Rio Pecos Plant WTU to Undergo Major Expansion

A major expansion at the Rio Pecos Electric Generat- ing Plant in Northwest Crockett County was announced today by West Texas Utili- ties Company. The generat- ing capability of the plant will be increased to more than 2½ times its present size.

The \$8 million construc- tion Project was announced by Roff W. Hardy, WTU President, who cited this new construction as evidence of the company's continued planning and building to provide power for West Texas growth and development.

Hardy said, "While we are still working to complete the second unit of the new San Angelo power generating station, our Engineering De- partment has been busy on plans and designs for this new generating facility at the Rio Pecos Plant."

The new unit, to be added to the Rio Pecos station which is located seven miles west of McCamey, will be a conventional reheat steam turbine-generating unit. The unit will have a capability of 95,000 kilowatts and the steam turbine is being de- signed for operation at 1,450 pounds pressure per square inch and at 1,000 degree tem- perature and 1,000 degree re- heat temperature.

John Hutchinson, Vice- President and Chief Engin- eer said that engineering de- sign was being done by Bechtel Corporation of San Francisco, California in con- junction with WTU's Engin- eering Department.

Construction for the new unit is scheduled to begin in June, 1967 with the target date for completion in May, 1969. According to Hutchinson the major items for the plant, the steam turbine-generator and the steam boiler, have just been pur- chased.

The Rio Pecos plant was originally built in 1927, with new units being added in 1954 and 1959. Currently the plant has a generating capa- bility of 59,500 KW and is operated by a crew of 27 employees under the direc- tion of J. A. Carroll, Plant Superintendent.

Junior Gridders Win Two, Lose 1 In Season Finale

Football season ended last Thursday afternoon for the Junior High Cubs and Lion B in a triple header with the Eldorado teams. Cub seventh graders remained un- defeated with a 6-0 win, eighth grade Cubs took a 28-8 pasting and the Lion B chalked up a 32-7 victory.

In the first game, the little Cubs held the Eldorado crew scoreless. Fine defen- sive playing on the part of the seventh graders kept the little Eagles behind the line of scrimmage the biggest part of the game and they never did penetrate Cub ter- ritory. Penalties plagued the Cubs in the first half and wiped out one touchdown. Quarterback Jim Montgomery passed to Halfback David Pagan for 25 yards and set up the score. Pagan went over from the 3 on fourth down, but a penalty wiped out the score and returned the ball to the 20. At the half the Cubs had the ball six inches from the Eldorado goal.

Going into the second half with a 0-0 score, the Cubs got on the scoreboard in the fourth quarter after a sustained drive down field, fullback Phillip Perner carry- ing from the 1 yd. line for the only score of the game. The try for extra points was no good.

Eighth grade Cubs made a much better stand against their Eldorado counterparts than earlier in the season, allowing the Eagles only one score in each quarter. The score was 14-0 in favor of (Continued on Last Page)

Ten Seniors Wind Up Grid Careers Friday Night Against Rankin

Ten OHS Seniors will be playing in their final football game tomorrow night when the Lions host the Rankin Red Devils and wrap up the 1965 campaign. The Lions need a victory to assure themselves a tie with Eldorado for second place in the nine-member 8-A District. Kick-off time at Lion Stadium is 7:30 p. m., with pre- game activities to begin at 7:15.

Concluding their high school football will be co- captains Larry Williams, Pon Seahorn, David Lewis, and Billy Carson. Six other senior squad members are David Jacoby, George Parker, Jesus Tijerina, Charles Far- ris, Mike Prater, and Sandy Stokes.

A victory over the Red Devils would give the Lions a season record of 7 wins and three losses and 6 and 2 district record. The three Ozona losses came on two 12-14 squeakers and the 6-14 loss to the powerful Sonora 11, the 1965 District 8-A Champions.

