Laura Switzer of McLean and two other members of the famed Hutcherson Flying Queens basketball team of Wayland Baptist College, Plainview, have been selected to represent the United States in the Pan American Games next month.

The annual games are scheduled at Sao Paulo, Brazil, from April 20 through May 5.

## Dr. H Onward Is On Association's Register of Merit

Dr. H Onward, outstanding Hereford bull owned by Faris Hess of McLean, is among 24 animals added to the American Hereford Association's Register of Merit following the 1962-63 show year just completed.

Gaining a place on the Register of Merit assumes immortality for the Hereford sire and dams which have demonstrated outstanding breeding ability based on the standings of their get and produce in the nation's top shows.

Dr. H Onward, calved in 1957, has accumulated 112 points to win a place in the register. The local animal is one of eight bulls added to the active register.

The Register of Merit was started by the American Hereford Association in 1927 as a means of recognizing the sires and dams of winning show animals.

Only Recognized Shows. Calculations have been based on the 1916 and subsequent shows recognized as Register of Merit shows by the association's board of directors. Only the first five placings in the designated shows are considered in the calculations.

An animal does not win points for himself, but for his sire and dam.

To qualify for the register, a bulls must have a minimum of 100 points earned by five or more of his get. Females must have 25 points minimum earned by two or more produce.

Application has been made by Southwestern Bell Telephone Co. to acquire the telephone property now serving Alanreed and vicinity. It has been learned here.

The property now is owned by H. H. Wozham and Mabel R. Wozham, doing business as the Alanreed Telephone Co.

Application to acquire the property and begin serving the area was made by Southwestern Bell to the Federal Communications Commission in Washington, D. C.

Persons desiring to support or protest the application have until May 6 to state their wishes in letters to the FCC in Washington.

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# City, School Elections Scheduled Next Week

Two trips to the polls are scheduled for McLean voters next week.

On Tuesday, residents will elect a mayor and two aldermen, then on Saturday two trustees for the McLean Independent School District and one county school board member are to be chosen.

Balloting in each election will be from 8 a.m. to 7 p.m. in McLean city hall.

There are no contests for any of the positions to be filled.

Mayor John C. Haynes is seeking re-election as mayor, while Boyd Meador and Jewel Meacham are candidates for aldermen.

Meador is now serving on the city commission, and Meacham is a candidate for the alderman's post formerly held by the late Ruel Smith.

The mayor and aldermen are elected to two-year terms.

Incumbents Sammy Haynes and Leslie Darsey are asking for new

three-year terms on the board of education.

John M. Haynes is the lone candidate for the Precinct 4 trustee position on the Gray County school board. Clifford Allison currently represents the precinct on the board, but is not a candidate for another term.

The city, school and county offices located in city hall will be closed on both election days.

# Sabin Vaccine To Be Given Sunday

Sabin vaccine Type III will be offered here Sunday in the third and final polio clinic sponsored by the McLean Lions Club.

The clinic will begin at 12 noon and continue until 6 p.m. at the grade school cafeteria, according to S. A. Cousins, chairman of the event for the Lions Club.

As in the past, there is no charge for the vaccine, which will be administered in a cube of sugar. However, persons who desire may contribute at the clinic. Each dose costs the Lions Club approximately 25 cents to administer.

Medical authorities urge that all children and adults under 30 years of age be given the Sabin vaccine, even though they may have already received the Salk polio vaccine.

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## LONG WAGON TRAIN SOUGHT

The hope that scores of people from throughout this area will join the annual Wagon Train to Amarillo in late May was expressed last Thursday night at the planning meeting for the 66 Roundup Rodeo and Horse Show celebration.

Faris Hess, who again will serve as wagon master for the Wagon Train, said he hopes many residents will become interested in the westward trip, which each year gives the rodeo association a big publicity boost.

Horseback riders are welcome to join the procession, and all persons who can are asked to take a wagon.

It was announced at Thursday's meeting that R. C. Jones of Tatum, N. M., will be the judge for the Horse Show, scheduled for the final day of the celebration on June 8.

Nelson Christie discussed plans for the calf scramble, also a feature of the rodeo.

Arrangements have been made to have the Gulf Sound Truck here for use as the public address system during the rodeo.

The rodeo opens on June 5 at Felton Webb Arena north of town.

Next rodeo planning meeting is set for 7:30 p.m. on Thursday, April 11, at city hall.

## Women's Clubs Are Volunteer Workers For RC Campaign

Three McLean women's clubs have volunteered to assist with the Red Cross fund campaign. John C. Haynes, drive chairman, announced Wednesday.

