The proposal of Troy Williams, Ozona rancher and business men, to construct a new postoffice building for Ozona has been accepted by the Post Office Department in Washington, according to a telegram received Wednesday by the Stockman from Congressman J. T. Rutherford in Washington.

The new building to house the local Post Office will be at 12th Street and Avenue F. It will contain 3,384 sq. ft. of floor space.

The building will be located on the north and west edges of the lot, allowing for a 40-foot paved parking space across the south end of the lot and a driveway and loading dock on the east side of the building.

The Post Office Department expects the building to be ready for occupancy by November 30, 1961.


