**Education Of Public Stressed In Annual April Cancer Drive**

The three-word imperative, "Guard Your Family," will again be the theme for the American Cancer Society Crusade which will be under way during the month of April.

For the third successive year, the family theme will be used in conjunction with the life-saving phrase, "Fight Cancer With a Checkup and a Check," it was announced by Mrs. H. B. Tandy, Crusade chairman.

The combined slogan sums up the cancer problem and what to do about it, said Mrs. Tandy, in discussing plans for the Society's 1961 educational and fund-raising Crusade. "Two of three families here and in the country at large will eventually be struck by cancer. Regular health checkups are their best protection against the disease, and checks are the means to support the scientists who are searching for a cancer cure or preventive."

Pointing out that 85,000 Americans die needlessly of cancer each year because they went to their doctors too late, Mrs. Tandy said the Society gives top priority in its April Crusade to its educational effort to prevent the tragic loss of life. "The free literature distributed by volunteers in their house-to-house calls," she said, "is designed to stimulate regular health checkups among all adults or early detection of cancer, when most cancers are readily curable."

**PERFECTS LAB GADGET**

James G. Conaway, medical technologist with the Crockett County Hospital, has perfected an inexpensive apparatus to eliminate the "spill factor" in use of a commercial immersion oil in high magnification microscopy. A simple gadget attached to the microscope allows the operator to dispense the immersion oil (used to concentrate light rays in high magnification) by a slight pressure on a rubber tube while peering through the eyepiece, the gadget eliminating the clutter of additional equipment and the danger of spilling of the immersion oil. The apparatus will be described in a forthcoming issue of the Medical Technologists Journal.

### Notes From The County Agent's Office

The pecan nut casebearer is the major insect pest attacking pecans in Texas. Casebearers can be successfully controlled if insecticides are applied in the proper manner and at the correct time, according to Extension Service Entomologists. For a proper control program, timing of the spray application with good coverage and use of adequate spray equipment, are most important.

Insecticides must be applied at about the time the eggs are hatching or before the young worms have entered the nuts. Proper coverage is essential in order to deposit an insecticide residue on the nut cluster and on the stem a few inches below the cluster. Good equipment is essential to force a sufficient volume of spray through the foliage, directly on the twigs and nut clusters in all areas of the trees. Inadequate coverage, more than any other factor, is responsible for poor control of the pecan nut casebearer. Since the insect feeds over a small area, the insecticide must be uniformly distributed.

In carrying out a successful casebearer control program, it is important to know and understand the life history. Casebearers overwinter as small worms inside tiny silken cocoons called hibernacula which are usually attached to a bud. In the spring, the larvae emerge from their hibernacula, feed for a short time on the buds and then tunnel in the developing shoots until they reach maturity. Pupation usually occurs in these burrows in the shoots and the moths emerge in late April and May. The presence of wilted shoots which have been tunneled out is a good indication that control measures will be required for the next generation of larvae in the nuts. About 9 days are required for development of the pupal stage.

Two or three days after the adults emerge, females deposit eggs on the tips of the nuts. The bluish-white eggs are deposited singly. In a few hours, small red spots appear in the egg. These spots increase in size until the egg is pinkish to reddish. The worms which hatch from these eggs are known as first generation casebearer larvae. The period of egg laying usually coincides with the completion of pollination at which time the tips of the tiny nuts turn brown. This is the period when the control program should be started.

The exact time of egg laying will vary from one season to the next. Also, the time of egg laying may vary from one location to the next during the same year even though the locations are only a few miles apart. Consequently, the most effective means for determining the best time to spray is by checking and observing the developmental stage of the casebearer.

Casebearer eggs hatch in 4 to 5 days. When the small forms hatch, most of them leave the tips of the nuts and migrate to the buds below the nut cluster to feed. After two or three days' feeding, the worms leave the buds and enter the base of the nut. From the time the eggs are deposited, about 6-8 days pass before the nuts are attached. Depending upon environmental conditions, 4-5 days are required for the eggs to hatch and the young worms feed on the buds for 2-3 days. One larva of the first generation frequently destroys an entire nut cluster. The length of the larvae period is about 25 days. To obtain good control, insecticides should be applied during the interval when eggs are hatching or when the young worms are feeding on the buds.

Ordinarily, only one application of spray is required to control the casebearer. If heavy rains occur shortly after treatment, benefit may result from another application. Generally, growers tend to spray too early and much of the effectiveness of the insecticides is lost before the insect appear. If several days are required to spray large orchards, it may be necessary to start the operation before the optimum time. Therefore, if possible, select one of the recommended insecticides which has a long residual effect. When the larvae reach maturity they pupate in the hollowed out nuts and emerge as moths. The female moths deposit eggs of the second generation which appear about 6 weeks after the first generation eggs are laid. At this time the nuts are nearly half grown and the eggs are usually deposited in grooves near the tip and base of the nuts or on buds below the nut clusters. The eggs hatch in about 5 days and the larvae feed in the leaf axis below the nuts for a short time. Then the larvae migrate to the nut cluster, enter at the base of a nut and hollow out the inside. Less injury is produced by this generation because the nuts are larger and each larvae requires only one or two nuts to complete its development. To control second generation casebearers an application of insecticides may be necessary if trees in the vicinity were not sprayed to control first genera-

tion larvae or if poor control of the first generation was obtained.

A third generation usually follows but the shells of the nuts have become hard and only a few of them are penetrated by the larvae. A number of third generation larvae construct hibernacula while the remainder pupate and appear as adults, emerging during August, September and October. These adults deposit eggs which hatch into fourth generation larvae. If nuts are available, their shucks constitute the principal food of the larvae of this generation until they prepare for winter. In the absence of nuts, the larvae feed on buds and leaf stems. Overwintering cocoons or hibernacula are constructed by the very small larvae by the middle of November.

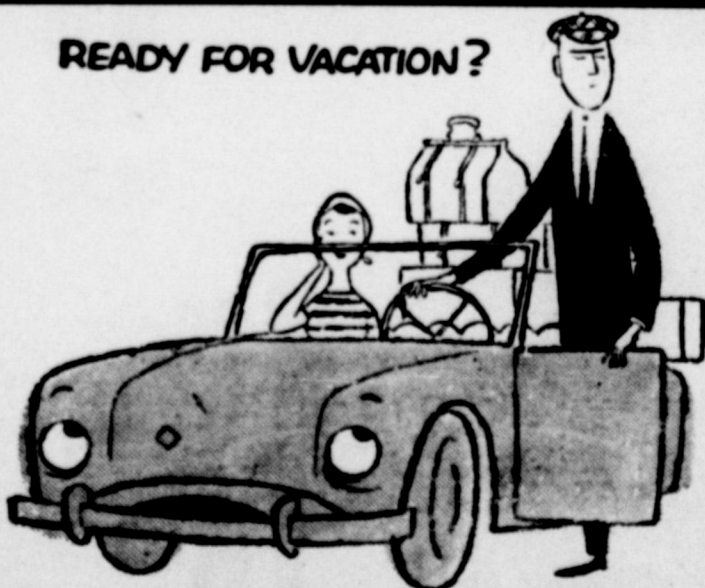
