18 Year Old Men Must Register

Mr. John Rankin, chairman of Selective Service Local Board No. 52 reminds young men of their obligation to register with Selective Service within 30 days of their 18th birthday. Mr. Rankin stresses the fact that the requirements to register to be in full effect and every young man is required to present himself for registration 30 days before or 30 days after his 18th birthday. If for some reason he has failed to register he should do so immediately to escape the penalty of Federal Law. Failure to register may result in fine, imprisonment, or both, under provisions of the Military Selective Service Act. Registration may take place at the office of the local board or at designated places of registration located in most communities. Texas Local Board No 52 serves Gray, Donley, Wheeler and Roberts Counties. The Local board office is located in the post office building, Rooms 4-6, 120 E. Foster, Pampa, Texas. Office hours are 8:00 a.m. to 4:30 p.m. Monday through Friday. Frank Simpson is the registrar for the McLean area and is located in the McLean Post office.

IRS Will Compute Your Tax

Many taxpayers again may have the Internal Revenue Service compute their income tax and retirement income credit, W.T. Coppinger, IRS District Director for North Texas, said today. He said the IRS' on request will compute the tax for persons with incomes of \$20,000 or less, who take the standard deduction, and whose income is solely from salaries, wages, tip, dividends, interest, pension and annuities. If the taxpayer also wants the IRS to compute his retirement income credit, he should include the basic information on Schedule R and attach it to his Form 1040. Mr. Coppinger said. He should also enter "RIC" on line 19, Form 1040. Instructions on Schedule R explain which items need to be provided. For those persons who qualify, the IRS will compute the tax, whether the return is a Short Form 1040 or the regular 1040. The tax instructions explain what information should be entered on the return, Mr. Coppinger said. After this information is entered on the return, the taxpayer should sign it and send it to the IRS center in Austin, Texas. He said the IRS will then compute the tax and send the taxpayer either a refund or a bill for the tax due, whichever is the case.

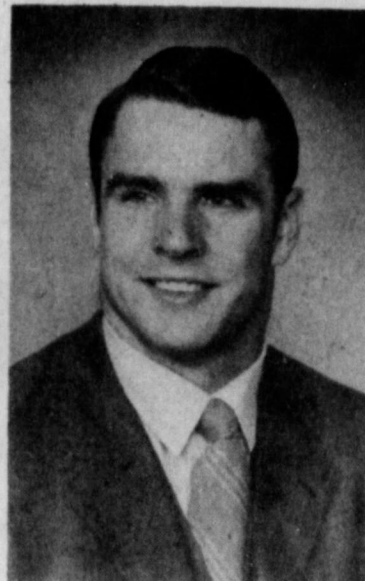

Game-Fish Law Hearings Coming Up

Texas hunters and fishermen have approximately one billion dollars invested in their equipment, and soon they will have the opportunity to put their voices where their money is.

The opportunity will come when Texas Parks and Wildlife Department officials hold public hearings in counties across the state concerning changes in laws affecting fish, game animals and fur bearing animals. Clayton Garrison, executive director for the department, said the hearings are the first step toward setting the coming hunting and fishing regulations. The proposals will be set forth at the hearings, and citizens comments will be invited.

Detailed reports of the hearings will be submitted to the Texas Parks and Wildlife Commission. The reports will be used by the commissioners when they are considering changes in game and fish regulations.

Garrison said department officials are hoping for a good turn-out at the public hearings. "Citizen participation at these hearings is absolutely essential if we are to get a full picture of many variables affecting fish and wildlife programs," he said. "We sincerely urge anyone interested in our fish and wildlife resources to attend these local hearings."

A meeting will be held for Gray County in Pampa at the county Courthouse Tuesday, March 27 at 10 a.m.

**Turkey Season
Coming in April**

There's more than a month still to wait, but now's the time to prepare for the spring turkey season, according to Texas Parks and Wildlife Department officials.

The main concern with many hunters will be finding a place to hunt. Leases have to be located and arranged.

Department officials say hunting turkeys in the spring is different than in the fall. The birds will be scattered, and vegetation would be a great hindrance. Officials say hunters who use turkey calls should have the best luck.