The 1965 Lions have used a powerful and balanced at- tack and a rock-ribbed de- fense along with spirited de- termination to push to six wins. New Lion Mentor Sam Mosley and assistant coach Bill Gerber began the sea- son with only one returning regular on the forward wall.

The spark plug of the Lions' offense has been Geo. Cox, 160 pound junior half- back. Perhaps the fastest back in District 8-A, Cox has rushed for 1,180 yards on 137 carries — an average of 8.6 yards per carry. Randy Up- ham, another Jr. halfback, has added 480 yards on 88 rushes for a 5.4 average. Cox has gained 315 yards on 13 catches as a pass receiver, and Pon Seahorn has nabbed 30 passes for 370 yards. Billy Carson has completed 33 of 58 passes for 380 yards and 2 TDs, and Randel Clepper has hit on 10 of 15 passes for 219 yards and 3 TDs. Seahorn has completed 3 passes for 101 yards. Two of Seahorn's three completions were for touchdowns.

The Lions offense is ex- pected to get its sternest tests of the season tomorrow night against Rankin. The Rankin team has played good ball all season and were not badly mauled in losses to Big Lake (18-6), Eldorado, (14-12), and Sonora (20-0). The Red Devils have beaten Menard, Junction, Sanderson, and Iraan (2-0).

Mosley's squad will be in better physical condition than they were against Iraan when they had eight boys on the injured list.

Scheduled to start against the Red Devils are Parker and Seahorn, ends; Sutton and Stokes, tackles; Ramos and J. DeHoyos, guards; Lewis, center; Cox and Up- ham, halfbacks; Carson, quarterback; and T. DeHoyos, fullback.

Mosley's crew came out after the half with their pat- ented last half fight. Taking the ball on the kick-off, Ozona drove within the Brave 10 yard line before the line Iraan stiffened. With the Lions' swiveled-hipped halfback George Cox lead- ing the charge, Ozona, who completely dominated the game in the second half, twice more drove deep into Iraan territory but were to push in for a score.

Ozona's second tally came as the result of a pass inter- ception early in the final quarter. Linebacker Ramos got in front of a Brave pass receiver at the Iraan 32 and took a toss by the Iraan tail- back Joy, fighting his way to the Brave one yard line before three Iraan Braves brought him down. Quarter- back Billy Carson went in for the score, and Ramos a- gain added the extra point. Later in the fourth quarter, Ramos tried a field goal from the Iraan 25, but the kick was wide to the right. The second extra point gave Ra- mos a season record of 17 of 21 extra points.

Based on the results of this session of Congress there is every reason to believe 14(b) will not be repealed. But the National Committee intends to continue to do everything it can to keep the U. S. Senate aware of the basic public opposition to repeal.

The successful stand made by courageous Senators, led by the Senator Dirksen, was made possible by the broad public support of voluntary union membership. Proof of this support was supplied by the thousands of newspapers, including yours, that editorially supported the retention of 14(b). Newspaper support, which was virtually unanimous, contributed a great deal to dampening the enthusiasm of White House and Senate advocates of compulsion.

We sincerely appreciate the editorials you have written — they certainly contributed to this victory for individual freedom. Thanks for your help.

Each team scored its lone touchdown in the third quarter. Ozona chalked up the first marker on a sustained march from their own 35, with Davidson, Leath, Childress and Casbeer taking turns at hugging the pig hide down the field. Leath negotiated the final 18 yards for the touchdown.

The Bronchos repeated the performance a moment later to tie the score and take the lead on converting for the extra point.

