Wagon Train Leaves May 30

At least six wagons and numerous horseback riders get McLean's 66 Roundup Rodeo and Horse Show celebration off to a big start early next Thursday, when they leave onto Highway 66 at 5 a.m. for the annual Wagon Train to Amarillo.

It was impossible to estimate the number of persons planning to participate in the Wagon Train this week, but Wagon Boss Faris expects six or seven wagons and scores of riders to join the regular procession west.

The group will stop at Lark at the end of the first day, then complete the journey to Amarillo on Friday.

Then Saturday morning they are

scheduled to parade through downtown Amarillo and go to the KGNC-TV studios for an hour-long program.

Cotton John Smith, KGNC farm director, said in a talk before the Lions Club Tuesday noon that 2:30 to 3:30 p.m. is the time reserved for the Wagon Train Show.

The show actually will be presented earlier in the day and recorded on video tape for presentation at the later hour.

Smith asked that a large delegation from McLean be present for the show, which will publicize the rodeo celebration beginning the following Wednesday.

The annual amateur rodeo is scheduled for four nights—June 5-

8—at the Felton Webb Arena north of the city.

Often described as the top amateur rodeo in the Texas Panhandle, the rodeo will feature two go-rounds with a total purse of \$2,400—plus a \$225 trophy saddle to the winner of each event.

The events—with a purse of \$400 in each—include saddle bronc riding, bareback bronc riding, bull riding, calf roping, heading and heeling and bulldogging.

Entry fee for each of the events is \$20.

In addition, a girls barrel race is on tap, with a jackpot of \$15. First place winner in the barrel race will receive a buckle. A pair of spurs will go to the second

place winner and a belt to the winner of third.

Rodeo announcer will be Nat Flemming, of Wichita Falls, and Richard Walters of Amarillo will be rodeo clown. Stock contractor again this year is the Ratjen Brothers Rodeo Co. of Happy.

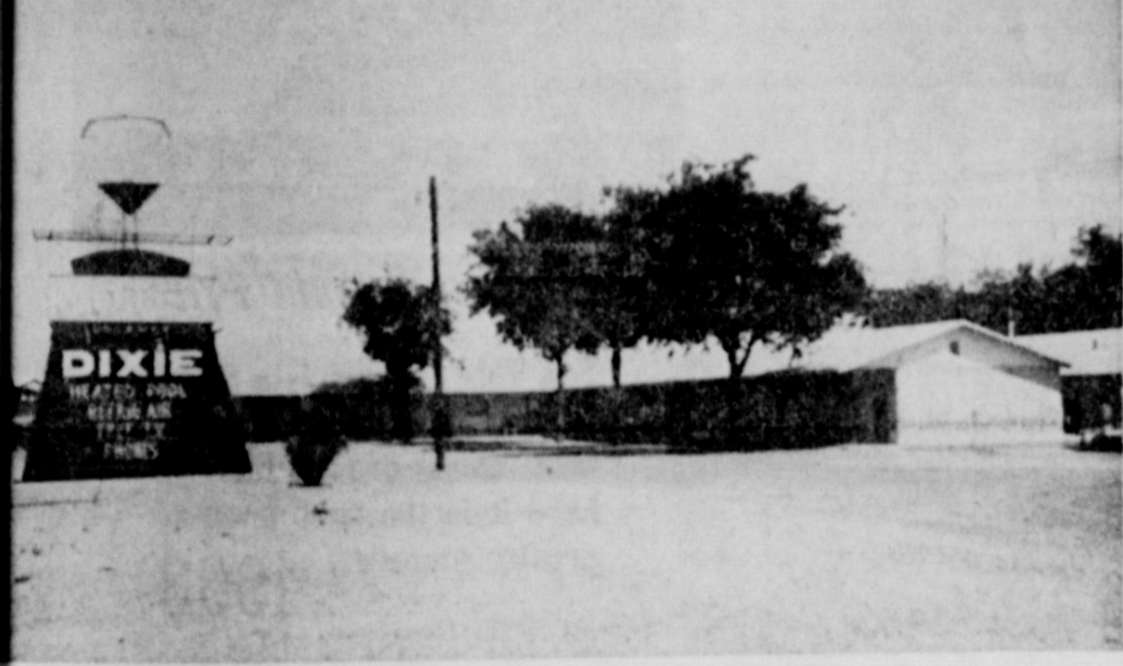
The rodeo will begin at 8 p.m. each of the four days, and admission will be \$1.25 for adults and 50 cents for children.