The spring turkey season affects only certain sections of the state.

There will be a spring season in all Possum Kingdom counties except Bosque, Erath, Hood and Somerville. The season is April 21-29. There will also be an April 21-29 season in Bandera, Burnett, Gillespie, Kerr, McCulloch, Menard, Schleicher and Sutton counties.

In Crockett and Val Verde Counties, the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department's proposed season was vetoed by the Commissioners courts. Therefore, according to law, these counties will have the same season as last year's, April 22-30.

Commissioners courts in Edwards, Kimble and Kendall Counties vetoed the spring turkey season entirely.

Any legal firearm may be used during the spring hunt. Longbows and arrows may also be used, but crossbows are illegal.

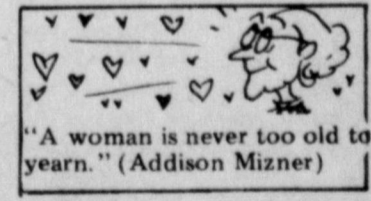

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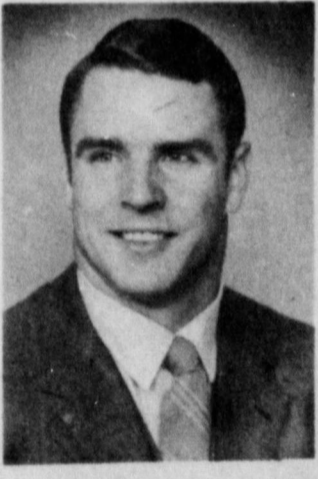

STATE CAPITAL Highlights AND Sidelights

Early senate approval was forecast by Lt. Gov. Bill Hobby for HB 3 to strengthen the open meetings law.

The bill was cleared by a criminal matters sub-committee of the Jurisprudence Committee last week.

The shield bill (HB 10) to protect newsmen from forced disclosure of information sources was due consideration in the criminal matters sub-committee this week. It will be expanded to include definitions contained in a U.S. Senate bill and probably amended to provide for a State Supreme Court mandamus proceeding to compel disclosure of information sources under certain cases, according to Senate sponsor, Sen. Chet Brooks of Pasadena.

Hearing was delayed until April 10 on HB 6 to broaden accessibility on information on government records pending a Legislative Budget Board estimate on the cost of the act to the state.

TAX BILL SEEN
Legislators will be forced to write a new tax bill due to demands of higher education and welfare, the chairman of an interim House Revenue and Tax Committee maintain.

If the regular session manages to get by with no tax bill, lawmakers will be called into special session to pass one, predicted Rep. Don Cavness of Austin. Rep. Joe Wyatt of Bloomington, co-chairman of the Committee, chared the gloomy forecast, adding that federal welfare guidelines will cost the state an extra \$100 million a year.

Cavness also cited the estimated \$28 million a year cost of an adult education bill and a \$13 million-cost measure to insure teachers a duty-free lunch hour, plus the multi-million-dollar bilingual education bill.

Both lawmakers also referred to the federal case involving validity of the state's

methods of financing public school education.

Texas, the Committee found, ranks 40th among 50 states in tax load but has among the most regressive tax systems. The Committee recommended a permanent revenue and tax staff, increased use of bond income for appropriation, use of private collection attorneys and a monthly reporting option.

18-YEAR-OLD RIGHTS APPROVED

Full rights of maturity for 18-to-20 year olds received tentative senate approval by a 19-11 vote.

The Senate also passed legislation to slow creation of new state-supported colleges by requiring prior approval of the Coordinating Board, Texas College and University System.

Still later, senators voted to extend collective bargaining rights (but not the right to strike) to policemen and firemen. Local governing bodies would have an option to grant the rights or order elections on the issue.

CRIME RATE DOWN

Major crimes are on the decline in Texas, according to a new Department of Public Safety report.

Col. Wilson E. Speir, DPS director, said the number of crimes last year was 2.2 per cent below 1971--the first measureable decline since 1954.

Translated into crime rates, the 1972 figure was six per cent below the 1971 rate per 100,000 population.