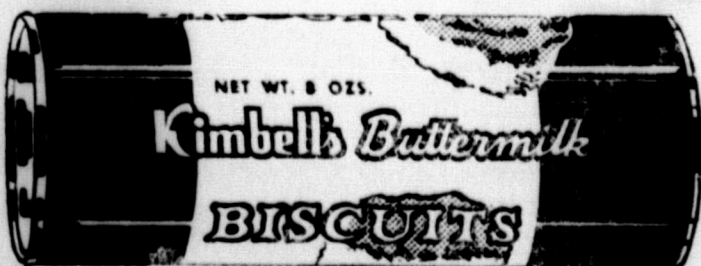

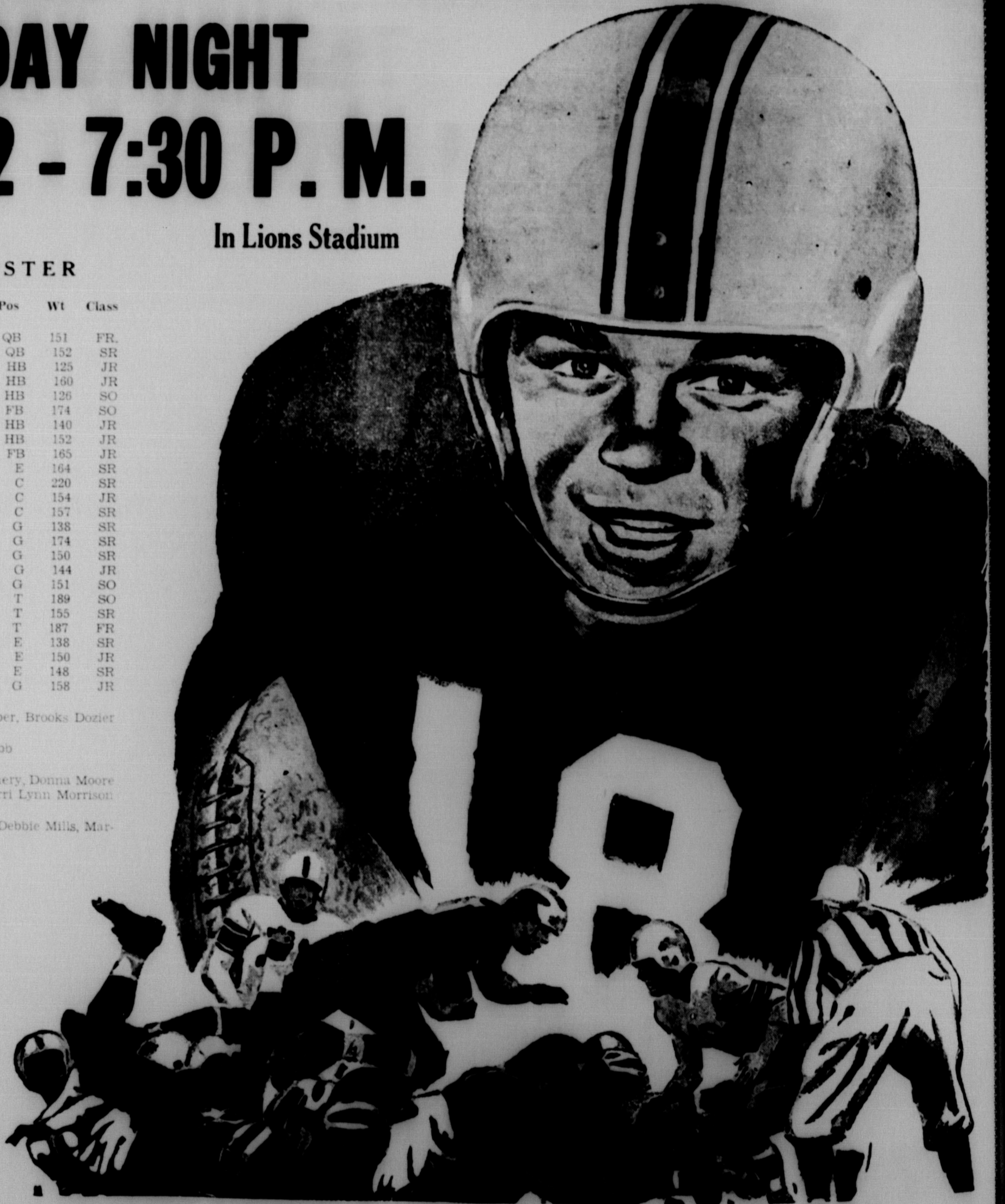

Canyon Gasser Assured In Shell Kincaid Estate

The Davidson Ranch multiply field of Crockett County gained its second Canyon producer and a 3/4 mile northwest extension to that pay with completion apparently as a shut-in gas well of Texaco Co. No. 1-C A. R. Kincaid Trust, four miles southeast of Ozona.

