Mrs. Butler Honored at Reception on Last Day as Telephone Employee

Below employees were honored yesterday, Wednesday, at a retirement reception honoring Mrs. Claudie Butler, who began her telephone career in 1927 as an operator in Ozona.

Close friends, Ozona business and civic leaders and telephone officials from San Angelo attended the affair in the Ozona business office General Telephone Company of the Southwest.

When Mrs. Butler first started to work for the telephone company in Ozona she served a one-position position switchboard and customers called the operator by turning the crank on the phone. As Ozona grew, two-position common battery board (operators answered when customers lifted receiver) was installed. Then a four position board was installed. In 1958, Ozona converted to dial operation and customers could dial their own local numbers during her telephone career.

Mrs. Butler worked on four different boards and served as operator, assistant operator, chief operator and was chief operator at the time Ozona converted to dial operation. She has been cashier.

Particular events recalled Mrs. Butler during her phone career include kneeling knee-deep into the dirt to help the operators during the Ozona flood in 1954.

Another event vividly recalled by Mrs. Butler was answering a distress call on a rural line. The caller didn't complete the conversation, Mrs. Butler realized something was wrong and asked the man's wife who was in town, an ambulance to a doctor. The man recovered from a severe case of emphysema.

Rufe Everett, 89, Early Settler Of Crockett Co Dies

Funeral services were held from the First Baptist Church here at 10 o'clock Saturday morning for Rufus S. Everett, 89, one of the earliest settlers in Crockett county. Mr. Everett, a retired rancher, died at about 4 p. m. Thursday in the Crockett County Hospital after an illness of two months.

Rev. Max Brown, pastor, conducted the services with James Funeral Home in charge of arrangements.

Mr. Everett came to Crockett county in the year of its organization in 1891. He settled at old Emerald, about five miles east of Ozona, when there were only six tents in the town which later competed and lost to Ozona in a voting battle for the designation as county seat of the newly organized Crockett county.

Mr. Everett worked as a ranch hand for about 15 years, making several trail drives to Brady, then the closest rail shipping point. In 1923 he bought a ranch on the Pecos river at the mouth of Howard draw and continued in the ranching business until age and ill health forced his retirement.

Survivors include the widow, Mrs. Fannie Mae Everett; two sons, R. J. and Thomas Edwin Everett, both of Ozona; a daughter, Mrs. Floyd Moss of Big Spring; two sisters, Mrs. Velma Gurtley and Miss Esther Everett, both of Del Rio; 11 grandchildren and 10 great grandchildren.

Johnny Johnson New Manager Of Ozona Chamber

Ozona Chamber of Commerce acquired a new manager this week with the arrival of Johnny Johnson, 27, former manager of the Morton Chamber of Commerce.

Johnson, his wife Janie, and their nine-months-old son moved to Ozona early this week to take over the Chamber managership which had been vacant since Luther Walker left for a similar post in Haskell in January.

Johnson is a graduate of McMurray College and has done post graduate work at both North Texas State University in Denton and the University of Houston.

Following graduation from McMurray, Johnson worked as director of the McMurray Alumni Association and while at North Texas taught one course in American History before taking over the Area Chamber of Commerce in Morton where he has served for the past fifteen months.

Johnson was recently appointed to the Chamber of Commerce Executive Association Committee in management in this area by the Committee chairman Roy Davis of Muleshoe.

Johnson was selected over a number of candidates who had applied for the post since it became vacant early this year.

First step toward getting work under way toward completion of a \$320,000 improvement program for Ozona public schools was taken Monday when the school board accepted bids on approximately \$20,000 worth of residential additions and painting.

W. L. Bishop of Comanche was the successful bidder on construction of bedroom additions on four of the teacher housing units in southwest Ozona. A bedroom and bath will be added to four

of the houses, bringing to eleven the number of houses in the teacher blocks with three bedrooms. Seven of the houses will continue with two bedrooms for teachers with smaller families.

Bishop's bid for the completed job of additions to the four houses was \$13,291.64, an average of \$3,325 per unit.

J. L. Trawick of San Angelo, contractor who built the Crockett county auditorium-coliseum, was a close second with a bid of \$13,864. Other bidders were Bill Taylor of Ozona Bill Wynne, J. D. Burke and D. E. Jackson, all of San Angelo.