The decrease, Speir said, was only the fourth since DPS began compiling its Texas Crime Report 30 years ago.

Decreases were noted in murders, aggravated assaults and thefts. Small increases were observed in rapes, robberies and auto thefts--with a larger increase in the burglary category.

The urban crime rate overall was down 4.7 per cent, with the rural rate off 5.8 per cent.

Crime clearance rates remained at 26 per cent. Clearance rate for murder improved from 86 per cent to 89 per cent, with further improvements noted in robberies, aggravated assaults and thefts.

Many factors are responsible, said Speir.

The DPS chief cited improved law enforcement effectiveness through training, education, more personnel and better facilities,

as well as improvements in other parts of the criminal justice system and "a growing awareness and concern on the part of the public that crime must be impeded."

The crime statistics break down to one major crime every minute, a murder every five and a quarter hours, a rape every three hours and 45 minutes and a robbery every half hour.

Atty. Gen. John Hill held key parts of the House-passed lobby control bill constitutional, but said some provisions are not.

For example, said the Attorney General, section that attempts to force registration of those who make expenditures to solicit other persons by advertising to communicate with legislators goes too far. Lobbyists opposing the bill before the

Senate Jurisprudence Committee said it abridges right of citizens to communicate with their legislators.

In other opinions, Hill held:

Federal and other police agencies cannot be told about arrests of juveniles which have been removed from official records.

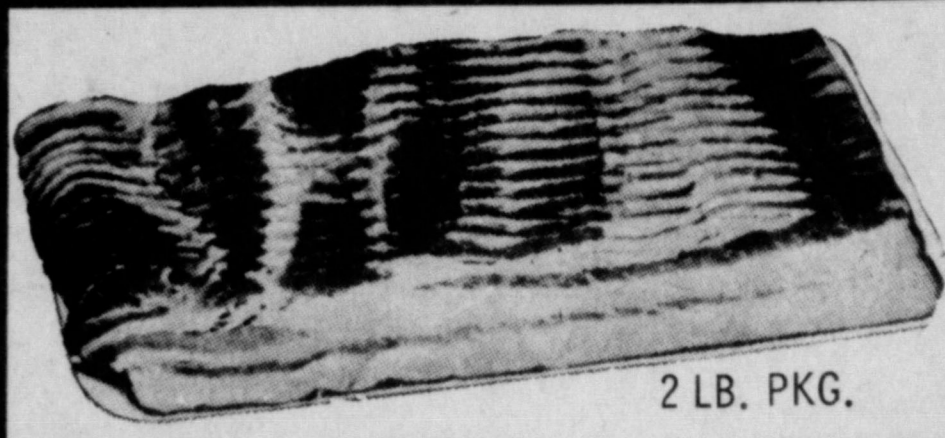

The House appropriations committee chairman has proposed a four-months' welfare budget until uncertain cost factors are decided. The Governor's mansion will be open to visitors on seven days a week.

U.S., EUROPE FOOD PRICES
 ---Although food prices continue to increase in the U.S., food is still a better buy than in the European countries, says an economist for the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station. In the U.S., the average family spends less than a fifth of its income on food. In Italy and England this total is a third, in France, one-fourth, and in Germany, 30 percent. It

also take less work to buy food in the U.S., and its quality is the highest in the world. It will cost more to pay the interest on the national debt in 1974 than it cost to run the government in all the years from 1789 to 1913—\$24.6 billion interest in 1974 against \$24 billion spent through the first 123 years of our government.

Vitamin "3" Controversy

Contrary to advertisements there's little foundation for claiming vitamin E a miracle cure-all, one authority said this week. Although this nutrient is essential for good health, it isn't everything it's promoted as being," Karen Kreipke, foods and nutrition specialist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, Texas A&M University, contended.

Studies and clinical trials fail to link vitamin E with "curing" heart disease, cystic fibrosis, blood disorders, leg ulcers, diabetes and miscarriages.

Actually, very little is known about the vitamin. It functions in the body as an antioxidant and helps red blood cells live as long as they should.

