Charles E. Coombes Becomes W.T.U. District Manager As Henry Batjer Reaches Retirement

Changes in the personnel of the San Angelo District Office of West Texas Utilities Company were announced today by Cal Young, WTU President. The changes will be effective January 1 following the retirement of Henry H. Batjer, District Manager.

Charles E. Coombes, Assistant District Manager in San Angelo since 1946 and employed by WTU more than 36 years, will succeed Batjer as District Manager.

Lloyd Cope, District Auditor for the San Angelo District will be promoted to Local Manager in San Angelo. J. B. Anderson, Jr., Assistant District Auditor will succeed Cope as District Auditor.

WTU's San Angelo District includes the cities and towns of San Angelo, Ozona, Sterling City, Eldorado, Sonora, Barnhart, Christoval, Carlsbad, Eola, Knickerbocker, Mereta, Mertzon, Sherwood, Tankersley, Veribest, Wall and Water Valley.

Henry H. Batjer, District Manager in San Angelo since 1934, and an employee of the company for more than 32 years, retires from active service with WTU on January 1.

In February, 1928, Mr. Batjer was employed as a construction engineer on the San Angelo water works system which was then owned and operated by West Texas Utilities Company. The following year he was named commercial manager and assistant district manager, and assumed his duties as district manager in 1934.

Chas. E. Coombes, who will assume his new duties as District Manager January 1, began his long career with the Company in 1924 as a merchandise salesman in Ballinger. During the next four years he worked in Ballinger and Santa Anna and later moved to Menard.

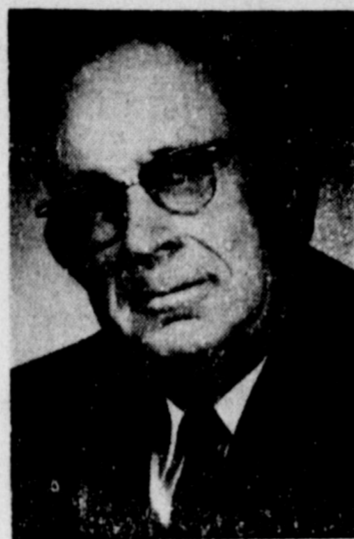
When the Company's new district was organized in 1928 with Mason as district headquarters, Coombes moved to Mason to serve as district merchandise sales manager, and six months later was promoted to District Manager. In 1929 the new district was combined with the Ballinger District, and Coombes returned to Ballinger as district sales manager.

In 1935 he was transferred to Dalhart where he served as District Manager of the Company's Panhandle for 11 years. When the electric and ice properties in that area were sold to Southwestern Public Service Company in 1946, Coombes moved to San Angelo where he has served as Assistant District Manager for the past 14 years.

Born in Benjamin, Texas in 1902, Coombes is the son of the late Charles E. Coombes of Stamford, a pioneer West Texan, former mayor of Abilene, and one of West Texas' best known lawyers.

Few 'Skinned Fenders' Only Traffic Mishaps Despite Heavy Flow

In spite of an unusually heavy through traffic surge during the Christmas holiday week-end, Crockett county has so far escaped serious accidents on the highways and streets and "if our luck holds out over the New Year week-end" as a representative of the Crockett County Sheriff's Department put it, the county will get through the danger period without marring its record of 217 traffic deathless days.

Only a few minor "skinned fenders" disturbed traffic officers during the holiday period to date. Deputy Sheriff Levon Parker reported at mid-week. Officers noted an extremely heavy flow of traffic on Highway 290 during the period, especially on Christmas Eve, Christmas day and the day after, the deputy said. Perhaps the frequent warnings by newspapers, radio and television of the holiday traffic hazards had something to do with it or perhaps it was just the density of the traffic that made people keep in line, but the record in this county remained unblemished to this morning.

Lions To Resume Cage Play Friday On Menard Court

Freeman Returns To Put Team Now At Full Strength

The Ozona Lions returned to the basketball court Tuesday and will travel to Menard Friday night to play Menard in a non-district contest.

