Surprising Lion Winners Take Two From Del Rioans

Strong But Aggressive
Lion Seans Fast In
New Season

Ozona Lions made it two in over the Del Rio Wildcats Tuesday night as they led into a first quarter lead where in front all the way, 57 to 40.

Lion win was a real team effort with Muggins Good and Johnnie leading the attack with points each, while Jimmy Freeman was the outstanding defender. Jim Williams and Bill Meinhardt did a fine job rebounding.

They sent the Lions into their lead with two free shots and a field goal and from there, Wildcats were never able to get front even though a strong quarter rally did pull them in six points of the Lions before Roy Killingsworth popped in straight goals to offset Del Rio scoring and send the Lions to intermission with a 22-16 lead. Best of Del Rio was the point producer with 10 of which were scored in four minutes that Freeman had on the bench in the second quarter. Postoffice Seeks Speed-Up Holiday Mailing Schedule

Patrons Asked to Use
Mail Sacks In Lobby
For Card Mailing

Ozona Postmaster Floyd Hokit announced this week that mail sacks had been placed in the lobby of the local office to receive Christmas card mailings in an effort to speed up holiday mail delivery. The plan was used last year and proved a big help to the office personnel in processing the heavy mail volume.

The lobby receiving sacks are marked "Local," "Texas" and "Out of State," and patrons are asked to bundle their Christmas cards, all faced the same way, and tie them with string provided. The bundled cards then should be placed in the proper sacks.

The lobby sacks, are, of course, a temporary arrangement, designed primarily to speed up the handling of greeting card mail. Patrons are asked to place air mail letters or cards in the regular out-going drop slot. Patrons are also urged where at all possible to have all local cards mailed at least a week before Christmas to insure delivery.

Postoffice patrons may also help in solving the holiday rush by clearing their mail boxes as often as possible thus preventing a ball-up in the distribution.

Regional postal officials are expecting the Christmas mail volume this year to break all previous records thus pointing up the need for early mailing of packages and greeting cards.

Wildcat Is Located, Producer Assured In Crockett Oil Activities

James E. Lyles, Midland, will drill a 2,000-foot wildcat, 1 1/4 miles due east of the two-well southeast portion of the Block 47 (Shallow) field of Crockett County, eight miles southeast of Big Lake. It is the No. 1-19-University.

Location, on a 320-acre lease, is 2,390 feet from the south and 330 feet from the west lines of 19-44-University Lands.

Third producer and a location southeast extension to the Millard, North (Queen) field of Crockett County was assured with the swabbing of three barrels of new oil per hour at R. E. Sutton, Midland, No. 2 H. M. Half Estate, in 63-1-1&GN, 6 1/2 miles southeast of Iraan.

Recovery was through perforations between 1,372-414 feet. Operator was preparing to fracture through lower Queen perforations between 1,444-456 feet, with 10,000 gallons and test.

The project indicated production in the Soma sand while being drilled, when it blew out at 875 feet, making gas at the rate of 6 million cubic feet per day, and again at 980 feet, also in the Soma sand, flowing unreported amount of gas.

The Blue Danube Oil Co., Fort Worth, No. 1 Henderson, a Crockett County wildcat in 7-M-GC&SF 20 miles southwest of Ozona and seven miles southwest of the Reservoir (3,200-foot) field, encountered a show of oil at 2,500 feet.

No other information was available.

Ranchmen Asked To Sign Brucellosis Control Petitions

Copies of petitions seeking to establish a brucellosis control program for Crockett county have been placed in several business places in Ozona for the convenience of ranchmen who wish to sign them. Dick Henderson, chairman of the brucellosis control program for this county, announced this morning.

Decision to launch an effort to get the program in operation in this county was reached at a recent mass meeting of ranchmen here and Mr. Henderson was named as chairman to direct the sign-up campaign.

In order to put the control plan into operation, 75 percent of cattle owners in the county must ask for it and the number must represent 51 percent of cattle numbers as determined by the tax rolls.

Copies of the petition have been placed at Ranch Feed & Supply Co., the Devil's River Feed Co., Ozona Wool & Mohair Co., and the Ozona Boot & Saddlery. Ranchmen are asked to call at one of these places and sign the petition.

Moore Bros., Allen & Lemley Angus Bull Sale Set For Dec. 16

The annual Moore Bros., Lemley and Allen Angus bull production sale will be held next Wednesday Dec. 16, at the Western Livestock Commission Co. in San Angelo. The sale will start at 12 noon with an estimated 300 head of serviceable age bulls offered.

In 1951 this sale, featuring the entire production of the three prominent breeders, was started with the idea of supplying top quality bulls for commercial breeders in the West Texas area, supplying them with animals that were acclimated to the country.

