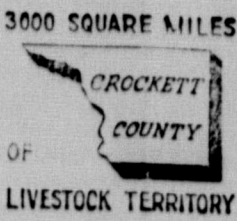

Funeral Service At 3 Today For Lee Childress, 81

Funeral services will be held at 3 o'clock this afternoon from the Methodist Church for Lee Childress, 81, retired rancher and long time resident of Crockett county.
Mr. Childress died late Wednesday afternoon in the Crockett county hospital after a prolonged illness. Services will be conducted by the Rev. Leonard Garrett, pastor, with burial in Cedar Hill Cemetery under direction of Janes Funeral Home of Ozona.
Mr. Childress was born Oct. 12, 1884, in San Angelo, the son of the late Mr. and Mrs. William Childress pioneer Crockett county ranching family. He had been a resident of Ozona 67 years, engaging in ranching operations over extensive holdings in this county until ill health forced his retirement a few years ago.
He was married to Myrtle Kincaid April 27, 1914, in Ozona. He was preceded in death by a son, Phillip Lee Childress, who died in 1948.
He is survived by the widow; two sons, W. A. Childress and James R. Childress both of Ozona; seven grandchildren and one great grandchild.
Mr. Childress is the last of four Childress brothers, sons of Mr. and Mrs. William Childress, who came to Crockett county shortly before the turn of the century. Preceding him in death were three brothers, Pleas, Hugh and Walter, and two sisters, Mrs. Roy Henderson and Mrs. Beecher Montgomery.

2 Wanted Men Nabbed In Early Morning Arrest

Two armed fugitives were taken into custody Friday morning near the Village Shopping Center around 3:00 by night deputy, Jack Hyde.
Becoming suspicious, when he noticed the two loitering around the center in a 1962 Falcon station wagon, Deputy Hyde stopped them and asked for a driver's license. The driver opened the glove compartment of his car and as he was apparently reaching for a pistol, Deputy Hyde drew his gun and took both men into custody.
A further check by the sheriff's department revealed that both men were armed, one with a 45 automatic and the other with a 32 revolver, and both were wanted by the F. B. I. as well as authorities in two states.
They gave their names as Reynold R. Hayward and Leroy L. Vass. The car the men were driving had been stolen in Orlando, Florida. Hayward waived extradition and will be returned there.
Vass was later identified as Edwin L. Jaeger, who escaped a Nebraska jail last August where he was awaiting transfer to prison on an armed robbery charge. He refused to waive extradition and is being held in the Crockett County jail pending the outcome of extradition proceedings.

A victory over the Sonora Broncos last Friday night ended the Lions' basketball season record at 1-1. The 59-53 win in the home opener was a hard-fought contest with the Lions pulling away in the final period after trailing 27-26 at halftime and 43-41 at the three quarter mark.
Earlier in the week the Lions lost 57-56 in the final seconds of play to the Eagles of Eldorado.
Tomorrow night the Lions will be in Crane to battle the tall AA club. An earlier contest with Crane had been canceled. This weekend the Lions' B-Team will be playing in the Garden City Tournament.
Tall Win Saunders 6'-4" led the well-balanced scoring attack in the Sonora game with 16 points. Pon Seahorn had 10 points, and Billy Carson, George Cox and Rex Bland had 8 points apiece. Trailing by two points going into the final period, Ozona scored 18 points and permitted the Broncos only 10 as they racked up win number one. Saunders grabbed 12 rebounds as the Lions hit on 25 of 63 field goals attempt for a 39.8% Sonora attempted 45 field goals but hit on 22 for a 48.8%.
Against Eldorado, Saunders hit for 18 points and Seahorn for 16 as Ozona fell 57-56. Leading 56-55 with less than a minute to play, Eldorado's Chris McCravery scored the winning bucket with 5 seconds remaining in the game. The Lions had taken a 4 point advantage at halftime, but the Eagles had knotted the count at 42-42 after 3 quarters of play.
In both games, the Lions gave indication that they will play an important role in the 4 team struggle for the West Zone Championship. Coach Brooks Dozier was well pleased with the Lions' performances and felt that the Ozona quintet had good potential (Continued on Last Page)