Co-Captain Jim Freemann returned to the squad this week after missing all but the first of pre-Christmas games, and his return is expected to give the Lions a big boost, even though Pete Montgomery has come along very well and will continue to play a big role in the Lions guard play.

The Lions finished their pre-holiday play with a five won and four lost mark, winning their last four games, all over teams that had previously beaten them.

Menard, a long time member of district 8-A, is now playing class B ball but has largely the same team that split with the Lions last year in two over-time contests. The Lions, on the other hand, do not have a single starter from last year on the squad.

Coach Brooks Dozier will probably start the same unit that started the last game before the holidays in Ozona, Phillip Carnes and Pete Montgomery at guards, Wayne Albers, Mike Stiles, and Co-Captain Van Miller across the front line. Hal Long, is expected to be back in action soon to bolster the front line along with Carl Montgomery.

In the past two games the Lions have gotten outstanding rebounding efforts from Stiles and Albers while Carnes, Miller and Stiles have led the way in scoring.

Freeman was expected to be the play maker and bulwark of the defense when the year began, and his loss after the first game left the Lions severely crippled, until Pete Montgomery was shifted from the B team to take up the slack left at the guard post.

The Lions have been getting "out shooting" but so far had shown little ability to use their high post in their tandem offense. The frequent zone defenses, and the shortage at guard which had Long in the front line, and then a few other factors which developed along the way, have hampered this development but now with everyone back it is hoped that all of these problems can be worked out before district play begins.

Following Friday night's game, the Lions will entertain the tough Del Rio Wildcats in Ozona next Tuesday and fans who enjoy good basketball will enjoy seeing the Wildcats play even though they may not be a top power, they play colorful basketball.

There will be an A and a B game, with the first game starting at 6:30 and the second game at 8 p. m.

Crockett County 4-H Club members start off the show circuit on Sunday, January 1, when six members take their livestock to the Sand Hills Hereford and Quarter Horse Show at Odessa. Ten fine-wool show lambs will be exhibited by Penn Baggett, Bill Jacoby, Duwain Vinson, Jr., and David Jacoby. Bill and Larry Williams will show two Hereford steers.

Weighing and classifying of lambs will get underway at 1 p. m. Sunday, with the judging taking place on Monday at 8 a. m. Steers will be shown on Thursday, January 5th. Sale of prize winning livestock will be held on Saturday, January 7th.

Mark and Penn Baggett brought home the champion and reserve champion banners in the fat lamb show at Odessa last year, winning out over some 400 top qualified fine-wool show lambs.

Ozona Welder Patents Sanitary Garbage Unit For Home, Business Installation; To Manufacture For Area Distribution

C. O. Spencer, Ozona welder, has perfected and filed for a patent on a unique garbage container unit which meets all sanitary requirements of city and county health departments and garbage collection agencies as well.

The garbage container units, consisting of two cans of specified size mounted on a steel post which is set in concrete in a permanent installation. The cans are easily removable from their mounting for emptying but the covers for the cans are permanently attached to the center post of the unit, thus preventing their damage or

loss in handling by garbage collectors.

The units are manufactured in two sizes, 20-gallon capacity and 26-gallon capacity and sell for \$19.95 for the 20-gallon and \$23.95 for the 26-gallon unit. The units are set in concrete 18 inches deep at a local charge of \$3.00 installation fee.

Mr. Spencer, who has applied for a patent on the invention, has already established markets for the garbage units in San Angelo and other area cities and is engaged in lining up sales representatives throughout the area.

Ozona Student, Sightseeing In Congo, Beaten By Congolese Soldiers On Leopoldville Street

Mercifully the news was slow in getting back to Ozona and that saved the Ozona parents of Roy Harrell a lot of agonizing worry had they known what was happening to him in early October in Leopoldville, the Congo, in Africa.

