## Enumerators Census In County

### Workers Needed To Make Count

A full-time job, extending over a period of three to four weeks, is waiting for six persons in Ozona.

The United States government is about to begin its decennial census of persons in this country and because of enumerators are being organized throughout the country to make the count, starting about April 1.

Don Boston of Big Lake has been named crew chief of enumerators in a four-county area of West Texas, including Reagan, Upton, Crockett and Crockett counties and is seeking to organize a team of enumerators in each of the four counties.

Applications should be made immediately so that those selected may attend a three-day school of instruction to be held March 28, 29 and 30 to prepare enumerators for their tasks.

Either men or women may qualify for the jobs as enumerators, Mr. Boston said. Pay will begin for those who qualify at the opening of the school of instruction. Pay for some workers will be on a piece basis and for others on an hourly scale plus mileage. Preliminary tests will be given applicants this week-end if enough applications are received, Boston said.

Census forms are to be mailed throughout the United States within the next few days. Those receiving these forms should fill in the information requested to facilitate the work of enumerators who will call during the census taking period.

Iraan High school is the defending champion in the High School Division and will be present to defend its title as will Ft. Stockton be defending champion in the Junior High Division.

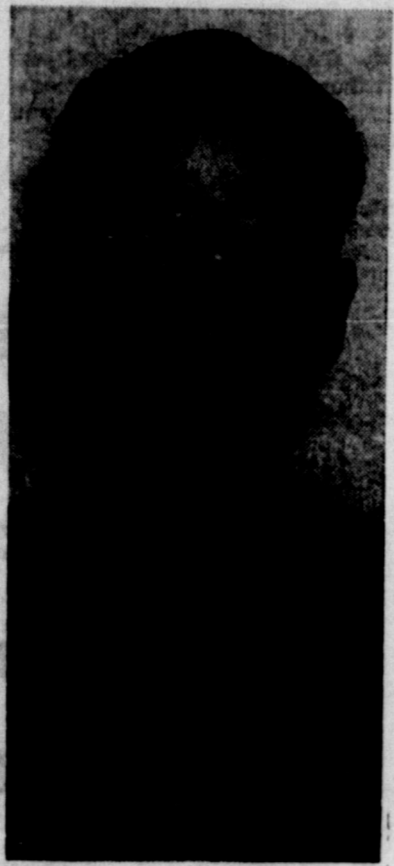
A number of conflicts kept several teams that usually come from starting this year's meet and Miss Knox stated Wednesday that she is considering changing the date next year if these conflicts continue.

## Kerrville Newsman Is Candidate For Legislative Post

### Carroll Abbott Seeks Post Vacated By Joe Burkett

Carroll Abbott, outstanding newspaperman and civic leader of Kerrville, will bring his campaign for State Representative for the 78th District to Ozona Saturday.

Abbott brings to his first political race a long history of service, not only to the Hill Country but to his state as well.

Two years ago, he formulated plans for a Friendship Flight to Alaska and drew a citation from Governor Daniel for bringing international attention to the friendship of Texans.

For the past two state Democratic conventions, Abbott has represented his home county. Abbott guided The Kerrville Times last year to being selected as the top small daily newspaper in the state by the Texas Press Association.

Abbott has been especially active in the ranching field. For five years, he has been a director and committee chairman of the Kerr County Livestock Shows Association, Inc. and helped other ranchers reactivate the Kerr County Wool Show.

Abbott is a director of both the Kerr County Chamber of Commerce and the Kerrville Jaycees. He is a member of the Baptist church, the BPOE and has long been active in P-TA affairs. He is a member at large of the Hill Country Boy Scout District and has been president of the Quarterback Club, a sports booster, for five years.

Abbott, 33, has been married for 13 years to the former Pat Black. They are the parents of three sons: Texas 10, Mark 5 and Patric 3.