Members of the Pioneer Study Club will conduct a Mothers March throughout the city from 6 to 7 p.m. Friday.

Contributions for the Red Cross will be accepted at the American National Bank and the Post Office all day Friday and Saturday Morning.

Members of the 1934 Sewing Club are to be in the bank and members of the Centennial Culture club in the Post Office to receive contributions.

Haynes also announced that the Lions Club's health and welfare committee will canvass the business district of the city for contributions.

He pointed out that while there has been little cause for help from the Red Cross here in recent years the organization did give much assistance to McLean residents following the tornado which struck the city in 1922.

The chairman urged all residents to give in the campaign now underway. Those not contacted by the clubs were asked to send their contributions to Haynes or leave them at the bank.

Each man wanted the very best for the United States.

George Washington was "first in war, first in peace and first in the hearts of his countrymen."

Although he was handicapped by lack of supplies and by poorly trained men, under his skillful leadership we were victorious in the Revolutionary War.

His officers loved and respected him so that after the war was over, they wanted to make him king of the new nation.

As President of the Constitutional Convention, he held the convention together, settled disputes and convinced the states to ratify the Constitution.

When the government was organized, so many people linked his name with the Constitution that

he was unanimously elected President.

The United States was a weak nation when our first President took office. Such a man as he was necessary to give the nation a strong foundation.

There were many problems to be solved. Washington was a wise and able President and he set many precedents for government today.

Thomas Jefferson will always be remembered as the author of the Declaration of Independence, for the Louisiana Purchase and for his great love of justice, liberty and freedom.

Jefferson truly believed that all men were created equal and wanted the slaves set free, the aristocracy of landowners broken up and free public education for all children.

All his life he did his best to further these ideals. Jefferson was not a man of power, but he was a man of principle. He was the central power second to the states. This type of government is known throughout the world as a "Jeffersonian Democracy."

John Marshall did more than any other man to establish the authority of the Supreme Court. When Marshall became chief justice, the provisions for the Supreme Court in the Constitution were not clearly defined, and the court had almost no power and authority.

Marshall is most famous for his decision that the Supreme Court had the right to declare laws unconstitutional.

Marshall believed in a strong central government. He interpreted the implied powers given the federal government literally; while the states' powers were interpreted very narrowly.

These decisions won him many enemies. Once after one of Marshall's decisions had made him angry, President Andrew Jackson cried, "John Marshall has made his decision. Now let him enforce it!"

Even so, John Marshall's decisions are still used as a guide for interpreting the Constitution today. Men like George Washington, Thomas Jefferson and John Marshall give us the right to be proud of our American heritage.

# COLLEGE FINANCING WILL BE DISCUSSION SUBJECT

A group discussion on the financing of a college education is being planned for parents and sponsored by McLean High School, according to Jerry Day, guidance counselor at the school.

"It has been found that many parents do not know how much a college education costs or how to go about financing this education," Day said. "Progressive parents probably want to know, but they do not know how to get the needed information."

Day said this will be the purpose of the group discussions—1. To impart needed information and 2. To answer questions that might be raised about education.

"Every parent who hopes to send his child to college should be interested in this discussion, and the sooner plans of this nature are started the greater are the chances of success," he added. Parents with children from preschool age through high school are welcome, Day said.

Areas to be discussed include:

1. The cost of attending the average Texas college.
2. Scholarships.
3. Savings programs.
4. Work programs.
5. School loans.
6. Commercial loans.
7. Summer jobs.

## Consumer Credit Education Class Held in McLean

Alexander J. Demarco of Miami, Fla., in conjunction with the Retail Credit Executives of Amarillo and the Retail Merchants Association of McLean, conducted a class in consumer credit education Tuesday at McLean High School.

The session was one in a series of classes scheduled during the week at Borger, Panhandle, White Deer, Stinnett, Pampa, Childress, Quanah and the four high schools in Amarillo.

Demarco is a director-at-large of the International Retail Credit Executives. He is a charter member of the Miami Toastmasters International, past president of the Miami Junior Chamber of Commerce, past president of the Greater Miami Credit Association, vice president of the National Retail Credit Association, third district, and has held office in various other credit organizations.

Generally speaking, the purpose of the classes is to contribute to the understanding of students in the wise use of credit and to stress the fact that credit is a magic force that puts the good things of life within the immediate reach of responsible people.

The local class included the showing of a 15-minute sound film in color dealing with consumer credit, a talk on the various aspects of credit as affecting young people and a question and answer period.

Members of the Retail Credit Executives of Amarillo, Pampa and Dallas served as the credit panel.

