It could be that the venerable Sam Rayburn, erstwhile Speaker of the House, who, as campaign manager for Lyndon Johnson failed to get his boy nominated for the Presidency, has won a Pyrrhic victory in packing the House Rules Committee.

Chairman Howard Smith of Virginia, a fellow Democrat who fought to the last ditch against this unseemly White House interference with the traditional and orderly regulation of legislative traffic, has acknowledged defeat in the gracious manner of a Virginia gentleman. Since it is the recorded wish to a majority of the House that the Rules Committee is to function as a sluice rather than a sieve, so be it.

In bowing to the inevitable, Chairman Smith may well inundate the House floor with bills—thousands of 'em—for the White House stooges to strangle on. None of whom would be more dismayed than Mr. Rayburn.

Woody Mason Presides At Auto Dealer Meet In San Angelo Feb. 15

Texas Automotive Dealers Association President F. D. "Bud" Mitchell and Executive Vice President H. C. Uittman will be featured speakers at a dinner meeting of all factory-authorized new car dealers in this area at the Cactus Hotel in San Angelo on Wednesday evening, February 15.

Woody W. Mason, TATA Director and Ozona Ford dealer, in announcing the meeting, stated Mr. Pittman's talk will be entitled "How Far Is It To Austin?" A former Executive Assistant Attorney General and Chairman of the Texas Industrial Accident Board Pittman will report on the status of car dealers under the federal wage and hour law and other matters of particular interest to Texas automobile dealers. On to looking after a nation of this scope, Mr. Davidson's activities were expanded a couple of big outfits with a captain in charge of each, shear and neighbor's sheep. Meanwhile, too, he was extensively in the business, buying and other livestock. He was in the cattle business association with his stuck with cattle leaving the sheep business and the children, son built up one of the registered Hereford section. He and Mrs. Davidson made the big time show in Houston to Ft. Worth, and to Kansas City, won many ribbons and on the fine registered

A breeder and fancier of fine horses and a lover of competition, Mr. Davidson took naturally to a love of the rodeo and was always prominent in roping circles where horses of his breed often starred. One of the most fabulous rodeos in the United States was one that Mr. Davidson sponsored at his own headquarters ranch south of Ozona for many years.

Spurning proffered help from ropers and cowboys who flocked to the annual event, his hospitality was extended to ropers, friends and strangers for three fabulous days each year at the "Davidson Rodeo". Visitors bedded down on the flats around the rodeo arena he had erected, ate their meals at the grub camp maintained by Mr. Davidson throughout the three-day period. Everybody was welcome, nobody needed to show an "invitation" to be admitted and everybody had a wonderful time.

He was a thirty-second degree Mason, past Patron of Ozona O. E. S. chapter, a Shriner, past Worshipful Master of Ozona Masonic Lodge and a lifetime member of the Ozona Methodist Church.

Mr. Davidson suffered a severe coronary thrombosis on Sept. 1, 1953, while riding a tractor pitting his land to retain what meager moisture might be available in that period of drought. He never recovered from that attack but remained fairly active until October of 1956, when he suffered another attack and complications. He entered the Crockett County Hospital in March, 1957, and had been a patient continuously since that time, although he was able to go for rides in his car with Mrs. Davidson frequently.

He is survived by his wife; one son, Joe Tom Davidson; his son's wife, Donna Beth, and four grandchildren, Becky Davidson Madray (Mrs. Giles) of San Antonio, Ann, Barbara and Joe Tom III (Tom) all of Ozona; one brother, Charles E. Davidson, Jr., of Ozona; five sisters, Mrs. W. J. Grimmer of Winfield, Iowa, Mrs. Bryan McDonald of Canyon, Texas, Mrs.

Frank McMullan, Sr., of Ozona, Mrs. Robert J. Meybin of Sewickley, Pa., and Mrs. Mark Garver of Little Rock, Ark.

to \$50,000 may be retained in the county's treasury.