A feature of the sale is the fact that the offering has not been topped. The entire production of the three breeders is offered, with the exception of culling off the bottom. The growers claim this year's offering will surpass any sale of past years in size of bulls, big, rugged animals, well grown out, not too fat for service, fertility, bangs and tuberculosis tested.

One Dead, Another Seriously Injured In One Car Crash

Florida Man Dies In-
stantly When Car
Strikes Bridge

Crockett county's record of 115 deathless days in traffic accidents came to a sudden and grinding halt early Tuesday morning when a 1956 model Ford Thunderbird convertible in which two Florida men were riding crashed into a bridge over Howard Draw 16 miles west of Ozona killing one of the men instantly and seriously injuring the other.

Dead in the early morning crash is Joseph Frank DePadova, 22, of Miami, Fla., who was driving. Seriously injured and under treatment in the Crockett County Hospital is Vincent Ray Dankward, 27, of Hialeah, Fla., who was riding as a passenger in the front seat of the car.

The two men were returning to Florida after a business trip to California where they operated a fleet of trucks, according to information given investigating officers. Highway Patrolman Jack Holmes, who investigated the accident, expressed the belief that DePadova dozed at the wheel, the car swerving into the bridge abutment. The car was traveling east in the direction of Ozona. The right front half struck the bridge abutment and overturned in the middle of the bridge, coming to rest on its top. Both men were pinned in the wreckage.

Sheriff Billy Mills, first officer to reach the accident scene, said that gasoline was pouring from the overturned vehicle and that Dankward, unable to extricate himself from the tangled mass of steel, was begging for rescue. Sheriff Mills called the Ozona Fire Department and a truck was dispatched to the scene to wash gasoline from the highway and to avoid an outbreak of fire. It was not until a wrecker arrived and lifted the overturned car that rescuers could extricate the injured man from the wreckage. He was brought to the Crockett County Hospital in a Cody ambulance where his condition was reported fair yesterday.

DePadova suffered a crushed skull and other injuries. He was dead when rescuers reached the scene of the wreck. The car was a total loss, Patrolman Holmes said.

