Cosden Miller Test Logs Show; Outpost Spotted

Cosden To Drill New Baggett Strawn Gas Field Test

A Crockett County outpost recovered shows in a shallow zone and a deep test was staked in the same vicinity.

Cosden Petroleum Corp., Big Spring, No. 2 Roy Miller, in 2-0-TCRR, 2 1/2-mile northeast outpost to Strawn gas production in the Refoil multiphase field, eight miles southwest of Ozona, recovered oil saturated lime and good stain on a core cut between 3,309-16 feet, possibly Wichita-Albany.

The section from 3,309-16 feet was fractured and oil saturated the section at 3,619 feet, oil saturated. The entire recovery showed good stain.

Drilling continued below 3,344 feet in lime and shale on a 9,800-foot contract.

Cosden Petroleum Corp., Big Spring, will drill its No. 1-C E. G. Baggett as a 1 1/4-mile east outpost to the three-well Baggett (Strawn gas) field, 12 miles southwest of Ozona.

Location is 2,310 feet from the south and east lines of 23-F-GC&SF. Scheduled depth is 9,500 feet.

It is also 1 1/2-mile west and slightly north of the two-well Joe "T" (Strawn gas) field.

Sinclair Oil & Gas Co. No. 1-154 University Crockett, opener and lone producer of the Block 46 (Graybury) field, 16 miles northwest of Ozona, has become depleted.

It was finished Nov. 19, 1959, for a daily pumping potential of 16 barrels of oil and 16 barrels of water, through perforations between 1,880-2,197 feet.

Drilled to 9,930 feet for test in the Ellenburger, it was plugged back to 2,363 feet.

Location is 1,980 feet from the south and 660 feet from the west lines of 8-46-University.

New Winter Assault Brings Mercury Drop, With Meager Moisture

Whether it's the "Easter spell" or just a winter that won't give up, the threat of spring fever was erased the middle of this week when erstwhile summer temperatures plummeted to the mid-thirties to the accompaniment of cold drizzle and icy winds.

The new winter assault brought more than uncomfortable temperatures to some parts of Texas, producing tornadoes and damaging hailstorms in the north central and northeast parts of the state earlier in the week.

The moisture, a welcome part of the weather change for this area, has been meager up to this morning but continued cloudy weather and drizzle is forecast for the rest of today and tonight and ranchmen were hopeful that the disturbance would produce enough top-of-the-ground moisture, at least, to kick off new spring growth.

Wildcat On Helbing Land Seeks Extension Of Refoil Gas Field

Chambers & Kenedy, Midland, will drill a 9,400-foot Strawn wildcat in Crockett County, 20 miles southwest of Ozona and 2 1/2 miles north of Strawn gas production in the Refoil multiphase field. It is the No. 1 Helbing.

Location is 660 feet from the south and 963.6 feet from the west lines of 28-QR-EL&RR.

Gulf Oil Corp. field application to change from a 2,500-foot stratigraphic test to a 1 1/2-mile southeast outpost to the Farmer (San Andres) field of Crockett County its No. 1-1W State, 15 miles southeast of Big Lake.

Location is 2,310 feet from the south and 1,650 feet from the east lines of 5-46-University. Contract depth is 2,600 feet.

Gulf will drill the No. 1-IT State as a location southeast offset to its No. 1-IV State, recent one-mile east-southeast extension to the Farmer (San Andres) field, 13 miles southeast of Big Lake.

Location is 990 feet from the south and 330 feet from the west lines of 19-47-University. Contract depth is 2,900 feet.

The three-weeks course is designed for teachers and covers all phases of the petroleum industry. Upon completion of the course, each participant will receive three hours of graduate credit from the University of Houston.

Cost of the program is borne by the Oil Information Committee.

Ballot Tuesday To Decide Texas' Senator Choice

Voters Face Chore In Scratching Off 70 Names On Ballot

Whether Texas's second representative in the United States Senate or radical will be determined by or racial will be determined by an estimated two million voters next Tuesday when the state's taxpayers will finance a special election to choose a Senator to replace Lyndon B. Johnson.

Johnson, who under the special "favored son" law, ran for two offices, last November, chose to be vice president instead of Senator, and thus left it up to the state to pick another Senator at a special statewide election.

Seventy-one candidates for the office have their names on the ballot. One of the number is to be each voter's choice and under Texas election law, every other name must be marked out by the voter, leaving only the name of his choice unmarked.

However, the attorney general has ruled that the voter is not obligated to mark horizontal lines through each separate name — that an elongated X over the mass of printed names will be a valid ballot, provided care is taken so that election judges can be sure of the voter's intention. Be sure that your pencil marks do not extend into your candidate's name and be sure that all other names are definitely marked out.

There will be only one voting place in Ozona, the courthouse. Other boxes in the county precincts will be at Powell Field, at the Power Plant and at the Owens ranch box.

Voters To Choose Three For School Board Posts Sat.

Two Incumbents See Re-Election; New-comer on Ballot

Crockett county voters will be called on to choose three members of the board of trustees for the Crockett Consolidated Common School District and two members of the county board of trustees in the annual school trustee election to be held Saturday, April 1.

Three candidates for the three places on the district board appear on the ballot, two of them present members of the board who are seeking re-election and the other taking the place of the member who is not a candidate for re-election.

Bill Carson, board president, and Glenn Sutton, are candidates for another two-year term on the board while Taylor Deaton, the third candidate, is a newcomer. The drawing for places on the ballot placed Deaton in first place, Sutton second and Carson third.

