Ozoma Natl Bank Stock Split And Dividend Order

For the first time in the bank's 60-year history, the Board of Directors of Ozoma National Bank has approved a 10 for 1 split of the bank's stock, now numbering only 1,000 shares of \$100 par value. The split will reduce the par value to \$10.

After the split, the stock will be further divided by payment of a 100 percent stock dividend on the expanded number of shares, bringing the total number of outstanding shares of the bank to 20,000.

W. W. West, president and Lowell Littleton, executive vice president, announced that a stockholders meeting will be called to consider these recommendations of the Directors.

The stock dividend and the stock split will increase the permanent capital of the bank and at the same time will reduce the per share market value of the stock.

The bank was incorporated with a beginning capital of \$50,000 sale of additional stock later pushing the capitalization to \$100,000. The present surplus is \$100,000 and undivided profits and reserves stood at \$754,149.46 at the June 30 statement of the bank.

Two Car Wrecks Result In Damage, Injury To One

Two car wrecks were reported by the Highway Patrol this week. The first mishap occurred around 11 a. m. Tuesday on the Big Lake hwy. near the El Paso Gas camp. A 1960 Chevrolet driven by Wm. Andrew Tounzen of Longbeach, California, attempted to pass a tank truck driven by Leslie Ervin Gross of Andrews, as it was turning off the highway into a private drive. The right front of the car was damaged but there were no injuries.

The second incident took place at Ave. H and 5th St. Wednesday morning, when a 1965 Chevrolet driven by Mrs. H. Ray Henderson and going east on 5th collided with a 1965 Pontiac driven south on H by Janice Parker Lee. Miss Lee received a head cut, the only injury reported in the crash. Both vehicles were damaged extensively. An estimate placed the damage at about \$1,000 to each car.

24 From Ozoma Attend Amistad Dam Site Tour

Twenty-four Ozonans participated in the Amistad Dam tour last Saturday and according to C of C manager, Johnny Johnson, it was a most enjoyable and educational trip.

The tour was arranged by special invitation from the Del Rio Chamber of Commerce. Arriving at the Roswell Hotel at 10:00 a. m. the Ozoma group was welcomed by Hillary Doran, representative of the Del Rio Chamber of Commerce.

Doran briefed the group on improvements being made on hwy. 163, and stated that these improvements should be finished by 1968 and coincide with completion of the dam scheduled for late 1968 or early '69.

After a short briefing by the resident engineer on the Amistad Project, the group went from the hotel directly to the dam site. In spite of a heavy drizzle of rain, three engineers conducted a thorough tour of the project.

First stop was a scaled down model of the completed dam where an engineer explained how the dam worked and how it will be paid for. From there they went to the dam proper and beyond the observation point to the work area itself. They saw crews drilling holes through solid stone walls and learned that at this point the water will be diverted.

Johnson said work on the Mexico side was also coming along at a rapid pace. He said that work on the dam was about 23 percent completed, the total cost will be eighty million dollars, and the dam will be six miles long, a joint endeavor of the U. S. and Mexico.

After the tour, the delegation inched in Del Rio and returned to Ozoma.

Lions Try Third Dist Opponent In Junction Friday

The Ozoma Lions will tackle their third district opponent tomorrow night when they trek to Junction to battle the Improving Eagles. Game time is 7:30 p. m. The Lions suffered a 14-12 setback at the hands of another band of Eagles last Friday night, leaving only two teams undefeated in district play after two weeks of action.

Despite their second 14-12 loss of the season, the Lions have indicated that they cannot be counted out until the ball game is over. On both occasions the Lions have bounced back in the last quarter for the tying TD only to have their two point efforts fail.

In Junction, the Lions will be playing a squad who, like Ozoma, saw Eldorado score the winning touchdown via a blocked punt. Junction was leading Eldorado with less than two minutes to play when Eldorado's James Belk blocked a punt that led to the TD and a 12-8 final score.

Playing on their home field with their best team in several years, Junction could be extremely tough, and a win over Ozoma would go a long way toward a successful season for the Eagles.

