

Mrs. White emphasized some comparisons from the hospital's monthly operating deficits as revealed by monthly reports filed with the court.

During the past three months, July, August and September, the hospital showed a total deficit of \$13,-650, with an exceptionally good patient load averaging approximately 9. (Patient load is the average number of patients per day over a month.) By comparison, the same three months a year ago, when the patient load was down to an average of 5.3, the three months total deficit was \$7,450

"Not quite but almost twice as high a loss with twice as many patients," she told the

The July deficit was \$4,-875, with a patient load of 8.6. The August loss was \$5,-500 on a patient load of 8.9 and the September loss, with the patient load up to 9.8. was \$3,275. The immediate past three months, by comparison, showed a deficit of \$664.10 in April, when the patient load was 7.5, May was \$900.84 short and the patient load was 7.4, and June's loss was \$1,762.89 with a patient load of 8.6. Highway Department explaining every detail from freeway planning to final payment from the State.

Dixon pointed out the proposed route on the huge map strung halfway around the courtroom and noted that the definite location had not been pinpointed nor details worked out except for the 8.7 mile segment. This will take place in further engineering study. However, he noted that the 400 ft. right of way would fall somewhere within the red strip on the map denoting the proposed route.

After a short recess enabling further study of the maps, there was a brief question and answer period.

The segment of the proposed highway that was definitely nailed down was that portion 6.6 miles east of Ozona, beginning at the intersection of U.S. 290 and Taylor Box Road and paralleling 290 for a distance of 8.7 miles to the Sutton County line.

Mr. Dixon said that construction on this portion of Interstate 10 is not expected to begin until late 1966 provided funds are available from the Federal and State Governments.