Before the news had reached Ozona that Roy had been beaten by Congolese soldiers in the strife-torn country on two occasions, his parents had received a telegram from him assuring them of his good health and at Christmas time they received a cablegram greetings from him in Southwest Africa.

But the incident in which he received rough treatment in the Congo was described in detail in the Atlanta (Georgia) Constitution in a dispatch received from its Congo correspondent, Mike Mahoney, who was writing a daily column for the Constitution from the Congo at the time.

How the Ozona parents finally received a copy of the article is something of a story itself.

Mrs. Howard Lemmons of Odessa, formerly of Ozona, has a brother living in North Carolina. The brother, in turn, has a son living in Atlanta. The article about an Ozonan attracted the son's attention, he sent a clipping to his father in North Carolina and the father sent it to Mrs. Lemmons in Odessa and she sent it to the Harrells in Ozona — and they finally got the details of what had happened to their son in Leopoldville. As told by the on-the-scene correspondent, here is the story as filed by Mahoney from Leopoldville, Republic of Congo —

Leopoldville, Republic of Congo — Sunday, Oct. 9, was definitely not a quiet Sunday for Roy A. Harrell Jr., 24, of Ozona, Tex. It started off pleasantly enough but ended up like a nightmare.

Harrell, a graduate student at the School of Advanced International Studies, Johns Hopkins University, Washington, D. C., was on his way from the United States to Stellenbosch University in the Union of South Africa to do research on Portuguese Africa. He had stopped off in Brazzaville, Congo Republic, on Saturday and decided to visit Leopoldville — just across the Congo River — on Sunday.

He chartered a taxi in Brazzaville and the taxi came across the river with him on the 6:30 a. m. ferry. When he landed on the Leopoldville side, he went through immigration and customs without any trouble, but the taxi driver was held up. The driver told Harrell to start walking towards the Boulevard Albert, Leopoldville's main street, and that he would meet him there in a few minutes.

"I had walked about three quarters of the way up the street," Harrell related, "when suddenly (Continued on Last Page)

MORE POWER TO THE CONGRESSMAN

If you don't want to be cozy with Mao Tse-tung, if you don't want to see the prestige of America yielded up under Communist threats to consign the faceless millions of mainland Chinese to unending slavery, if you don't want to sell Free China and Chiang Kai-shek down the River Styx, if you object to playing blind-man's-buff with Castro and the Latino fellow-travellers; if you are opposed to delegating our own national business to the UN (which is neither united nor composed of nations) and decision of our disputes to the "World Court" — tell the Congressman and our Senators before they go back to Washington.

These are all points on which the members of both houses of Congress will have to take a stand in the upcoming session. And regardless of his party or his personal convictions, it is a rare Congressman who has the fortitude to buck the Administration without some assurance from his constituents that they stand with him.

And if you question what the drift will be if left unchallenged by the folks back home, consider the crew that President - elect

Kennedy has assembled to mastermind foreign policy. The chief, according to protocol at least, will be Dean Rusk, former pillar of the Institute of Public Relations and former advisor to President Truman on the Korean War strategy, a champion of sanctuary-for-the-enemy beyond the Yalu and an effective opponent of General MacArthur's win-the-war philosophy.

And at the UN, with the promise of new prestige and greater policy responsibility, will be the diletante historian and politician from Abraham Lincoln's home town, who can't quite make up his mind whether he would rather be Bob Hope or Confucius, and who would "wage peace" by throwing at our enemies whatever they might ask for.

Finally, with Chester Bowles, whose Democratic convention platform was frankly concocted as a best-seller for the minority groups in the party's big-city strongholds, as Undersecretary of State — a man whose fondness for lavish foreign aid — especially for the Asian "neutralist" nations, and whose support of Red Chinese recognition are matters of record — the triumvirate of appeasement is complete!

In the face of this triple-threat, the plain citizen can look only to Congress to halt the debacle that is brewing. But he can do more than look and hope. He can speak and write to those who represent him. He can tell them he wants them to keep America out of the Communist conspiracy, to sustain and enforce Constitutional government and to keep our economic powder dry.

