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Jim Standridge To Preach Revival At First Baptist

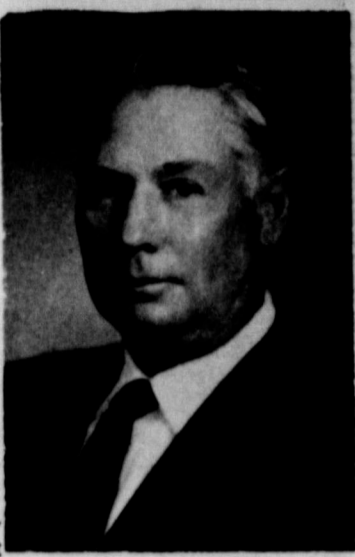

Saving Bonds Sales In Gray County Total \$329,006

September sales of Series E and H United States Savings Bonds in Gray County totaled \$31,775 according to a report from Mr. George B. Cree, Chairman of the Gray County Savings Bonds Committee. A total of \$329,006 has been purchased in this county since January 1. This figure represents 78% of the 1970 goal of \$420,000.

Texas purchased \$15,033, 393 in Savings Bonds during the month compared to \$14,480, 583 for the same period a year ago -- an increase of 3.9%. Sales for the nine-month period were \$136,303,218 for 76% of the yearly goal of \$179.9 million.

The Amarillo Area Diabetes Lay Society will hold its regular monthly meeting on November 3, 1970 at the Social Hall of Polk Street Methodist church at 7:30 p.m. All interested persons are invited to attend.

Miss Nancy Floyd, Therapeutic Dietitian at High Plains Baptist Hospital will be in charge of the program, and will speak on the subject: "Interpreting Your Diabetic Diet", assisted by members of the Panhandle Dietitians Association, who will be available after the program to answer individual questions on diet for diabetics. Since diet is of utmost importance in the treatment of diabetes, this program should be of great interest to diabetics and their families.

Literature is available at the meetings on subjects such as the care of diabetes, testing procedure, proper diet, and recipe booklets, published by the pharmaceutical companies. These are distributed free of charge.

In 1970, Nancy Palmer daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Ralph Palmer, of Pampa was the county champion and placed 1st out of 46 contestants. The champion was a student at the Robert E. Lee Junior High School, 8th grade. Nancy placed 18th out of 73 national contenders in Washington during the first week of June.

The 1971 Golden Spread Bee will be co-sponsored by West Texas State University, and the Amarillo Globe-News. L. J. (Jack) Edmondson, director of public services at the university, will be coordinator for the Golden Spread event.

There will also be a secondary contest -- the only one of its kind within the National Spelling Bee program -- open to youngsters from the sixth and lower grades. These juniors will be guests of the Amarillo Globe-News at the Regional Bee on April 24, but will not spell unless they represent the senior division, also.

Tim Palmer (Nancy's brother) was the Junior Champion for 1970 and (his) her parents are Mr. and Mrs. Ralph Palmer of Pampa. The Junior champion attended the St. Vincent's School, 6th grade.

The district winner, will go to Washington where he'll compete with district winners from all over the United States. The trip includes various sightseeing tours and entertainment.

Each county winner will receive a plaque in Amarillo and a gold pin. Each county junior champion will be awarded a trophy and silver pin. Entry ribbons and winner ribbons will be given to ALL participants.

ANNUAL insurance company spokesman have called for an "absolute minimum" 11.7 per cent profit allowance after taxes.

Industry representatives told the State Board of Insurance at a two-day hearing that they must have that margin to stay afloat and serve car owners.

At the same time, they told the Board it should consider all sources of insurance company earnings in arriving at rates.

Members pledged to offer recommendations for providing financial assistance to cities and towns to help them provide adequate facilities and attract federal matching funds.

Under industry recommendations, future rate inadequacies would be the "sole responsibility of the state" regulators if they fail to recognize a proper rate of return.

Expert witness told the Board that state-regulated utilities, which have far less risk of loss than casualty insurance companies, are permitted higher profits.

Others said that casualty insurance companies are among those that the lowest rates of return of any major industry.

Unimpressed, Texas AFL-CIO President H. S. (Hank) Brown called the biggest fight "since the Battle of the Alamo" if the board agrees to another rate increase.

COURTS SPEAK
Texas Court of Criminal Appeals held that a Houston judge was not disqualified from presiding at the trial of a man who was being prosecuted (as a district attorney) 10 years earlier in another charge.

State Supreme Court set arguments for December 2 over whether a Dallas firm's contracts giving dealers exclusive territories for breath sweeteners is a violation of anti-trust laws.

Also set for December 2 were arguments over losses covered by "vandalism and malicious mischief" provisions in insurance policies.

Still another December 2 argument is scheduled in an Austin case involving whether death of a motorist was solely due to an auto accident or whether chronic illnesses contributed.

Some of the deceased man would collect \$20,000 in insurance if the accident was ruled to be the cause of his death.

A county may pay overtime subject to budget and maximum salary laws and may pay for accumulated vacation time in line with contracts, Atty. Gen. Crawford Martin has held.

In other recent opinions, Martin concluded that:

Public junior colleges districts are classified as political subdivisions of the state for the purpose of elective coverage of employees under employment insurance.

FUND LIMIT RAISE URGED
Interim study committee has called on the 62nd Legislature to expedite submission of a constitutional amendment to remove the four-per-cent interest ceiling on Water Development Bonds.

Texas Water Resources Study Committee, in a special report, emphasized that the Water Development Board has authorized the sell \$100 million in bonds to make loans to local governments for water improvements, but the present limit makes the bonds unmarketable.

Ability to sell at prevailing high interest rates is blocking construction of dams, reservoirs and treatment facilities in all parts of the state, said the committee.

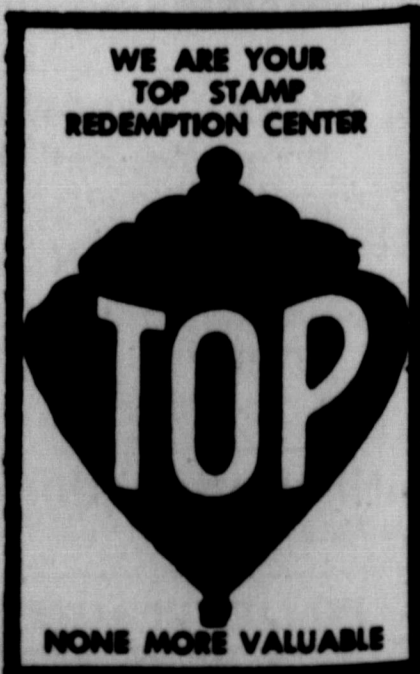

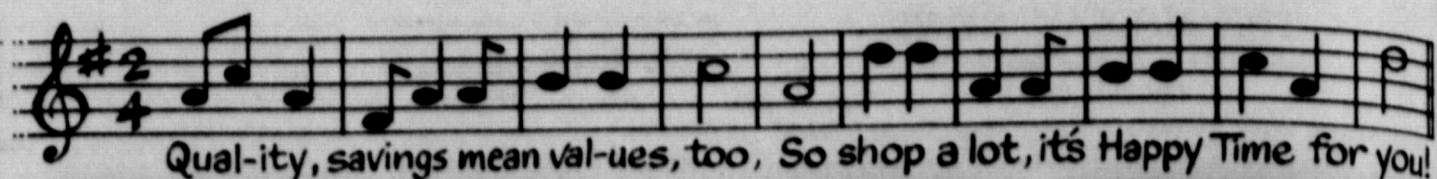
