22-Degree Temperature Discouraging To Trees, Shrubs Trying To Bud

If you thought, just because the buds are swelling, fruit trees are blooming, grass and weeds are green and the sunshine has been warm, that all these things indicated winter is over and spring is here, you had a rude shock this morning.

From somewhere, probably to the north, came below — way below — freezing temperature in the Ozona environs early Thursday morning. The temperature sagged to 22 degrees in the early morning hours, with only a slight breeze from the northwest and barely enough moisture to make a thin coating of frost on metal objects.

Temperatures for the past week have been mild, reaching the high seventies in the daytime. This morning's low temperature was the tailend of a cold front which swept in with high winds and dust Tuesday.

3 Ozona Players Named To All-Dist. Basketball Teams

Carnes On First Team, Long And Miller On Second Team

Three Ozona Lions were named to the All-District basketball squad named by district 8-A coaches, according to word from district headquarters located in Sonora this year.

Phillip Carnes, fiery Ozona guard and play maker as well as the Lions second scorer in district play, was named to the first team while Hal Long, the Lion's leading point maker, and Van Miller, co-captain of the Lions, were both named to the second squad.

Each team in the district placed one player on the first team with Big Lake and Ozona each placing two on the second squad.

Named to the first team were, Gene West of Sonora, Greer Kothman of Junction, Bobby Hubbard of Big Lake and Jim Runge of Eldorado, with Carnes filling out the team.

The second squad was composed of Primo Gonzales of Sonora, Hal Long of Ozona, Van Miller of Ozona, Fin Watkins of Big Lake, and James Mann of Big Lake.

Long led the Lions in scoring in district play but started district play slowly, not really playing very good basketball until the second round. Miller led the Lions in pre-season play but fell off in his scoring when district began.

Even though not a smooth performer, Carnes averaged almost 11 point per contest and distinguished himself on defense and with his hustle and desire to win.

All three Lions named to the squad are juniors. Carnes was the only non-senior on the first team while one of the second team was a senior.

Long led the Lions scorers with 117 points in eight games for a 14.5 average. Long played well on defense and rebounded strongly in the second half of play but did neither very well in the first half.

Crockett Rambouillet Breeders Place In San Angelo Sheep Showing

Two Ozona exhibitors won places in the registered Rambouillet sheep show at the San Angelo exposition this week.

T. A. Kineaid, Jr., Crockett county Rambouillet breeder, took 5th and 6th places in the two-tooth ram showing, third in the pen of three two-tooth rams and fifth place in the two-tooth ewe division.

Pam Jones, young 4-H club breeder, showed the fourth place pen of three two-tooth ewes, fifth place in get of sire and ninth place in two-tooth ewe showing.

Wildcat Location, Two Outposts Spotted In West Crockett Area

Crockett County gained location for a wildcat and two outposts during the past week.

Plymouth Oil Co., Midland, will drill the No. 13-00 Noelke Livestock Co. as a 2,000-foot wildcat in the Olson multipay field of Crockett County, 16 miles southeast of Iraan.

Location is 1,595.45 feet from the south and 990 feet from the east lines of 10-GG-T&NO.

The Olson field produces from the San Andres and Grayburg between 1,860-2,040 feet.

The field has one Wolfcamp well producing from 5,381 feet. Canyon production is depleted. Gulf Oil Corp. has field application to complete as a two-mile southeast extension to the Farmer (San Andres) field of Crockett County, its No. 1-IS State, former 2,800-foot stratigraphic test, 13 1/2 miles southeast of Big Lake.

Location is 2,310 feet from the north and west lines of 22-47-University.

Gulf Oil Corp. will drill the No. ST-1-1W, a 2,800-foot stratigraphic test in Crockett County, 15 miles southeast of Big Lake and 1 1/2 miles south-southeast of the Farmer (San Andres) field.

Location is 2,310 feet from the south and 1,650 feet from the east lines of 5-46-University.

El Cinco Production Co., Ltd., Midland, No. 1 C. D. Johns, in 24-31-H&TC, Crockett County wildcat, five miles southwest of McCamey and 1 1/2 miles southeast of the Crossett, South (Devonian) field, recovered 250 feet of heavily gas-cut and slightly water-cut mud on a drillstem test in the Devonian.

Tool was open 1 1/2 hours on the test taken between 5,236 - 5,405 feet. Flowing pressure was 70-150 pounds; 30-minute shut-in pressure, 2,285-1,470 pounds. The project, slated for 6,000 feet, was preparing to drill ahead.

West Texas Track And Field Talent To Assemble Saturday

The largest field of entries in the history of the Ozona relays is expected on hand Saturday as twenty-two teams vie for the title in the ninth running of the Ozona Invitational relays.

Meet Director Chick Womack revealed this week that of the twenty-five invitations extended twenty-two had been returned indicating they would be on hand.