Coach Sam Mosley's squad hopes to beat Junction and use their off week to get ready for the last half of the campaign when they must take on Menard, Big Lake, Sonora, Iraan, and Rankin. The Braves of Iraan, who upset Big Lake two weeks ago, went down before Sonora 30-6. Sonora is the only unbeaten team in the district but trail Eldorado by one half game because they have played one less game than Eldorado. The Eagles have dropped one non-district game. With seven weekends remaining in the district struggle, more upsets could confuse 8A.

Coach Mosley is expected to name the following boys to start the game tomorrow night. On defense will be T. DeHoyos, Flores, Sutton, M. Marris, Tijerina, and Lewis on the line, Williams and Ramos as linebackers, and Carson, Seahorn, and Cox in the secondary. On offense Seahorn and Parker at ends; Sutton and Stokes, tackles; J. DeHoyos and Ramos, guards; Lewis, center. T. DeHoyos, Carson, Upham, and Cox will start in the backfield.

Dozens of Ozonans were on hand early Friday morning at the office of W. F. (Bill) Dixon, Resident Engineer, State Highway Department, to see for the first time the proposed route for Interstate 10 across Crockett county and through (or around) Ozona.

The Department's map revealed the engineering proposal for the four-lane highway to bisect Ozona just south of 14th street, crossing over land now used as baseball and Little League playing fields, county road department buildings, L. D. Kirby's Humble wholesale station and a relatively few residential houses.

Speculation for months on end have placed the road both north and south of Ozona and most Ozonans were pleased with the location of the route, though at the same time regretful that it will mean giving up playground areas and residential lots along its path.

The Interstate 10 will cross State Highway 163 with an overpass and a traffic interchange in south Ozona, and since it will cross both Gurdley and Johnson Draws will probably be elevated across the entire town area.

The new highway will provide other traffic interchanges at both the east and west edges of Ozona. These will provide ample opportunity for traffic to quit the Interstate to stop off in Ozona.

The maps displayed showed the proposed new highways to be south of present U. S. 290 to Bachelor hill where it will cross the present route and continue west to the Pecos river at a point about four miles north of Sheffield, there joining with a segment already determined in Pecos county.

A public hearing has been set for October 7 at 2 p. m. in the courthouse on a segment of the proposed highway in this county from a point 6.6 miles east of Ozona to the Sutton county line. A detailed schematic drawing of this segment was on display at the highway office Friday morning and is expected to create no controversy.

The segment to be definitely nailed down after the public hearing begins at the intersection of U. S. 290 and the Taylor Box road. This ranch road crossing the highway will overpass the Interstate at that point, according to the schematic. From there the new highway will parallel 290 to about the county line.

A graduate of Southwestern University and Drew Theological Seminary, he did graduate work at Princeton Seminary. He has had several pastorates in Texas and is presently serving as Executive Secretary of the Conference Council of the Methodist Church.

A Rotarian and a 32nd degree Mason, Dr. Richardson served as delegate on three occasions to the World Methodist Council. In 1963 he led a tour through the Middle East.

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Eldorado Wins Over Lions 14-12 By Blocked Kick

The Lions lost their first district ballgame last Friday night when they were edged 14-12 by the Eldorado Eagles. The two point loss, the second of the year, dropped the Lions' district record to 1-1 and season record to 2-2. As a result of their win, the Eagles shot into the District 8A lead, as the leader, Iraan, was trounced 30-6 by Sonora.

Ozoma grabbed the lead early in the second quarter when they drove 48 yards for a score. George Cox began the drive with two carries of six and five yards. Billy Carson hit Cox with a short pass, and Cox moved on down to the Eldorado 19. Carson spotted end George Parker for a 9 yard pass play at the 11. Two five yard blasts by fullback Thomas DeHoyos carried to the one, and DeHoyos plunged in for the score. Beto Ramos missed the try for the extra point.

It was Ramos' first failure after eight consecutive hits. Just before the half ended, Eldorado, using a series of short passes to pick up most of the yardage, scored

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INTERSTATE 10 ROUTE

Ozonans went to the office of the Resident Engineer, State Highway Department, Friday morning and throughout most of the day Friday, to see the proposed route for Interstate 10 across Crockett county — and particularly, the route through Ozona.