THE BATTLE LOOMS

The parents and the taxpayers of the nation are indebted, we think, to a gentleman named Fred E. Wright for a letter he wrote recently to the Philadelphia Evening Bulletin. He said:

"A curious imbecility has lately come to the fore as a political issue. Spawned by bureaucrats, fomented by misguided school teachers, lip-serviced by politicians, it has gained enough momentum . . . to reach disastrous proportions. . . .

"I speak of the so-called need for Federal aid to education. I speak of Federally - approved school children attending Federally-approved school buildings, using Federally - approved textbooks,

riding Federally-approved school buses, eating Federally-approved menus in Federally-approved cafeterias, taught by Federally - approved school teachers using a Federally-prescribed curriculum. I speak of Pennsylvania supporting the schools of Arkansas, and Arkansas doing the same for South Dakota.

"Is it too much to hope that the American people will not let themselves fall for this unconstitutional solution to a problem which each community must face for itself? Is it too much to expect that Pennsylvania, and each other state, will decide what its own needs are in education and continue to solve its own problems in this field?"

But, let those who applaud Mr. Wright consider the forces with which they must contend, and arm themselves for battle. The busy-body era, in which we have lived for nearly 30 years, has entrenched a fat-cat bureaucracy supported "morally" by the tax-free fat-cat "teachers union" with its fat-cat bankroll for public hypnosis, and physically by fat-headed taxpayers. Further, the question, "Would you deny your children?" is as loaded as "Have you stopped beating your wife?"

The News Reel

A re-run of "The Ozona Story" as gleaned from the files of The Ozona Stockman

From The Stockman, Dec. 31, 1931

Garbage Disposal Plans Outlined

In anticipation of the inauguration of a new type garbage collection and disposal system in Ozona, the Board of Directors of the Crockett County Water Control and Improvement District has authorized the following statement of policy and appeal for cooperation to the end that the system might find maximum favor among the people it seeks to serve:

To help us fight disease and keep our town clean, you are respectfully requested to closely observe the following regulations regarding proper disposal of garbage and refuse.

Receptacle:

Every home owner or tenant shall provide containers of sufficient size and number to hold a week's accumulation. Receptacle shall be constructed of a solid and durable grade metal not to exceed 32 gallons in capacity, the combined weight of the garbage and container shall not exceed 100 pounds. It shall be provided with a suitable close-fitting cover. Keep your garbage can in a sanitary condition at all times. It is recommended that racks be built for garbage cans and lids be secured by a light weight chain to the fence post or other stationary object. This will prevent damage and loss of lids.

Every owner, tenant or occupant is entitled to have garbage and refuse removed twice every week when prepared in accordance with local requirements, unless alleys are impassable.

Preparation:

Garbage must be kept as dry as possible by draining off all liquids and should be sacked or wrapped in paper placed in container.

Other refuse:

Tin cans, small quantities of broken glass, bottles, paper and other refuse of a similar nature should be placed in a container with garbage or in a disposable container such as cardboard box or heavy paper sack. Tree and shrub trimmings will be hauled when prepared in accordance with suggestions set out by Board of Directors and placed between the sidewalk and curb or in alley on the premises concerned. To have trees or shrubs hauled, call the water office, Phone 2-2730.

Construction or remodeling waste, wooden crates and furniture, rocks, bricks, broken concrete, plaster, droppings from animals or fowls will not be removed by the Sanitary Department. Heavy accumulations and industrial waste such as discarded automobile frames, bodies and other heavy bulky refuse and all industrial waste resulting from manufacturing operations must be disposed of by the owner or occupant of the building or premises where such industrial waste originates. It shall be disposed of in such a manner and at such a time as shall be designated by the Board. This shall also include accumulations from packing houses, killing and dressing plants for poultry and fowls, wholesale fruit and vegetable houses or storage.