The other project on which bids were taken was painting the outside trim on the high school building and the inside and outside of the Davidson Memorial gymnasium.

Two bids were received on this project. Harry Broncy of San Angelo being the low bidder with a bid of \$6,874. The only other bidder for the paint job was Bill Seward of San Angelo, whose bid was \$7,328.

The board had called for bids for a new lighting system at the football stadium but only one bid was received and the board took it under advisement. It is possible that bids may again be sought for this project.

The re-lighting project included the erecting of four new 80-foot steel towers on which new and more powerful lights were to be installed and the setting of new lights on four wooden poles, two at each end of the football field. This project not only will provide a better lighted playing field, but it will remove the big posts from in front of the grandstand — behind which most action in the game usually takes place.

Plans and specifications are nearing completion on the balance of the school improvement program. Included will be the construction of a library and two additional classrooms for the high school and two new classrooms at South Elementary school and three classrooms and needed additional rest rooms at the North Elementary.

Another project in the improvement program, providing a house for use of the superintendent, has been accomplished. The board has purchased the home of Mrs. J. M. Baggett for this purpose and will have possession not later than Oct. 1 of this year. Mrs. Baggett plans to move into an apartment at the new apartment complex being built by South Texas Lumber Co. in West Ozona.

Crockett Lands Make \$78,000 For University Fund

Lease sale on University lands in West Texas, held in Austin last week, was the most profitable held in the past nine years, figures revealed this week.

A total of 167 tracts embracing 49,222.695 acres was offered and 158 of the tracts were leased at an average bonus of \$215.21 per acre.

The total bonus received was \$10,166,000 and brought the permanent university fund up to \$442,000,000.

Crockett County's part in the sale brought a bonus of about \$78,000.00 on 3,219.80 acres leased.

The biggest bonuses came from land in the Delaware Basin which in some instances brought as high as \$572.10 per acre.

A breakdown of Crockett County leases showed that Standard Oil was the top bidder in points land secured with 1951.50 acres leased for \$24,000.00. Gulf, Sunray DX and Conoco were also big bidders in the Crockett County sale.

David Jacoby To Be Chairman 4-H Dist. Council

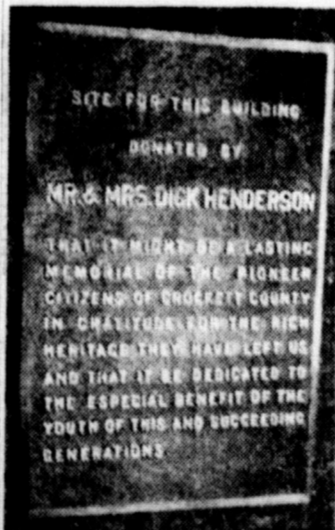

Park Service Plans Study Of Fort Lancaster

The National Park Service has advised Congressman Ward C. White of Texas that a regional park service plan will be in Ozona to visit the site of Ft. Lancaster, erected on banks of the Pecos River Crockett County a few years before the Civil War.

Remains of some old buildings still remain. The Crockett County Historical Survey Committee, under the leadership of Mrs. R. A. White, had asked Congress to assist in securing records of the old fort and to request assistance from the National Park Service in planning restoration of the old post.

Ben Sheppard, chairman of the Texas State Historical Survey Committee, in Arlington this week, also discussed the subject with park service. The Park Service, Congressman White already had a file on Fort, and is interested in cooperating with local state agencies in locating the ruins.

DO-IT-YOURSELF JOB

For a preview of what lies ahead for the 19 states with Right to Work laws should our Congressmen fail to support Taft-Hartley's Section 14(b), there is the night of June 10 at Garrett, Ind.

Here, in this state that had but recently repealed its Right to Work law — on the pious assertion of union bosses that, that was the way to peace and tranquility, two or three hundred goons of both sexes besieged a struck electrical equipment plant and held prisoner 70 workers, mostly women, through a night of terror.

Practically all of the plant windows were smashed, according to the Chicago Tribune report, the captive workers being cut and bruised by flying glass and stones. Thirteen workers' cars were damaged one destroyed by a gasoline bomb. An estimated 30 to 40 fires were set by railroad flares and gasoline bombs — in an abandoned church nearby, on the factory loading dock and variously around the plant.