For the most part, we dare say, they were pleased with what they saw on the maps the highway crew had mounted on the walls for display. The four-lane interstate highway, which in many cases completely bypasses towns along its route, will pass directly through Ozona — not exactly through the "middle" but just three blocks south of its present route, which is "down the middle."

It seems from many standpoints, that the Highway Department, and the Engineering staff here, headed by W. F. (Bill) Dixon, has been most generous toward Ozona. In the first place, the new Interstate 10 will have three traffic interchanges by which travelers may quit the highway to stop off in Ozona — one at the east edge of town, one at the intersection with State Highway 163, and one at the west edge of town. A traveler then will have his first chance at the edge of town. He will be informed that he is approaching Ozona and if he misses that turn-off, he will have another as he reaches the middle of town — and he can see the town from an elevated roadway. And if he should overshoot that, he can back at the opposite edge of town.

The Interstate will overpass Highway 163 in Ozona, another provision in the planning. It is more expensive construction but will consume less adjacent property which would be the case were the state highway to overpass the Interstate. And the elevated roadway will thus overpass both Gurdley and Johnson draws, as well as the state highway, through the city.

Although the Interstate will require a 400-foot right-of-way in rural areas, in urban areas this requirement is reduced to a maximum of 350 feet.

Although it is unfortunate that progress will require the sacrifice of even one residential lot in a town that has as few as Ozona, it is, nevertheless, the most fortunate choice that could have been made for the highway — consuming the very minimum number of residential and business lots. This is because of the fact that much of the property just south of 14th Street is county property — the county highway department and the Powell Field and Little League baseball parks.

Again, it is unfortunate that these playing fields, dedicated for the purpose in the E. M. Powell deed setting aside the Ozona townsite section, must go in the highway construction project. But maybe in the fullness of time, other play areas can be developed in or near the town.

All who viewed the proposed route must have felt a twinge of sympathy for

those householders who will be uprooted in the development. It is to be hoped that when the time finally comes for their actual dislocation that their compensation will be adequate and that other suitable homesites will become available to them.

TIPS FOR OUTDOORSMEN

by Vern Sanford

Keeping Matches Dry

"A wet match is an abomination to both smoker and camp cook," so sayeth The Sportsman's Bible.

You can keep matches dry by daubing the heads with clear fingernail polish. This is much easier than dipping them in paraffin.

Fingernail polish waterproofs the matches even under trying conditions — and the polish adds to their combustibility.

Retouching Duck Decoys

When you touch up the worn paint spots on your decoys, be careful what sort of paint you use.

Flat paint is best as it has no shine to scare away incoming flights. Use turpentine as thinner since linseed oil will tend to add shine.

After the paint dries, give the surface a few licks with fine steel wool to dull the paint even more.

Fisherman's Dilemma

How often have you heard it argued around camp whether, or not, a hook should be fully covered with the bait? Leave the barb bare! A naked hook will no more scare away fish than will the hooks on an artificial lure.

Fact is you will snag more fish when the barbs are sharp and bare.

Stringing the Fly Rod

If you are one of those anglers who threads a fly rod by pushing the leader through the guides — don't! An easier and quicker method

is to double the line above the leader connection and shove this doubled line with the point of the same nail, put a dot of black for the pupils in the middle of each white spot.

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Thermometers Aid Fishing

A smart fly fisherman adopts any method that promises to improve his chances for success. One wrinkle is the use of a thermometer to register water temperature.

For instance, in water 55 degrees and warmer, use lightly submerged nymphs and flies.

If the water is 45 to 55 degrees, use weighted nymphs and wets with streamers.

If colder than 45 degrees go way down deep with your flies, or spoons.

Stiffing Flames

The bane of a camp cook's existence is to have his fire burst into flames, when what he wants is hot coals.

Experienced cooks have found a way to instantly douse these unwanted flames.

They merely sprinkle a handful of common table salt over the fire and—presto—the flames disappear.

A Handy Gadget

When that old three-ring notebook gets too old for use, don't throw it away.