Location of containers:

In residential area, receptacles as required shall be placed inside of the property line at the edge of the alley where there is no alley fence. Where there is an alley fence, receptacle or receptacles must be placed against the outside of the fence. Where there is no alley, receptacles must be placed in front of property between the sidewalk and curb at a place most accessible to the collectors. Where garbage containers are serviced from the alleys, house numbers should be painted on each can. Under no conditions will garbage vehicles be allowed to enter private property for the purpose of picking up garbage.

Business establishments are required to use the same type of container as that for residences and such containers shall be placed in the alleys, where there is an alley, and where there is no alley, containers must be on or near the curb line of such place of business. All boxes and cartons must be broken down and tied into bundles not exceeding 75 pounds in weight. Business establishments having such quantities of waste paper to make use of barrels impractical are requested to use paper balers or incinerators of a type as may be

approved by the fire department.

Dump grounds:

The new dump grounds and sanitary fill is located just south of the town of Ozona. The dump ground will be open between the hours of 8 a. m. and 6 p. m. and there will be a man on duty at all times during the dumping hours. No charge will be made for the use of this dump for the residents of the town of Ozona. All persons hauling waste material will be expected to handle the trash and refuse in such a manner as to prevent it from scattering on the highways and streets.

Nuisances and unsanitary conditions will be handled by the county health officer.

Complaints:

Do not enter into controversy with workmen concerning garbage collection. To make a complaint call the Crockett County Water Control and Improvement District office, your Sanitary Department, Phone 2-2730. In making a complaint, be sure to give name and correct address.

The above suggestions, if met, will enable us to keep Ozona clean and give you more efficient service. We will appreciate your cooperation.

It is caused by several different kinds of microscopic nematodes or worms that live in the soil. This condition should not be confused with root nodules that form on roots.

Many people discover the disease on old plants at this time of the year when replacin shrubs or trees that have died. Half-rotted knots about the size of marbles or smaller may be found on smaller roots of diseased shrubs or trees. Affected shrubs or trees that lack vigor and die slowly over a period of several months or years is a common symptom, also a die-back condition of limbs may also be present.

Root knot nematodes are commonly found on many ornamental plants including boxwood, begonia, clematis, coleus, dahlia, European elm, fig, gardenia, hollyhock, peach, peony, rose, sweet pea, violet and weeping mulberry.

Several cultural practices and chemicals can be used for control, primarily as preventive measures.

Care should be taken in selecting nursery stock to avoid getting infestations of root knot nematode. Cultural practices such as drying out of the soils may be employed. If chemical control is desired such nematocides as ethylene dibromide, dichloropene, methyl bromide, vapam, VPM, Nema X, nemagone, fumazone and others may be used. Dealing with a reliable nurseryman on your nursery stock will usually eliminate most of these troubles. They will sell you only healthy plants and will make good those that do not live, if such diseases do exist in the plants.



I was jumped from behind by four Force Publique (Congolese Army) soldiers and pulled down into the street. They were all armed with rifles and bayonets and they proceeded to kick and pummel me. After about five minutes of this, a fifth soldier came up, jerked me to my feet, and told me — in very poor French — to get going.

"By this time my driver had come up and was waiting for me a little way up the street. I ran and got into the taxi and he took me to the Hotel Memling (a block off the Boulevard Albert)."

Harrell then spent several hours at the Memling recuperating from his frightening experience. He telephoned the U. S. Embassy during this time and told them what had happened. They asked him to be more careful in the future. "They seemed to think what had happened to me was about part of the course," he said.

After lunch, Harrell decided he would have another try at seeing the city. His driver took him to the African townships on the edge of the city, the zoo, the now mostly-deserted European residential areas, the Stanley monument — which is on a hill overlooking the city — and finally to the carefully guarded residence of Congo President Joseph Kasavubu. Here Harrell's luck ran out again.

