

1973-74 Hunting- Fishing Laws Set

Texas sportsmen can start making plans for the upcom- ing hunting and fishing sea- sons.

In public session April 26, the Parks and Wildlife Com- mission approved seasons, bag limits and means and methods of taking game birds animal and fish for 1973-74.

In the Panhandle Regula- tory Districts, open season for mule and white-tailed deer is Nov. 17- Dec. 2.

Turkey seasons were set to run concurrently with deer seasons.

Quail seasons vary accord- ing to regulatory districts:

Permian Basin, Panhandle, Edwards Plateau, Trinity- Brazos, Southeast and Oak Prairie, Nov. 17, 1973, - Feb. 15, 1974.

Possum Kingdom and Northeast, Dec. 1, 1973- Feb. 15, 1974.

Quail bag and possession limits are 12 and 36 respect- ively.

Generally, the javelina season is concurrent with the Nov. 17, 1973 - Jan. 1, 1974, deer season.

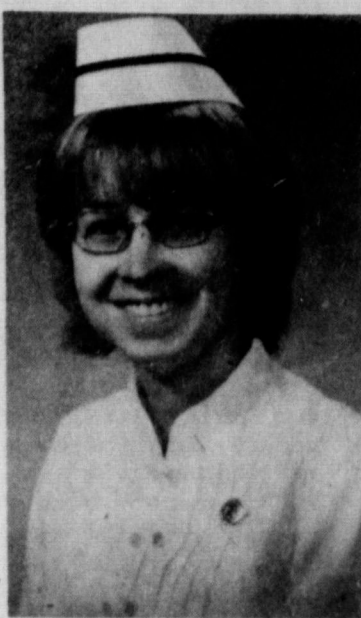
There is no open season on Javelina in the Northeast, Panhandle, Southeast and Trinity-Brazos Regulatory districts except Fannin county in the Northeast District.

STATE CAPITAL Highlights AND Sidelights

Daring more federal court challenges, the House reapportionment Committee has advanced a "Redistricting" bill that makes virtually no changes in present representative districts.

The Committee bill, approved 12-8, would retain multi-member House districts in all but the three metropolitan counties of Bexar, Dallas and Harris.

Rep. Joe Wyatt of Bloomington, the sponsor, said he would accept an amendment on the House floor to give Tarrant county single-member districts like those in the three larger counties.

Chairman Rep. Fred Head of Troup favored dividing all urban counties, which now have two or more representatives, into single-member districts. Committee action, in effect, took control of the bill from Head on the floor.

A three-judge federal court in January, 1972, ordered single-member House districts for Bexar and Dallas counties and gave the legislature until July 1 to rewrite a 1971 reapportionment scheme.

Representatives were warned before the vote that if the U.S. Supreme Court upholds the 1972 ruling, it is likely to order single member individual House districts in all urban counties.

The bill as advanced further did not meet federal court disapproval of a 9.9 per cent population spread between smallest and most-populous Texas House districts.

However, Wyatt contended the Supreme Court in a Virginia case later upheld a 16.4 per cent deviation. UNNECESSARY "ENERGY" ADS

The House Natural Resources Committee held a hearing on HSR 131 last week--a measure that requests advertisers to "not use advertisements to urge the public to use more power or energy than is reasonably necessary."

House authors are Representatives Ben Grant, Marshall, and Woody Denson, Houston.

Grant testified before the committee that his bill was not intended to regulate advertising of energy companies in Texas--but to urge advertisers to reach or persuade the public to conserve or decrease the use of energy and to avoid all wasteful uses of power.

He cited some of the copy used by Conn Edison--a major utility in the East.

west Electric Power Company told the committee that his company was against the bill because they did not feel the state should "get into the business of curtailing advertising."

"We have a surplus of power," he said. "Conn Edison has a shortage. We need to urge our consumers to use more electricity in the winter for heating purposes. We have the power available, and we need to sell it in order to pay for our bonds."

"Our consumers use our power supply in the summer when air conditioning is needed," he continued. "But we need to 'sell' them on winter-time power consumption through out advertising programs. We don't think the state legislature should get into advertising controls in Texas."

Grant said he was merely trying to encourage advertisers to avoid waste of energy, and that he would oppose "mandatory" regulations also.

The bill was sent to the Oil and Gas subcommittee of the Natural Resources Committee.

VENDING MACHINE FIRMS EYED

The attorney general's office and 14 other government agencies are investigating operations of 11 vending machine corporations in five cities.

Visitorial letters were served on the firms requesting that books and records be made available for inspection.

The Department of Public Safety, State Comptroller, State Securities Board, Texas Alcoholic Beverage Commission and law enforcement agencies in the cities are cooperating in the probe, coordinated by the Attorney General's Organized Crime Strike Force.

Firms are located in Dallas, Houston, Fort Worth, Grant Prairie and San Antonio.

Details of the investigation were not disclosed. Refusal of a Grant Prairie concern to allow inspection of records resulted in filing a misdemeanor complaint in Dallas County Criminal Court No. 2. DISASTER AID AVAILABLE, LIMITED

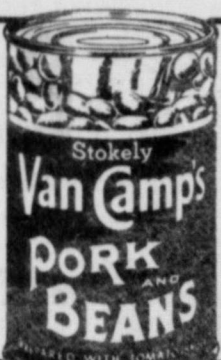

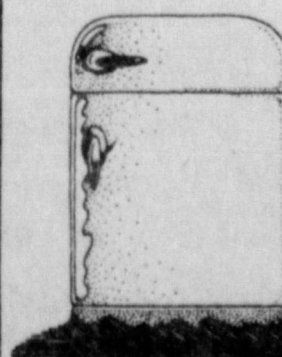

Texas Ranks 2nd For License Holders

In 1972 Texas ranked second among the 50 states in the total number of fishing license holders according to the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service statistics.

