Former Resident Spotligted In College Newspaper

(EDITOR'S NOTE: The following article was published in the Feb. 14, 1980 edition of THE RANGER, the newspaper of Amarillo College. Frank Rodgers was a long-time resident of McLean.)

He's up at 4:30 every morning to get in a couple of hours of study before school. He has a 90-plus grade point average and works as hard as any student in the program.
But Frank Rodgers isn't just any student.
He can tell you about the dust bowl years and following the oil fields from boom-town to boom-town. He can tell you about living in the Oklahoma "Indian Nation" as a boy and many years of sweat and hard work as a driller in search of "black gold."

Frank is 72 and is completing his first quarter at the Amarillo College School of Vocational Arts.

Born near Pontoc, Miss. in 1907, Frank came to Amarillo five years ago from McLean, Texas where he had lived since 1930.

Moving to the Oklahoma "Indian Nation" near Osage when he was a year old, he began to follow the oil fields as a young man and eventually went on to own his own drilling company.

Frank tells of the time during the dust bowl days when, one day, while working nights in the oil fields around Dumas, Texas he had gone in to get some sleep.

He opened a window for some air and while he was sleeping the dust blew in.

"When they woke me up they thought I was dead. The dust had covered me," Frank said. I worked in Kansas when you had to find out which roads were open each evening before you went in. It was just like snow the way the sand would

drift."
The dust is gone and the years spent laboring in the oil fields are over and now Frank is studying to become a television man. He says he will probably open a repair shop of his own after his schooling.
What were his thoughts on coming back to school after all these years?
"I was afraid I wouldn't make it, he said, I haven't been to school in 40 years."
Well, Frank's not only making it, he has a 90-plus grade point average.
"It's been a lot of work and a lot of study and I guess I have to study as hard as anyone. I study at home and here at school,"

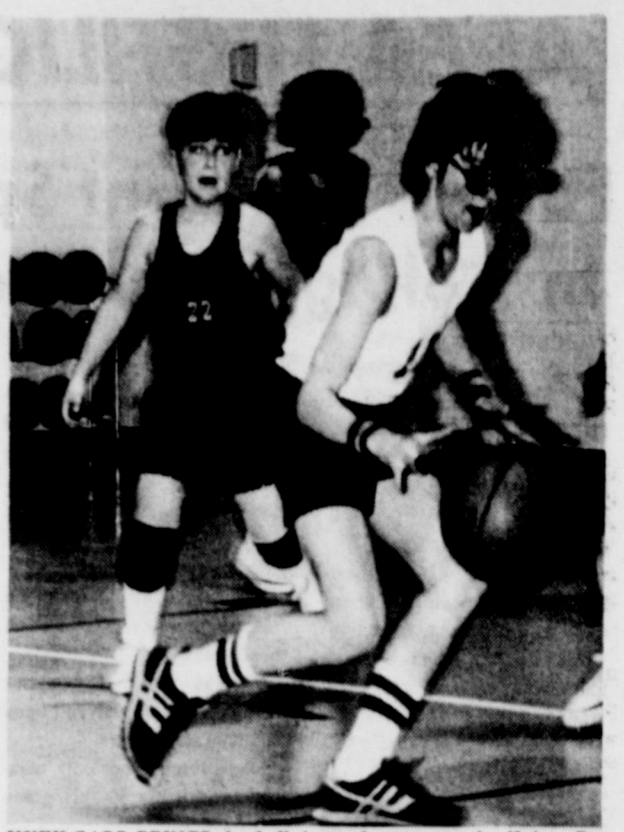

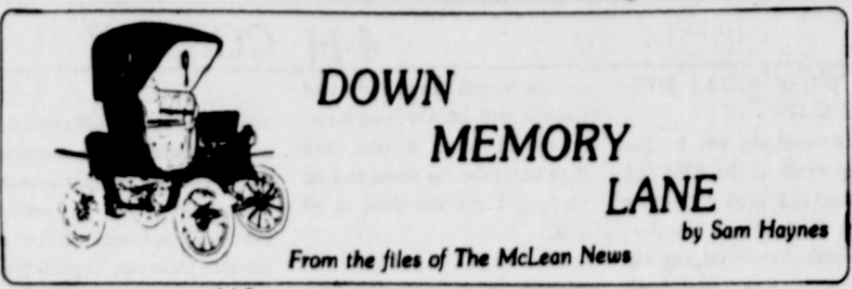

That evening at 7 o'clock a demonstration will be presented on the basics of training and riding horses in the snaffle bit. Don and Kamber Ulmer, Professional trainers from Acampo, Calif., will present the demonstration.

