JIM GOSS IS PRINCIPAL OF LELA SCHOOL

Jim Goss, a former member of the McLean school faculty, has been employed as principal of the Lela school. He succeeds Wendell Morgan, who resigned at Lela after being elected Wheeler County superintendent of schools, a position he will assume Jan. 1.

Two other McLean teachers are joining the faculty at Lela. Phil Biles will teach the fifth and sixth grades and Mrs. Biles the first and second graders.

Principal Goss received a BS degree from Midwestern University, Wichita Falls, and has been in the teaching profession for 13 years. He was employed at Lone Grove, Okla., and Olton before coming to McLean two years ago.

Mr. and Mrs. Goss have three daughters, Debby, 11, Kathy, 8, and Sherry, 5.

Mr. and Mrs. Biles both hold BS degrees from Southeastern State College, Durant, Okla., and each has had eight years of teaching experience. They were members of the faculty at Duncan, Okla., before coming to McLean two years ago.

They have three daughters, Becky, 8, Jan, 6, and Debby, 4.

Both families are Baptists, and Mr. Goss was presently serving as Sunday School superintendent in the McLean church, and Mr. Biles as secretary. Mrs. Goss was superintendent of the beginner department, and Mrs. Biles has also worked in the Sunday School.

Other members of the Lela faculty are John Thomas, seventh and eighth grades; Miss Sandra Baker, third and fourth grades; and Mrs. Susan Pakan, special reading teacher.

The Lela school will open Monday, Aug. 29, for the 1966-67 term.

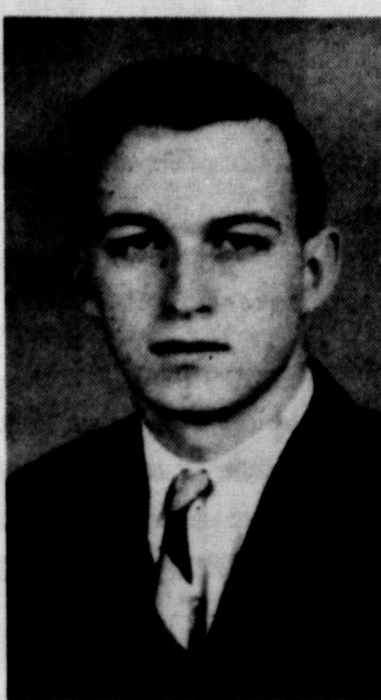

Mrs. Back Studies Use of Newspaper in Classroom

Mrs. Vera Back, a teacher in the McLean Junior High School, attended the third annual Living Textbook Conference July 19-23 at West Texas State University.

The conference, sponsored by WTSU and the Amarillo Globe-News Publishing Co., was aimed at showing the various uses of the daily newspaper in the classroom.

Dr. John H. Haefner, professor of social studies education at the University of Iowa, opened the meeting Sunday night. He is considered a leading authority on newspaper use in classroom instruction.

The contents and operation of a newspaper were explained to the group of 75 educators at the Monday morning session by members of the Globe-News staff. Phil Newsom, foreign news analyst for United Press International, spoke on Monday night.

Dr. Lee Williamson, assistant superintendent of instruction in the Amarillo public school system and conference director, was the speaker at the Tuesday morning session. The group toured the Globe-News building Tuesday afternoon.

The conference was ended at noon Wednesday with a panel quiz with department heads from the Globe-News papers as moderators. Dr. Emmitt Smith, director of program developers at WTSU, was conference coordinator.

Clarendon College In Building Program

Kenneth Vaughan, president of Clarendon College, has announced that construction will begin this week on the proposed housing complex to be located on the new campus acreage which was purchased recently.

The housing complex is the first step in an extensive building program now in the blueprint stage, and will consist of a cafeteria, bookstore, swimming pool, boys' dorm and girls' dorm. It is being constructed by CarTex Corporation of Canyon and Amarillo and is being financed by private funds. The new buildings will be completely air conditioned and are to be ready for occupancy when the fall semester begins in September.

The second phase of construction is to commence within the year and will include a complete academic plant. These facilities will also be situated on the new 30 acre campus just off U. S. Highway 287 at the Western edge of the Clarendon city limits. The new plant is to be financed by federal and private monies and will require neither a bond election nor a tax increase.

Students who wish to reside in the new dorms at Clarendon College should make reservations immediately.

County Benefits Total \$223,008

"Monthly old-age, survivors and disability benefits totaling \$223,008 are now being paid to 3,000 people in Gray County," according to Travis Briggs, Social Security district manager.

