October 23rd, the Texas Court of Criminal Appeals issued its mandate affirming the summary judgement ordered by 31st District Judge Grainger McIlhany forfeiting bonds totaling \$30,000 in three Wheeler County cases where William Robert Brown is defendant.

The State of Texas was represented by District Attorney Guy Hardin in these three forfeitures which were ordered by Judge McIlhany on October 9, 1969.

The \$30,000 judgment plus interest and court costs will be paid to Wheeler County by the bonding insurance company.