Fred Sallings of Miles will once again be the starter for the meet with members of the Ozona Public School faculty and volunteer help from among the Ozona track carrying out the many duties connected with running off a meet.

The Ozona Lions, who are defending the title won for the past two years, will be in for some stiff competition this year as the big field moves into Ozona.

The Lions hopes in the 440 relay were struck a blow in the Ft. Stockton meet when newcomer Freddy Dobbs, who had been showing well in drills, pulled a muscle and may be out for a month or more.

Replacing Dobbs will be two new squad members from the basketball squad, brothers, Carl and Pete Montgomery. The Montgomery brothers will join the veterans Tony Parker and Jim Doran to give the Ozona team a lineup that is expected to hold at least until Dobbs is ready again.

The Lions have considerable strength in the hurdles where Phil Carnes, the Lions lone winner in Ft. Stockton, leads a group of able hurdlers, some of whom may not be ready this early in the season but are expected to be strong contenders by district meet time.

The Lions are expected to be strong in the 880 relay, the dashes and the broad and high jumps. Coach Womack said Tuesday that he felt that they could win the critical points needed from other district schools but could not guess how other competition would affect the expected points that Eldorado and Junction stand to make in district.

Challenging Ozona with strong squads will be Eldorado, Junction, Sanderson, Mason, and Eden with Sonora being a good chance of being a big point winner.

Teams indicating that they would be present are: Eldorado, Sonora, Big Lake, Junction, Sanderson, Rankin, Iraan, Bronte, Robert Lee, Bandera, Rock Springs, Barnhart, Christoval, Ackerly, Mason, Miles, Grand Falls, Menard, Garden City, Melvin, and Eden in addition to host Ozona.

As best as can be determined this early in the season, the records now established in the Ozona meet do not seem to be in any great danger, but Sanderson has a great half miler and Bandera is reported to have a good vaulter.

Most of the teams entered in the Ozona meet will be in action for the first time this season, however, making it difficult to predict just where the great performances will be coming from.

A norther which blew into Ozona Tuesday gave some hope that the weather, which has a way of being had at this meet, might be good for a change.

Notes From The County Agent's Office

The revised inventory estimates will have a favorable effect on stocker prices of cattle, according to Lloyd Bergsma, livestock marketing specialist with the Extension Service at Texas A&M College. It is not likely that this favorable effect will more than offset the effect of expected lower slaughter cattle prices this fall. As usual light stocker cattle will be in strong demand this spring. Producers with stocker and feeder cattle for sale should take advantage of any price bulge, suggests Mr. Bergsma.

Texas cattle numbers are up as total numbers increased three percent during 1960. The January 1, 1961, cattle inventory of 9.4 million head is the largest cattle population in Texas since 1891.

Sheep and lamb numbers increased four percent in Texas during 1960 to reach an estimated total of 6.2 million head.

The increase in sheep numbers in Texas was contrary to the National trend. Sheep and numbers in the U. S. declined one percent during 1960.

A six percent increase in goat and kid numbers in Texas during 1960 places the total inventory at 3.5 million head.

Certified seed growers in the state have produced their first crop of premier, a new variety of side-outs grama, and reports indicate they are very pleased with the results. The Texas Agricultural Experiment Station, developers of Premier, took a survey of growers and found that most thought the new strain was as good or better in every way than Contrado, Uvalde, Vaughn or El Paso.

All the growers surveyed said they would recommend Premier to their friends because of its outstanding quality.

One of Premier's greatest advantages over other commercial varieties is its ability to grow under limited moisture conditions. Another is its tendency to retain its spikes after maturity, thus allowing more time for harvesting.

Forage production is another of Premier's strong points. The seed germinates readily, and the seedling develops into mature plants in approximately 120 days. This, coupled with the plant's ability to produce long, broad leaves, makes for a bountiful forage production in a relatively short time.

Premier is recommended for the areas bounded by Lubbock, Sonora, Stephenville and Marfa. It should be planted in sandy loam, loam and clay loam soils at the rate of one pound of pure live seed per acre. Seeding should be done in early spring, and competitive plants should be controlled by

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spraying or mowing. Seed should be available from commercial seed producers for spring planting.

30 JUNIORS TAKE NATIONAL MERIT SCHOLARSHIP TEST

Thirty students at the Ozona High School took the National

Merit Scholarship Qualifying Test J. A. Peltó Principal, announced. The test was at the High School at 9:00 a. m. Tuesday March 7. All students who wish to be considered for Merit Scholarships to be awarded in 1962 took the test at that time.

The qualifying test was a three-hour examination of educational development. The test is the first step in the seventh annual competition for four-year Merit Scholarships provided by the National Merit Scholarship Corporation and by sponsoring corporations, foundation associations, and individuals.

