Pot Blamed for a Father's Pain

Hollywood film director and editor Morty Fallick has a personal reason for being involved with the American Lung Association's new anti-marijuana program, "Marijuana: A Second Look.

Fallick, who directed the cast of the hit series FAME in TV public service spots for the new educational project, has a son who suffers from a rare lung disease known as DIP (disquamative interstitial pneumonitis). Twice his son almost died due to his debilitated lungs.

"We think he contracted the lung disease from smoking paraquatcontaminated marijuana," says Fallick. "I can't tell you how strongly I support ALA's 'Marijuana: A Second Look,' aimed at young people."

The goals of ALA's program include getting information about the health effects of smoking marijuana into the hands of teachers, parents and, primarily children ages 9, 10 and 11 so that these preteenagers cal American Lung Associationwill say no to pot when they encoun- The Christmas Seal People*."


