Mrs. C L Williams Pioneer Crockett Mother Is Dead

Mrs. Charles L. Williams, 76, pioneer Crockett County mother, died at mid-morning Wednesday in Crockett County Hospital. She had enjoyed exceptionally good health all her life until suffering a heart attack about two months ago.

Mrs. Williams was born September 2, 1886, in Glen Fawn, Texas. She came to Ozona in 1913 as the first grade school teacher. September 1, 1916, she married Charles L. Williams, former Crockett County sheriff and ranchman, who died in 1924. Mr. Williams early death left Mrs. Williams a widow the day before her youngest son was born, yet she gallantly carried on and reared her family alone. She reared five sons and a daughter.

A graduate of Sam Houston State College, she was a lifelong member of the Methodist Church and had served in all the offices of the church. She was a member of the Ozona Woman's Club.

Mrs. Williams was well known in West Texas art circles and for many years gave Ozona High School graduates their choice of her landscapes or still-life paintings as graduation gifts. Her paintings were featured at art shows in many West Texas cities. She also excelled in China painting and many young couples have received one of her hand painted China plates as a wedding gift. For many years she taught China painting in her home.

Among other honors, Mrs. Williams was a 5 star mother in World War II. She made an extended tour of the Holy Land at the age of 76.

Funeral services will be held today at 4:00 p. m. in the Ozona Methodist Church with Rev. Leonard Garrett, pastor, officiating. James Funeral Home is in charge of arrangements. Burial will be in Cedar Hill Cemetery.

Mrs. Williams is survived by her five sons, Charles L. Williams, Jr., Gene Williams, Jack Williams, Joe Williams, and Byron Williams; one daughter, Mrs. Joe Clayton, all of Ozona; two brothers, Dr. J. A. Fussell of Ozona and J. O. Fussell, Cushing, Texas; one sister, Mrs. Charles Farr of Baytown, and eleven grandchildren.

Sen. Amendment Given Scanty but Favorable Vote

Crockett county voters, like those in most West Texas counties, voted favorably for adoption of the proposed constitutional amendment to raise the membership of the Texas Senate from 31 to 39 in Tuesday's special election.

But the vote was pitifully meager, again as it was through most counties of the state, with the exception of the big cities where a heavy unfavorable vote turned down the proposed Senate enlargement.

Only 101 valiant voters took the trouble to register their opinions on the amendment in this county, 78 of them favoring its adoption and 23 opposing. The vote in the courthouse box in Ozona was 68 for the amendment and 16 opposed. In the Powell Field box, 3 favored the amendment and one opposed and in the Power Plant box 7 were for it and 6 against.

Dodging Rabbit on Hiway Causes Near Fatal Crash

Trying to miss a jackrabbit which darted across the highway in front of their car nearly cost the lives of two young sisters at the east edge of Ozona early Friday morning.

Linda Gay Lyall, 19, driver of the car, and her sister, Paula Kay, 22, are in a San Angelo hospital under treatment for their injuries after having received first aid at the Crockett County Hospital after the accident. Paula Kay suffered a fractured vertebra and is under the care of a bone specialist. Linda Gay, a student at Howard Payne College in Brownwood, escaped with broken ribs and minor cuts and bruises.

The girls were on their way to El Paso from San Antonio. Riding in a late model Volkswagen, they had just passed another car and were pulling back into the right hand lane when the rabbit darted in front of the car. The driver swerved too far to the right and the car went out of control, overturned twice and landed upside down in the drawed just north of the highway bridge.

Had the car traveled another hundred feet before going out of control, it would have smashed into the concrete bridge, and both girls probably would have been killed.

Badgers Edge Lions 14-12 In Season Opener

A gallant effort in the waning moments fell two points shy and the Lions lost a squeaker 14-12 to the McCamey Badgers last Friday night in the season opener for both clubs. Trailing 14-6 with just under two minutes remaining in the game, the Lions went 81 yards for a touchdown. With quarterback Billy Carson hitting on eight of nine passes in the final drive, end George Parker, with a diving catch at the flag, scored on a 13 yard play with three seconds remaining. The effort for the tying two points failed.

The Lions round themselves seven points behind midway in the first quarter when Ridgely Holifield, 168 lb. speedster, darted 38 yards for a Badger TD on the first play following a pass interception.

Ozona bounced back for a score on their first possession following intermission with a drive of 58 yards. Lion halfback George Cox led the drive as he pitched in with 36 yards in six carries, and Parker added 11 yards on an end around. Carson slipped in for the score from inside the one, and the Lions trailed 7-6. The attempt for the extra points was no good.

Following a Lion fumble early in the third quarter, Holifield again found a hole and stepped 16 yards for the second Badger TD.

The kick for the extra point was good and Lions were behind 14-6.

Gaining possession of the ball with less than two minutes to go, Carson hit Cox for four yards, then Thomas DeHoyos for six on a screen pass and a first down. Parker caught a short pass for eight an 18 yard pass play was complete to end Pon Seahorn and another 12 yards was picked up on a pass from Carson to Seahorn who lateraled to half back Randy Upham. Carson then hit Seahorn at the 13 yard line, and two plays later found Parker just inside the flag for a TD. The try for the tying points was no good.

With the exception of the scoring runs by Holifield, the Lions' defense was stingy, allowing only 144 yards on the ground, and almost 100 yards (Continued on Last Page)

He added that the Longhorns have been reported as having had a sophomore team last year and lost only three or four starters.

Bronte does have a good size ball club, with 175 pound Boyce Lee and 182 pound Doug McCutchen, backs, and 165 pound Larry Corley and 205 pound Tony Olivias, tackles, leading the way.

The Lions came out of the McCamey encounter in pretty good shape with only the normal lumps and bruises to hamper them. Beto Ramos, veteran linebacker who was shaken-up last Friday night and sat out the last three quarters of the game, is set and ready to go tomorrow night.

The probable starting defensive unit will see Sutton, Lewis, Tijerina, and Marlin Farris as the front four, with Oscar Flores and Thomas DeHoyos on the corners. Williams and Ramos will be at linebacking spots. Carson and Seahorn will start at defensive halfback slots, and Cox will be at safety.

RECIPE OF THE WEEK JALAPENO CORNBREAD

1 hen cooked and diced (can be cooked the day before) reserve stock for gravy.
Mix together the following ingredients:
3 cups cornbread mix
2 1/2 cups sweet milk
1/2 cup salad oil
3 whole eggs, beaten
1 button garlic, grated
1 large onion, grated
3 teaspoons sugar
1 can of cream style corn
1 small can chopped green chiles or jalapenos.
1 1/2 cup cheddar cheese, grated
8 slices of bacon, cooked crisp and crumbled
Spread diced hen in a 10 by 14 inch baking pan, pour a small amount of stock over it. Cover with cornbread mixture and cook in a 375 degree pre-heated oven for 30 to 40 minutes or until cornbread is well browned. Thick-

en stock with cornstarch for gravy.
To serve, cut in squares and turn each square over. Spoon gravy over top of individual servings.

This is a delicious main dish and a complete meal when served with a green vegetable and a fruit salad. No trouble at all if you cook your chicken the day before. Canned chicken may be used with canned chicken broth used in the gravy.
