**Boy Scouts Seek Return of Tent**

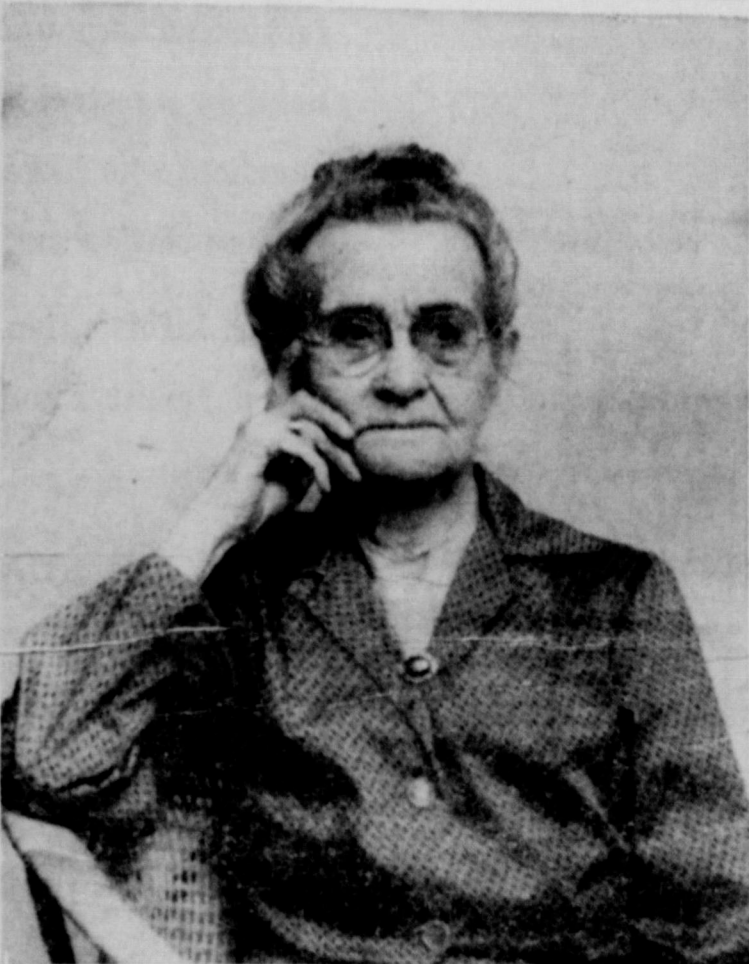
LOST: One eight by 10-foot tent-colored wall tent. Finder please return to the McLean Boy Scout troop.

## RAINFALL UPS '63 TOTAL TO 1.83 INCHES

March is becoming something of a wet month, with 1.16 inch of moisture already recorded in McLean and the possibility of more ahead.

Latest precipitation came Sunday afternoon, as .09 inch of rain accompanied by some sleet fell on the city and left an unusual sight—water standing in the ditches.

Moisture total for the year of 1963 in McLean now stands at 1.85 inches, almost a full inch more than had fallen to this date in 1962.

Weather records maintained by Pete Fulbright, city superintendent, show only .87 inch as of March 14, 1962.

**Snow Didn't Come**  
Weathermen were beginning to scratch their heads and wonder Wednesday what to forecast for the coming days. Occasional light snow flurries had been anticipated Wednesday, and it appeared for a time they might come.

Clouds hung over McLean through most of Wednesday, but by mid-afternoon the sun had burned itself through the cover.

Mostly fair weather is expected today, with rising temperatures.

High thermometer reading for the past week was 68 degrees, recorded on Monday. The low was 26, occurring last Thursday.

All of the candidates are assured of election in the April balloting, unless write-in campaigns should develop for unannounced aspirants for the positions.

It is especially unusual for the McLean independent school district to have an election with only enough candidates to fill the positions to be voted on.