A second training program at the pavilion at 1 p.m. on April 8 will conclude the three-day

short course. This will consist of a demonstration on training, riding and successfully showing the same horse in several events. Emphasis will be on western pleasure, English pleasure (hunt seat), reining and barrel racing. Conducting the training will be Tommy and Chris Manion, professional trainers from Aubrey.

Dr. Bill Tyznik, professor of animal science at Ohio State University, will be a featured speaker during the Monday session at Rudder Center on the A&M campus. He will discuss "Nutrient Requirements of Various Classes of Horses" as well as "The Economics of Feeding Horses." Other speakers will include Dr. Jack Kreider, A&M associate professor of animal science, who will talk about "Recent Advances in Broodmare Management," and Dr. John Bowen, A&M associate professor of veterinary medicine, who will discuss

"The Current Status of Reproductive Diseases in Horses."

The program on Tuesday morning will feature a discussion by Dr. Dale Lovelace, Extension area forage specialist at Dallas, on "How to Make Pastures Pay on Your Horse Farm." Also, Kreider and Dr. Gary Potter, A&M professor of animal science, will review highlights of horse research at Texas A&M, and Potter will discuss "The Digestive System of the Horse and Feeding Management Implications."

In The Kitchen

My favorite dessert is pie...any kind! These two pies are among the best that I've ever tasted (with the exception of Isabel Cousins Chocolate Pie, which is the best in the world!)

GOLDEN PEACH PIE

Pasty for 2-crust pie
3 c. frozen sliced peaches
1 c. peach juice
1 1/2 tbs. brown sugar
1 1/2 tbs. sugar
2 1/2 tbs. quick cooking tapioca
1 1/2 tbs. cornstarch
1/8 tsp. ground cinnamon
1 tsp. lemon juice

Thaw peaches until most of the ice has disappeared. Drain off the juice, measure and stir into mixture of sugars, tapioca, cornstarch and cinnamon in saucepan. Heat rapidly until thickened. Boiling is not necessary. Set aside to cool.

Set aside to cool.

Add peaches and lemon juice to cooled, thickened juice. Pour filling into pastry-lined 9 inch pie pan. Cut vents in top crust; cover pie, seal and flute edge.

Bake in hot oven (425) 30 minutes or until browned.

CHOCOLATE CHEESE PIE

(Watch the calories on this one!)
9 inch Chocolate graham crust
1 (6 oz) pkg. semisweet chocolate pieces
1 (8 oz) pkg. cream cheese, softened
3/4 c. light brown sugar, firmly packed
1/8 tsp. salt
1 tsp. vanilla
2 eggs, separated
1 c. heavy cream, whipped

Melt chocolate over hot water; cool about 10 minutes.

Blend cream cheese, 1/2 c. sugar, salt and vanilla. Beat in egg yolks, one at a time. Beat in cooled chocolate. Blend well.

Beat egg whites until stiff but not dry. Gradually add in 1/4 c. sugar; beat until stiff and glossy.

Fold chocolate mixture into beaten whites. Fold in whipped cream.

Pour into chilled crust. Chill overnight.

CHOC. GRAHAM CRUST:

Mix thoroughly 1 1/2 c. graham cracker crumbs, 1/4 c. brown sugar, firmly packed, 1/8 tsp. ground nutmeg, 1/2 c. melted butter or margarine, and 1 square unsweetened chocolate, melted. Press into 9 inch pie pan. Chill until firm.
