

"May Almighty God, who has watched over this repullie as it grew from weakness to strength, give us the wisdom to carry on in the way of Franklin D. Roosevelt." Mr. Hoosevelt's foreign policy, he said, "recognized the solemn duty of this country toward nawhich have been weakened in the death struggle against tyranny."

For these principles of international cooperation, Mr. Truman seclared, "we are determined to fight with all our strength."