The Garrett fire department responded to four calls to put out fires at the plant, and once to a false alarm that sent the fire-fighters to another part of town while a fire was set at the plant. This and other blazes were extinguished by police, on-lookers and even pickets. The violence, which began at six p. m. continued unchecked until three a. m. when Mayor C. E. Miller ordered the plant closed "for the safety and welfare of the community."

We are reminded by Executive Vice President Reed Larson of the National Right to Work Committee that these results of repeal in Indiana fail to support the testimony of Labor Secretary Willard Wirtz before a House Labor Subcommittee only two months ago. He called for repeal of 14(b) — which is that part of the Taft-Hartley Act that reaffirms the right of States to ban compulsory union membership — as "a very real con-

tribution to industrial peace." It's repeal would remove, he said, "one of the most serious sources of bitter labor-management suspicion and conflict."

Mr. Larson feels that since Secretary Wirtz is so obviously wrong, he ought to say so, and urge Congressmen to preserve 14(b) — and to defend those 19 states where workers do not have to pay job-rent in union dues against the wave of violence that repeal would touch off.

However, this is a job we think the voters can handle better for themselves — if they get at it **Quick!**

HE'S TALKING TO 26 MILLION

Barry Goldwater's answer to the problem that has been bugging conservatives of both Democratic and Republican leanings since the November debacle of their hopes is the Free Society Association. Hopefully, it is to provide a rallying point for the rightest "splinter" organizations that have sprung up around the country to perpetuate the philosophy of freedom and responsibility that might best be termed traditional Americanism.

While each of these has gathered dedicated followers — who felt painfully unwanted in either major party — their leadership has been less than inspiring. Thus, it would seem to make a lot of sense for all to any themselves to whatever degree may be practicable under the banner of the Free Society Association.

"The formation and announcement of the FSA," explains the former conservative Presidential candidate, "should give the nation one vital and significant piece of information. If all who believe in the free society will stand up and be counted by supporting this new effort it should show that the colossus of collectivism has not completely crushed out individualism in this country, as the pollsters and pundits have lately been saying. The

free society is not obsolete. Free man is not obsolete. Neither are their ideas. The Free Society Association is established to do nothing less than prove this."

Republican National Chairman Ray C. Bliss, supported by Senator Goldwater for his post at the head of the GOP, has, however, expressed unhappiness at such "side movements" and declared, "they aren't helpful." He also said: "When I think of a free society, I think of two strong parties."

But this, we would say, is no mere coincidence. It is exactly what Honorary Chairman Goldwater is thinking of, too. And he is determined that the Republican Party will be one of those "two strong parties" when it can be induced to shake off its quarter-century of infatuation with Democratic Party socialism.

HIGHLIGHTS AND SIDELIGHTS

From Your State Capitol

Austin, Texas — Two of the three redistricting plans passed by the last Legislature soon will come under courtroom attacks.

In a legislative redistricting case in Houston, motions will be filed asking that the new plan for dividing Texas into 150 districts for the House of Representatives be declared unconstitutional.

Main attack is expected to be purely on the question of whether countywide districts with more than one legislator serve to discriminate against minority racial and political groups.

No attack is expected on the plan passed to divide the Texas Senate into 31 new districts.

UT Lands Leased — University of Texas leased 47,014 acres of land for \$10,106,000 at the 50th public auction of oil and gas leases.

Active bids were drawn on 159 of 167 tracts offered. All leases were made for five-year terms and a one-sixth royalty on mineral production. Highest and second highest bids — \$260,000 and \$225,000 — were on 320-acre tracts in Ward County.

Receipts from auction will swell the Permanent University Fund to over \$442,000, Land Commissioner Jerry Sadler said.

July 4 Toll Warning Issued — Homer Garrison, Department of Public Safety Director, estimates that thirty-one persons will die in Texas traffic accidents during the three-day July 4 holiday.

DPS plans maximum enforcement with additional

personnel from other uniformed services to augment the regular Highway Patrol. "Operation Motorcade", a DPS-directed coordinated among state agencies to reduce traffic accidents, will focus public attention on added dangers of holiday travel.

Governor's Vetoes — Just before the veto deadline Governor Connally vetoed the bill which would have allowed banks, savings and loans associations and others to charge up to 17 1/2 per cent interest on certain types of loans.