It was finalized for 184,500 cubic feet daily, plus 10.4 barrels of condensate, plus seven-tenths of one barrel of water, on a six-hour test through perforations at 6,223 to 6,385 feet, which had been acidized with 3,000 gallons and 20,000 pounds of sand. Gas-liquid ratio was 17,170-1. No choke was reported.

Operator abandoned Pennsylvania perforations between 7,746-77 feet. Location is 1,320 feet from the south and east lines of 3-KL-GC&SF.

The discovery, the firm's No. 1-1 Davidson, Jr., was finalized Jan. 1, 1965, for a calculated, absolute open flow of gas per day through Canyon perforations between 6,201-361 feet; for a calculated, absolute open flow of 2.25 million cubic feet of gas per day, with gas-liquid ratio of 35,600-1, through Pennsylvania perforations between 7,890-916 feet; and for a calculated, absolute open flow of 690,000 cubic feet daily with gas-liquid ratio of 51,400-1, through detrital perforations between 8,606-936 feet.

Shell Oil Co. will drill two out posts to the Ozona (Canyon sand gas) field of Crockett County approximately 20 miles southwest of Ozona.

The No. 1-C J. W. Henderson, 1/2 mile south, is 1,500 feet from the south and 1,320 feet from the east lines of 6 BBB-GC&SF, Derrick floor.

The No. 1-B Henderson, 3/4 mile southwest is 1,320 feet from the north and west lines of 7-2 I&GN.

Both projects are scheduled to 7,000 feet.

HIGHLIGHTS AND SIDELIGHTS

From Your State Capitol

Austin, Texas — Both ultra-liberals and ultra-conservatives have indicated they want a place on the 1966 general election ballot.

Texas liberal spokesmen hint they may run a candidate for governor and perhaps one for the U. S. Senate if Atty. Gen. Waggoner Carr is the Democratic senatorial nominee.

Conservative party already has adopted a resolution of intent to nominate state candidates next year.

New Weapon Found — A significant new weapon has been acquired by the State of Texas against a federal lawsuit to abolish the poll tax as a voting requirement in this state, reports Attorney General Carr.

U. S. Senate Judiciary

Committee has made available to Carr testimony of federal Atty. Gen. Nicholas Katzenbach purportedly acknowledging the Texas poll tax is not used for racial discrimination.

Carr maintains that, in view of testimony, Congress could not have had Texas in mind when it authorized suits against the levy as a voting requirement under the voting rights act.

Case is set for trial December 1 in Austin.

Amendment Adopted, Rejected — Texas voters split down the middle in the November 2 elections. They approved half of the 10 amendments presented, disapproved the other five.

Amendment No. 4, proposing four-year-terms for state wide officials, was vetoed by almost 50,000 votes. It received more attention than any of the others.

Also defeated were proposals to grant state repres-

entatives four-year terms; extend the veterans land program; authorize salary increases for Lieutenant Governor and Speaker of the House and raise lawmakers' expense allowance; and exempt certain charity hospitals (Hermann Hospital, Houston) from ad valorem taxes.

Voters approved amendments to raise state property tax five cents for college building purposes; provide more state leeway in meeting matching fund requirements of federal programs for needy; liberalize teacher retirement system investment authority; establish an \$85,000,000 loan fund for college students; and provide for compulsory retirement of judges at 75 and authorize machinery for removing judges who are ill or incompetent.