Abbott plans to actively carry his campaign of "honesty and hard work, service for the people—ALL the people—all the time" to every community in the 10-county district.

## FFA Chapter Tours San Antonio Packing Plant, Stock Yards

Twenty-three members of the Ozona FFA Chapter, with their sponsor, Vocational Ag. Instructor M. A. Barber, and Mrs. H. C. Noelke, Jr., and Mrs. L. D. Long, visited in San Antonio Monday where they toured the Swift & Co. packing plant, the Union Stockyards and the George Lucky feed yards ten miles southwest of San Antonio.

The party took off at 5 p. m. from the vocational ag building, had breakfast in Junction, toured the packing plant in the morning, the stockyards and feed yards in the afternoon and got back to Ozona about 9 p. m.

At the Swift & Co. plant the boys and their sponsors visited the killing floor where cattle, hogs and sheep are slaughtered and then followed the carcasses through all their processes in the plant.

In touring the Union Stockyards, the boys received a full explanation of operations of the yards from commission company representatives at the yards.

At the gigantic George Lucky feed yards, the party saw the big scale feeding operations where approximately 11,000 cattle are on feed at all times and where approximately 33,000 cattle are fed out each year. They toured the feed mixing rooms, saw the big trench silo storage facilities and witnessed the mechanized feeding operations in the yards.

## Cattle Raisers Risk Isolation By Failure To Adopt Clean-Up Plan

By failing to adopt the brucellosis clean-up program, cattle raisers of Crockett county are running the risk of being isolated so far as movement of cattle from this county to market is concerned, spokesmen for the program pointed out this week.

Two adjoining counties, Pecos and Terrell, have completed their tests and are now designated brucellosis free areas. Other adjoining counties to the east and north are in process of making the clean-up tests and when surrounding counties are declared clean areas no cattle can be moved through them from an untested area without quarantine and testing.

Petitions on which signatures of 75 percent of the producers in the county and 51 percent of the cattle numbers is required have been out for several weeks here, at the feed houses, wool warehouse and at the Ozona Boot & Saddlery. Only about 70 signatures have been secured whereas a minimum of 106 will be required.

## Postoffice Mail Box Pilfering To Be Stopped Here

### Postmaster, Officers Take Steps To Catch Mail Thieves

Somebody in Ozona is taking some long chances with the federal laws in pilfering mail boxes in the local postoffice and sooner or later are going to face prosecution in federal courts on mail theft charges, with consequent severe penalties.

This was the prediction this week of Postmaster Floyd Hobit after a series of mail box break-ins in the local office and the looting of mail in recent weeks. Mail missed from boxes of local patrons has been found in weeds and shrubs around the courthouse and one opened package, taken from a box, was dropped in the street mail box in recent days, the postmaster said.

"Unless we can stop this pilfering, it may be necessary for us to lock the postoffice lobby at night, which would be a great inconvenience to a lot of patrons," Hobit said. He urged the cooperation of citizens in catching the mail box thieves by notifying officers when they see persons loitering in the lobby, and in preventing box break-ins by being careful to see that boxes are closed and the combination turned off the opening number. Boxes can be opened again if the combination is left in the opening position. Hobit pointed out, and he urged patrons to turn the combination dial after closing boxes.

An added attraction in this year's meet will be a special eight man mile relay. The winner will not get points toward the team championship but will receive a trophy to show for this effort.

The Lions finished a strong third in the Comanche relays in Ft. Stockton with their basketball players only two days with the squad and Coach Chick Womack, while moaning about the poor weather this spring, did say he felt the squad was stronger now.

A re-run of "The Ozona Story" as gleaned from the files of The Ozona Stockman

From The Stockman, Mar. 12, 1931

Reports or surmises that outbreak of scarlet fever among Ozona school children last week resulted from spread of germs from infected books used by students suffering from the disease last year were denied this week by Supt. John L. Bishop and Dr. G. Miller, county health officer. All books used by pupils with communicable diseases are immediately destroyed Mr. Bishop said.