Registration for the Old Settlers Reunion is set for Wednesday, June 5, which also will see a parade through the city at 4 p.m. to kick off the celebration.

Another highlight of the celebration will be the Horse Show and (See WAGON, Page 2)

CITY SUMMER SCHOOL DATES ARE REVEALED

A six-week summer school for high school students who are behind in their class work is expected to begin on June 3, Jim Boyd, MHS teacher, said Wednesday.

Boyd said that many students have expressed interest in the school, and if a sufficient number register by May 27, the special classes will be offered. Only English and history will be taught.

Registrations will be accepted by mail up to midnight next Monday. A \$10 check deposit should be included with each student's registration, and the enrollee should give his name, mailing address and course or courses he plans to take.

If enough students fail to register for the courses the deposits will be returned by May 1.

Total cost for one full unit or credit will be \$32. This price includes books for the course. The cost per one-half unit will be \$16, which also includes books.

Start at 7:30 a.m.

English and history classes will begin at 7:30 a.m. each day for five days per week. Classes for one-half units will end at 10 a.m. and those for full units at 12 noon.

The school is scheduled to end on July 12.

"It should be understood," Boyd said, "that the school is for the student who is behind and will not be available for the students who have the following credit standing: Sophomore, four credits; juniors, eight; seniors, 12."

A maximum number of 15 students will be accepted.

NOXIOUS WEEDS
Mr. Charlie Carpenter came to me with a problem concerning a weed that was spreading very rapidly on his place. We sent one of the weeds off for identification, but got no answer on it. Van Mills, Soil Conservation Ser-

vice, and I finally got it in the thistle family. Finally, we identified it as the Canadian thistle. It is a perennial and is labeled in a book I have as a very bad weed. It spreads by runners as well as seed. We recommend 2, 4-D weed killer, which Mr. Carpenter used. It appears a satisfactory kill would be obtained. We will have to wait until later to determine if a permanent kill was obtained. A lot could be done to make ranches a lot more productive if people would be more persistent in keeping down undesirable plants. We have numerous publications on how to control most of the noxious plants. Drop us a card or call The McLean News office on Tuesday, and I will be glad to help you with any such problems.

Bids Invited By Post Office On Route to Memphis

Bids are being invited by the Post Office Department on a star route between McLean and Memphis.
Deadline for submitting sealed proposals is 4:30 p.m. June 19. Bids must be sent to the Transportation Division, Post Office Department, Box 2258, Fort Worth 1.
A bond of \$3,600 is required for the successful bidder. The contract period will cover from July 1, 1963, to June 30, 1967, but bidders should submit proposals on a yearly basis.
The route is equal to 58 miles and back and will be traveled six times a week. No service is required on the eight holidays.
Additional information concerning the route may be obtained from the chief of highway transportation branch at the Fort Worth address.