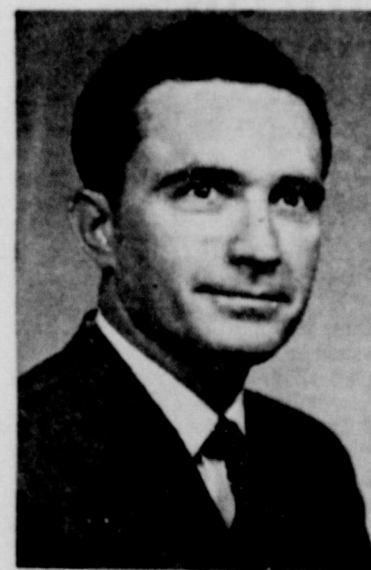

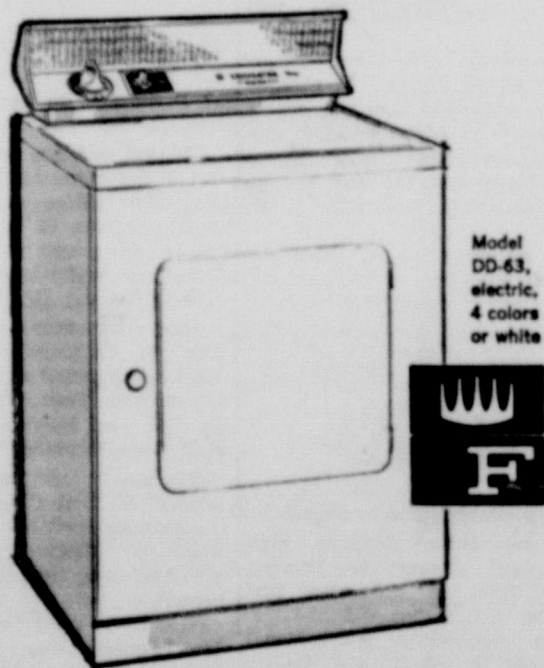

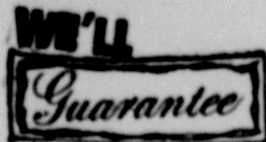

# NEWS from YOUR COUNTY AGRICULTURAL AGENT TEXAS A. & M. COLLEGE EXTENSION SERVICE

**GOPHER DEMONSTRATION**  
The burrow builder was demonstrated on the Hack McCurley place last Tuesday. This is the first one ever demonstrated in the western area of the state.

From a mechanical standpoint, it was a success. There had been some question as to whether the soil was of the right type to maintain the burrows.

A rather large acreage was treated on the McCurley place. Results will be known in the near future.

**HAND METHOD OF TREATING GOPHERS**

This is very successful when done right. We had a very nice letter from Mrs. Donald Beall of Heber, Utah, asking us to check with local relatives concerning a cemetery plot at the Hillcrest Cemetery.

We contacted Mrs. Charles Cooke and gave a demonstration on how to place poison grain with a probe in runways. We were surprised to know we had readers from as far away as Utah.

This note to Mrs. Beall: Mr. Ross Smith and I treated the gophers in your cemetery lot as a demonstration. For others that want to follow through on this matter, you can purchase the poison grain from Smoky Price.

We also planned to show Feb Everett how to do this very simple operation. We have leaflets which we will place in Feb's hands to give out to anyone interested.

**SCREW PROGRAM**

John B. Rice showed me a letter from the state office of the Southwest Animal Health Research Foundation. They are now within \$200,000 of their state goal of \$2 million.

The letter says they are now within sight of the goal and are asking every county committee to raise their quota within the next two weeks.

Our Gray County quota is \$1,000 for this year's drive. We now have in only \$255.

be fulfilled. For two weeks now no screw-worms have been reported in Texas. This is a record. Inspection lines are now being set up in Texas, whereby it will be most difficult to get screwworms into uninfected areas.

It would be great if we could say goodbye to this very costly pest in the cattle industry. They have been wiped out in Florida through this method. We can do it in Texas, many believe.

**SOIL TESTING**

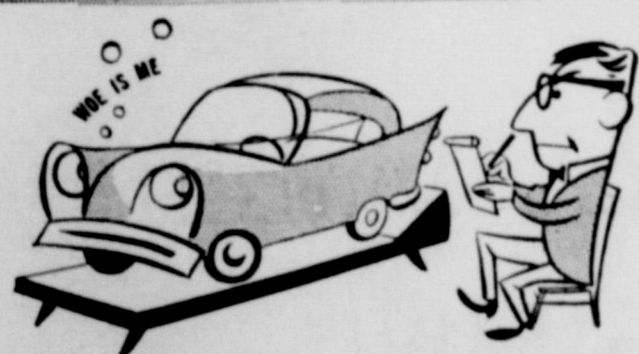

## WASHINGTON AND "SMALL BUSINESS"

Despite all the furor emanating officially on the action of France's Charles DeGaulle in keeping England out of the European Common Market, this publicized anger is in no way unanimous.

While it is quite a wry sense, there is a quiet admiration held by many that the French leader only did the inevitable.



His claim that British entry in the C. o. m. o. n. e. w. H. a. r. d. e. r. Market would bring the United States into the management of Europe was largely based on the well known fact that for several years it has been U. S. State Dept. policy to egg Britain into seeking membership, looking toward the eventual setting up of some supra-national government to be called the North Atlantic Community, or some similar name.

This Gallie action of DeGaulle's, preceded by his prior treaty with West Germany, was a manifestation, long known to many but largely ignored, that proud nationalism does not want to accept domination by the U. S. State Dept., or anybody else.

It makes little difference that the U. S. taxpayers have been bled of billions of dollars to throw around in France as well as in West Germany.

Now they are on their feet, have a more thriving economy, from the standpoint of expansion, than the American econ-

omy, which has been seriously crippled by the billions of dollars given them.

So the attitude is, "who needs America?" We will run our own affairs from now on.

This attitude, while quite irritating, is not unexpected. The biting of the hand that has fed is nothing new in human affairs. But there is a grave danger now that these nations now hold the whip hand over the United States.

While the foreign give away boys have been shovelling American dollars overseas, they have remained in substantial volume in European hands. They have been gradually exchanged for U. S. gold with result nation's gold reserves are now down to low level.

As a matter of fact, they can now make large enough demands on the U. S. gold reserve to practically deplete the supply. The former beggar nations are now in the saddle, and the U. S. can be reduced by their actions to beggary.