John William Henderson, 77, one of the first settlers of Crockett county and a prominent rancher and financier here for 43 years, died in a San Angelo Hospital Wednesday night following an illness of nearly two years. Funeral services will be at 4 o'clock this afternoon from the family home, Rev. J. H. Meredith, pastor of the Methodist Church officiating.

By an overwhelming majority the bill by Senator Small of Wellington validating the title of surface owners of Texas school lands to fifteen-sixteenths of the minerals was passed by the House of Representatives in Austin Wednesday afternoon.

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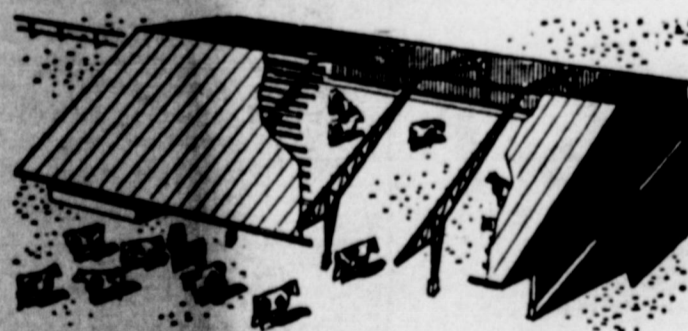

## Steve Preslar Comments

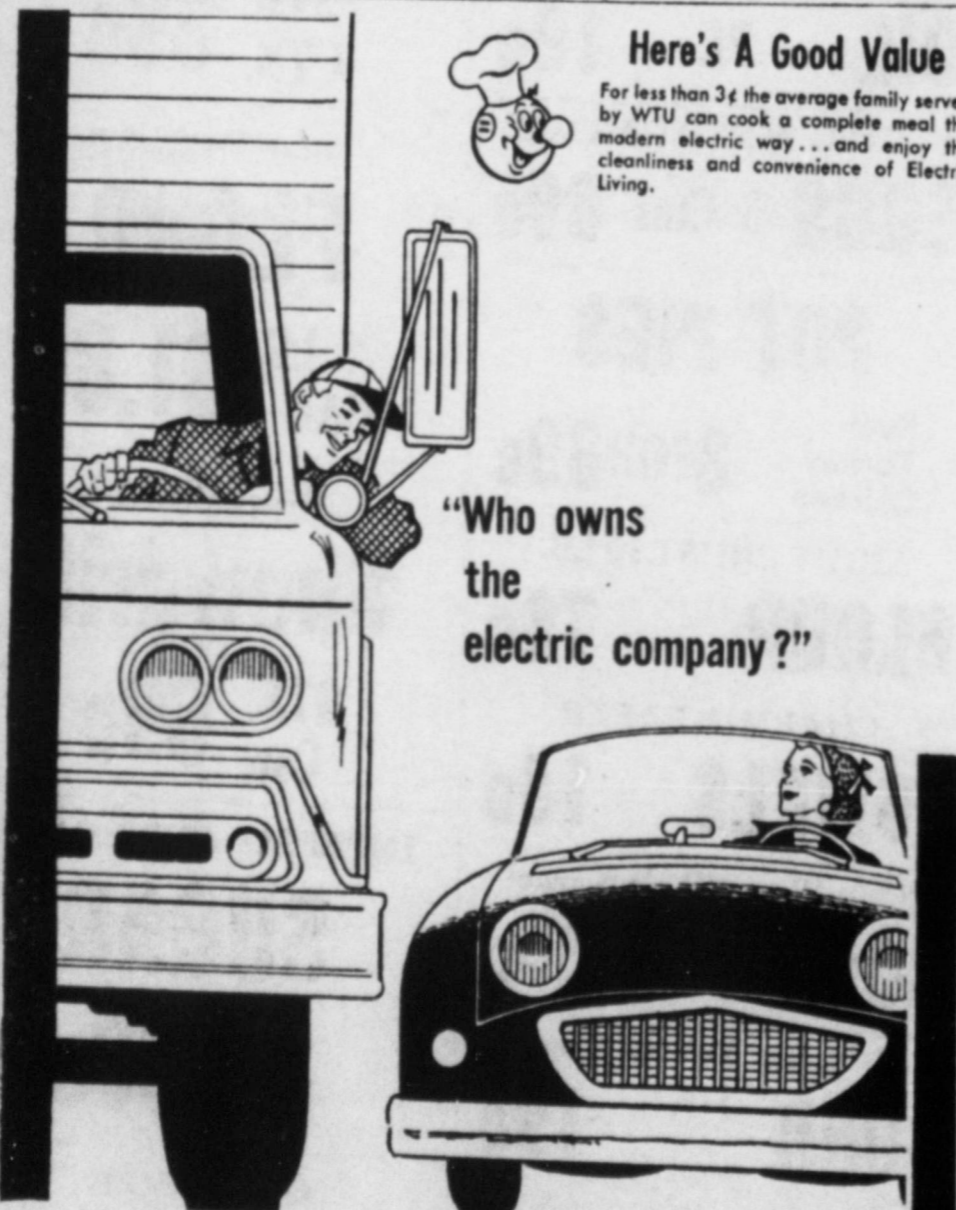
In our prior discussion column we have seen how the decisions of a Judge affect us, both directly and indirectly, even though we ourselves before the Court saw how the Judge interprets the Constitution, and the common law, so decisions made by the Judge determine what the law is. This adds up to the fact that the trial judge is a very important one, and brings us to looking at the method by which we fill that important office. The early formation of our government, there was much debate about whether judges should be appointed by the Executive or elected by the people. Our Constitution composed of the aristocracy believed in something of a class, ruled-by-the-few, but judges appointed by the government, while another led by Thomas Jefferson believed that the people should elect men who sat in judgment.

