Councilman Loyd Bybee, Councilman Wayne Bybee Resign Posts Recently

Members of McLean City council met July 24 at 7 p.m. in the City Hall.

Present were councilmen W.A. Bentley, June Suggs, Dr. F.H. Fabian, and Mayor George Terry; city secretary Stella Lee; Mr. and Mrs. L. Fennell; and Mr. and Mrs. Darryl Herndon.

The invocation was given by W.A. Bentley.

Letters of resignation from councilmen Loyd Bybee and Wayne Bybee were read to the council by mayor Terry. The resignations were accepted by the council - motion by Bentley, second by Suggs to accept the resignations with regret, effective July 18.

Loyd Bybee's resignation letter read,

"Attention: Mayor George Terry,

This letter is written for the purpose of informing you of my resignation from the City Council of the City of McLean, Texas.

The reasons, for my resignation, is the conflicts of interest law Art: 988A. I own a small business, I need all the work I can get. This law prevents me from doing any work, for the City, Library, Fire Department, any schools, county, state, government apartments or any government funding job. Also

my concern for the city's liability and that of my own. The effective date of this resignation to be 7/18/84.

Councilmen Wayne Bybee's resignation letter read,

"Attention: Mayor George Terry,

Dear City Council Members and Mayor Terry,

This letter is written for the purpose of informing you of my resignation from the City Council of the City of McLean, Texas. The reasons for my resignation at this time are that I no longer feel comfortable with my position as City Councilman because of what I perceive to be the illegal manner in which the affairs of the City of McLean are conducted by its governing body. Further, it has become apparent to me that the majority of this governing body has no intention of changing or attempting to require the city to conform to state law and, further, that it has no intention of responding to the needs of the city as I perceive them. Therefore, because of my disappointment and concern for the city's liability and that of my own, I hereby tender my resignation to be effective when received.

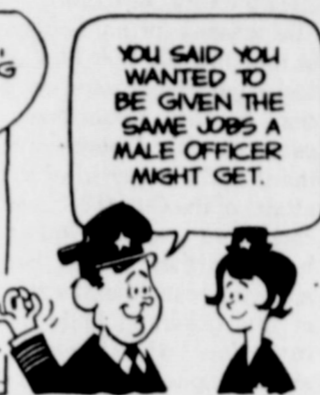

He married Winnie Joiner in Ada, Okla., in 1916.

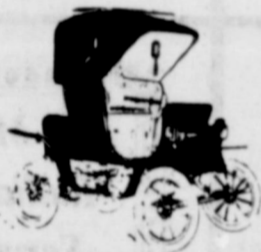

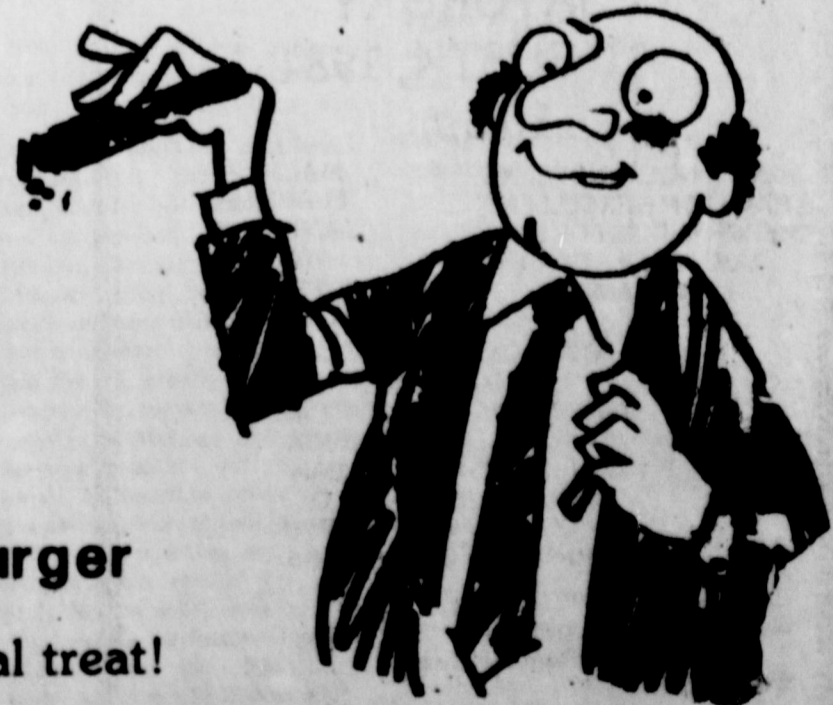

The official ribbon was cut by Mayor pro-tem June Suggs, as mayor Terry and State Representative Foster Whaley joined others looking on.

