Transmission System Addition Planned by WTU

Plans to extend a 138,000 volt transmission system into the Trans-Pecos area was announced by West Texas Utilities Company. The company will build a new transmission line from its Rio Pecos plant at Garvin near McCombs to tie in with the company's gas-turbine plant located five miles north of Fort Stockton.

The new 37 mile line will be built to handle 138,000 volt capacity. However, the new line initially be operated at 69,000 volts. This line is an extension of the company's "back-bone" high voltage transmission system which now extends from the Oklahoma border near Quanah down through Abilene and San Angelo and on to McCombs in West Texas.

The line will supplement the existing lines connecting the two plants. Buck Construction Company of Lubbock will begin work on the new line immediately and plans are for it to be in service by March, 1966. The new line will make additional power available for the towns the company serves in the Davis Mountain area; Alpine, Balmorhea, Fort Davis, Marfa and Presidio.

This new construction, it was pointed out, is a part of WTU's program of planning and building to provide the electrical power for the continued development of the towns and communities it serves.

Rushed to the Crockett County Hospital he was taken to San Angelo after x-rays for bone surgery. After 3 1/2 hours in surgery Saturday night doctors seemed to think they would be able to save the leg.

judge was apparently uninjured and fired several shots with his rifle in a vain attempt to summon help. After applying a tourniquet to his daughter's arm and leaving his watch with instructions to loosen the tourniquet at intervals, he set out for help.

He was found by the roadside a short while later about a mile from the scene of the wreck, by Pete North who rushed to the Bailey Ranch and called for help. Having no knowledge of the wreck, officers and a Janes ambulance came upon the scene and picked up the injured girl before arriving at the spot where the Judge had apparently collapsed and died instantly.

Funeral services were held from the Methodist Church at 3 p. m. Wednesday, with Rev. Leonard Garrett, pastor officiating. Burial was in Cedar Hill Cemetery under the directions of James Funeral Home. The body lay in state at the church from 10:00 a. m. until the services began.

Morton Brock Jones was born January 23, 1912, in Corrigan, Polk County, Texas, the son of Mr. and Mrs. S. M. Jones. He was married to Bernice Bailey, daughter of the late John Bailey and Mrs. Bailey, September 1, 1936. Judge Jones was a civil engineer with the Humble Oil & Refining Co. in Houston until moving to Ozona in 1945 where he began ranching operations and later sold insurance and real estate.

Always active in community affairs, he was elected to the office of county judge in 1962 and served in that capacity until his untimely death.

Surviving are the widow, one daughter, Elizabeth, and two sons, Brock, Jr. and Johnny; three brothers, J. R. Jones of New Orleans, John D. and A. B. Jones, both of Houston; and three sisters, Mrs. Neal Madely, Mrs. Will McKinny and Mrs. E. B. Shellenburger all of Houston.

Recipe of the Week From Kitty's Kitchen

With hunting season in swing we felt some venison recipes were in order. One each for sausage, steak and roast.

Venison Sausage

15 lbs. good quality pork (not too fat)
15 lbs. venison
2 teaspoons grated garlic
8 ounces salt
8 ounces pepper
Double grind pork and venison, adding seasonings mixing well. Stuff into casings and store in refrigerator.

Venison Swiss Steak

1 1/2 lbs. round venison steak (1 1/2 inches thick)
3 large onions
1 large celery stalk, cut up
1 cup tomatoes
2 tbs. Worcestershire sauce
salt and pepper to taste

Dredge steak with flour, season with salt and pepper, then brown in fat. When brown on both sides, add other ingredients. Cover tightly and cook in medium oven (350 degrees) until tender, about 1 1/4 hours. Remove meat to platter and make gravy from drippings in pan.

Venison Roast

3 to 4 lb. venison roast, shoulder or ham
1 pkg. Lipton's Onion Soup Mix
salt and pepper
Salt and pepper roast, place in center of large piece of heavy duty foil, sprinkle soup mix over meat, seal in foil, bake at 350 degrees 3 hours.

HIGHLIGHTS AND SIDELIGHTS

Your State Capitol

San Antonio, Texas — Texas' major state government program for widespread coordination of public service activities is being activated.

Gov. John Connally soon will reveal his initial plans for the project that will change across the entire spectrum of governmental services.

FACT, the Planning Agency Council for Texas, was authorized by the 1965 Legislature — primarily to implement the statewide water program. However, Connally wants to broaden its scope to many other areas.

Legislation authorizing a central state planning agency cited the need to coordinate state efforts in the fields of water supply, reclamation, transportation, highways and other programs financed with federal, state and local funds.

Eight major agencies — health, highway, parks and wildlife departments, industrial commission, soil conservation board, Texas employment commission, railroad commission and water development board — were designated by the Legislature as members of the initial staff.

Oil Allowable Hiked — Texas oil production may hit a 10-year high in 1965. This thanks to a jump in December allowable to 31.4 per cent of potential.

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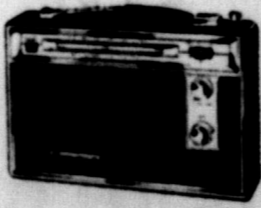
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
