Max Sherman Made Kindergarten Pupils President of Senate To Enroll Jan. 11

State Senator Max Sherman of Amarillo was elected today by his fellow Senate members to serve as President Pro Tempore of the Senate during the first called session of the 63rd Legislature. Sherman, who is serving his second term in the Texas Senate was unanimously elected during the opening day of the special session after being nominated by a fellow North Texas legislator, Senator Jack Hightower of Vernon.

In making the nomination Senator Hightower praised Sherman for the strong contributions to the Senate that have made him such a strong leader and so highly respected by his colleagues and constituents.

Sherman, a 36 year old Panhandle native from Berger is currently serving as chairman of the Senate Natural Resources committee and is a member of the Finance and Jurisprudence committees.

The position of the President Pro Tempore is the highest honor that can be bestowed upon a Senator by his colleagues. The President Pro Tempore presides over the Senate in the absence of the Lt. Governor and is next in line to succession to the Governorship in the absence of the Governor and the Lt. Gov.

Senator Sherman was joined during the swearing in ceremonies by his wife Gene, who is also a native of Berger; his son Lynn, age 10; and his daughter Holly, who is 9 years old.

On Friday, January 11, 1974 from 3:00 p.m. to 4:00 p.m. will be enrollment time for the Kindergarten students in McLean Public Schools. Parents are requested to bring their children for this enrollment time. All children who were 5 years of age on or before September 1, 1973 are eligible to attend the public school Kindergarten program.

Parents must have their children's birth certificates for verification.

Also each child must have their immunizations (minimum school requirements: DTP-3 doses, last dose since age 4; Polio-3 doses last dose since age 4; Measles-1 dose or case history of illness; Rubella-1 dose) or have started on these immunizations. The first full day of classes for the Kindergarten will be on Tuesday, January 16th. The reason for enrollment on January 11th is to provide for the information and materials requests to the parents a few days in advance of the first day of classes.

The school is encouraging parents to make every effort to enroll their children on January 11th.



S. W. P. S. To Invest In New Equipment and Improvements

More than \$266,000,000 will be invested in new equipment and improvements during the next five years by Southwestern Public Service Company, Roy Tolk, chairman and president of electric company, announced today.

New generating facilities to be installed during the 5-year period will increase the capability of the system by almost 1-million kilowatts, bringing the total capability to approximately 3-million kilowatts.

One of the new generating stations included in this 5-year program is the addition to the Nichols Plant, north east of Amarillo. Construction has just recently started and completion is scheduled for June of 1976. It will have a capability of 350,000 kilowatts and will use coal as its primary fuel. Long-term contracts with the Atlantic Richfield Company have been negotiated for low-sulfur coal from Wyoming, thus assuring an entirely adequate supply of this fuel.

Scheduled for completion in mid-1974 is a 256,000 kilowatt unit at Jones Station near Lubbock. This will bring the total capability of this plant to 512,000 kilowatts and it will become the largest of Southwestern's 10 interconnected generating stations.

"In the latter part of the 5-year period, projections call for another coal-fired generating unit to be built, probably in the north part of the company's service area.

It will be in the 350-450 thousand kilowatt range, depending on the load requirements at that time," Tolk said.

"In order to assure a clean environment when using coal as the primary fuel, it is necessary to spend an additional 30-percent of the cost of the unit for equipment to prevent objectionable products of combustion from reaching the atmosphere. The installation of both electrostatic precipitators and stack gas scrubbers will insure that we equal or exceed applicable stack gas emission standards," Tolk said.

"Southwestern's peak load for 1973 was 1,758,000 kilowatts and that is expected to climb to 2,392,000 kilowatts by 1978. The addition of these new generating facilities will more than take care of that increase," Tolk said.

Conservation of the area's water supply will continue to be a prime consideration at Southwestern Public Service Company's electric generating stations. When the two units now under construction are completed, they will save, on the average day, 14,000,000 gallons of potable water through the use of sewage effluent. That's the equivalent of the daily water needs of a city of 100,000 people. Another important construction project that is a part of

The 5-year program and currently under way, is a 234,000 volt transmission line from the Tuco interchange, north of Abernathy, to Nichols Station, northeast of Amarillo. This new line will provide a second 230,000 volt line for the interconnected transmission system and make the movement of power between major generating stations and the areas of greatest use more efficient, reliable and economical. This project is also scheduled for completion in mid-1974.

Looking toward the future, Southwestern Public Service Company is continuing its efforts to help make the generation of electricity by nuclear fusion a reality through its membership in the Texas Atomic Energy Research Foundation. Also, the company is actively engaged in an experimental project with the Occidental Petroleum Corporation to produce oil from shale by in situ combustion. The test project (Continued on Page 4)

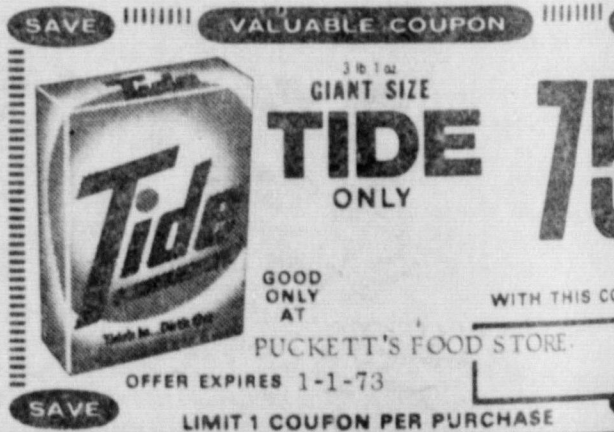

Is McLean Hospital Going To Close?