The taxi drove up to the gate of the residence and stopped. Before he had time to even take his camera out of its case, the four Force Publique soldiers who were guarding the entrance came up to the car, jerked open the doors. Two of the soldiers dragged him out onto the ground while the other two did the same to the hapless taxi driver. The soldiers then proceeded to beat both of them.

"It seemed as if they must have mauled me for 20 minutes", Harrell said.

Mr. and Mrs. Vic Montgomery are to leave Ozona Friday for Dallas where they will be guests of the Cotton Bowl Association on the occasion of the twenty-fifth anniversary of the first Cotton Bowl game, in which Mr. Montgomery took part as a player on the TCU team.

Harrell said. "One of them kept saying in French, 'You are a white man — you are a white man — take off your glasses — we want to see the frightened eyes of a white man. Finally six other soldiers came up and one of them helped me to my feet. I asked him if I could sit down by the side of the road as I was very dazed. This he let me do. I saw then that they were still beating my poor taxi driver. They kept yelling at him: 'You are not an African — you are a Frenchman (Brazzaville was formerly the capital of French Equatorial Africa) — just because you are black that doesn't mean you are an African.'"

The soldiers then made Harrell take the film out of his camera and give it to them. (He had some pictures of the famed Dr. Albert Schweitzer on the roll which he had taken in Lambarene Gabon Republic, the site of Schweitzer's jungle hospital). They then made him empty everything out of his shirt and pants pockets. In one pocket was a traveler's check for \$20 which they made him sign at gunpoint and give to them.

"They then told me to get out of there," Harrell related, "I walked a little way and then took off on a dead run. They were still beating my taxi driver the last I saw of him. I think one reason they beat him so long was because he resisted them. I didn't fight back because I knew it would only make matters worse."

Harrell said that while he was being pummeled, a car full of European drove up, saw what was going on, and left in a great hurry. He also stated that one Norwegian soldier and several Ghanan troops who were attached to the United Nations forces stood off a distance while he was being beaten and did nothing to stop it. He was rather bitter about this fact when he related the incident to this reporter later.

He found another taxi after leaving Kasavubu's residence and returned to the Hotel Memling. There he told some people what had happened and they told him he should contact the U. N. officials in Leopoldville. But as it was Sunday, they were very difficult to get in touch with; so he took a taxi to the port and boarded the ferry for Brazzaville.

"I didn't begin to relax until we reached the middle of the Congo River," he said. "I have never been so scared in my life. I was literally petrified. I had broken out in a cold sweat and was shaking all over. I am naturally fairly dark-complexioned, but I was as white as a sheet. I had really had enough of Leopoldville!"

Harrell was very lucky to have escaped without serious injuries. When I interviewed him about the incident on Monday morning, he was in good shape physically and had no bad bruises or cuts.

An hour and a half after Harrell had been attacked Sunday in front of Kasavubu's house, this reporter arrived at the same spot by taxi and took a picture of the residence from the car window — not knowing, of course, what had transpired earlier. One of the Congolese guards blew a whistle and motioned my driver to stop the vehicle. Two guards then came up to the car, told me it was forbidden to take pictures and demanded my film. I showed them my U. N. press card and pretended that I didn't know what they were talking about. We kept up this play-acting for 30 minutes. Finally, a Ghanan soldier arrived on the scene and between us he persuaded the Congolese soldiers that they should let both me and my film go.

I stayed in Leopoldville for three days, wandering all over the city and suburbs at will, and this was the only trouble — if it could be called that — I encountered during my entire stay.

On the surface, the city was peaceful and quiet. The hotels

were operating normally and comfortably, bars and night clubs were going full swing, and I even saw — much to my astonishment — white women walking down back streets unaccompanied. The only thing that reminded me from time to

time that this was Leopoldville was the two-man teams of blue-helmeted U. N. soldiers who were nonchalantly patrolling the streets at distant intervals.

I must admit they were a very reassuring sight, however, for the

city was almost too peaceful — quiet — like the calm before a storm. And somehow you never very well that if those blue helmets had not been there, the atmosphere would have been very differently different.



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