"No evidence was presented to the Legislature to justify these specific rates, either on the basis of reasonableness or need," the Governor

said in his veto message. He said he also was concerned about a provision of the bill which would have let lenders require borrowers to purchase or provide insurance as security for a loan. That provision, he noted, would not have limited in any way "the number or types of insurance coverages which (could have been) required."

Connally vetoed a total of 40 bills passed by the 59th Legislature. Among them were:

Insecticide bill which would have affected both commercial insecticide applicators and farmers and ranchers;

Bill which would have authorized the expansion of the

Upper Colorado River authority to include Colorado, Concho, Irion, McCulloch, Menard, Runnels and Young Counties; and

Bills creating Northern Texas State College at Arkansas and Permian College at Odessa.

Mild Winter Said Cause Screwworm Buildup In S'west

Mission — What's happened with the screwworm eradication program? After producing 90 percent reductions in infestations during each of the first three years, a look at the statistical records can be somewhat disquieting.

Through Wednesday of last week, 180 screwworm infestations had been reported in Texas. By this time a year ago, only 81 cases had been detected. To date, 113 infestations have been recorded in Texas during June, making this the heaviest month of infestation in one and one-half years.

The picture is much the same for the Southwest as a whole. Through June 23, 1964, a total of 102 infestations had been reported in Texas, New Mexico and Arizona; the figure for this year presently stands at 288.

What's the reason for the upswing? Several factors are involved according to eradication officials. First of all, the southern portion of the eradication area and north-

ern Mexico experienced one of the mildest winters in many years, and the winter kill of native screwworms was not too effective. "The weather has been on the side of the eradication program for the past three years, but this year we are on our own", voiced Dr. M. E. Meadows, field operations chief.

The mild winter was followed by almost ideal conditions for screwworm development during the spring. Heavy rains in southern parts of Texas saved many a pasture and crop, but made virtually every pothole in South Texas a haven for screwworm.

The situation wasn't enhanced any by failure of many livestock producers to take even the simplest precautions in handling their stock following routine animal husbandry practices. "You don't find many screwworms unless you have lots of wounds," Dr. Meadows said.

Dr. S. C. Gartman, program administrator, points out the difficulty of wiping out the final vestiges of any insect or disease.

Two Extensions To Production In Northwest Crockett

The Crockett, South multipay field of Crockett County gained its fifth detrital producer and a location northeast extension to that pay with completion of Shell Oil Co. No. 8-L Hobbs, in the far Northwest corner of the county.

It was finalized for a daily flowing potential of 230 barrels of 42.2 gravity oil, with gas-oil ratio of 1,100-1, through a 16-64-inch choke and perforations between 5,060-100 feet, which had been acidized with 1,000 gallons and fractured with 25,000 gallons.

Location is 850 feet from the northwest and 1,240 feet from the northeast lines of 22-31-H&TC.

The same field gained a 1 1/2-mile northwest extension to detrital production with the separating of the detrital and Devonian zones at the Shell Oil Co. No. 3-K Hobbs, 20 miles south-southeast of Crane.

From the detrital it was finalized to produce a daily flowing potential of 179 barrels of 42.3 gravity oil, through a 12-64-inch choke and perforations between 5,027-032 feet. The Devonian is being produced through perforations between 5,051-5,306 feet.

Location is 1,860 feet from the northeast and 660 feet from the southeast lines of 19-31-H&TC.

PUBLIC NOTICE

Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON SEPTEMBER 7, 1965.

SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 44 proposing an Amendment to Sections 2 and 25 of Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas so as to provide for an increase in the membership of the State Senate from 31 to 39 members; to fix the membership in the House of Representatives at 150 members; to require apportionment of the Senate according to population; and to delete the limitation that no single county is entitled to more than one Senator.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Sections 2 and 25 of Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended to read respectively as follows:

"Section 2. The Senate shall consist of 39 members. The House of Representatives shall consist of 150 members."

"Section 25. The state shall be divided into Senatorial Districts of contiguous territory according to population, as nearly as possible."

"Should the Legislature enact any enabling legislation in anticipation of this Amendment, no such law shall be void by reason of its anticipatory nature."