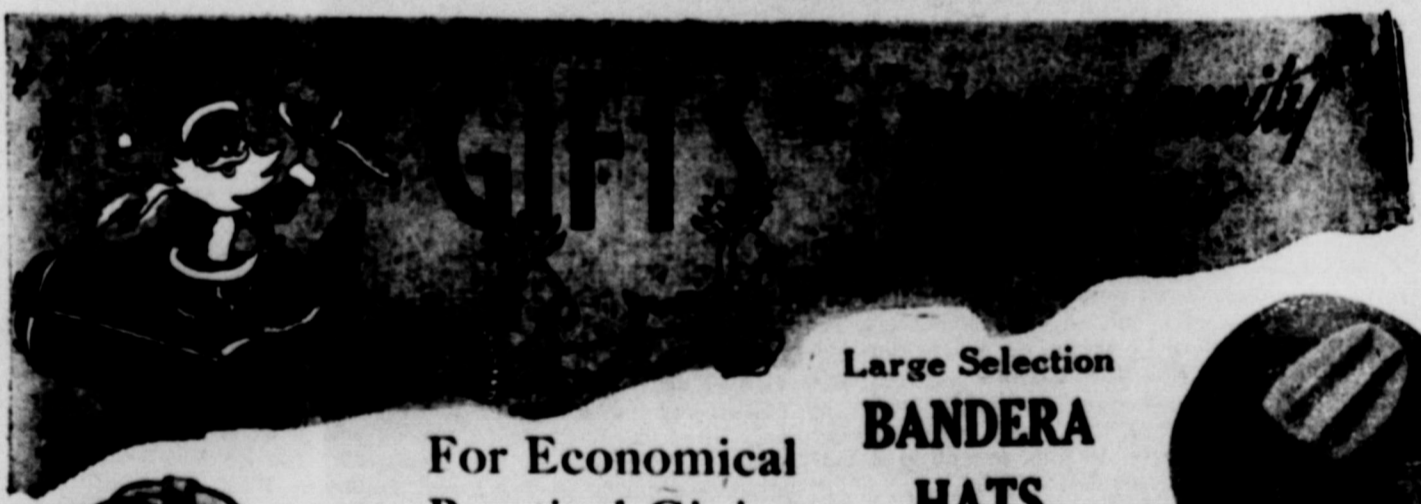

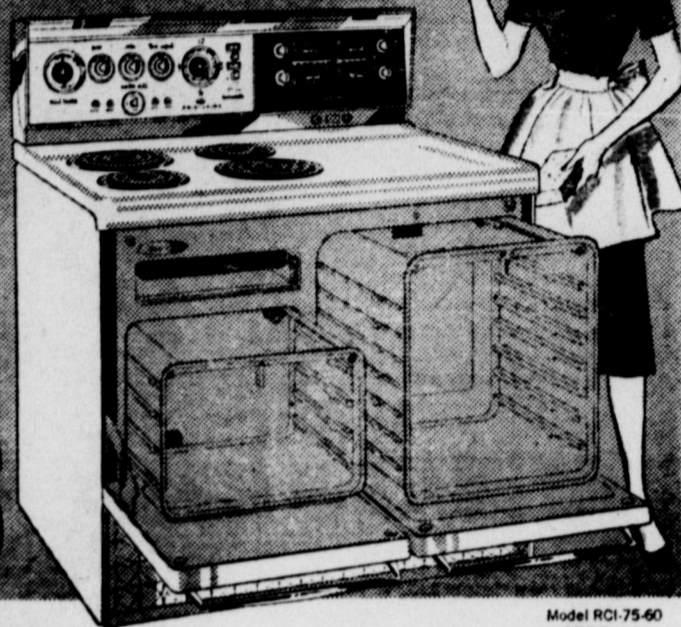

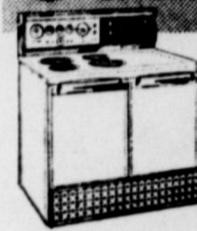

The News Reel

A re-run of "The Ozona Story" as gleaned from the files of The Ozona Stockman

From The Stockman, Dec. 11, 1930

Perner, and the Ozona Longhorns, captained by Haskell Leath, battled to a scoreless tie on the Powell field gridiron here Wednesday afternoon in a post-season game to benefit the local Christmas Seal sale. Coaching the Cubs was Miller Robison and coaching the Longhorns was Vic Montgomery. Teams were made up of pupils from the first, second, third and fourth grades. Gate receipts totaled \$13.10, divided equally between the four classes.

More than fifty Crockett county ranchmen and business men attended a mass meeting at the courthouse here Saturday to hear plans of the Eat More Lamb Club for a national advertising campaign to popularize lamb meat on American tables. In charge of Victor Pierce, Crockett county club chairman, and T. A. Kincaid, president of the Sheep & Goat Raisers Assn., principal speakers were Ed Blanton of San Angelo, editor of Sheep & Goat magazine, and Erle Racey, Dallas advertising executive. Mr. Kincaid, in introducing the speakers, called attention to depressed conditions in the sheep industry. He said that an individual, when he gets sick, calls a doc-

tor. The sheep business is sick today and needs a doctor. Business in this country has found that advertising is the best doctor for a sick business.

All previous records were broken by Ozona school children this year in the sale of tuberculosis Christmas Seals. The total sales reached \$105.

New Metropolitan Area Mail Service Proving Success, Survey Shows

Postmaster General Arthur E. Summerfield today announced wide-ranging improvements in

mail transportation that will mean better mail service for Ozona and 293 other communities in the San Antonio-Austin metropolitan area.

Discussing the program at a meeting of post masters in San Antonio Tuesday, George A. Gray, Regional Operations Director, said that more than two million people in the 64-county area, extending from the hill country around San Angelo to the Rio Grande Valley, would benefit by better mail service.

Barring infrequent delays in media of transportation and occasional distribution errors, first-class letters mailed at designated collection boxes or in the postoffice before 5-00 p. m. on a business day will be delivered on the first delivery at any office in the area on the following business day.

"Tests just concluded," Mr. Gray said, "proved the mail pattern to be exceptionally successful. Approximately 1,650,000 first-class letters originate on an average day in post offices inside the area. Approximately 63 per cent of this mail is destined for points within the area. We have tested our new service patterns and schedule with highly satisfactory results."

He pointed out that mail for and from offices outside the area, all over the United States, will be expedited by the new arrangement. Accelerating the flow of mail in the metropolitan areas, it was explained, is part of the national postal program, which has next-day delivery between any two major cities in the country as its long-range objective.

This is the 58th Metropolitan Area Plan established in the country, serving a population of more than 125 million people.

The revised mail pattern is based on the establishment of sectional centers to which mail from outlying offices is brought for consolidation and onward dispatch for connections with trunk line facilities at San Antonio.

The plan requires an intricate pattern of interlocking schedules using all transportation media on

schedules set up for one purpose—to give better mail service. For example, under this plan letters mailed in San Antonio and Austin at the post office or in design-

ated collection boxes before 5 p. m. on a business day will receive next-day delivery in all cities in the entire area, including all offices in the Rio Grande Valley.

