The News Reel

A re-run of "The Ozona Story" as gleaned from the files of The Ozona Stockman

From The Stockman, May 1, 1939

Drenching rains which definitely broke a drought that has prevailed virtually since last fall and which was worth millions of dollars to the livestock industry soaked practically the whole of West Texas during the last four or five days. The heart of the stock raising section within a 200 mile radius of Ozona was visited by general rains ranging from one to four inches.

Crockett county's population has almost doubled in the last ten years, according to a preliminary census report made Thursday by Miss Edna Phillips, local enumerator for the United States Bureau of the Census. The total population of Crockett county was given as 2600, a gain of 1100 over the 1920 count and a gain of 1300 over the 1910 census.

Nearly \$3,000 worth of improvements are being made by the Crockett County Fair Association on its plant in preparation for the biggest rodeo race meet and stock show ever held when the 1939 show opens July 3 for a three-day run.

Lions and their ladies and invited guests will gather in the Hotel Ozona ballroom Monday night for a "Ladies Night" program in celebration of the beginning of the third year of the club's existence in Ozona.

From Sam Ashburn's Column in S. A. Times: There aren't many goat men in Crockett county. In fact a one-legged man could count them on his fingers and toes. About the only goat men are T. A. Despite the disappointments at Lubbock, Coaches Chick Womack and Sonny Cleere can look back on the most successful track season Ozona has ever had and look forward to a promising year next spring.

Lost from this year's squad due to graduation will be some of the team's most valuable members, Billy Bob Holden as well as David Sikes, Bobby Sutton and Dizzy Reeves.

Holden worked hard all year and proved himself an excellent athlete by taking part and winning points in a number of events.

Sutton, though not a great sprinter was a fine team man and anchored his 440 and mile relay teams exceedingly well. In the sprints and discus, Sutton always gave his all and that was good enough for points in most of the meets the Lions made this season.

Sikes, with still a shot at state honors, won or tied for first place in every meet the Lions entered after the first one and not many people can do better than that. Sikes occasionally took part in the mile relay and in the high and broad jumps where he scored in the district meet with two fourths in addition to his first in the vault.

On the brighter side of the picture both Tony Parker and Jim Doran had down years as sophs. This is not uncommon particularly in track and it is quite likely that both sprinters will come on

next spring and fulfill some of the promise they gave last year as freshmen.

Tommy Porter has come along very well and will doubtless be a key man in next year's plans if he continues to show the type of running he displayed late this spring.

In Jim Williams the Lions have a proven discus champion as well as an able sprinter who may be used a great deal more in that field next season than in the past schedule.

Bob Meinecke won second place in the shot and the pole vault and will be favored in the latter event next year. Meinecke's returning vaulter, Johnny Jones, has proven an able member of the mile relay and is a fine competitor wherever used.

Freshman Carl Montgomery and Phillip Carnes along with Soph Jim Freeman all promise to add strength next fall and in Alonzo Galindo the Ozona coaches will have the top half miler in the area in all likelihood.

Joe McMullan is a proven cham-

plon in the high hurdles and can get points in the low hurdles. Joe still hits too many hurdles and next year if he stops that practice he will be down to 15 and maybe a little below which will win most meets and get him to Austin.

Big Lake and Junction will be stronger but the Lions will still have the edge unless the boys slacken their own pace.
