Cox, who has averaged over nine yards per carry, has been used very effectively as a pass receiver in recent games. 1 can water chestnuts (5 oz. can sliced and drained). 1/4 cup chopped pimento 14 cup chopped bell pepper

2 tablespoon grated Parmesan cheese 1 tablespoon minced par-

1 teaspoon Worcestershire

Sauce 1 teaspoon salt

1/2 teaspoon red pepper Bake at 350 degrees (or less) for 1 hr. or till rice is done. Toss, gently, with a fork once during baking. Be sure to bake covered.