"This Amendment shall be-

come effective upon its adoption."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on the 7th day of September, 1965, at which election all ballots shall have printed on them the following:

"FOR the Constitutional Amendment increasing the membership of the State Senate from 31 to 39 members, retaining the present membership of the House of Representatives, requiring apportionment of the Senate according to population, and deleting the limitation that no single county is entitled to more than one Senator."

"AGAINST the Constitutional Amendment increasing the membership of the State Senate from 31 to 39 members, retaining the present membership of the House of Representatives, requiring apportionment of the Senate according to population, and deleting the limitation that no single county is entitled to more than one Senator."

Sec. 3. The Governor of the State of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for the election and this Amendment shall be published in the manner and for the length of time as required by the Constitution and laws of this state.

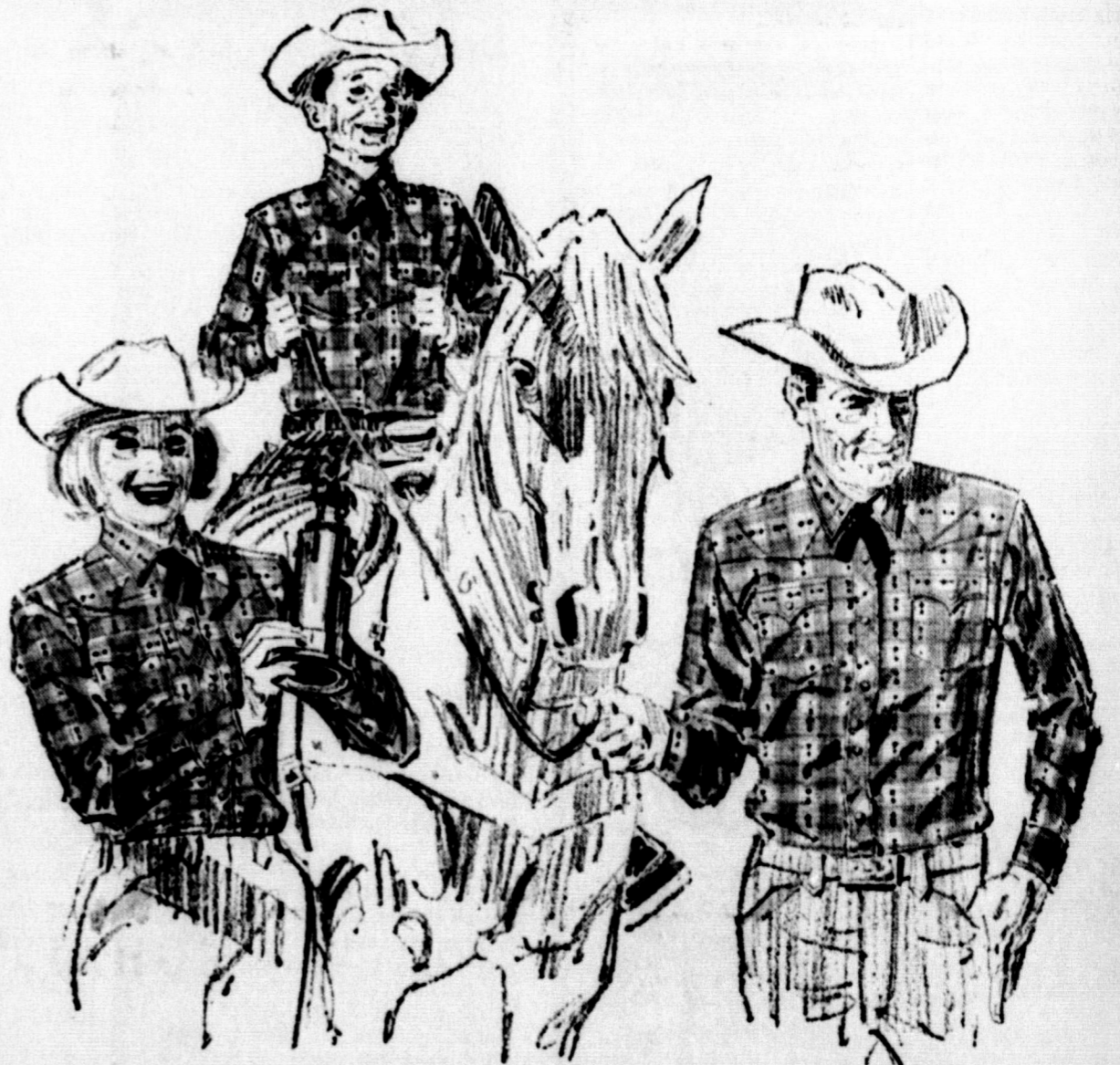

OUTDOORS IN TEXAS

One of the finest collections of firearms in the world is in the Winchester Museum in New Haven, Conn.