Small amounts of vitamins are stored in various body organs, muscle and fat tissues.

A fat-soluble vitamin, it requires presence of fat and bile salts for absorption.

There's little chance that a person eating a well-balanced diet will lack vitamin E since most common foods contain modest amounts.

Estimated adult daily requirement is 25-30 International Units--the average U.S. diet furnishes 2-66 I. U. daily.

Best food sources are leafy vegetables, whole-grain food products and fats--especially vegetable oils.

Aerosol Spray Cans Are Hazardous

Consumer handle potential bombs daily as aerosol spray cans--yet display few precautionary measures.

"Used according to directions, they're safe," Mrs. Doris Myers, home management specialist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, Texas A&M University, noted.

But used improperly, they can become extremely dangerous.

Aerosols work on the principle that product and propellant--liquefied gas--are mixed in a container.

When the push button mechanism is pressed, the propellant exerts pressure on the mixture in the can, forcing it up and out the valve.

As it enters the atmosphere the propellant converts to vapor--producing the familiar spray or foam effect.

A great variety of products are available as aerosols.

Today, an individual can instantly prepare hors d'oeuvres, decorate a dessert, clean the oven or paint furniture--all at a touch of his or her fingertip.

However, besides being versatile, aerosols can cause injuries--even death.

A major hazard is danger of explosion when containers are exposed to extreme heat. Heat causes the propellant to expand and explosions result. Even empty containers may explode when heated--due to expansion of any propellant remaining inside.

Another danger involves flammability. Many products are flammable if sprayed near an open flame.

Still others' fumes are toxic when inhaled--such as insecticides.

Even the most common products may cause skin and eye irritations when misdirected.

Aerosol product labels furnish specific instructions and warnings concerning content use and disposal.

Some aerosols are made for specific uses and should be handled only certain way. Therefore, read the entire label before using the product--observe all warnings and follow directions.

Before disposing an aerosol container, hold its valve open until all remaining product and gas escape. Place container with non-burnable trash--never in an incinerator.

Store aerosols away from heat and out of the reach of children.

Within the last few years, numerous youngsters have died from inhaling aerosol vapors in highly concentrated amounts.

Inhalation in many cases was intentional--in attempt to get "high." Hair spray was the household used most often.

Therefore, parents should alert all young people to the extreme danger of "sniffing" aerosols or any other product.

Fingering the Criminal

Harriet, victim of a mugging, was summoned to police headquarters to view a lineup. One of the men looked vaguely familiar, but she felt too doubtful to pick him out.



A week later, she was called to a second lineup. All the men were different except one—the same one who had seemed familiar the first time. With her confidence bolstered, Harriet pointed an accusing finger at him and said:

"He's the man."

But at the trial, her identification was ruled out of court. The judge said placing the man into both lineups was an unfair way of singling him out and making him look guilty.

Witnesses to a crime are often asked to select the culprit out of a police lineup. As a means of identification, the lineup—usually consisting of prisoners or plainclothes policemen—is widely approved.

However, to be constitutional, the procedure must be carried out with basic fairness. Police must not "stack" the lineup so as to draw special attention to the man they suspect.

On the other hand, the participants need not be perfect look-alikes.

In another case, the suspect was the only one in the lineup wearing a black jacket. Admittedly, this made him conspicuous to some degree. But a court upheld the procedure anyhow, since the jacket happened to be the man's regular attire.

Furthermore, even if the suspect is conspicuous in one respect, the witness may have other legitimate reasons for making the identification. For example:

A burglary suspect was placed in a lineup while wearing distinctive clothing. But the witness who picked him out did not rely just on his apparel. He said he recognized the man mainly by his height, his weight, his voice, and his posture.

The court decided that, with so much to support it, the identification by the witness was indeed worthy of the jury's consideration.