Conversely, letters mailed in the and other offices in the area will receive citywide delivery the following business day in San Antonio and Austin.

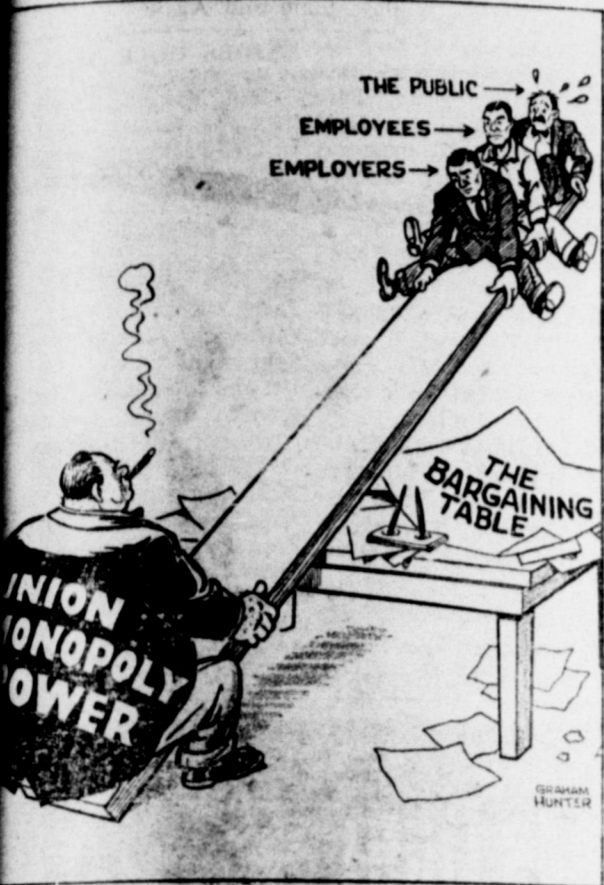

Notes From The County Agent's Office

By Pete W. Jacoby

In many consumer studies, it was found that people frequently purchased and used eggs "because we like them." This points up the wide acceptance of an egg's flavor, its versatility and ease of cooking, says F. Z. Beanblossom, extension poultry marketing specialist.

The egg, a breakfast "mainstay", is also widely used as a hearty luncheon dish, for sandwich fillings and in combination with other foods for satisfying dinners.

One of nature's most nearly perfect foods, eggs combine their heavy concentration of high-quality protein with relatively few calories, and complete digestibility and are accepted as an important dietary requirement from infancy through the "golden age" group. Two eggs supply as much as 30 percent of the high-quality protein needed daily by adult men or women. In fact, notes Beanblossom, egg protein comes so near to perfection that scientists use it as a standard to measure the value of protein in other foods. Eggs also contain substantial amounts of essential minerals and vitamins, including the anti-anemia vitamin, B12.

Basic egg cookery is something a youngster can master, it is so easy and uncomplicated. For the experienced cook, this means that eggs can be appetizingly prepared in minutes, in a variety of ways from soft-cooked to shirred, says the specialist. Eggs are ideally combined with sauces, salad ingredients, poultry and other seafood and meat foods that satisfy eager appetites without stretching the food budget... because eggs are economical, too.

reason why you can't make your own sausage, seasoned to your family's taste.

Louise Mason, Extension foods and nutrition specialist, says you can make up a pound, for example, on Saturday for Sunday breakfast. All the equipment needed is a sharp trimming knife and a food chopper.

Start with a small amount, so you can see how the seasoning pleases the family. If it isn't exactly right the first time, you can adjust the seasoning next time.

To make the sausage: Buy a rib-end pork loin roast — a cut that has about the right proportion of fat and lean for good sausage. (Generally, this is about a third fat and two-thirds lean.) Trim the meat from the bone except for the leanest portion which may be saved for pork chops if desired. Cut the meat in pieces small enough to go into the food chopper conveniently and then weigh it.

If you like high seasoning, here's a mixture for one pound of the meat. Mix thoroughly 2½ teaspoons salt; ¼ teaspoon black pepper; 2½ teaspoons rubbed sage; ½ teaspoon sugar. For milder seasoning, use half this mixture. Some people like to add a little clove, nutmeg or mace and cayenne pepper. One caution in varying seasonings: Never taste the raw sausage. Wait until thoroughly cooked. Mix meat and seasonings well.

A Needed Constant Reminder

Put through the food chopper, using the medium blade. Cover and let stand in the refrigerator overnight so the seasonings and meat will "blend." Form into patties.

To cook, place patties in a cold pan with no added fat and cook

over low heat until thoroughly done. Meat should have no trace of pinkish color.