Thomas E. Hall is curator of the Winchester museum. He has proved to be a handy man for Texas collectors to get their questions about unusual firearms.

It is open to the general public and is one of the latest steps in the preservation of early-day firearms. Originally the guns were collected as a record of firearms development in America. Now, however, it has been expanded into a study of projectile arms and weapons of all types and from all countries. It contains more than 5,000 guns, including Chinese pieces more than 2,000 years old.

First guns in this collection were placed there by Oliver Winchester around 1800. He was the first president of the Winchester Repeating Arms Co.

Most valuable gun in the collection is a Colt Patterner revolver with accessories. It dates back to about 1836 and is worth something like \$5,000.

Of special interest to Texans is an old Walker-Colt, worth some \$3,500. It was made in 1847 and was the first revolver to gain acceptance as a worthy military weapon.

This is the gun designed by Captain Walker of the Texas Rangers. It was field-tested by Texas rangers in the rough days just after the war with Mexico and just before the Civil War.

There also are many old model 73's in the collection. This is another gun well known in Texas, because of the great number held by collectors. I understand that Bill Gooch of Raymondville, game warden, has a score of these old rifles in all calibers ranging from .22 to .44 caliber. He has gathered them from all over the southwest.

A former game warden, Norman Swansburg of Rio Grande City, has a half-dozen of these famous 73's.

The Winchester collection also includes a number of Civil War firearms. It will be remembered that many of the guns used by the Confederacy were made in Texas, around Tyler and Rusk. No doubt some of these original Texas-made guns are in the collection.

One of the most unusual guns in the Winchester collection is an old Sharps Carbine, with a coffee grinder in its stock. This gun was invented about 1863. One of them was issued to

tan Firearms", a similar book dealing with the products of the Manhattan Arms Co., originated by New York bankers to make guns during the Civil War.

With so many of these books on the market, is there little wonder that interest is kept alive in old guns?

I never have been an antique gun collector myself. But I know many who are.

L. A. Wilke of Austin may not be an antique gun collector either. But he sure has some old timers. One is a single shot wire-framed Hamilton rifle, the first he ever owned. He has had it for more than fifty years. It still is in fair condition.

He also has a double-barrel, twelve-gauge Ithaca, which is around 60 years old.

His prized gun is a model 1873 Winchester, carried by an old Texas ranger. It was presented to Wilke by the ranger just before he died.

Wilke also has a model 94 Winchester, also carried at one time by a Texas ranger.

These are not traffic guns. In other words they are not for sale.

I suspect there are thousands who have such guns tucked away in their closets proud possession of the yesterday when a good gun was so important.

There are museums of various types in most of the larger cities of Texas, where collections of old guns have been assembled. Also, there

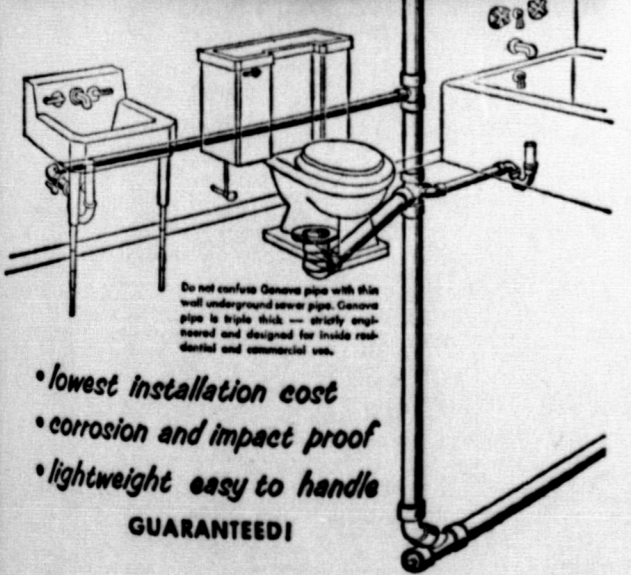