Texas sold 1,542,693 licenses, behind California with 2,261,766 and ahead of Minnesota with 1,486,871.

Texas also ranked third in the total number of hunting license holders.

Texas had 783,103 hunting license holders, behind Pennsylvania with 1,122,399 and Michigan with 785,752.

The U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service defines a "license holder" as one individual regardless of the number of licenses he may purchase.

Nationwide, the sale of licenses decreased in 1972 from the year before. But sale of fishing licenses increased.

Expenditures for hunting licenses were \$108,000,000 in 1972 and \$107,310,803 in 1971. Fishing license sales increased by \$7 million.

Meat prices test homemakers' skills as planers, shoppers and cooks.

There are several methods and "extenders" for providing this amount while satisfying family tastes.

Though a family member might complain about a three-ounce serving of steak, that same amount of meat in a stew, soup, casserole or salad goes much further.

Cookbooks and other literature furnish numerous recipes for such meat dishes to help consumers stretch purchases.

Another "extension" method involves combining protein-rich dry beans, lentils or dry peas with less meat. For example, bean soup

Right to Spank

"The right of parents to chas-

 good." But no longer.

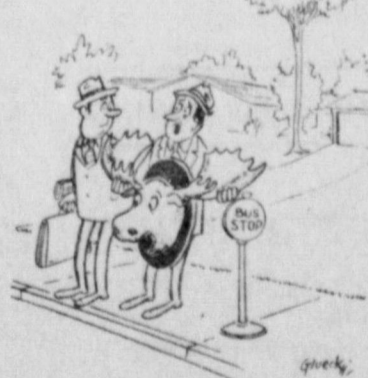


Thus, a father was found guilty
 of assault and battery for beating

 standards of the community.

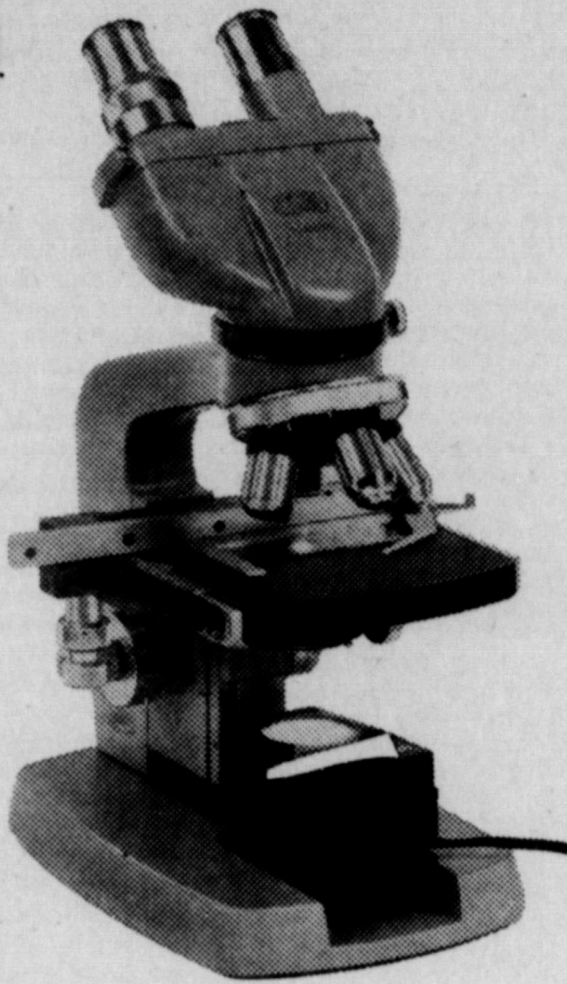

NEWS County Agricultural Agent Texas A. & M. College Extension Service By FOSTER WHALEY

Recently we compiled some figures with reference to agriculture in Gray County. We thought you might be interested in these figures. In the 24 upper Texas Panhandle counties there are 6,093,790 cultivated acres. Almost two million acres are in wheat either for grain or grazing. Something under two million acres are devoted to grain sorghum. A little over two million acres are either idle, in cotton or other crops. Over these total acres about two and one half million is being irrigated from underground wells.

Feedlots within a seventy five mile radius of Pampa contain almost one million head of cattle. About two million head are being fed within a 100 mile radius of Pampa.

Agriculture and Agribusiness will soon dwarf the once all important oil business. Whether you know it or not- the Panhandle of Texas is one of the richest regions in the work in natural resources- Natural gas, oil, cattle and good farm land.

WHEAT CONDITIONS

Hail has destroyed a sizeable acreage of wheat on High Plains South of Pampa and on the Carson-Gray county line. Yet a vast acreage of wheat is still standing and in my opinion the best crop is in prospect that I have ever seen. Wheat is now 30 inches high and heading. No need of moisture at present. One more good rain could set even the dry land farmers up for some 50 bu yields. Dry land wheat looks almost as good as the irrigated.

If you want to see the prettiest wheat crop you have ever seen, take a drive this week end up 1-40 to HWY 70, then north to Pampa and back to McLean.

COYOTE PROGRAM

The Helicopter coyote control program has done wonders to reduce the coyote population. The nice thing about it is the fact a considerable savings was made by using the helicopter over other means. A two day hunt killed just under 300 coyotes. It takes an exceptionally good trapper to get this many in a year. We congratulate the ones that took the initiative and get this program underway.