They included Ernest LeSuer, credit consultant, Dallas; W. L. Veale, credit manager, Pampa; Lonnie Rhoads, Blackburn Brothers, Amarillo, and Melvin Isley, credit and collection consultant, Amarillo Credit Bureau.

The class was sponsored by the local chapter of Future Business Leaders of America, with President Don Woods opening and closing the meeting.

A reception for all members and guests followed the meeting in the homemaking room. Freshman members served as hosts and hostesses. They were Barbara McCurley, Sue Beck, Ernie Fry and Doyal McCurley.

## Right-of-Way For 273 to Be Bought

Preparations are underway for a continuation of the improvement of State Highway 273 between McLean and Pampa.

The Texas Highway Commission the past week authorized the purchase of right-of-way for a 3.5-mile section of the highway in Gray County.

The portion of the road starts at the north city limits of Lefors and extends southeast to the North Fork of Red River.

Estimated right-of-way cost for the 3.5 miles is \$55,000.

A nine-mile portion of the SH 273 improvement project was completed from McLean north two years ago, and since that time additional work has been done south and east from Pampa toward Lefors.

The Highway Commission has announced that it will recommend the new route through Lefors be constructed west of the football stadium there.

## 5 Alarms Answered By McLean Firemen

McLean volunteer firemen had a busy week, answering five alarms since last Thursday. All were for grass fires.

The first occurred Thursday on the Harris King place three miles northeast of town, causing minor damage.

On Friday, firemen extinguished a blaze east of the John C. Haynes residence at the city's north edge after several acres were burned off.

Between two and three sections of grassland were burned off in the blaze.

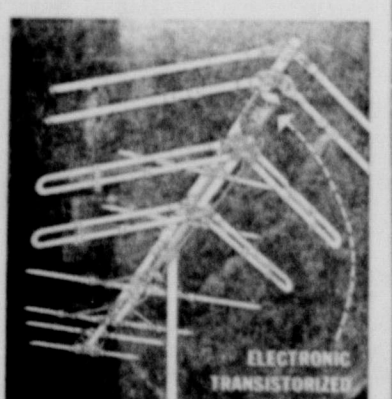

## SCREW WORM ERADICATION PROGRAM

## SPRAYING FRUIT TREES

This is a subject we are called

on for help as much as any other one item.

Oscar Tibbets was also asking about when and what to use.

As a general guide, if you will spray most fruit trees when three-fourths of the petals fall with the following mixture, it will solve most insect trouble in fruit trees.

Mix one-half pound of wettable dieldrin and three pounds of 50 per cent wettable DDT in 100 gallons of water. In most cases it will take some kind of a sprayer with an agitator.

A cattle sprayer works good. Be sure the spray rig has not ever had a weed-killing chemical in it.

For more specific information, we have a new leaflet entitled "Texas Guide for Controlling Insects and Diseases on Fruits and Nuts."

## CATTLE AND CALVES

U.S. totals of all cattle and calves on farms and ranches as of Jan. 1, 1963, reached a record 103,754,000 head, up four per cent from a year earlier.

## YOUR FAIR SHARE . . .

Most Texans, we believe, are fair-minded folks. They believe in fair play, square dealing, and mutual respect for personal and property rights. Those who want to take advantage of their neighbors are the exception.

Sometimes it may be hard to define "a fair share." This can occur in dividing oil or gas production, when two or more landowners are involved.

As we all know, oil and gas don't pay any attention to fence lines.

Here in Texas many wells have been allowed to produce more oil or gas than they should have because they were drilled on very small tracts. That extra oil or gas came from under the neighbors' land.

Some oilmen made a regular practice of this type of operation. Obviously, one owner got more than his fair share—others, less.

People in 25 out of 29 oil-producing states have found a way to divide their oil and gas so that each owner gets what is rightfully his. They simply put their small acreage together and share the costs and income. This system is known as POOLING.

Such a system is needed in Texas. It is proposed in a bill now before the Legislature, HOUSE BILL 510. When the neighbors cannot agree, the Railroad Commission would set up a drilling block and see to it that the rights of all owners are protected . . . all costs and proceeds equitably divided.

Oilmen who have made fortunes at the expense of others could not be expected to support House Bill 510. They are bitterly opposing it. But the responsible oilmen of Texas are overwhelmingly for it. So are the informed citizens who want to see justice done.

Ask your Senator and Representative at Austin to support House Bill 510—so Texas, too, will have a reasonable and legal way to assure each landowner his FAIR SHARE.

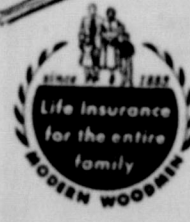
