Carr Honored By Nation's Attorneys

Texas Attorney General Waggoner Carr was last week named the nation's "Outstanding Attorney General" by the National Association of Attorneys General at its 60th annual convention in Cleveland, Ohio.

By unanimous vote, the assembled attorneys general of the 50 states awarded Carr the Wyman Award which is presented each year to the attorney general who has done more to advance the objectives of the National Association of Attorneys General to help make the United States a better place for all in which to live.

The announcement of the award was made by the president of the national association, Louisiana Attorney General Jack P. F. Gremillion. The award, highest honor that the nation's attorneys general can bestow upon one of their members, was first initiated in 1957. Last year's winner was

FOR WANT OF A VOTE

A single vote can conceivably be as important as the legendary nail-for want of which an important battle was lost.

Elections at all levels of government have been won or lost on the basis of a handful of votes. This could happen June 4 when one major state-wide race—for attorney general—and many important local races will be decided.

On the county level, the race for Gray County judge between the incumbent, Bill Craig, and Pampa lawyer A. J. Carubbi Jr., is of most interest to McLean citizens.

Several factors have prompted the prediction that the voter turnout could be one of the smallest in Texas history—with possibly as few as five per cent of Texas citizens going to the polls.

First of all, it is a non-Presidential election year, and this always decreases voter interest. Second, there is not a contest for the governor's race, and this has traditionally diminished interest in the second primary.

A final warning sign was the rumor immediately following the first primary on May 7 that some counties without locally contested races weren't even going to hold a second primary. The State Democratic Executive Committee responded with a resolution calling attention to the fact that every county is required by law to hold a runoff election, and the penalty for failure to do so can be a fine or imprisonment for party officials.

For want of the votes of Texans who don't care enough to go to the polls June 4, a very small majority of the citizens could elect some of its most important office holders. And the big battle to get the majority of Texas voters to exercise their responsibility as citizens would be lost!

McLean Rodeo Starts Next Wednesday

A parade through downtown McLean Wednesday afternoon at 4 p.m. is the first event on the agenda for this year's McLean 66 Roundup Rodeo and Horse Show.

Area sheriff posse and riding clubs have been invited to participate in the parade. Plans have been made for a prize to be given to the best decorated bicycle entered.

June 1, 2, 3 and 4 are the days scheduled for the 1966 rodeo, with performances to start at 8 p.m. each of the four days, Wednesday through Saturday, at Felton Webb Arena, north of the city on SH 273.

Contestants for the rodeo are already calling here to report that

they plan to compete for the \$2,500 in prize money and the \$225 trophy saddles in the various events.

Rodeo events, each of which will have a \$400 purse and \$20 entry fee, include: Saddle bronc riding, bareback bronc riding, bull riding, calf roping, heading and heeling and bull dogging.

Agon this year, a wild horse race is planned with a \$5 jackpot and \$100 added.

For the second year, the winner of the girls barrel race in two go-rounds will receive a barrel racing saddle. A \$15 jackpot also is offered in this competition for women and girls.

Flip Breedlove of Clarendon, famed in the Panhandle for his

barbecues, will prepare another barbecue for the celebration. Serving will be at 5 p.m. Saturday at City Park at \$1 per plate.

On Saturday, June 4, at 10 a.m., the approved AQHA Horse Show and approved cutting horse contest will get underway. Horses from several states are expected to be entered.

Curly Dougherty of Oton will be the judge. He replaces Jimmy Meeks of Lovington, N. M., who is unable to attend.

Over \$300 in prize money is being offered in this year's Derby Town Fiddlers contest, set for 1 p.m. on June 4 at City Park. Some of the outstanding fiddlers

from Texas have indicated they will be on hand for the contest. The Junior Chamber of Commerce will operate a concession stand at the contest.

Added Feature

Instead of the usual calf scramble, an added feature in this year's rodeo will be a goat sacking contest for children 10 years of age and under. Prizes will be awarded to the winners in this event. This contest will take place at Saturday night's performance.

Two new attractions have been added to this year's celebration, one being the Registered Youth Activity Show, slated for June 4 from 11 a.m. until 2 p.m. Entries must be in by 9 o'clock that morning.

Beautiful trophies, donated by the American Quarterhorse Association will be given away. Age limit for the youth show is 18 years of age.

The other added attraction will be the McLean Rodeo Queen contest. The girl selling the largest amount of saddle tickets over 25 will be crowned queen, and will receive a gift certificate. The queen will be recognized at the final performance of the rodeo.

Barbecue Tickets to Go on Sale

Cecil Seaney, McLean Rodeo Association president, said Wednesday that tickets for the barbecue will go on sale Monday. Several merchants will have the tickets on hand for anyone wishing to purchase them early.

Rev. Leo McMahan will be principal of the school. Everyone from beginners to intermediates is urged to be present.

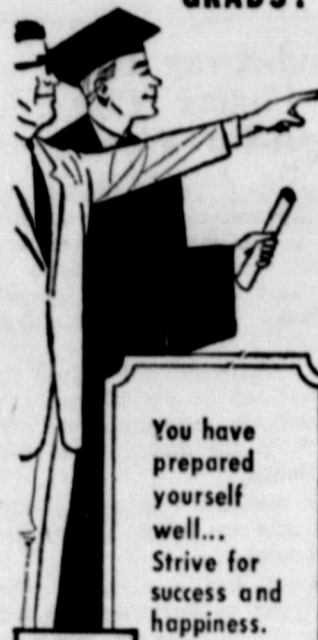

A dam was staked on the Johnson Ranch northwest of Alameda. Row direction was laid out for W. B. Jackson, Vernon Baggerman and Leon and Bill Bohr.