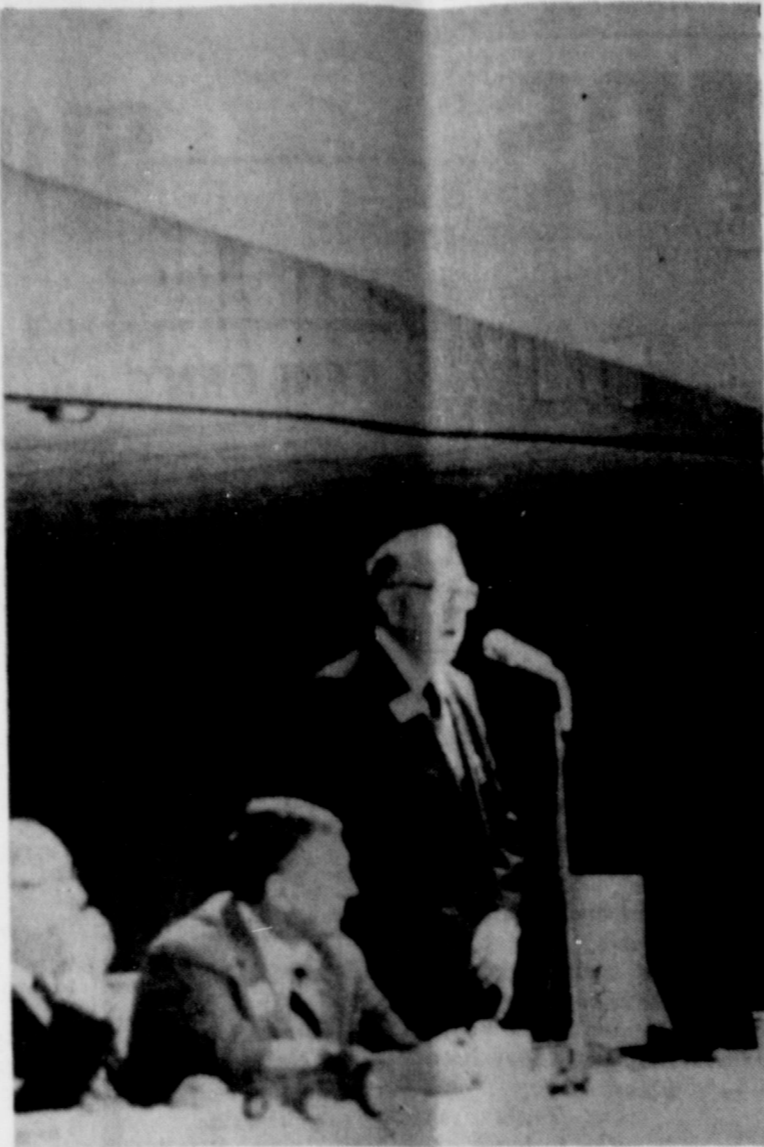
State Highway Department Officials Mark Goode and John Butler served as guest speakers during the catered bar-b-que held at the McLean Country Club.

The ribbon-cutting ceremonies officially cut the link of old Route 66 connecting Chicago to Los Angeles by way of the Texas Panhandle.

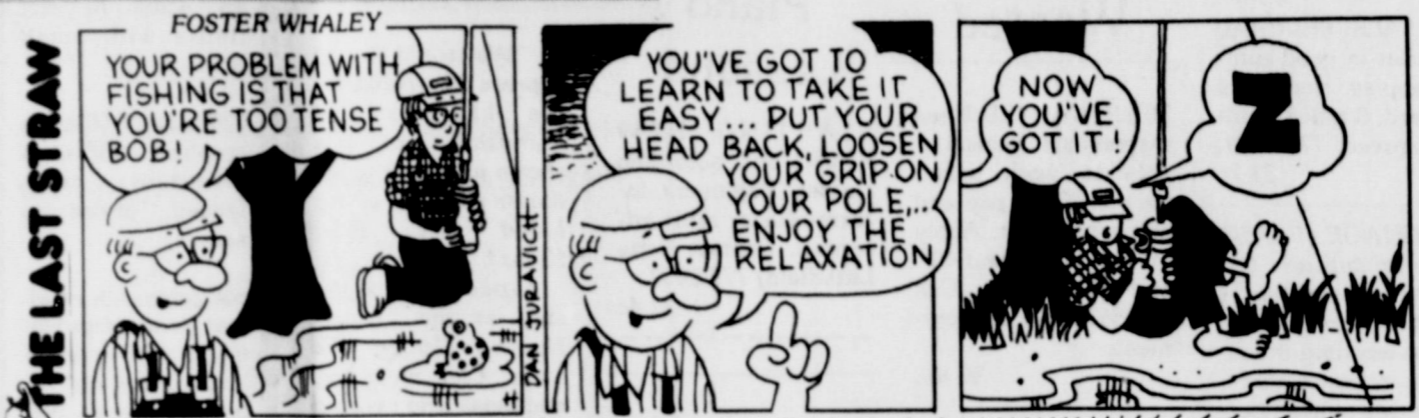
The ceremony dedicated the opening of the last link of Interstate-40, which bypassed McLean in June.

You're Cooking

The wave of health food devotees and vegetarians has increased the availability of foods few Americans knew about a decade ago.

Here is a molded salad — Americana at its best — but with fresh bean sprouts, mushrooms, chives and sunflower seeds among its ingredients. This is a crunchy, well-seasoned treat that goes well with barbecued meats and poultry or summer salads.

- VEGETABLE GARDEN MOLD**
- 2 packages unflavored gelatin
 - 2 cups cocktail vegetable juice
 - 1 cup ginger ale
 - 1 tablespoon soy sauce
 - Generous dash garlic powder
 - 1/2 cup fresh bean sprouts
 - 1/2 cup thinly sliced mushrooms
 - 1/4 cup shredded carrot
 - 1/4 cup thinly sliced celery
 - 2 tablespoons chopped chives
 - 1/4 cup sunflower seeds

In a saucepan, sprinkle gelatin on 1/2 cup vegetable juice to soften. Place over low heat, stirring until gelatin is dissolved. Remove from heat. Add remaining juice, ginger ale, soy sauce and garlic. Chill until slightly thickened. Fold in vegetables and sunflower seeds. Spoon into 5-cup mold or individual molds; chill until firm. Unmold on salad greens; garnish with additional shredded carrot. This kitchen-tested recipe makes about 4 1/2 cups, 4 servings.