Use the back (with the three rings) to keep camp cooking tools together.

The rings will hold spoons, large forks, pancake turners, etc., handy and ready for instant use.

Straightening Nylon Leader

There are three good ways of straightening a coiled nylon leader:

1. Soak it in liquid detergent.

2. Dampen and stretch it between the hands (hold for several minutes stretched tight.)

3. Pull it through a folded piece of rubber, or rubberized material.

Human Hand As A Ruler

How many times have you been in a situation where a ruler was needed, and none was handy?

Well, you'll never be in that fix again if you'll remember the distance between the tip of your little finger to the tip of your thumb. Span your hand on a ruler, by placing the tip of the little finger on 0, and the thumb tip on whatever numeral in inches you can reach.

Tip for Amateurs

If you are thinking of mounting a recoil pad on your gun butt, take this precaution against splintering the wood when the stock is sawed.

Wrap adhesive tape around stock at the cutting point and use a table saw.

Man Bosworth's New Novel Is Robust Tale Of Whaling Ships

Robust and raucous it is, the newest novel by Allan R. (Allie) Bosworth, titled "Storm" and just published by Harper & Row (\$4.95).

The novel of whaling and the ships and their crews dates back to 1880 when the first whaling ships were beginning to join the whaling fleet. The novel is, in the author's style, well researched and, judging from his extensive bibliography, accurate to the probable satisfaction of the most old whalerman of the sea.

Three Wildcat Tests Are Slated In Crockett Co.

Mallard Production Co., Dallas, will drill the No. 1 General American as a 4,800-foot Pennsylvania wildcat in the Noelke multipay field of Crockett County, five miles east-southeast of Iraan, one location south of a recent Wichita-Albany pay opener and 1/2 mile southwest of its No. 1 Bouscaren, active Pennsylvania wildcat.

Location is 2,173 feet from the south and 2,607 feet from the west lines of 29-GG-HE&WT.

The No. 1 Bouscaren, same section, was bottomed at 4,765 feet, waiting on orders, after recovering salty sulphur water on drillstem tests between 4,640-80 feet and 4,730-65 feet.

The Wichita-Albany opener, Allied International Petroleum Inc., No. 1 Bouscaren Heirs, same section, was finished March 8, 1965, to pump 163 barrels of 41 gravity oil, plus 39 per cent water, with gas-oil ratio of 580-1. Production was through perforations between 4,280-292 feet.

Texaco Inc. will drill two projects in the Ozona (Canyon sand) field of Crockett County, approximately 20 miles southwest of Ozona.

Both projects are in 8-BBB GC&SP.

The No. 2 Evelyn Henderson, a 6,700-foot test 1/2 mile north of the nearest production, is 1,320 feet from the south and west lines.

The No. 3 Evelyn Henderson, a 7,000-foot test one mile northeast of the nearest production, is 1,320 feet from the north and east lines.