Brush control pays dividends for Hyattsville, Wyo., rancher. In 1952 this rancher started spraying sagebrush. The results were tremendous. His grass production increased from 343 pounds of grass per acre to 1143 pounds of air dry grass per acre. Records of grass production were kept for six years, and the increase of grass in brush controlled pastures was significant every year, ranging from 200 per cent to 400 per cent increase.

Mrs. Vera Dial Dickey, who ranches between Lefors and McLean, plans to spray about 3,000 acres of sagebrush and shinnery this spring.

Johnny Haynes and Harvey Hudgins also plan to spray sagebrush.

Brush controlled pastures carried 24 per cent more cattle, increased gain per head 31 pounds, and produced 48 per cent more beef per acre during a 10-year grazing comparison at the Woodward Experiment Station.

Agriculture Unifies City and Farm Youth Through 4-H Work

The U. S. farm is no longer an outpost away from the mainstream of city life. And it's been years since the outward appearance of a farmer has been noticeably different than his city cousin.

An example of the disappearing barrier between city folks and rural folks is the 4-H Club youth.

At this present time almost every 4-H boy and thousands of 4-H girls are enrolled in the 4-H agricultural program sponsored by International Harvester Co.

This estimate is based on the 1965 enrollment totaling 963,379 members, an increase of nearly 71,000 over 1964; and up 141,764 from 1963. Many of these young farmers spend as much as 10 years on 4-H projects relating to farming and agri-business.

Scores of success stories are reported, profits made and futures secured. But hand in hand with success and security are disappointment, failure, loss or a move from the farm necessitated by economic pressures.

Hardly ever, though, does the young farmer fail to gain from his experiences. Working close to nature teaches self-reliance and discipline, he finds.

The complexity and high cost of modern farming compels rural teenagers to keep informed on tested methods for producing the

Doctor in the Kitchen

DON'T TRY TO BE A MEDICINE MAN

People occasionally ask me if they should alter their diets for fear of cholesterol.

I take it they are being influenced by publicity they've seen that suggests fats in the diet, particularly those containing cholesterol, may be a cause of heart disease.

Well, they may be one cause of some heart disease. There's a good deal of evidence that suggests this. But the evidence is far from conclusive. There are other factors, too, that are implicated in heart diseases. There is no reason to panic and we need some fats in our diet.

Cholesterol and Blood

The whole scientific controversy swirling around cholesterol concerns whether too much of it in your blood can in fact cause a heart attack, or set up conditions that in turn make a heart attack more likely. While a lot of evidence points that way, the fact remains there are people with high blood cholesterol levels who never have a heart attack. And there are people with low blood cholesterol levels who do. The body makes its own cholesterol. A proper level of cholesterol in the blood is normal.

The medical profession is not in full agreement about cholesterol. Meantime, we do know there are very good reasons for not tampering needlessly with the basic American diet that has rendered so many health benefits to our population. Also, we know heart disease probably has multiple causes. It is generally agreed that lack of exercise, heredity, smoking, obesity and high blood pressure are involved as much or more than diet. So are dietary factors other than fats, including

What to Do

You can do something about exercise. So can you, if you have enough will power, do something about smoking. High blood pressure and obesity? You should see your doctor about these, unless your overweight is not that serious. One can lose some excess weight by simply eating less of everything.

But don't tamper with your diet in terms of trying to affect delicate changes in the amounts and kinds of fats you eat. You've heard of animal fats and vegetable fats—also polyunsaturated, monounsaturated, and saturated fatty acids? See your doctor about these. If he thinks your risk of a heart attack is such that your diet should be modified, he'll say so. And he will know how to do it, taking into account all sorts of other things he knows about your general health or special problems you may have.

Guidance Is Important

Besides, without guidance you would probably fail to affect any significant change in your blood cholesterol level. This is the opinion of authorities who are experienced in such things. And also remember, as we said earlier, no one really knows the exact role of cholesterol in your blood in relation to your heart. Your doctor is the man to see about these things. Don't attempt to be your own medical man, or your neighbor's.

Snake Season Here; Watch Your Step!

The snake season is in full bloom, along with the wild flowers and the safe and pretty natural accoutrements.

A Texas Parks and Wildlife Department spokesman cautioned that trips afield to explore enticing tracts of bluebonnets and other flowers very often means contact with snakes.

If and when a person, without his snake leggings or flak vest, finds himself face to face with a big bad snake, here's what the department's official snake guide suggests:

"If a poisonous snake is discovered close by, the best protection is to remain as still as possible until the snake has moved away. It should be remembered that a snake is quick to strike at a moving object, so to quickly step away at such a moment may be disastrous.

"If a rattlesnake is heard nearby but can't be located, do not begin wild dash to safety. Location of the snake may be misjudged and by taking a step you are likely to walk into, rather than away from, it. Again, remain still until the snake is sighted and, when it is certain the snake is at least five or six feet away and no others are nearby, slowly back away. If you must move away, do so as slowly as possible."

 Put a layer of potatoes in a greased baking dish and sprinkle with some of the flour, salt, and pepper. Repeat until all the potatoes are used. Pour milk over potatoes and dot with the fat.
