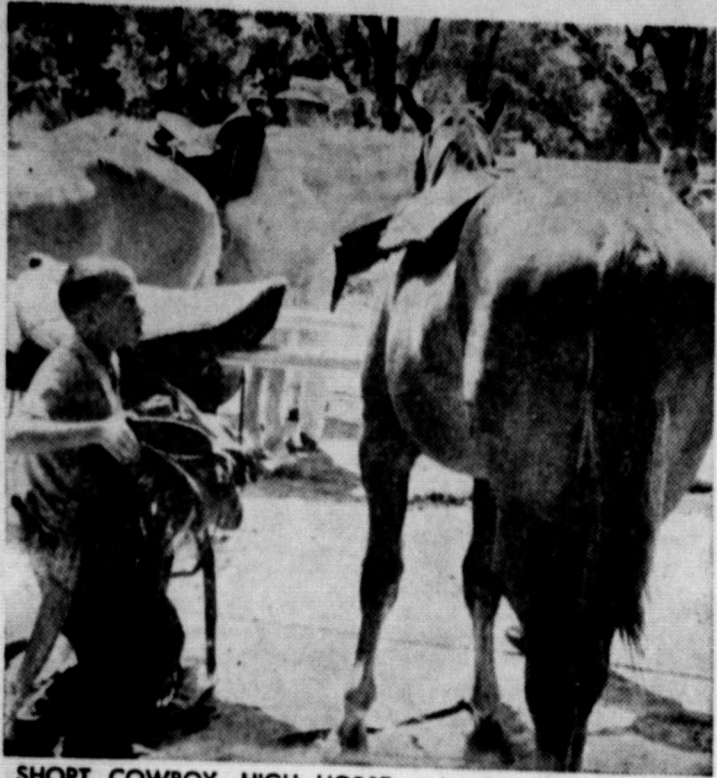

## Doctor in the Kitchen

### FISH IN THE DIET

The Pennsylvania Medical Society reports that an estimated one billion tons of fish are born every year in the waters which cover so much of the earth. The balance of this huge increase is maintained because the larger fish feed on the smaller fish, and themselves fall prey to the still larger fish. And to man.

In many homes during this Lenten season, religious considerations call for abstention from meats and meat products on fast days. There may also be some meat-lovers who will give up meat as a Lenten sacrifice. If so, protein alternates are essential to keep a balanced diet.

#### Fish Is Plentiful

Among the best of these is fish. There are many nations where fish is much more plentiful than meat. One finds fish as a course routinely on hotel and restaurant menus in all of Europe, at dinner and sometimes at luncheon. In the Orient fish is a staple in many diets where meats seldom appear. The variety and tastiness of fish dishes in the Scandinavian countries is well known.

When we say 'fish', we include as a matter of course, the shell fish—oysters, clams, crayfish, lobsters, crabs, mussels, abalone, scallops and the less popular squid. Any variety of fish supplies good quality protein. Fish and seafood from the ocean contribute in addition, necessary minute quantities of iodine required by the body. Before the cause of simple goiter was ascertained about 45 years ago, populations using extensive quanti-

ties of deep sea fish in their diets thus were automatically protected against this condition, and they still are.

#### Former Problems

Fish used to be difficult to handle. They had to be cooked and eaten rather promptly in order to avoid spoilage. Good fish from the ocean were scarce inland. Out of this there arose the superstition that fish and milk should not be eaten at the same time. Actually, fish and milk were both about equally perishable before modern methods of handling were available, so any disturbance created by taking fish and milk together was probably due to one or the other being spoiled. Now that both can be handled safely, no one need be afraid of delicious fish-and-milk dishes such as oyster stew, fish bisques and Boston chowders, scalloped fish and seafood, or just a good cold glass of milk with a fish dinner.

#### Fish Is Delicious

There is no end of delicious fish dishes to suit any taste: broiled swordfish steak, boiled finnan haddie, deep-fried Dover sole, pompano en papillote (baked in a paper bag with shrimp and lobster sauce), tuna casserole with rice, brook trout, shrimps in cocktail or deep-fried, lobsters in a dozen different styles, oysters Rockefeller, fish sticks (good for a change at breakfast), salmon loaf, smoked fish of various kinds, herring marinated or kippered. . . Fish, in fact, should be included in the diet year 'round. It's a good food.