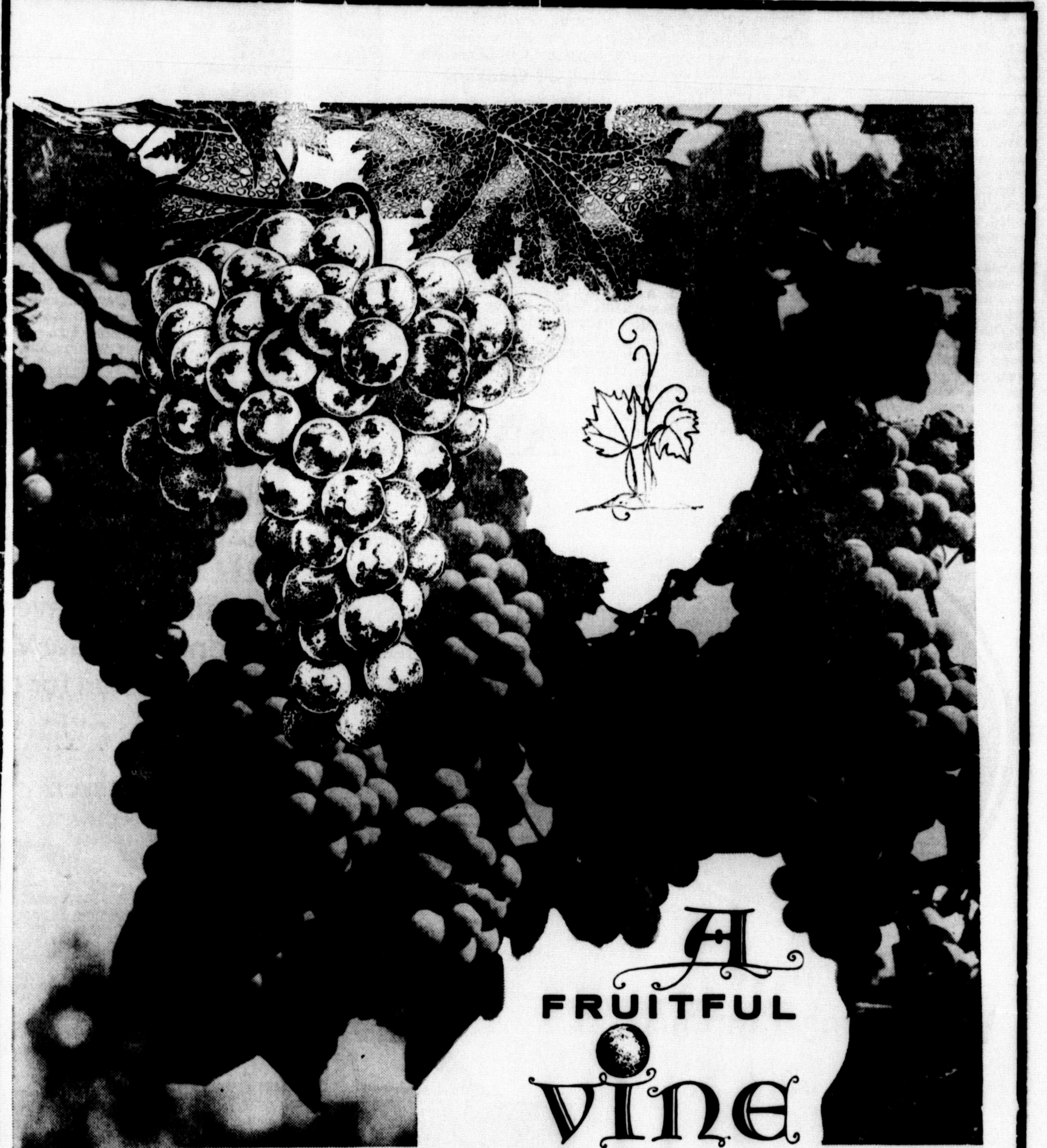

When a junior in high school, Miss Clayton read an article in the National Geographic Magazine on the International School of America and its unique plan of providing a student with thirty hours of college credit while traveling. The dream began and study plans were made to enable her to become one of the group during her junior year in college.

She was a 1963 honor graduate of Ozona High School. While in high school she was a cheerleader, football queen, Lion's Club Sweetheart and pianist, twirler with the band class president, class favorite. She attended Southern Methodist University in Dallas two years and while there was a member of Pi Beta Phi Sorority, and was named to the Dean's list.

Miss Clayton represented Ozona in the Miss Wool of Texas Pageant in Odessa in 1964. She was named first alternate and represented the Texas Sheep & Goat



Raisers as a "Wool Princess". She has traveled over most of the United States; spent one summer in the Hawaiian Islands, and spent the summer of 1965 touring the part of Western Europe not covered by her ISA itinerary.

She will return to Texas in June of 1966, and will resume her regular college work in the fall.

Miss Clayton joined the school in San Francisco and classes began in Tokyo Sept. 27. Classrooms are provided in leading universities of the countries visited.