This is the questions I am asked many times a day, and I want to try and tell it the way I know it and maybe clear up some questions.

1. Is McLean General Hospital going to close? It could. Why? because we do not and never have had a 24 hour RN coverage but up until now we have been under a special rule which allowed us to have one RN on 8 hrs, a day and on call 24 hours a day and L.V.N. working under her but now Medicare states we are to have 24 hour R.N. coverage.

2. Has McLean Hospital been decertified? No, not yet. However, medicare is holding up payments to the hospital until the deficiency has been corrected.

3. If the hospital is decertified will I as a medicare patient have to pay this money? No, if the hospital is decertified and not recertified the hospital absorbs the cost.

4. If the deficiency of R.N. Coverage is not met will the hospital be decertified? Yes.

5. Can it be recertified? Yes. Many hospitals, have been decertified and then recertified and medicare starts paying again when the hospital is recertified and makes it retroactive as of the date it started withholding payments.

6. I heard today it was closing January 1, 1973 if deficiencies are not met. Is this true? To My knowledge we have not gotten any correspondence from medicare

I also have 2 others I will contact in the next day or two.

9. Why can't we obtain R.N.'s?

a. The Salary has been to low.

b. R.N.'s who are married, need jobs for their husbands.

c. Housing problems.

10. What can be done about the above problems.

a. We have adjusted the salary somewhat recently to an acceptable salary and are negotiable.

b. If you have jobs available let me or Mr. Lee Mites, administrator of McLean Hospital know of them and what the pay scale is so we can tell the R.N.'s when we interview them.

c. If you have rent property, spend a little money on it and clean it up so it will be presentable and acceptable for an R.N. and family to live in and make it known to us and the same goes to anything you have to sell, make it presentable.

11. There are other reasons such if a young girl gets out of school, she either gets married or wants to stay in the city in a bigger hospital, where there is more excitement and more entertainment.

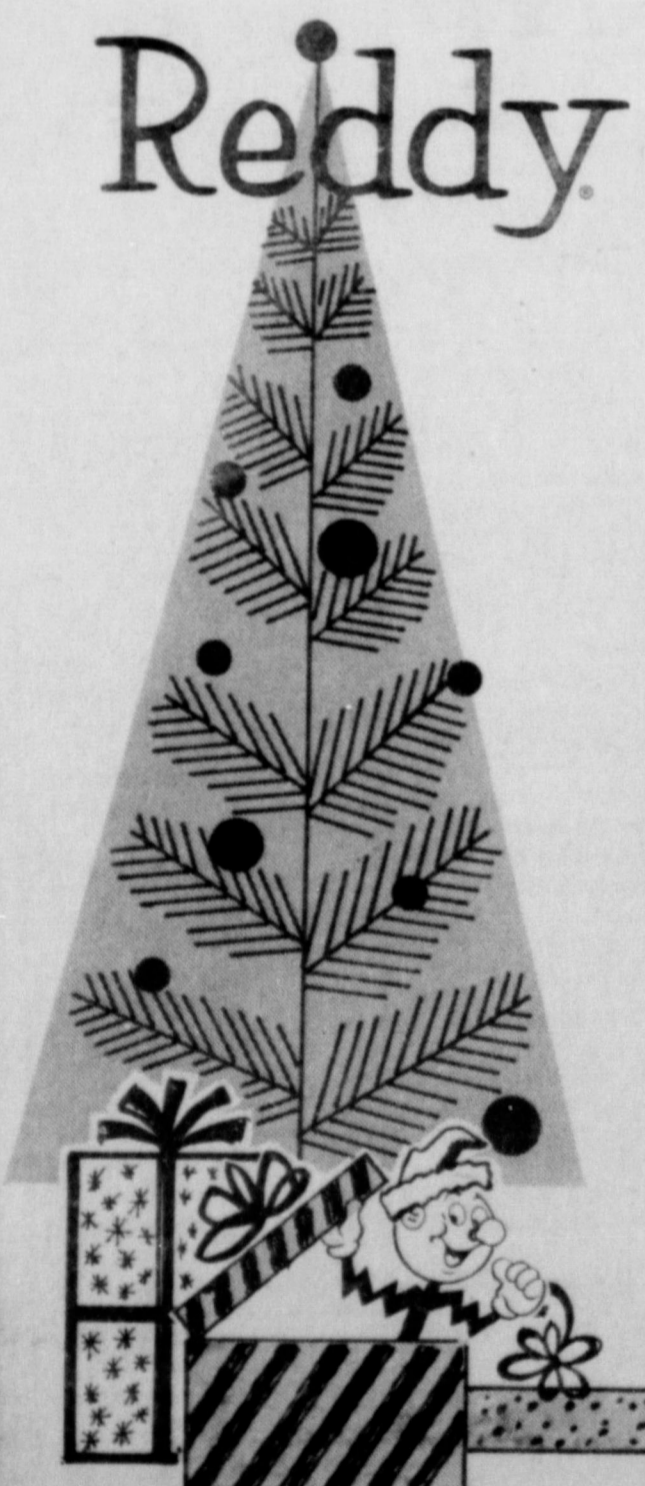
