John Marshall did more than any other man to establish the authority of the Supreme Court. When Marshall became chief justice, the provisions for the Supreme Court in the Constitution were not clearly defined, and the court had almost no power and authority. Marshall is most famous for his -



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### YOUR FAIR SHARE

Most Texans, we believe, are fair-minded folks. They believe in fair play, square dealing, and mutual respect for personal and property rights. Those who want to take advantage of their neigh-

bors are the exception. Sometimes it may be hard to define "a fair share." This can occur in dividing oil or gas production, when two or more landowners are involved.



Such a system is needed in Texas. It is proposed in a bill now before the Legislature, HOUSE BILL 510. When the neighbors cannot agree, the Railroad Commission would set up a drilling block and see to it that the rights of all owners are protected . . . all costs and proceeds equitably divided.

Oilmen who have made fortunes at the expense of others could not be expected to support House Bill 510. They are bitterly opposing it. But the responsible oilmen of Texas are overwhelmingly for it. So are the informed citizens who want to see justice done.