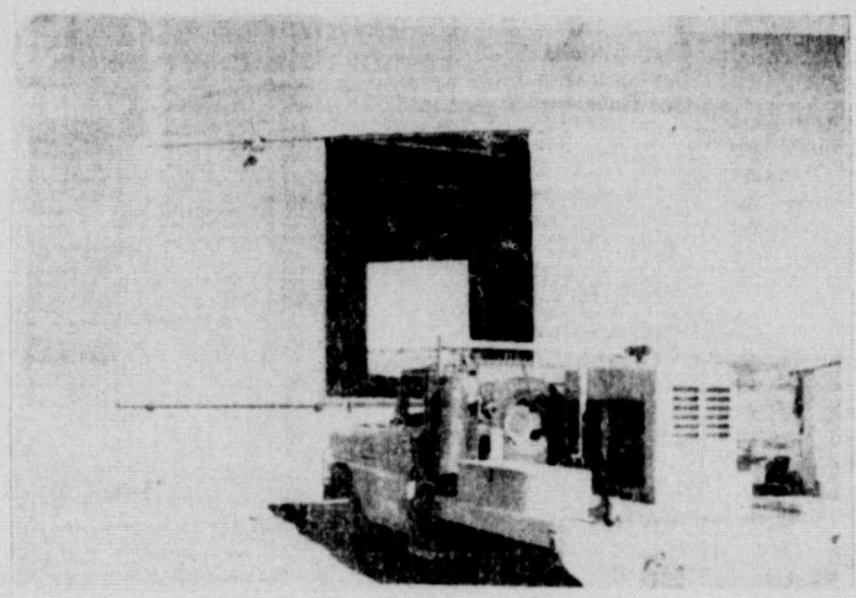

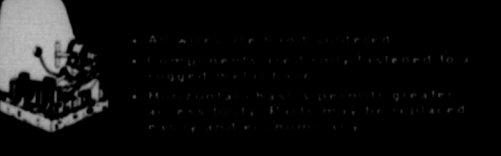

The surprise anniversary gathering took place at the Dudley ranch home on the Pecos river in Crockett county. Present were the Dudleys' three sons, Roger, Jr., and Walter who ranch on the home place, Lee Dudley who ranches near Sanderson, and Betty (Mrs.

J. W. Mnuell) from near Fort Stockton, and their families. Also present were Mrs. Dudley's brother-in-law and sister, Mr. and Mrs. Billy Stewardson of Roswell, N. M. The couple's three grandchildren were among the family gathering.

At the time of his wedding, Mr. Dudley was in charge of a garage for the repair and maintenance of the few cars that were in service in Ozona. He was employed by the late L. B. He was making \$60 a month before his wedding and as a wedding present received a \$5 a month raise, he recalls.

layed while the bridegroom went to fix the balky car.

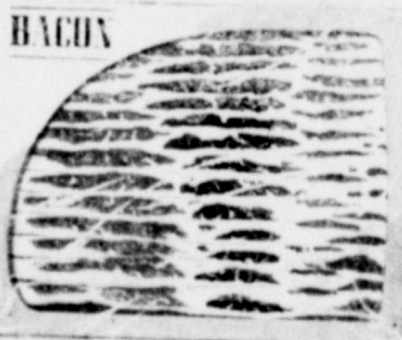

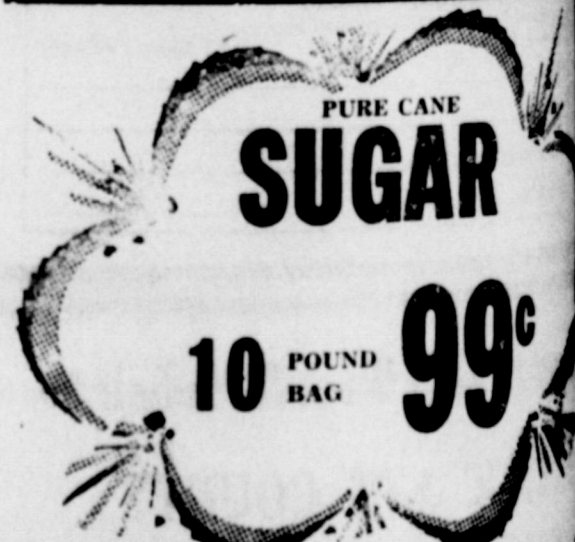