Not the first lady official in Crockett County history, but the first lady judge in its history took the oath of office last week.
Mrs. M. Brock Jones, widow of the late Crockett county judge who died of a heart attack a little over two weeks ago, was sworn in last Friday morning in the county clerk's office, with County Clerk Leta Powell administering the oath.
Mrs. Jones was appointed by the Commissioners Court to fill out the unexpired term of her late husband and after several days of consideration accepted the appointment at a special

In accepting the appointment, Mrs. Jones told the court that she felt honored to be considered for the post and accepted the responsibility only on the assurance of all county officials and employees of their full cooperation in assisting her to become familiar with the duties of the office and in its administration.
"I feel that it is a gesture of respect and appreciation for my husband's service and I and my children, of course, appreciate your thoughtfulness. Of course, my first responsibility must be that of a mother to my teenage daughter, but I feel that I will have enough free time to devote to it, and with your help and the help and counsel of all the county officials, I will be able to perform the duties of the office, and administer county business in a satisfactory manner. I ask your indulgence and that of the people of Crockett county until I have familiarized myself with the routine of the office procedures."
Mrs. Jones is the mother of two sons, Brock, Jr., a law student at the University of Texas, and Johnny, who has completed college work and has secured a real estate license and qualified for life insurance sales, and has set up in the business which was a sideline for his father after his election to the office of county judge.

Abel Conviction Upheld By Appeal Court - 12 Years

Texas Court of Criminal Appeals last week upheld the conviction of Arthur G. Abel and fixed his sentence at a flat 12 years, denying a plea for a rehearing. Abel was convicted here in 1964 of the burglary of Knox Motor Co. (now Wooten Motor Co.) on the night of September 26, 1964. He was sentenced to "not less than 2, nor more than 12 years."
Because of security reasons he has been held in jail at San Angelo since his 1964 trial. Recently he escaped from his jail cell and was apprehended in the lobby. Sheriff Billy Mills transported him to Huntsville Tuesday where he will serve out his sentence.

Both projects are in 2-I-GC&SF.
The No. 4 Suburban Propane Gas Corp., et al., 1/2 mile east of 3,056-foot Clearfork production, is 467 feet from the south and 1,980 feet from west lines.
The No. 5 Suburban Propane Gas Corp., et al., 3/4 mile northeast of 3,056-foot Clearfork production, is 1,350 feet from the south and west lines. Ground elevation is 2-490 feet.
Nearest Spraberry production is 11 miles to the northeast in the Ozona, Northwest multipay field.

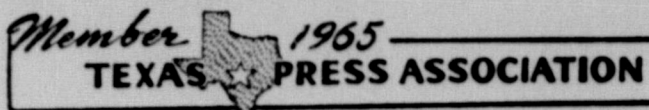

Pumpkin Bread

Sift together into mixing bowl: 3 1/2 cups sifted flour, 2 teas. soda, 1 1/2 teas salt, 1 teas. cinnamon, 1 teas. nutmeg, 3 cups sugar. Add, stirring until blended: 1 cup chopped pecans, 1 cup cooking oil, 4 eggs, 1/2 cup water, 1 can (1 lb.) pumpkin. Pour into 2 greased and flowered 9x5x3 inch pans. Bake in moderate oven (350 degrees) 1 hour. Remove from pan and finish cooling on cake rack.

This is a delicious easy holiday bread and one the whole family will enjoy.