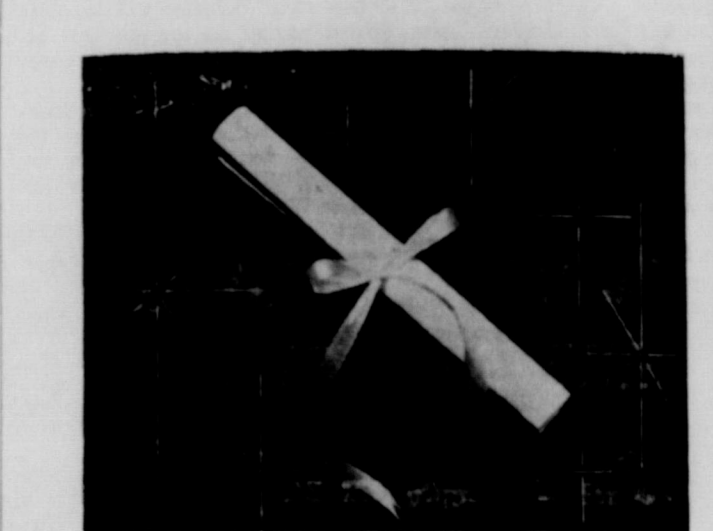

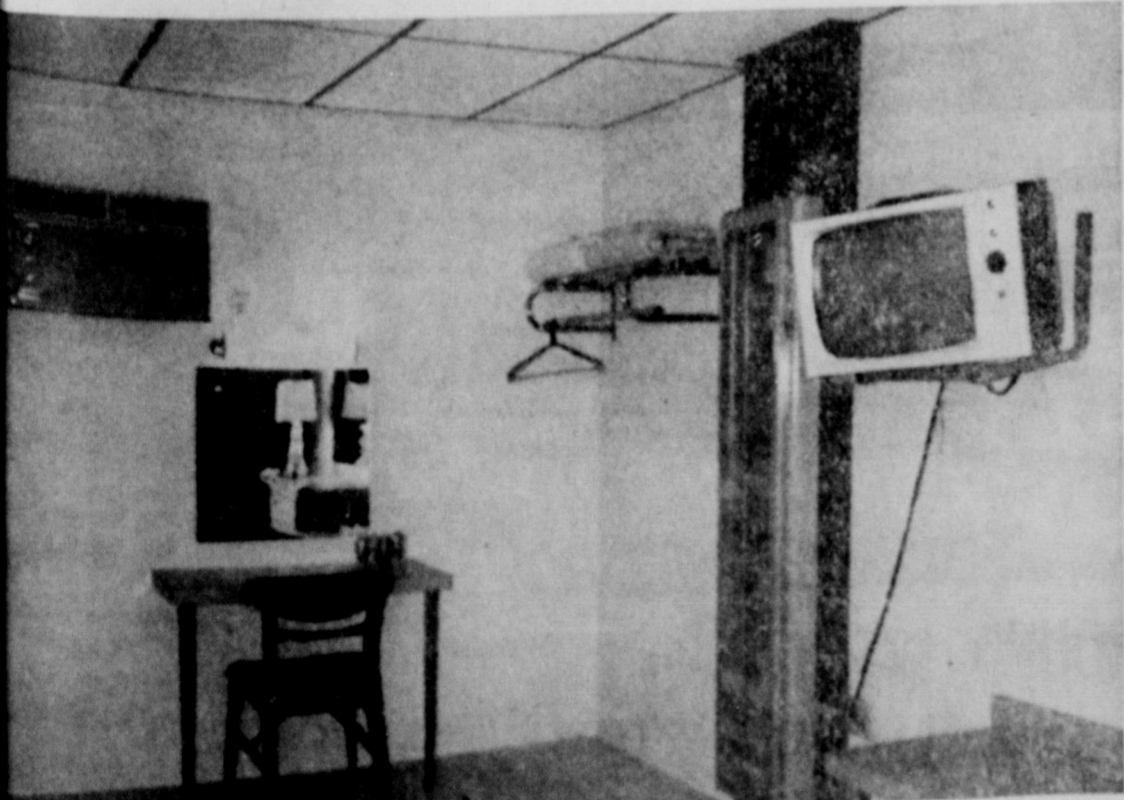

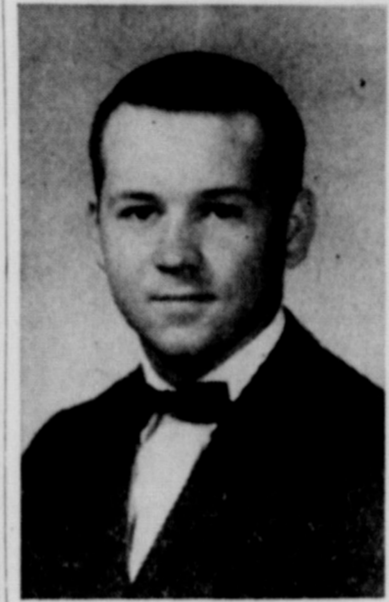
She never grumbled or complained, had sunshine and love of God in her every day life and a kind friend to everyone.
