is it a strictly unselfish wish, since the patients and students stand to gain hours of enjoyable employment—if the hunters send the deer hides to the annual buckskin collection.

Haskell Fine of Kerrville, chairman of the Volunteer Services Council which sponsors the collection has sent out thousands of shipping tags giving specific directions for donating the hides. They are available from most chambers of commerce in the hunting country and other spots where hunters gather.

If the sportsman skins out his own kill, he is asked to throw a handful of table salt on the raw side of the hide, allow it to drain, roll and tie or package it and affix a tag addressed to: Austin Taxidermist Studio, 2708 South Lamar, Austin, Texas.

If the tag is marked "charity," most motor freight lines will haul without charge, Fine said. If the deer is left at a processing station, the hunter is asked to direct that the hide be sent in.

The Volunteer Council arranges tanning and delivery of the finished leather to all the hospitals and special schools where it is used in occupational therapy, he explained.

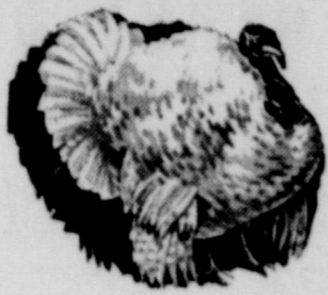