Naturally, no one likes being out-manuevered. DeGaulle would not win a popularity poll in the United States, but the real deep bitterness is against the self-appointed American Messiahs who laid the groundwork with billions of tax dollars for the American people to be so badly taken.

Years ago European political cartoonists often depicted Uncle Sam as a rather bumbling country bumpkin. It appears that in the area of world politics and economics, they had something there.

His answer was, "If you believe this is your duty, you must go. You need not fear harm. Every true soldier will respect and bless you."  
 Getting permission from the officers was a hard job. They said that it was impossible for a woman to be out in the front, but Clara didn't give up. Clara Barton was given permission to go to the front. For four years she followed the battles. Every soldier spoke of her with affection. Soon she was known as the "Angel of the Battlefield." Clara Barton is a part of our American Heritage.

**Auto Inspection Deadline Nears**

Many motorists in Texas are going to be faced with long lines and waiting periods in order to have their cars inspected prior to the April 15 deadline. Only 39 per cent of the 586,270 registered vehicles in Region 5 of the Texas Department of Public Safety have visited safety inspection stations and obtained their 1963 safety stickers, according to Capt. Alan Johnson, of the DPS motor vehicle inspection service.

All registered vehicles in the state must be inspected by April 15 and have a 1963 sticker on the windshield. According to the records of the DPS, there are 21,520 vehicles registered in Gray County. Only 6,807 or 32 per cent have been inspected to date.

**Time Now to Plant Farm Windbreaks**

The time for obtaining Ponderosa pine trees from the Gray County Soil Conservation District is limited, it was announced this week. These trees can be purchased through the SCD at the Bruce Nursery north of Alanreed at low cost, according to Arneal Scott, work unit conservationist for the Soil Conservation Service in Gray County.

Scott urged that plans be made now to set out a farmstead or feedlot windbreak, providing permanent improvement for the land. The trees should not be planted later than the last of April.

**Superintendent of Church Visits Here**

Rev. L. E. Jackson, superintendent of the Great Plains Pentecostal Holiness Church Conference, visited with the McLean Pentecostal Holiness Church congregation here Sunday and was guest speaker at both the morning and evening services.

The rural traffic accident summary for Gray County for the two months of 1963 showed a total of 23 crashes resulting in three persons killed, 12 persons injured and an estimated property damage of \$35,375.

The patrol supervisor reported that a new hazard has been added to the traffic picture. Motorists may not realize it, but the current hiking fad had added an element of danger to driving.

The sergeant added that everyone who decides to make one of these 50-mile or 25-mile hikes should be aware of the traffic dangers that are involved and also that all Texas drivers should be alerted to the fact that these pedestrians may cause a certain amount of danger.

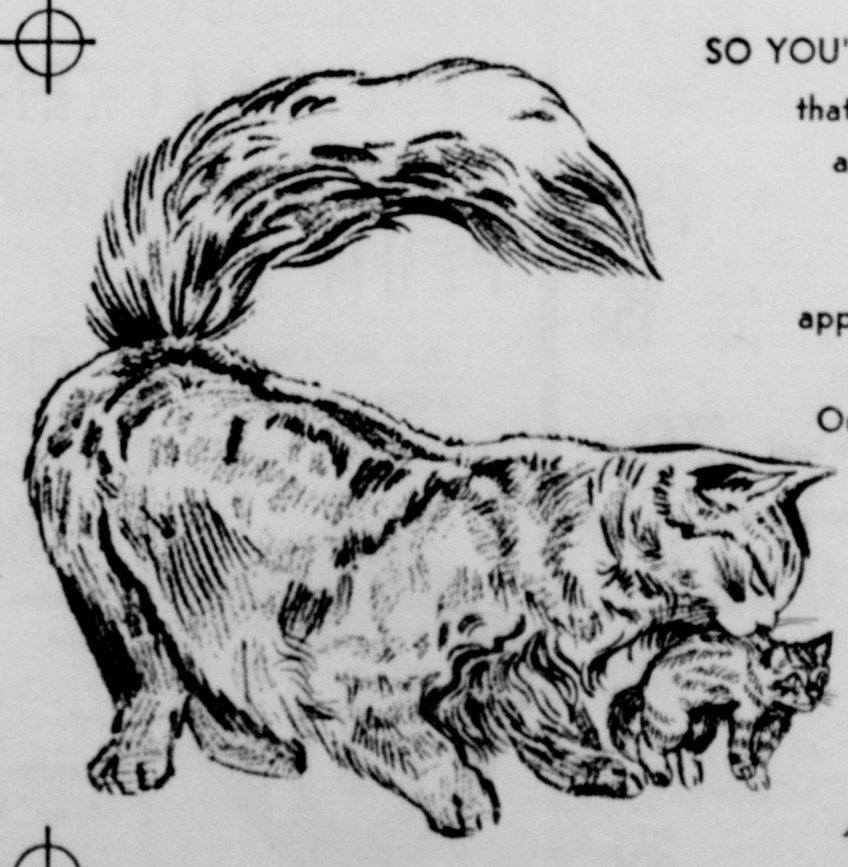