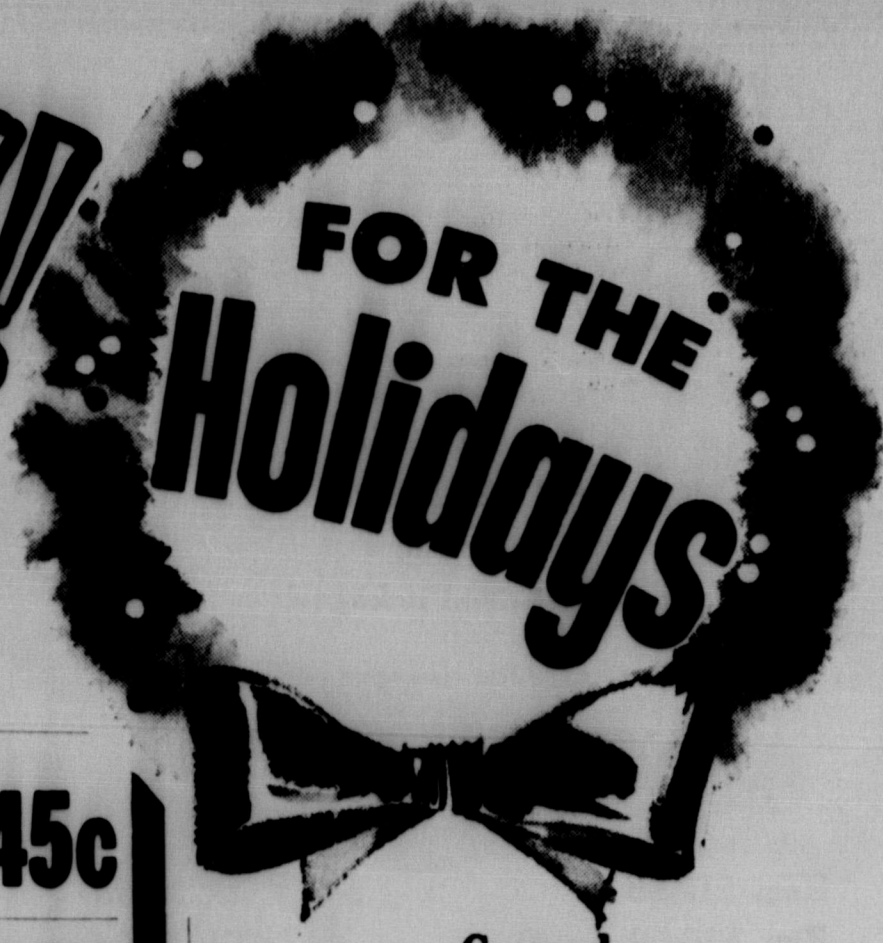

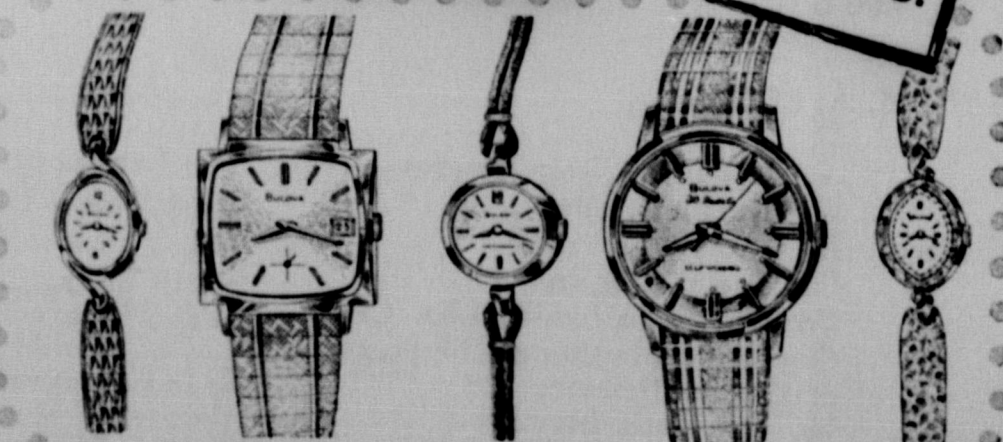

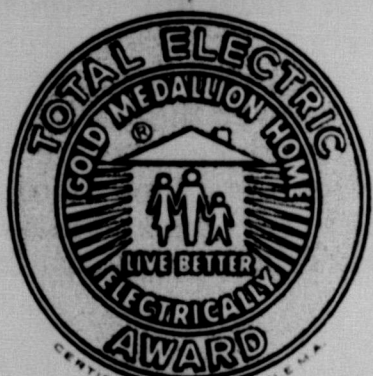

computers for the answer when all will be government workers. If you want to inject a real shocker into the discussion — current statistics show 1 of 7 civilians working for government — federal, state and local!

Perhaps the readers in your area might be interested in this serious national problem as it affects each one; there is something seriously wrong with our economy when the only manner we try to pay our way is to borrow and pass the I. O. U. on to the coming generations.