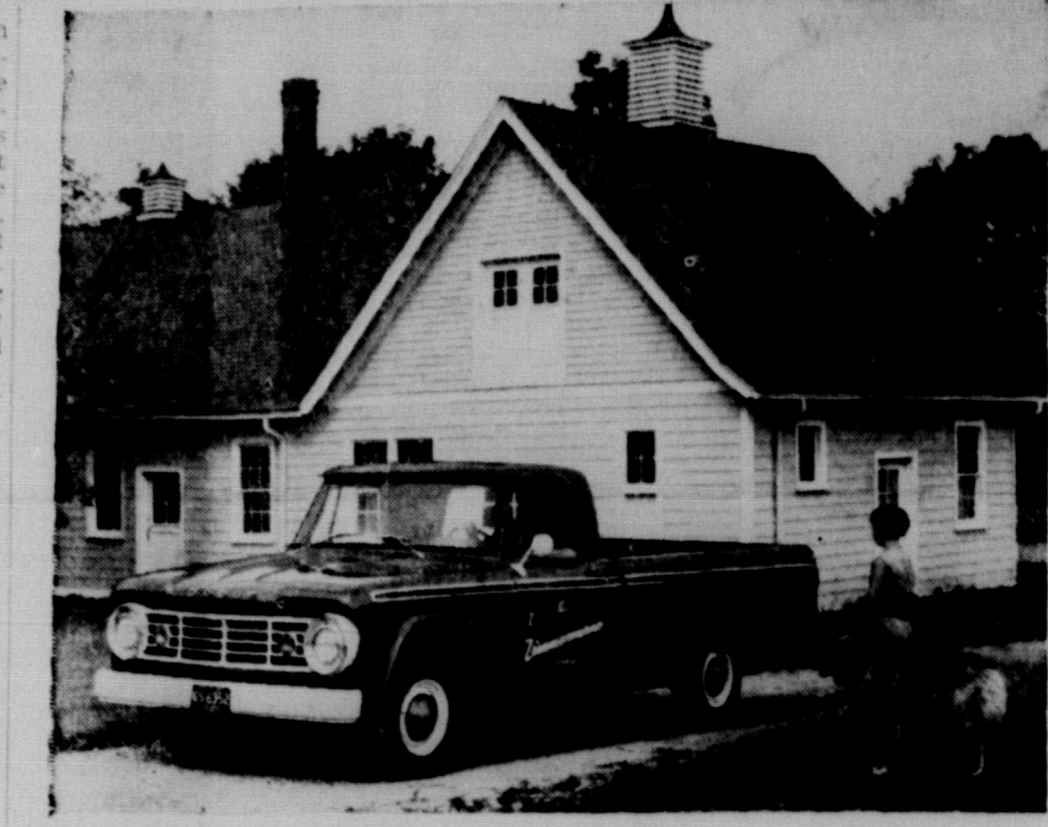
Brother Of Ozonan Dies Of Gunshot

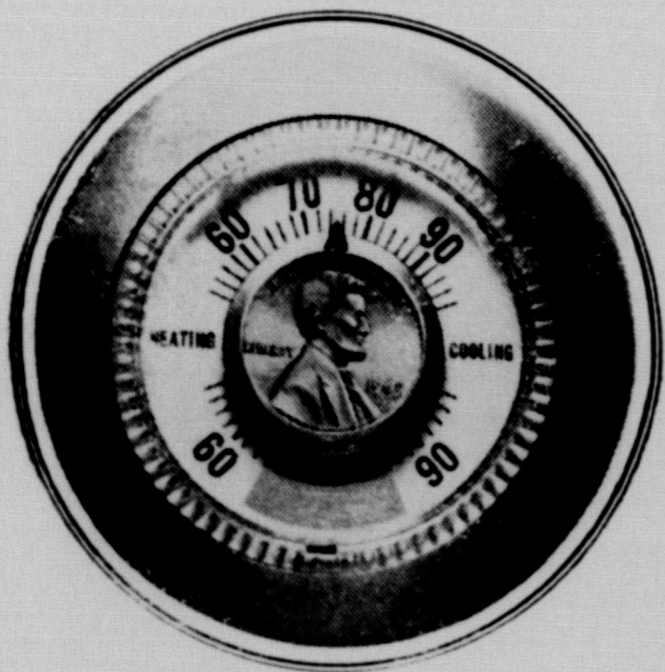

City had approved \$2,000,000 in bonds to develop underground water supply on the Texas side of the Red River before the Legislature passed a law to ban pipelining water across the state boundary.