Joe Williams, retiring member of the board, did not seek re-election.

On the same ballot, voters are asked to fill two vacancies on the county board — or rather to re-elect present members of this more or less inactive board. Hillery Phillips, representing Precinct 1, and Wayne W. West, at large, are the two candidates whose names appear on the ballot for the county board.

To vote for all candidates on the ballot, a voter needs only to tear out the perforated corner of his ballot, sign it on the back and drop the corner slip in one box and the ballot in another. If, however, he wishes to write in a candidate other than one appearing on the ballot, he needs to mark out the name on the ballot, he intends voting against and write in the name of the person he wishes to vote for.

There will be only one voting place in Ozona in the trustee election, the courthouse box. Voting also will be at the Powell Field box and the Power Plant box.

"HE WHO MUST DIE" A Recommendation That You See This Powerful Movie

I have seen this masterpiece and my conclusion is that these words of recommendation are in no sense exaggerated. The Passion Story is presented in a new and exciting way. None of the familiar words or scenes are present. Rather, one finds the simple story of a small town on the island of Crete preparing to act out the Passion Story. Following the picking of the characters, the actual Story is acted out in the lives of the town folk.

One cannot begin to describe in words the issue this film so scorchingly dramatizes. So often, we sentimentalize the crucifixion to

the point that it has no real impact upon us. Not so with this film! Those who see it will know that they have been somewhere and have seen something which they will have a hard time forgetting. I agree with Bosley Crowther of the New York Times who wrote that someone "goofed outrageously by not naming it the best foreign-language film of 1958". You will goof too, if you do not see it!

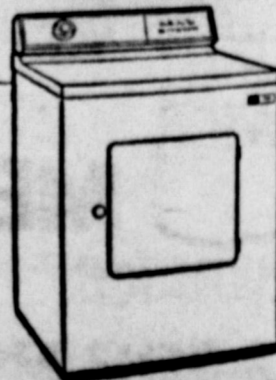

Notes From The County Agent's Office

Eastern tent caterpillars are again damaging trees in the state, according to reports received by extension entomologists. The preferred host of this insect are fruit trees, roses, hawthorn and various shade trees.

Eggs of this insect hatch about the time that first leaves are opening. After feeding on the new leaves for about two days, the larvae begin to construct their tent in a nearby crotch. As the caterpillars grow, they enlarge the tent. This structure is used as a shelter in bad weather, but in good weather the caterpillars leave the tent several times a day to feed on leaves. In case of severe infestations, the larvae may completely defoliate the trees, the entomologists continue.

About six weeks after hatching, the larvae will mature and pupate. The moths emerge in about three weeks and begin to deposit their eggs. These eggs, however, will not hatch until the following spring.

The best time to control these insects in when they are in the web, point out the specialist. If only a few small trees are infested, it may be practical to remove the webs by hand and burn them. If this cannot be done, however, there are several insecticides recommended for their control. DDT, methoxychlor, toxaphene and malathion are effective. These insecticides are available in several

forms, but wettable powder formulations prepared for dilution in water are generally preferred.

All of the recommended insecticides have certain restrictions when applied to fruit trees, the entomologists warn. Any of them, however, can be used safely during the period of bloom and early fruit set. Children and pets should be kept away from fresh sprayed areas.

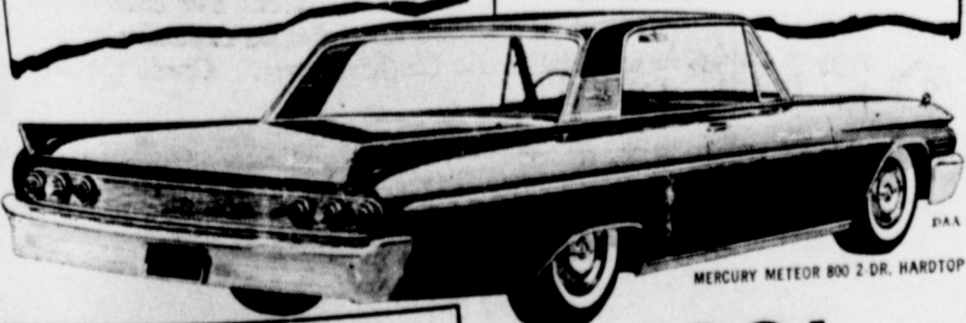

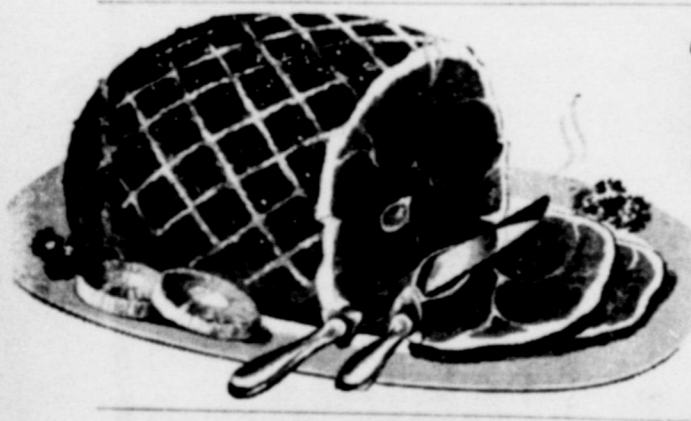