The number of scholarships awarded in any year depends upon the extent of sponsor participation. In 1960, 831 scholarships were awarded; 514 were provided by 115 sponsors and 317 by the Merit Corporation. There are 3,132 Merit Scholars attending 391 colleges in the current academic year.

The scores of students who took the test on March 7 will be reported to their schools before the end of the spring semester in time for use by class advisers. The scores are used in many high schools to help students make edicions about college attendance and field of study. Many students who do not expect to win a scholarship take the test in order to learn more about their individual strengths and weaknesses in the areas measured by the test.

H.J.R. #4 provides for distribution, ANNUALLY, among all counties that do not have race tracks, one-half of the STATE TAX REVENUE obtained from horse racing. Each county would receive approximately \$1.00 per capita population the first year. Counties where the tracks are located would receive 2% of parimutuel handle. The state's tax income from horse racing alone would run close to \$12,000,000 the very first year—possibly more—besides all the income tourists would bring to Texas—which would amount to millions of dollars, plus a great ad valorem tax on race tracks, breeding farms and many valuable race horses.

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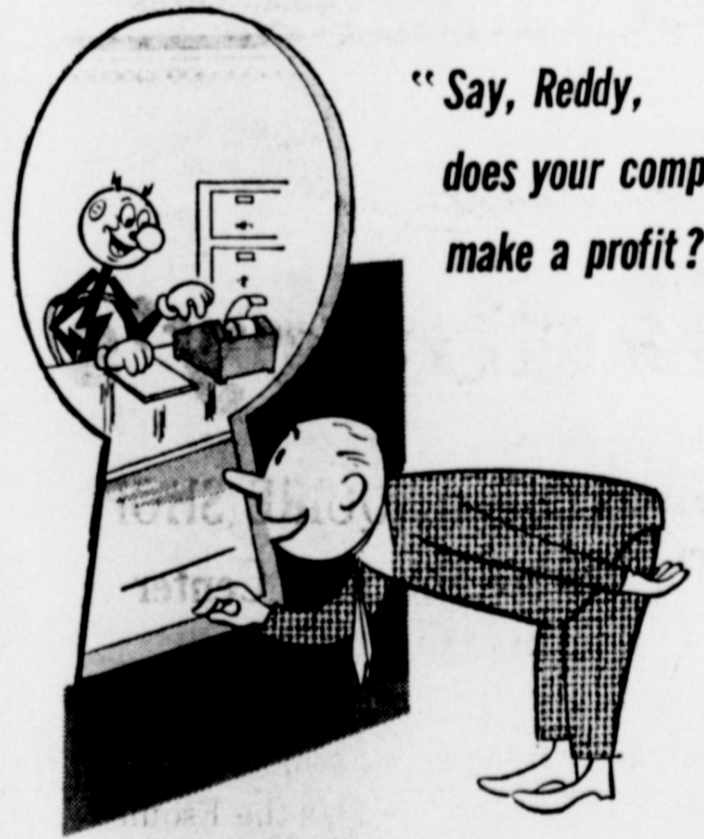

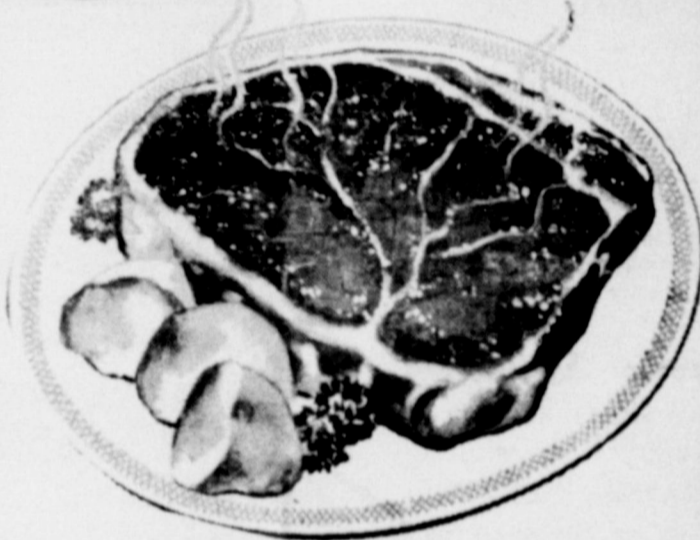

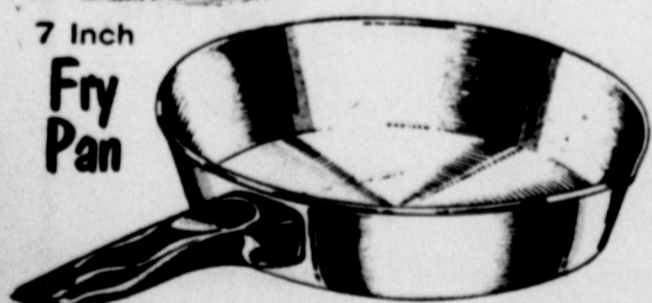