That debate is still going on today in our various states, some states having the appointive system and some states having the elective system, with the latter favoring the appointive system so largely on the basis of the man who sits in judgment should not have to be beholden to anyone. In an elective system it is said that people should have a right to elect the man who sits in judgment on them, and that it is better to be beholden to the man who elects him than to be beholden to one man for his appointment when that man may not be in the District, nor vote there, and be affected by the Judgments made there.

In Texas the matter is provided by our Constitution, which provides that judges shall be elected. In fact, so zealously do we guard our right to select our judges that our State Constitution provides that in the event of a vacancy the Governor shall have the right to appoint a temporary judge until the next election. Judgments are not made for the full term of the department, but only until the next election when the people shall elect their choice of one among them to be their judge.

It is well that a judge should be elected from among the people, because justice is done to the people as well as to the letter of the law.

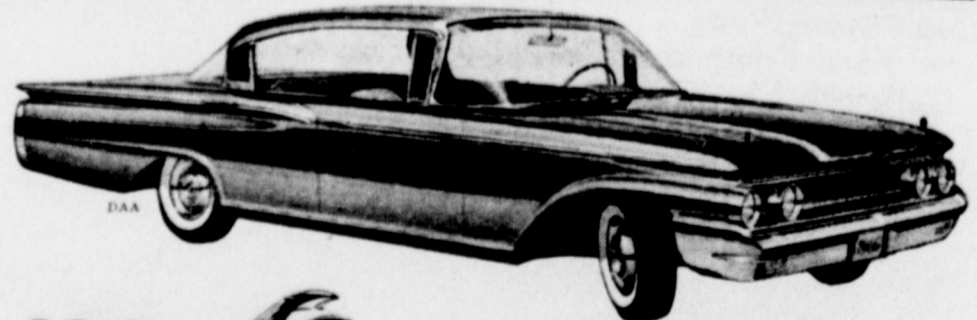