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

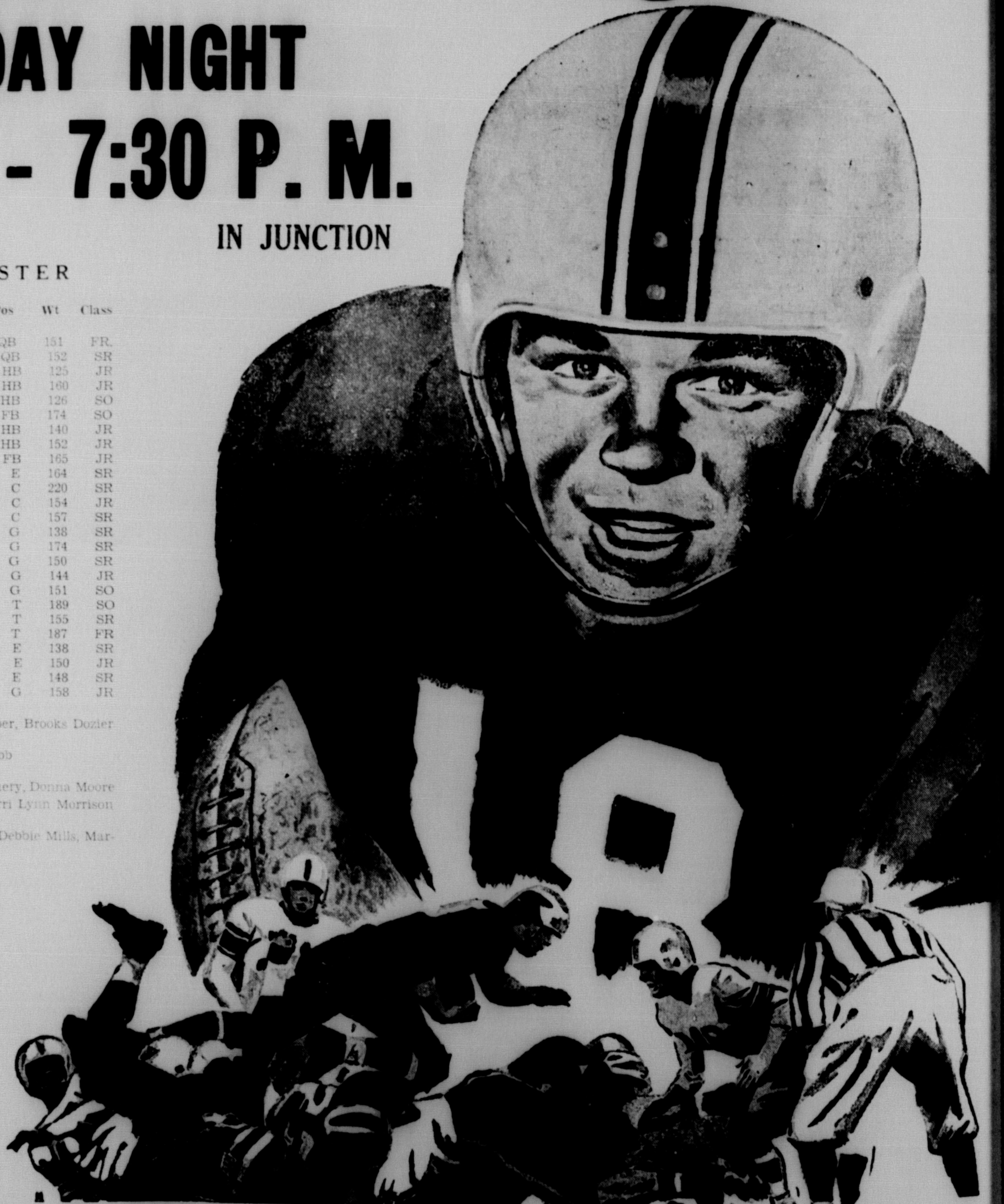