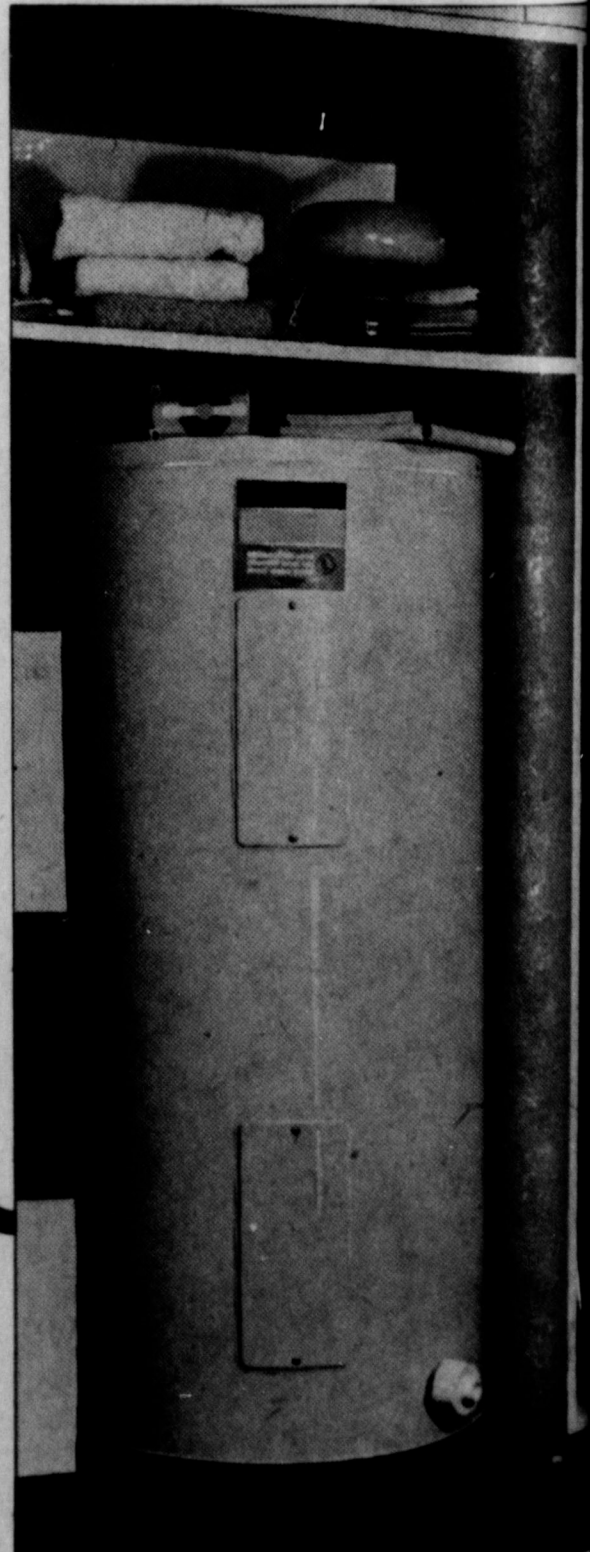

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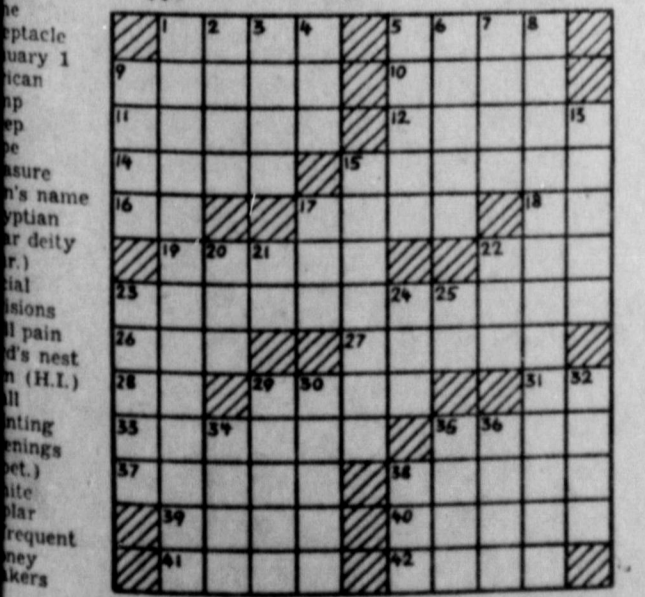

Accent on Health

All households contain poisons. No home is likely to be without a large bottle of aspirin, a container of some cleaning fluid, a can of caustic soda or similar product for stopped-up drains, laundry detergent or bleach, or perhaps some poison seeds for mice. In our sleeping-pill-age, barbiturates and other sedative drugs are found in many households.

