





Art. 6.06 of the Election Code provides that the voter shall mark out the names to vote for, but that the failure to do so shall not invalidate the ballot if the intention of the voter is clear in the opinion of the election judge. Art. 8.21, however, provides that no ballot shall be counted if the candidates for more than one party are left unscratched.

Since, apparently, both laws cannot be applied, the individual Precinct Judge is left with the burden of deciding which law is just. This inconsistency in the law has contributed to the irregular pattern of vote disqualification between not only counties, but precincts within counties.

For instance, within this county, returns from Precinct 2 showed 3 voters disqualified from a total of 178 votes cast, for a low rate of about 11/2 percent. Precinct 5 on the other hand had 7 votes "thrown out" of a total of 42 cast or about 16 percent disqualified.

Other illustrative figures in this county include Precinct 1 with 16% votes not counted; Precinct 9 with 0 per cent not counted; Precinct 4 with 9 per cent not counted; and Precinct 6 with 3% votes disqualified.

Register For American College Test Program

The three-hour tests, to be given Saturday, February 25 in 48 states and the District of Columbia, are required or recommended for admission to more than 500 colleges and universities in 23 states.

These 23 states, which have ACT-affiliated college testing programs, are Alabama, Alaska, Arkansas, California, Colorado, Idaho, Illinois, Iowa, Kansas, Kentucky, Minnesota, Mississippi, Missouri, Montana, Nebraska, Nevada, North Dakota, Ohio, Oklahoma, South Dakota, Tennessee, Texas and Wisconsin.

Participating colleges use ACT results for student guidance and admissions and for awarding scholarship aid to applicants, as well as for placing freshmen in classes or programs suited to their abilities.

The ACT test has four parts that yield five scores - a composite score indicating over-all college potential, and four separate scores indicating levels of general capability in English, mathematics, social studies and the natural sciences. ACT scores and manuals explaining how results may be interpreted are furnished colleges indicated by students and are sent to the student's high school for his and the school's use in guidance. Further information about ACT tests, taken by more than 125,-000 high school seniors last year may be obtained in the principal's office. 000