The new monthly figure represents an increase of \$31,948 and 200 people over the year before.

"A large part of the increase in payments resulted from changes made by the social security amendments of 1965," Briggs said. "The changes which were in addition to the new program of health insurance for the aged, included a 7% increase in monthly benefits retroactive to January, 1965; benefits for widows as early as 60; benefits for full-time students between 18 and 22; benefits for some divorced women; benefits for some people over 72 who hadn't worked long enough to get social security before; and the payment of disability insurance benefits to workers who are unable to work because of a disability that lasts 12 months or more."

"In addition to the people who began getting benefits in 1965 because of these changes," Briggs continued, "a good many older people who, upon applying for Medicare, found they were eligible for regular social benefits, too."

All in all, the 1965 figures for Gray County include: 1,502 retired workers, 133 disabled workers, 467 wives and husbands, 474 children, 350 widows and widowers, 70 widowed mothers, 4 parents.

The average monthly old-age retirement benefit in January was \$83.92 for all states, while in the state of Texas, the average was \$74.95.

"These figures," Briggs said, "show how wide the protection offered by social security has become. Just about every man, woman and child in the Panhandle area has in social security the assurance that loss of income because of retirement, disability, or death will not result in destitution—and now with Medicare everyone has the assurance that the costs of operations or medical services in his later years will not wipe out his savings."

4-H Scholarships Being Offered

Many of the older 4-H'ers have outpaced more experienced farmers with higher yields. Some are already in partnership with their dads or are renting acreage on their own.

With the aid of 4-H scholarships provided by Allied Chemical, six young people each year are helped with their college expenses, agricultural short courses or other educational endeavors.

The 1966 scholarship winners will be chosen from among all state award winners. They will be announced next fall during the National 4-H Club Congress which they will attend. About 5,000 members are expected to receive the field crops county medal of honor this year.

Any boy or girl interested in starting a field crops project can contact the county agent's office.

Notice of Community Election by Mail—The county and community committee for next term will be elected in September. A slate of nominees will be established for each community. The present community committee will select the slate of nominees.

There will be four communities in the county, known as A—Grandview, B—McLean, C—Laketon, and D—Pampa, each comprising one-fourth the county as in the past years.

The slate of nominees will be mailed to you for voting. In addition to the nominees selected by the community committee, nominees may be presented by petition. Petitions must be: (1) Limited to one nominee each; (2) Signed by at least 6 eligible voters (eligible voters may sign as many petitions as they desire); and (3) Received at the county office by not later than Aug. 12.

Eligible nominees are producers residing in the county and the community for which they are nominated. They should be currently engaged in farming or ranching, well-qualified for committee work, and representative of the various sections and types of agriculture in the community.

Persons nominated by petition will be placed on the slate of nominees if they are found eligible and willing to serve. They will be notified before completing the slate of nominees of their ineligibility and rights of appeal if they are found to be ineligible. The community committee or the county committee may make such additional nominations as are required or as it considers to be desirable.

Prevented From Planting by Natural Disaster—If any person is prevented from planting cotton or feed grain due to drought and he would have planted if moisture conditions had permitted, he may make application to the county committee to have this acreage that would have been planted counted as planted for the purpose of price support payments.

Gray County Approved for Emergency Grazing and Haying—The secretary of agriculture has authorized grazing and harvesting of forage for a limited time on soil bank, cropland adjustment, wheat, cotton and feed grain diverted acres program lands. This authorization is subject to approval of the ASC county committee. Regardless of reports you may have heard or read, grazing or harvesting this acreage without prior approval of the ASC county is a violation of program regulations. If approval is not obtained, the regular program penalties apply.

If you believe you or some other person should be permitted to graze or harvest forage on this land on your farm because of local unfavorable weather conditions, please notify us immediately. If this permission is granted, a charge for the value of the grazing or forage harvested will be collected or deducted from your program payments.

This approval for the county ends on Aug. 31, 1966.

NEWS OF CONSERVATION

Several improved pastures have been established in the county. Drew Word, Eben Warner, D. W. Swain and Elmer Balch have improved irrigated pastures.

The most important use of improved pastures in Gray County Soil and Water Conservation District is grazing.

The management of these pastures is the key to success or disappointment. Pastures should be divided into at least four equal pastures. The pastures should be grazed about 6 to 8 days and then rested about 21 days. During the resting period these pastures should be fertilized and watered.

This should provide the most grazing and the high quality of grazing that is expected from this type of pastures.

The amount and quality of forage is limited primarily by the management that is given to these pastures.