More than 500,000 children--like the little girl next door or the toddler in your own home--will swallow poison this year. Most cases reported will involve children under five years of age. Sadly, virtually all of these poisonings are preventable, says the Texas State Department of Health.

In Texas last year, there were nearly 200 fatal poisonings listed as accidental. Almost half the child poisonings involve aspirins, the single most common offenders.

March 18-24, 1973, has been set aside as national "Poison Prevention Week" in an effort to focus public attention on the potential poisoning dangers widespread throughout the household.

Huge numbers of commercial products of one kind or another are either toxic or poisonous. It is sometimes difficult to know whether a particular product is dangerous or not. Many of these products often are in easy reach of children and their inquisitive young minds and hands.

In some cities, Poison Control Centers have been set up to identify the ingredients of commercial products and to offer advice to the attending physician concerning treatment. The Poison Control Center in your area is at your doctor's fingertips, and can help him diagnose symptoms, identify the substance and the proper antidote for it. The State Health Department has helped develop some 22 Poison Control Centers across Texas. Information on proper antidotes is usually given directly to a physician. Thus, you should call your doctor first, and take a sample of suspected poison or its container with you to the hospital emergency room.

Obviously, many of the commercial products that are accidentally swallowed may not be particularly dangerous. However, if one is not sure, and the nature of the product cannot be identified quickly, a good rule is always to treat it as a potential poison.

There are two broad types of treatment for poison victims: the "evacuate" treatment, and the "dilute and neutralize" treatment. The aim of the evacuate treatment is to have the victim vomit up the poison, and thus to get it out of his system. This is accomplished in various ways, including the use of substances called "emetics" to induce vomiting. The dilute-and-neutralize treatment keeps the poison in the system but renders it harmless by the double action of weakening or diluting it and by neutralizing its effects. It is most effective with strong

acids, alkalis and the corrosive poisons in general.

Common emetics to induce vomiting are: salt water (add two tablespoons of salt to a pint of warm water); mustard water (add one to two tablespoons of commercial mustard to a glass of warm water); and soap water (shake up warm water with a few pieces of plain white soap until a lather forms).

There are, however, some points to remember. Do not try to induce vomiting in the unconscious patient. Do not induce vomiting if product swallowed contains hydrocarbons such as gasoline or solvents. Keep the head down to prevent the patient from choking on the vomited material. With a child, keep across the lap with head down.

It is important to use the dilute-and-neutralize treatment with corrosive poisons. A corrosive is a strong acid or alkali which has a direct searing or caustic action on body tissue. These substances include lye (caustic soda), calcium hydroxide, ammonia, hydrochloric acid, battery acid, carbonic acid and creosote. You can recognize a corrosive by the searing effect it has on the tissues of the lips and the mouth. Read the directions and caution statements and antidote on the bottle or can to determine if these ingredients are present.

Health authorities know that a simple dilution of a swallowed poison will help cut down its rate of absorption and decrease its local irritative or corrosive action. Of considerable importance is "neutralization"--or making the poison inert or harmless. Thus citrus fruit juices of dilute vinegar solution will chemically neutralize a strong alkali such as lye. Bicarbonate of soda (baking soda) will neutralize an acid. In both cases, harmless salts are formed. Milk is capable of neutralizing both acids and alkalis, and is always safe to give for purposes of dilution as well.

The so-called universal antidote--consisting of two parts activated charcoal, one part tannic acid, and one part magnesium oxide mixed together and one to two tablespoons added to a glass of warm water--is a handy item to keep in your first aid chest. Vomiting must then be induced.

An ounce of prevention is worth a pound of cure. State Health officials urge all parents to poison-proof the home by removing dangerous common household substances, keeping them on high shelves, or in locked cabinets. Medicines should be kept under lock also.
