

Two Extensions To Production In Northwest Crockett

The Crockett, South multipay field of Crockett County gained its fifth detrital producer and a location northeast extension to that pay with completion of Shell Oil Co. No. 8-L Hobbs, in the far Northwest corner of the county.

A number of the class members, whose age made them eligible, have passed the written portion of their Driver License test since the course was completed.




